After reading a book, the student takes a test on the computer, If they get 100 percent correct they earn the total number of points assigned to the book, however, as

## Dry weather calls for extra caution

As the period without appreciable precipitation and the wind picks up even more velocity, w Our area is a tinderbox waiting to explode. Thank fully, we're not into the summer season when the Statewide, the conditions are the same.
