The legislature is at work on methods of legislating safety on the highways, requiring rigid inspection of all motor vehicles in Texas. A Senate committee has just voted 19-9 in favor of a bill to require annual inspection of all vehicles. The bill now goes back to the House for concurrence on minor amendments.

Last week we mentioned Lt. Dan Ethridge being transferred to Florida from New Hampshire to take special schooling. Information from the Tyndall Air Force Base in Florida this week reveals that the school is composed of a carefully selected group of Air Force officers who will undergo intensive academic training and practice in ground-controlled interception, learning the operation of aircraft control and early day warning systems, studying tactical coordination of air defense weapons and precision direction of interceptor squadrons.

This past week the House adopted a proposed constitutional amendment to raise Legislators' pay. The vote was 105-31. Under the terms of this piece of legislation, Legislators would receive \$25.00 per diem for the first 120 days of a regular session and \$7.50 for each day thereafter. At present Legislators receive \$10.00 per diem for the first 120 days and \$5.00 per day for each day thereafter. They also get 25c a mile for travel from their residence to the capitol. Under the new legislation passed Tuesday, the mileage allowance is omitted. However, it adds a stipulation that no Legislator, whether licensed as an attorney or not, will be permitted to conduct any practice before a state board or agency while the Legislature is in session. This proposed pay increase would be retro-active. Naturally, it will have to be approved by the Senate, signed by the Governor and submitted to a vote of the people in a statewide election to be held in 1952.

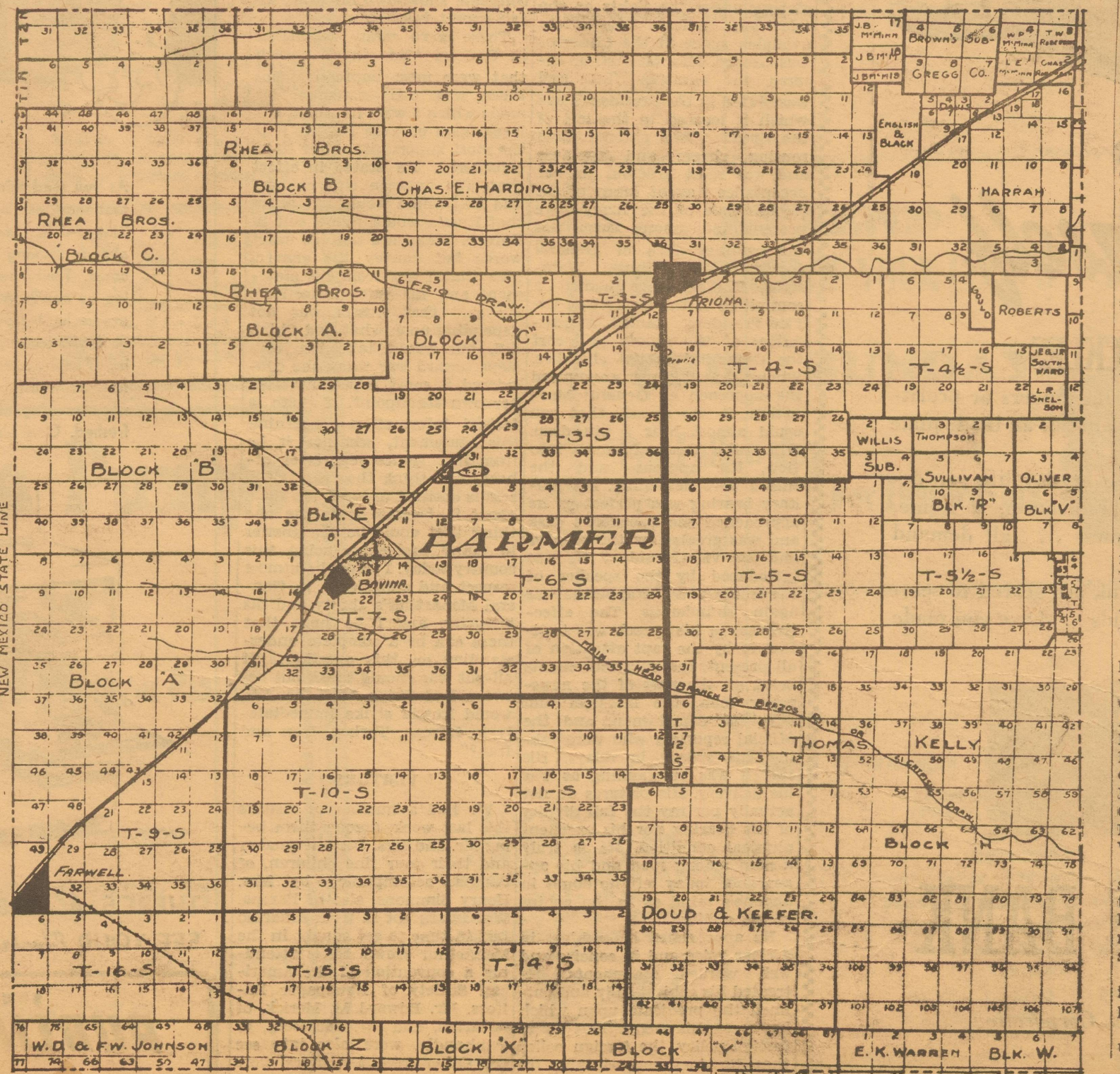

Editorially Speaking

Why Hadn't Someone Thought of This Before—Find Out the Wishes of Every Farmer in Parmer County Regarding Location of the Agriculture Offices Within the County

Congratulations are in order for the Parmer County Soil Conservation District for the first really concrete effort to determine the wishes of Parmer County farmers in selection of the site for the agricultural offices within the county.

That group this week is sending cards to every taxpayer within Parmer County, asking directly where he would prefer the office location.

Certainly such inquiry should more nearly reveal the needs and desires of the county than has the undercover "politicking" so often resorted to in this and other instances.

Mr. Charles Brannon, Secretary of Agriculture, U.S.D.A., recently issued a directive as follows:

"The headquarters of all U.S.D.A. personnel having county office personnel of the Soil Conservation Service and of the Production and Marketing Administration shall be moved into the same county offices; it shall be the policy of the department to invite county agents or representatives of the state agriculture agencies to locate in such single county offices whenever possible."

Now here is the situation locally:

For nearly two years the Soil Conservation Service has been located in Friona in the American Legion Building, and these offices have been furnished without charge by the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. The FMA is located at Farwell, on the county line and on the state line.

Parmer County almost is a perfect square containing over 900 square miles, extending approximately 30 miles from north to south and the same from east to west. Geographically, Friona is in only a few miles from the perfect center of the county. Friona unquestionably also is in the center of the irrigation area, which already is the most thickly populated section of the county and destined to be even more so, if trends noted

in other irrigation belts are followed here.

Friona has made available to the agencies two buildings: one, the entire lower floor of the American Legion building, with adequate space for all offices; or another location which would be adequate space for offices together with garage space for the trucks, either entirely rent free.

Farwell has offered the third floor of the Parmer County Court House.

In considering location of the offices, we wish to reiterate more of Mr. Brannon's sensible suggestion.

"Primary factors as to location and housing are (a) accessibility of the site to the farmers to be served; (b) adequate and suitable space; (c) efficient arrangement and lighting facilities; and (d) cost."

Categorically we cannot but place Friona above the other locations because of its central location, desirability of the physical office space, available, and the economy of the location, both from the rent-free office space and the central location. Time and mileage factors would definitely place a central as the logical choice.

So, whatever the wishes of the farmers, let them be heard! Let's be done with the loose talk, the petty maneuvering, and the pressure politics; we urge every taxpayer to return by this Saturday the cards mailed them.

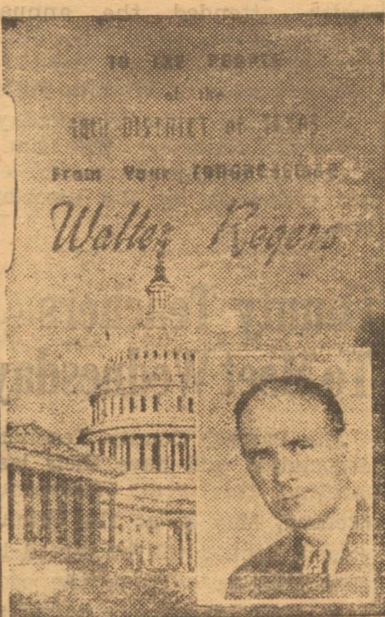

VENI, VIDI, VICI

General of The Army Douglas MacArthur came into Washington early this morning amid tremendous ovations. I was at the Statler Hotel just about two hours before his arrival, and a huge crowd was gathering. His arrival was scheduled for 12:30 a.m. You can see that the crowds gathered in the middle of the night as well as in the middle of the day. His appearance before the joint meeting of Congress today was certainly a grand occasion. The Chamber of the House of Representatives was glaring under the lights of the television cameras and every available space in the Chamber was packed. Mrs. MacArthur entered the chamber first and was seated in the President's box which is located to the left of the Speaker. She entered amid rousing cheers and applause and was most gracious in her acceptance thereof. Many of the top officials of the Army were present and among them was the familiar face of General Jonathan M. (Skinny) Wainwright. The Speaker named a committee of the House and the Vice-President named a committee of the senate to escort the General into the chamber. When the Doorkeeper announced the approach of General MacArthur, it was so still that you could almost hear a pin drop. When the General came into view, the applause and the cheers were deafening. His military bearing was perfect as he approached the Speaker's desk and was greeted by the speaker and the Vice-President. He was introduced by the speaker of the House and the applause was again thunderous. The effectiveness of his speech was testified to by the rapt attention of all present, the only movements being on the part of the newspaper men, the newsreel and television cameramen, and the official reporters who were taking his speech in relays. His speech was outstanding as was his delivery. His pictures do not actually portray the full dignity of his bearing nor his excellent physical condition. He is truly a man among men and his appearance today left no doubt in anyone's mind as to the genius of his ability.

He approached his subject in a clear voice and in concise and well worded statements. He treated his subject fully and outlined the predicate upon which he based his suggestions as to foreign policy, the foreign policy that he does suggest, and his opinion as to the results that would be forthcoming should

these suggestions be adopted. He also gave substantial factual information upon which he was basing his theories and suggestions. He definitely did not have the time to go into a full explanation of these factual matters, but obviously wanted to. I hope that he will go before the Congressional Committees, both Senate and House, and outline in complete detail the entire Far Eastern situation. The people and the Congress are entitled to know the background and all of the facts concerning the Far Eastern situation, and to date we have not been given them. MacArthur is entirely too valuable a man to be shelved in this area of crisis. His complete knowledge and understanding of the Asiatic theatre is of inconceivable value, not only to this country, but to the world. If he is not returned to the Far East, certainly he should be placed in a position of authority among the joint Chiefs of Staff for the purpose of helping to mold our future actions in the Asiatic theatre. This entire transaction, as deplorable as it has been and as uncalled for as has certainly done one thing. It has gotten this country nearer to a concrete foreign policy than we have been in several years. It has brought out into the open a lot of the fumbling and stumbling and is definitely going to put England on the spot for a complete showdown on what we can expect from them.

There were many highlights in General MacArthur's speech that were most impressive, but there was one statement he made which I wish he would enlarge upon because I think it is the most important matter to be considered. He stated in effect that war between this country and Red China would not mean that Russia would follow suit in Europe. Those are not his exact words but convey the general idea that I got from his statement and his voice inflections. He said that Russia was not depending upon what Red China did, but would take her own steps toward war when she considered it most expedient from her own standpoint. If there is factual information concerning this statement, whether it be from intelligence reports or otherwise, I think that the Congress is entitled to know the facts about it, because it is the one thing that could be the answer to many problems facing this country today. I have the utmost respect and confidence in General MacArthur's ability and his integrity, and I do hope that there can be a complete understanding on this question: "If all-out war should break out between Red China and the UN, would Russia strike immediately in Europe, Turkey, Iran and Iraq?"

DO YOU KNOW what "usury" is?

Notaries' Terms End June 1st; Applications Should Be Given Clerk

County Clerk Loyde Brewer has received notification from the office of the Secretary of State John Ben Shepperd on the procedure to be followed in the reappointment of qualified notaries public whose terms expire June 1, and the appointment of new notaries.

The reappointment of all presently qualified notaries of Parmer County will be made by Secretary of State Shepperd by May 20, and each reappointed notary must qualify with the County Clerk on June 1, file oath and bond and pay the statutory filing fee to the clerk in order to serve as a qualified notary for the new term, June 1, 1951 to June 1, 1953. After all reappointed notaries have qualified, the clerk will forward Certificates of Qualification and filing fees to the Secretary of State. Individual notaries are not to send money to the State office.

Terms of all presently qualified notaries expire on June 1, and a notary cannot qualify for the 1951-53 term before that date, irrespective of reappointment or new appointment.

Persons applying through the County Clerks for notary appointments for the first time will receive appointments, effective on the date of qualification. A Certificate of Appointment on each person applying for the first time will be sent to the Secretary of State for approval and then returned to the County Clerk, after which the person will be notified to appear within 10 days to qualify before the Clerk.

In the instructions received from Shepperd, he stated, "An applicant must be 21 years of age or older and a resident of the county in which he intends to act as a notary. It is important that the exact name of the applicant be given and that this name be used on all documents signed by the person.

"Usury" is interest collected in excess of the amount allowed by law. Interest on money borrowed is a contractual matter between two parties. However, the Constitution of Texas, to protect those who must borrow money, has placed a legal limit on the amount that a person can charge for the use of money. The maximum rate of interest varies among the different States of the United States. Each State may set its own limits. Some states allow interest as high as 3 1-2% per month on small loans. In Texas, the maximum allowable rate of interest per year is ten per cent (10%). Any interest above ten per cent is illegal or usurious. All written contracts which provide for a greater rate of interest than ten per cent (10%) are void as to all of this interest, but are enforceable as to the principal. If the usurious interest has been paid, the statutes permit the person so paying to recover double the amount of such interest.

NEWS LETTER

Howdy Neighbor:

Our hats are off to the city employees and the merchants who so generously gave of their time to sweep and wash down the streets this week so that they could be marked off and painted to permit more regular parking. The meeting on feeding of live stock held at Clovis last Saturday was very interesting and a great deal of good information was gathered not only from the talks by the men in charge of the experiments at N.M.A.&M.

but by the practices of some of our good farmers here in Texas. Mr. Marvin Koger Associate Professor of Animal Husbandry, Mr. J. H. Knox head of this department, Mr. P. E. Neale associate professor, were the speakers. The tour on the Bud Williams farm where silage is the main feed was very interesting, also Joe Stoer farm near Lariat who feeds his cattle on wheat. At the cotton meeting at Oklahoma Lane on Tuesday night many interesting facts were brought out on the care and

planting of cotton, selection of seeds, and type most fitted for the locality, as well as different types of spray machinery and equipment and insecticides and the time and money saving devices any farmer can make out of scrap materials he has on his farm, some of which are not in manufacturing production as yet.

It was quite gratifying to see the large number of people present at the Bovina Chamber of Commerce banquet on Monday night. It is this type of meeting where members and their families and others get together with their neighboring towns and enjoy the fellowship which the organization holds.

The taxpayers of Parmer County have received cards from the secretary of the soil conservation, A. L. Black, requesting that they show their preference of where they would like to have the combined offices of the P.M.A. and S.C.S. located. This is a poll to get the feeling of the farmers, these cards must be postmarked by April 28th, and must be signed to be valid.

As to the consolidation of the P.M.A. and S.C.S. offices in Parmer county, it is felt that the people responsible for the agriculture programs in the state and counties should decide where these offices should be consolidated to best serve the farmers in the counties. Since there has not been an unanimous agreement in the county referral to the state agriculture mobilization committee. It has been suggested to this committee that it would be on a factual basis and settled fairly and equitably without regard to personalities or politics.

It is quite disappointing to see that since the last issue of the paper not one person has called at this office or the city office to have trash hauled away or lots burned off to make the city cleaner, do away with breeding places for flies and germs and all in all to make Friona a nicer, cleaner place in which to live. This service is still available—the City Office phone 2762, or the Chamber of Commerce 3301.

At a meeting of the Parmer County Fair Board on Monday evening the dates of September 13-14-15. Curry County Fair dates are September 20-21-22. Tri-State Fair at Amarillo September 24-29. Panhandle South Plains Fair at Lubbock October 1-6th. Castro County Fair date has not yet been set.

Next Tuesday, May 1st at 11:15 p.m., the Boosters of Wichita, Kansas will be in Friona for a short visit. It is hoped that as many as possible will be down town to meet them and greet them and welcome them to Friona. It was hoped that our school could also be included in this but due to the hour of arrival it was felt that this was not possible.

Have you written your Congressman lately? Does he know how you feel about the legislation which is being passed? These men who you voted into

these offices are interested in what you think and what you want but if you do not take the time to drop him a line and tell him he thinks everything is all right and maybe it is, and again maybe it isn't, but does he know? A sheet of paper and an envelope and a postage stamp are inexpensive and hold a great deal of weight if you will only take the time to use it.

A number of copies of the North Atlantic Treaties have been sent to this office and you are free to call and get a copy if you wish to read the contents. These are made available through the United States Chamber of Commerce for your convenience.

The new 1951 Texas State road maps have arrived along with windshield stickers for your car and are here for the asking.

Insecticides are not too plentiful at present and by the time cotton is going to be ready to treat they may be very scarce. You should be looking ahead and preparing for this. According to the new men from the experimental station, the first spraying should begin when there are four leaves and sprayed three times at seven day intervals then again when there are eight to ten leaves the same as before to kill the thrips and aphids also the boll worm which lays its eggs on the leaves and hatch at a twenty-five day cycle. This can be accomplished either by dusting or spraying but here in this country spraying is more efficient due to the wind and lack of moisture, either by a power unit on the ground or by plane.

Benger Air Park has received the latest model airplane equipped with spraying and dusting equipment. Bill Jennings went to the factory and flew this equipment in this week. They are now prepared to do any type of dusting or spraying needed also I have learned that sowing of grasses is becoming very popular by the use of an airplane.

The S.C.S. boys have agreed to run a grade line on our City Park, Granville McFarland has agreed to loan us the equipment to grade and level up the ground. Now, who will be generous enough to lend a hand to operate this equipment so that we will have a pleasant place this summer for our kiddies to play and enjoy the shade of the many trees throughout the park.

There are a number of interested bidders waiting for Friday to bid on our 62 blocks of paving. From all indications things are going to start popping very soon. The next will be sidewalks. This of course will be up to the property owners but, paved streets, new street lights and all the other improvements this would really add to the appearance of Friona as well as the convenience to the residents and children who use our streets so much going to and from school and the kiddies who so thoughtlessly play in the road.

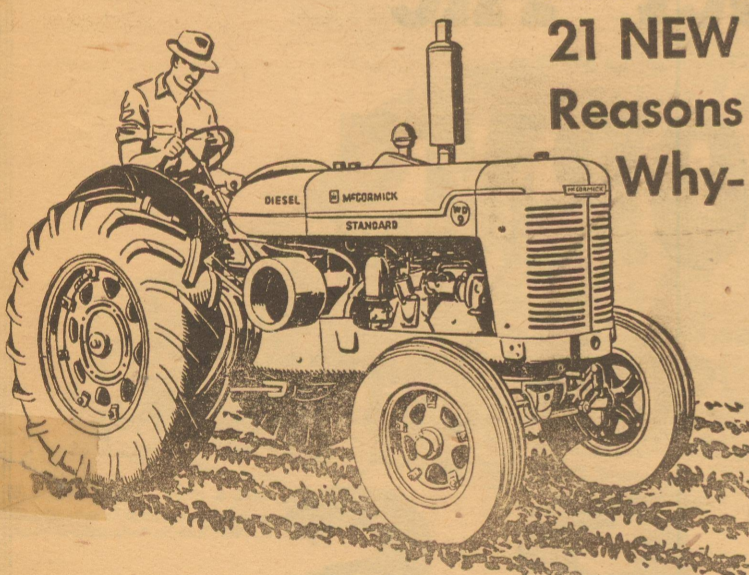

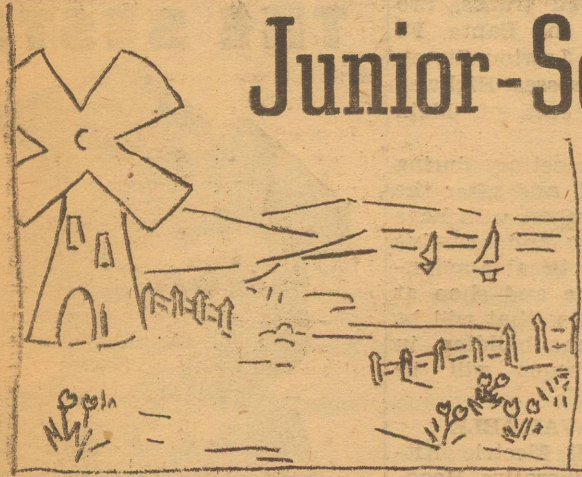

OPS Price Charts Due from Many Retail Establishments by Monday, Says Taylor

Groceries, Restaurants, Some Others Affected

Three groups of retail establishments—restaurants, groceries and consumers goods outlets which are subject to Ceiling Price Regulation 7—face deadlines for compliance with Office of Price Stabilization regulations by Monday, April 30.

The reminder came from C. J. Taylor, acting district price executive in the Lubbock district office, which includes Packer county. The 66-county district reaches south and west to the Rio Grand, El Paso and the New Mexico state line, north to the Oklahoma line and east to the eastern boundaries of Lipscomb, Hemphill, Wheeler, Collingsworth, Childress, Cottle, King, Garza, Borden, Howard, Glasscock, Reagan, Pecos, and Terrell counties.

Here is the way each of these types of establishments is affected:

Restaurants, soda fountains and other food and drink establishments—by April 30 must file base period statements of food cost per dollar sales with their district OPS office.

Grocers under CPR 15 & 16—Must have their ceiling prices in effect by April 30. Also, by April 28 they must notify OPS what category, based on 1950 gross sales volume, they are in: Independent store with less than \$75,000, independent with \$75,000 to less than \$375,000, non-independent with less than \$375,000, or a retail store, independent or otherwise, with \$375,000 or more.

Sellers of CPR 7 items—Must file pricing charts by April 30. Many merchants not originally affected by Regulation 7 are now affected. About 15 new items were placed under the regulation two or three weeks ago. Sellers of the new items must be in compliance by April 30, along with those originally affected, Taylor said.

Items under Regulation 7 now include musical instruments, radio and television sets, phonographs and records, housewares, garden tools, light hardware, some paper products, silverware, chinaware, glassware, jewelry, watches, clocks and other items. Wearing apparel, floor coverings, furniture, specialty shop items and certain other merchandise have been under the order since it was first issued.

Merchants should send their price lists to the district Office of Price Stabilization, Broadway Building, 1202 Texas Avenue, Lubbock, Texas.

Businessmen needing additional information regarding their compliance should direct their inquiries to the district price executive in Lubbock.

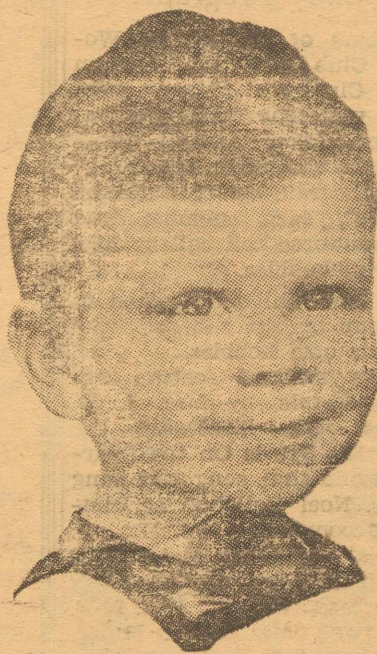

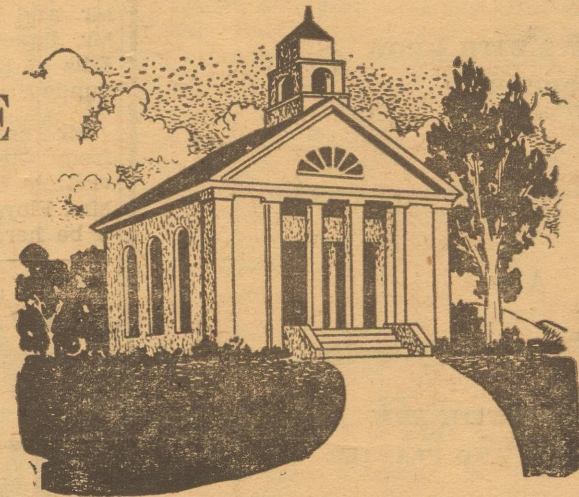

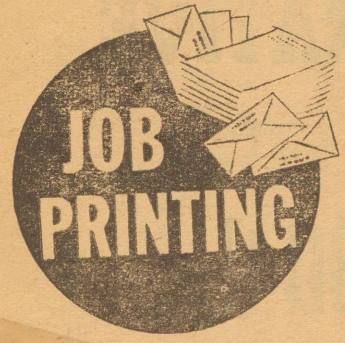

The Hereford appearance is sponsored by the Auxillary of the Episcopalian church and the WSCS of the Methodist church in Hereford.

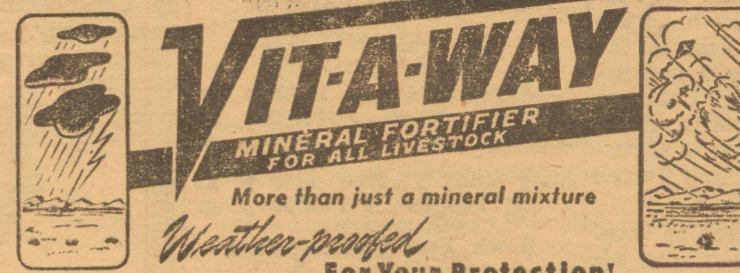
