Bovina Mustangs Go All the Way, Win Regional 6-Man Football Title Thursday

Game Viewed by Over 750 Fans From Area

In undoubtedly the most exciting football game ever played on Bovina territory, the Bovina Mustangs last Thursday fought to a 33-26 win over the Paint Creek Pirates for the regional 6-man football championship.

Scores: Bovina-Hromas 14, Derrick 6, J. Ware 6, L. Ware 6; total 33. Paint Creek - O. Moody 20, C. Thomas 6; total 26.

The first touchdown came early in the game when Bovina won the toss and received the Pirate kick down on the Bovina 10 yard line where Ware brought it up field to the 35. Young carried it 8 more yards on second down; when Derrick gained a couple, and Denny threw a pass to Hromas which netted a touchdown. Hromas took kick-off the extra point, making the score 8-0. Though the Pirates were tied with the Mustangs on several occasions, they never passed them in scoring during the game.

As 6-man football is played only to the regional level, this was the highest honor that the Bovina team could attain; and consequently it ended the football season there.

The schools will close on Sunday, December 16 with a "Massed Festival Choir" concert at First Baptist church, Hereford beginning at 8:15 p. m. Choirs from the three central schools will participate.

Assisting Dr. Biddle in the school at Friona will be his wife and Bob Lawrence, educational director of First Baptist church of Hereford, and association music director.

This is an unusual opportunity for those who are interested in music. No charge will be made.

Final Water Report Will Be Drafted At Austin After Public Hearing Dec. 11

Controversial Report Attracting Statewide Attention, Water Users

The public hearing of the Texas Water Code committee called by Senator Rogers Kelley, of Edinburg, beginning at 9:30 a. m. December 11 in the Senate chamber of the capitol in Austin, is attracting widespread attention throughout the State.

"We had over four thousand copies of our Preliminary Report mimeographed, but the demand for copies exhausted our supply during the first week after its release on November 15," Senator Kelley stated in Austin today.

"In addition, more than 70 persons and organizations have indicated their desire to appear at the hearing and express their views concerning the Texas Water Laws, Kelley continued.

"The genuine interest manifested in this hearing is most encouraging, and after we have listened to the recommendations of the citizens of Texas who will give us the benefit of their ideas concerning the revision of the Water Laws in this public meeting, the committee will be able to prepare its Final Report for submission to the governor and to the legislature in a manner that will be of the greatest benefit to the State," Senator Kelley said.

Money to carry out the city improvement program in Friona has been deposited in the Friona State Bank this week by the bonding company. Voters recently authorized issuance of \$100,000.00 in street improvement, waterworks improvement and extension, and city office-fretation erection; and that total amount has been deposited together with some \$180.00 interest paid by the bonding company as interest due from the time bonds were signed until final state approval this week.

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Engineers are now occupied in preliminary surveys and sketches of the waterworks program and the city hall building, with advertisement for bids on the waterworks already published. Paving will necessarily have to be preceded by the waterworks program.

Membership Drive In Full Swing Throughout Week

With its membership drive in full swing, a full-time manager on the job, and a work program already commenced, people of the Friona area, are recognizing this week that the new Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture is an actuality, with machinery in motion to provide all the services of a community commerce organization.

The board of directors met early Wednesday morning for a kick-off breakfast prior to membership drive. During the day over half of the annual budget of \$8,000.00 was paid in by 62 new memberships.

The board emphasizes that, though this is a good start, the full amount will be necessary for smooth, effective operation that should give value received to the members and community as a whole. Only business memberships were solicited Wednesday, with only part of the business firms contacted; effort will be made to contact all the businesses at an early date, together with individuals desiring active membership.

The organization last week ordered additional Christmas street lighting which has been strung by city employees, and the group is cooperating with the American Legion in bringing Santa Claus to town on Saturday the 16th, with his candy, nuts and fruit for the youngsters. Santa will make his appearance on the streets at 2 p. m.

Several city and rural problems are being studied by the group, with emphasis on better trade relations, new business enterprises and professional services, and rural road marking and improvement.

Both President O. J. Beene and Manager Alan Romich expressed appreciation today for the cooperation of members and non-members alike throughout the area, and voiced their optimism regarding a practical work program returning real benefits throughout the new year of operation.

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EDITORIAL

It Pays to Know the Facts, Whether Regarding Government Spending, Private Enterprise or Worldwide Politics

Ignorance is little excuse. So many of the increasingly complex problems of local or national economy are often made even more complex by misunderstanding of the facts.

The free enterprise governments have of late been the victim of wholesale propaganda directed by the communistic blocs to the ignorant or unformed masses of Asia. Just to illustrate how easily these Orientals could be misled, and consequently align themselves against the "capitalistic" United States, we are printing the results of a recent survey in our own nation about enterprise here at home, a subject in which we should be at least moderately informed.

If a recent survey made of a group of high school seniors produced typical views, American education is giving the student a highly erroneous idea of how American industry operates and the size of the profits it earns.

These seniors were asked to estimate how much profit the average company makes. Their answers averaged 50 per cent. The true figure, covering a long period of years, is about six per cent.

They were asked to estimate the average investment per worker in American industry.

You can't change the nature of your faults by blaming them on your nature.

Those who would destroy free enterprise and free government have small concern with the truth. They make the most of every misconception that exists in the public mind.

Only those who know the facts can make intelligent decisions. And the place to start teaching those facts is in our schools and colleges.

Young Herring also has learned the value of teamwork and sportsmanship. A 4-H'er for eight years, his unusual record includes 176 dairy exhibits and a substantial dairy income. Herring has won seven grand, eight junior, and five senior champion awards at three major shows, one of the second largest dairy shows in the world. He was high point man in dairy judging at the 4-H Club Round Up, 1950, and served as director of the Plainview Dairy shows for 1949 and 1950. Judges have named him Star Dairy Farmer of Texas, Southern Region. With two years' junior leader experience, young Herring now has part interest in his father's herd and helped to make his home a grade A dairy farm. Lederle Laboratories has provided his award.

The Law & You

Do you know why you "acknowledge" legal instruments?

Most everyone has at some time or another signed a legal instrument before a notary public, and had him take your acknowledgment to the same in the space below your signature.

The notary public is someone who is vouched for and is known to the authorities. The notary, when he takes your acknowledgment vouches for you, and says that he knows you, and knows that you are the person who signed the instrument. When the notary signs the acknowledgment and seals the same, you may then place the same of record without further proof of who you are.

It is a procedure to prevent fraud and forgery. Many instruments which have no business being filed might find their way into the Deed Records and cloud the title to your property were it not for the requirement of an acknowledgment.

Texas 4-H'ers Honored for Best Achievement Record

STATE-WIDE recognition has been accorded E. P. Wicker, Jr., 19, of Wilson, and Yolanda Ellis, 15, of Plainview. Each will receive an artistic pair of statuettes symbolizing achievement from the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work.

Weekly Book Review

John Masefield Groups Favorite English Poems of More Than a Century Ago Into My Favorite English Poems, A Treasure

"My Favorite English Poems" edited by John Masefield, well known English poet, has been criticized because his selections contain none of the poems written within the last 100 years. The poems he has chosen could have been loved by him for half a century they claim.

We find upon looking through the volume containing poems from 45 poets that the last ones named, or the more recent ones, are our favorites.

Beginning with Langland and Chaucer and finishing with poems from Rossetti there are complete poems, choice stanzas, or even a single line chosen by the author as his preference. Many will not like this sort of arrangement but it has its good points.

By such a preparation, the volume is not to large in size to be discouraging. It offers a taste of what Masefield considers the best and is therefore an inducement to the reader to follow through by reading his favorite poet in full. Best of all it offers one, a good pick up book to read at short periods of time, or as some call it a bedside book to be read upon going to bed.

We liked best, poems from Milton, Shakespeare, Keats, Wordsworth, Shelley, Browning, Coleridge, Tennyson and Byron, and those were the ones we read as given by this tome.

From Lord Byron there was only one poem, "Occasional Pieces" while Samuel Taylor Coleridge had several stanzas from "The Ancient Mariner" as well as "Kubla Khan" and others.

John Keats' "To Autumn" was

our chosen poem from this poet and one line which was given from another reading. "The stars look very cold about the sky."

"To a Skylark" by Percy Shelley recalled for us, high school days in an English Literature class and perhaps had something to with our choice from this poet as found among those selected by the author.

Familiar to us from long ago grade-readers was "The Eagle" by Tennyson and was read by us first among his poems selected. And there were two lines from the "Dying Swan" which read, "The wild Swan's death-hymn took soul, of that waste place with joy" and from "Mort D'Arthur," "On one side lay the ocean, and on one lay a great water, and the moon was full."

Most disappointing to us was the fact that the author did not mention Mrs. Browning, one of our very special favorites of the English bards.

In rechecking we found another one memorized years back, Thomas Gray's "Elegy Written in a Country Churchyard." It was the only one with which we were familiar, of the poems listed under his name.

If you feel like renewing your acquaintance with older English poets this is a good edition. And as you know, poetry is very much back in vogue again. 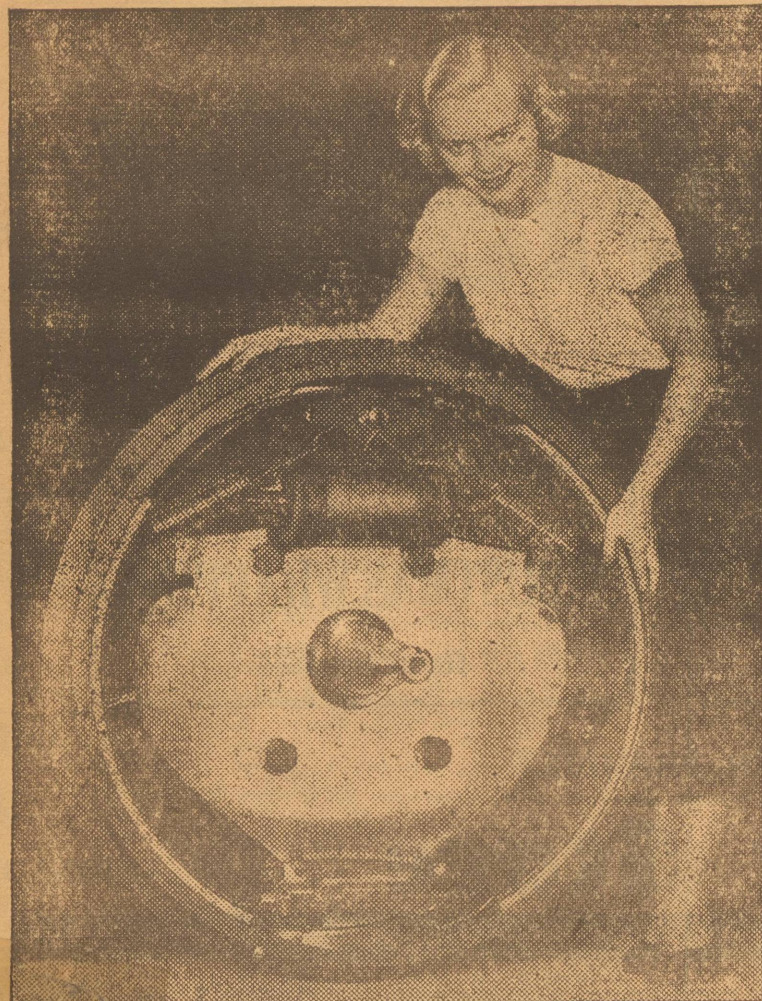

Texas Venture

In Education • 1876-1951

Our first state college—Texas A. and M. is now in its seventy-fifth year



In recent months much has been written of amazing new developments in the forestry field through the breeding of hybrid trees, producing a fast-growing, vigorous new tree in much the same manner as scientists have produced hybrid corns and other valuable new plants. Success in this field would revolutionize forestry practices. Thirty years ago a little-known Texas scientist working on the A. and M. campus produced hybrid oak trees which are campus landmarks today. This pioneering opened up an entirely new field which is now coming to the attention of the world. Hilge Ness, who produced hybrid oaks by crossing the overcup oak and the liveoak, was chief botanist of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and professor of Botany at the college for many years. He joined the staff in 1889, after graduating from Texas A. and M., and served until his death in 1928. A distinguished scientist, he had great influence as a teacher and researcher, and made valuable contributions to Texas agriculture through the production of many useful new plants, one of which was the Nessberry, a cross between the dewberry and raspberry, which still bears his name.

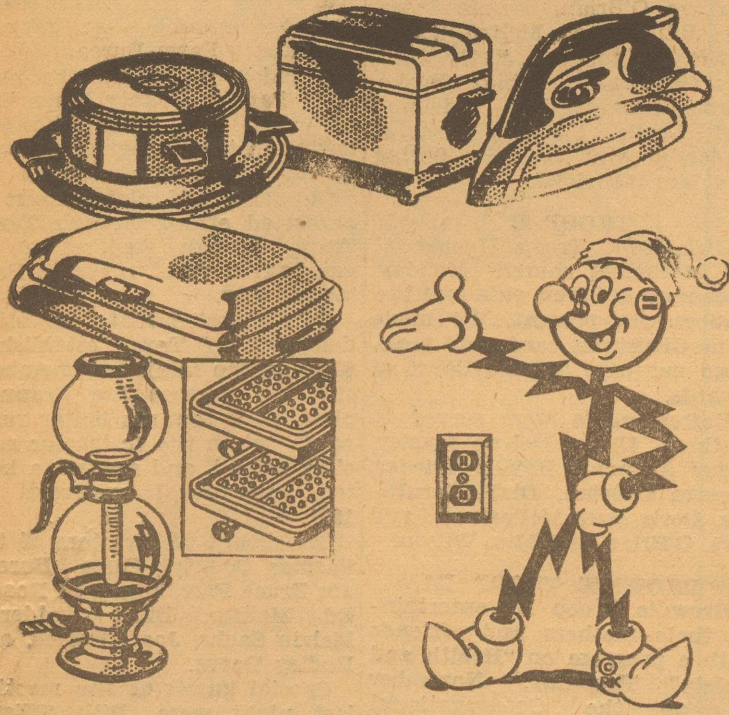

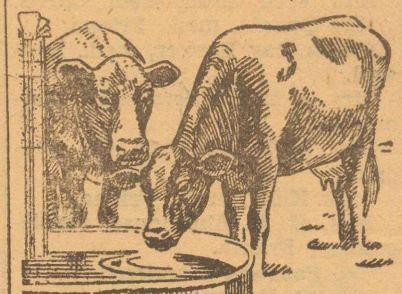
