EDITURIAL

It Pays to Know the Facts, Whether Regarding Government Spending, Private Enterprise or Worldwide Politics

Ignorance is little excuse.

So many of the inreasingly complex probtems of local or national economy are often made even more complex by misunderstanding

The free enterprise governments have of late been the victim of wholesale propaganda directed by the communistic blocs to the ignorant or uniformed masses of Asia. Just to illustrate how easily these Orientals could be misinformed, and consequently align themselves against the "capitalistic" United States, we are printing the results of a recent survey in our own nation about enterprise here at home, a subject in which we should be at least moderately informed.

If a recent survey made of a group of high school seniors produced typical views, American education is giving the student a highly erroneous idea of how American industry operates and the size of the profits it earns.

These seniors were asked to estimate how much profit the average company makes. Their answers averaged 50 per cent. The true figure, covering a long period of years, is about six per

In operation, however, the anchor (top center) holds assembly stationary. One brake shoe acts to retard the other, multiplying friction and actuating a process called "self-energization."







In recent months much has been written of amazing new development in the forestry field through the breeding of hybrid trees, producing a fast-growing, vigorous new tree in much the same manner as scientists a fast-growing, vigorous new tree in much the same manner as scientists have produced hybrid corns and other valuable new plants. Here's Washington news of great interest to small business and to all taxpayers. This reported action almost approaches a revolution in bureau operation.

A Washington bureau has expanded its services and simultaneously slashed its operating

The Reconstruction Finance Corporation has cut \$5,000,000 from its administrative expense.

At the same time the RFC indicates it is now set up, despite decreased expenses, to be of greater value in assisting inde-pendent small business to secure long term capital loans.

It is not to be presumed that RFC is now embarking on the usual bureau practice of throw-

ing the taxpayers' money away.

To the contrary, RFC will insist on applicants for loans showing fair credit responsibility. But small business, unable to get long term loans from local banks due to local banking laws, will be given every consideration. And RFC intends to be self-support-

"glory seekers"; the agency does not run heavily to the corps of press agents found in so many branches of government. This money buys commodities to give away. If corporations seeking this business all hold to one price, the profits are greater and small business is effectively blocked out. Only anti-trust law enforcement blocks this easy road to millions from Marshall Plan

The office of Information of the Marshall Plan has just re-leased an interesting item: "For generations men of this tiny Bavarian mountain-top village have grumbled at hauling water for drinking, cooking, and bathing, up six steep kilometers of rough road. At last, the tiresome chore is ended. The Marshall Plan is bringing water up the mountain to the people of Hoehenberg." The report then relates that a \$22,800 pumping station and pipeline has been bought by American taxpayers' dollars.

So now, the men of Hoehen-berg grumble no more. And all the income tax paid by 56 American families with two children on an earnings of \$5,000 per year each will go to pay for the water


