**TAXPAYER WANTS SUBSIDY FOR ROCKING CHAIRS**  
Hon. Earl Wilson U. S. Congressman from Indiana, recently got a letter from a constituent, which he placed in the Congressional Record, dated April 6, 1950. It appears on page A2775, Seymour, Indiana, March 25, 1950.

Dear Mr. Wilson:  
I am in the furniture business and am writing this letter to request that you obtain for me a subsidy on our platform rockers. We are now making about a thousand a year and are eager to step up this production to 50,000 as soon as possible. With so many people in this country getting rocking-chair money, we feel that the market is unlimited for our product. Since you are voting money for potatoes, cotton, tobacco, railroads, aviation, and many other industries, I see no reason why we in the furniture business should be slighted.

Now, we would like a guaranteed price of \$50 each for these rockers. In the event that we are unable to sell all of them, we will arrange to burn them right here at the factory rather than go to the expense of shipping them somewhere else to be destroyed. I notice that you paid \$2.90 a bag for potatoes in Maine and then shipped them to Chicago which raised the cost to \$4 a bag and then sold them to farmers for one cent a bag. That sort of thing is pretty expensive, so we will gladly arrange to destroy any surplus of our rockers right at the factory.

Please let me hear from you as soon as possible regarding the above mentioned rocker program, as we are eager to get the Government checks rolling in.

**Draft Registrants Have Responsibility Of Keeping Boards Posted on Change of Status; State, Local Boards Emphasize**

**Marriages Should be Reported Immediately**

Filling of the Texas draft quota of 2,513 men for September is being jeopardized by the fact that many men, now classified in 1-A, have failed to report marriages and other changes in their circumstances, Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield State director of Selective Service, has charged in a strongly-worded statement.

"If we fail to furnish the number of men desired from this state, this failure on the part of many men will be the chief factor in that failure," General Wakefield said.

The state director said that many of the local draft boards are reporting that when they issue orders to report for physical examination, many of the registrants are coming in with evidence of marriages that took place "many months before."

General Wakefield pointed out that if these men who have married had notified local boards immediately after the marriage took place, they would never have been sent an order to report for physical examination in the first place.

"We are operating with little time to get the job done demanded of us," the general said. "The local boards, unless they want to declare such registrants delinquent, have to turn around and get out an order to report for physical examination to the next man in order of age. All this takes time, and our local boards have short deadline to meet."

Selective Service wants to be reasonable about this situation, the state director said, "but we know that the patience of our local board members are wearing thin. We just want to point out that it is not mandatory under the law that married men be reclassified into III-A under such circumstances.

"Such men who fail to report changes of status, such as marriage, or a change of address legally are eligible to be declared delinquent for failing to com-

ply with the law. A delinquent can be inducted immediately ahead of all others under this law and if we are forced to do so in order to meet our calls, we will comply with the law to the letter," General Wakefield continued.

The state director concluded with the statement that notifications concerning marriage, change of address, and other changes of status are "the entire responsibility of the registrant," and that notifications of change must be sent to local boards in writing over the signature of the registrant.

"Too much damage already has been done," he said. "The time is almost past for men to get things squared with their draft boards."

**Moseley Is First Parmer Draftee; Takes Pre-Induction Examinations on First Day of Army-Air Recruiting Center**

**Additional Calls Are Issued for Registrants Monday, Monday Week**

Hugh E. Moseley of Friona was one of the 59 registrants to be processed by the pre-induction machinery of the Amarillo recruiting station Monday.

Moseley, who had been called under the present draft step-up, took physical examinations at Amarillo and returned home to await further word from the Hereford office out of which the Parmer County registrants are handled.

According to Mrs. Petersen, clerk of the Hereford office, Moseley and all other registrants upon being notified of acceptance to the armed services, usually within seven days after examination, will be given a minimum of 21 days to set their personal affairs in order before induction.

The Hereford board has received calls for draftees to report for physical examinations both this next Monday and the following Monday, Mrs. Petersen said.

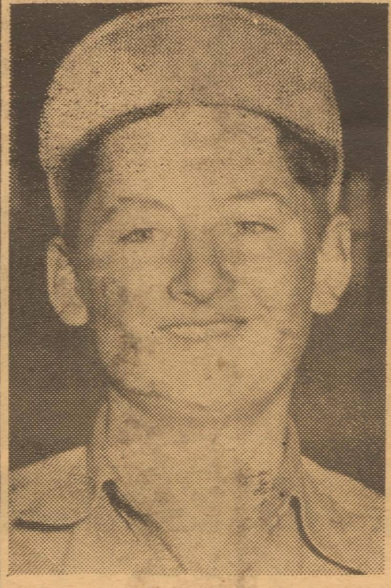

**Bible School Will Begin Mon. Week At Friona Church**

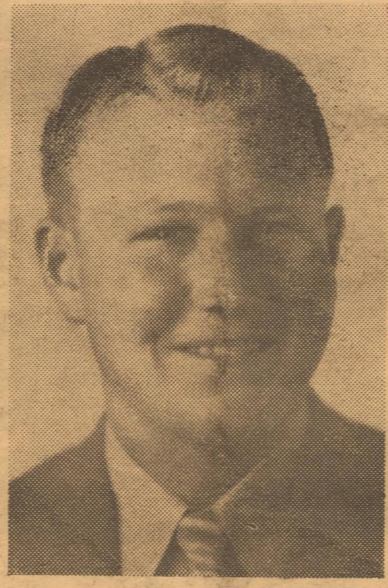

treated like the queen she is. Her stall in the fair's \$250,000 cattle barn will be richly decorated to the queen's taste. Lackeys-in-waiting will attend her at all times while she chews her royal cud.

However, Sable's success in life is due not merely to her own serious efforts. She is the result of a plan of careful breeding extending back far beyond the turn of the century.

Her father is Observer's Blonde's Signal, highest tested senior superior sire in the nation. Her mother, too, was a champion.

Her owners are a young Texas couple who are breeders in the best tradition of the cattle country. They are Mr. and Mrs. Chester Elliff of the Victory Jersey farm near Tulia, high in the Panhandle.

To help the champ achieve her amazing record, completed in 1949, the Elliff's milked Sable

by hand four times every 24 hours for 365 days. During this period they fed her 7,798 pounds of a tasty mixture of oats, wheat bran, alfalfa leaf meal pellets, cottonseed meal, soybean meal and salt.

As a result Sable's output was almost rich enough to whip. Her 19,497 pounds of milk produced 1,223 pounds of butterfat. She was the first Jersey to produce more than 1,200 pounds since 1934.

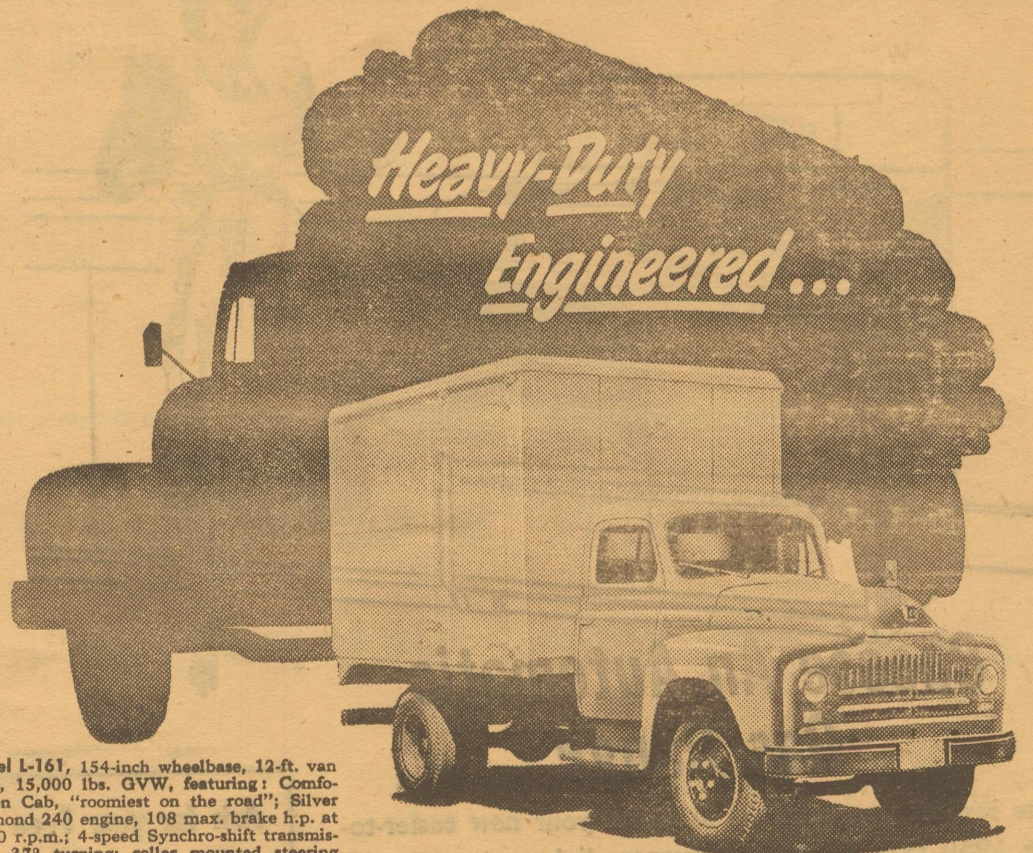

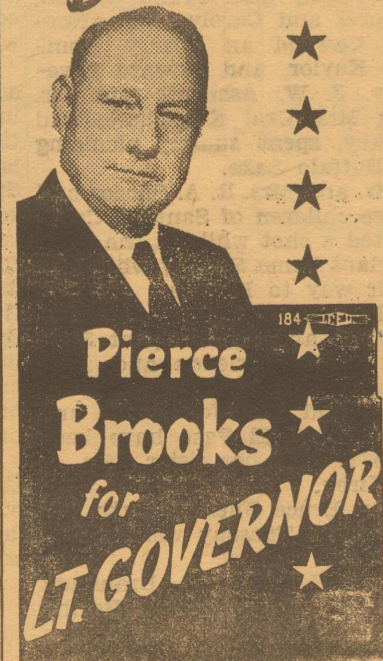

### Governor Outlines Civil Defense Plan In Executive Order Received Here By Mack Bainum, Defense Coordinator

#### Concern Expressed But Excitement Is Folly, Gov. States

A Statement from Governor Allan Shivers To the People of Texas

The Korean incident has caused the State government to receive numerous letters, telegrams and telephone calls concerning various phases of civil defense.

It is timely to advise the people of Texas as to the status of our planning and organization.

A State organization has been in existence and active for a period of months. The State is in constant touch with the appropriate officials of the Federal government. When the invasion of South Korea occurred, a letter was in the mails from the Governor to the 7133 mayors and the 254 county judges of Texas, outlining in detail the plans as they effect local government. This personal letter will be followed by bulletins issued as frequently as necessary to keep local communities completely advised of developments.

Private industry and business and public utility installations should take normal precautions for the protection of property, but we have no advices from the National government which would indicate the need for special policing by State or local forces.

There is much justification for concern over the international situation but there are no grounds for excitement or hysteria.

While the agencies of the government continue to strengthen their forces and facilities, the individual citizen might well show his or her willingness to participate in the total preparedness of our people for any emergency by volunteering immediately to take the standard courses in first aid and care of the sick. This training will be of the greatest benefit to ourselves and to our neighbors no matter what kind of disaster befalls us.

There is also a need now for

recruits to take training as nurse's aides.

A practical, an important, and a patriotic job is available for each one of us. I have no doubt that the citizenship of this State will respond to the calls made for their help in demonstrating to the world that the people of America are equal to any test which future time may bring.

#### Local Organization Outlined In Order Of Texas Governor

State Disaster Relief and Civil Defense Local Organization

The Mayor of each incorporated town in this State will be recognized as the Municipal Defense Coordinator for his jurisdiction.

The County Judge of each county will be recognized as the County Defense Coordinator for the area of the county outside the corporate limits of the municipalities in the county.

It is suggested that the County Judge call a meeting of the County Defense Coordinator and the Municipal Defense Coordinators in the County for the purpose of effecting proper coordination of effort and agreements for mutual aid.

For the information of the State Disaster Relief and Civil Defense office, it is requested that the County Judge advise the Governor when such a meeting has been held and a county-wide organization effected by the County Judge and the Mayors in the county.

By virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, the above order is issued for the protection of the public safety in case of calamity or disaster.

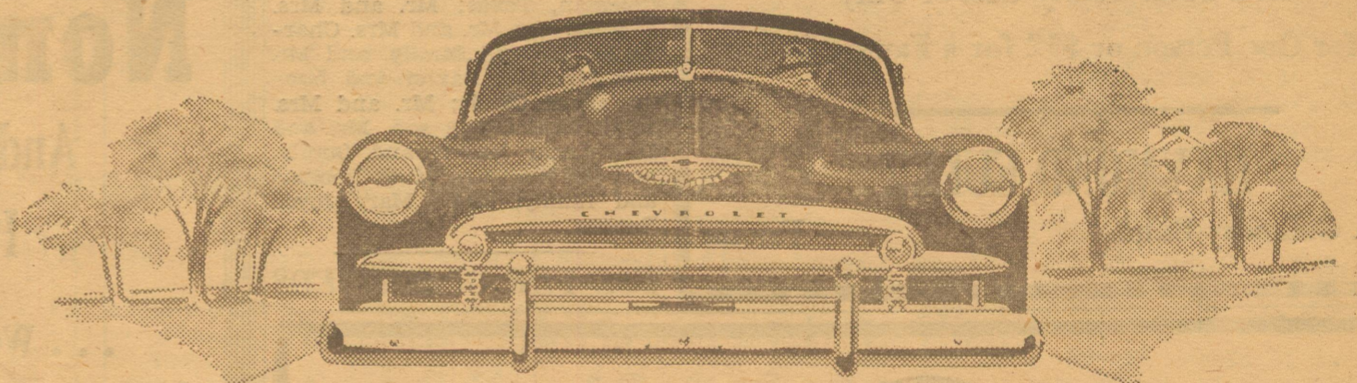

**Candidate Rogers  
 Announces District  
 Campaign Plans**

Campaign manager for Walter Rogers of Pampa candidate for congress in the August primary is Wiley Reynolds, a native of Gray County.

This is the first venture in politics for the 35-year-old farmer-stockman, who said, "I don't know much about politics, but I know Walter Rogers and I know the Panhandle needs him in congress."

Reynolds said campaign headquarters will be opened in Pampa and a district-wide organization will see to it that voters of the Panhandle hear about Rogers.

"I have known Roberts since he moved to the Panhandle. He is a solid citizen, a civic worker, a family man and a hard worker. I know that he is qualified and capable and will work for the district in which he lives," Reynolds said.

Ground work for an extensive campaign for Rogers has been started. Some of the county chairmen appointed by Reynolds include S. B. Owens of Collingsworth county, C. J. Humphrey of Amarillo, and a Hall county committee composed of N. W. Durham, Horace Tarver and C. L. Sloan.

Other chairmen will be announced later.

Rogers opened his second primary campaign with a radio speech from KGNC in Amarillo last week.

In the speech he called for the government to furnish the people more facts and truth about matters without withholding any bad news.

"Too many times in our history the American people have been spared the cold facts under the pretense that they would be unduly alarmed."

"I say it is better to be unduly alarmed in time to do something about it than it is to receive the information later in the form of heart-breaking news from the battlefield," Rogers said.

Rogers will be heard again over KGNC August 4 at 7 p. m.

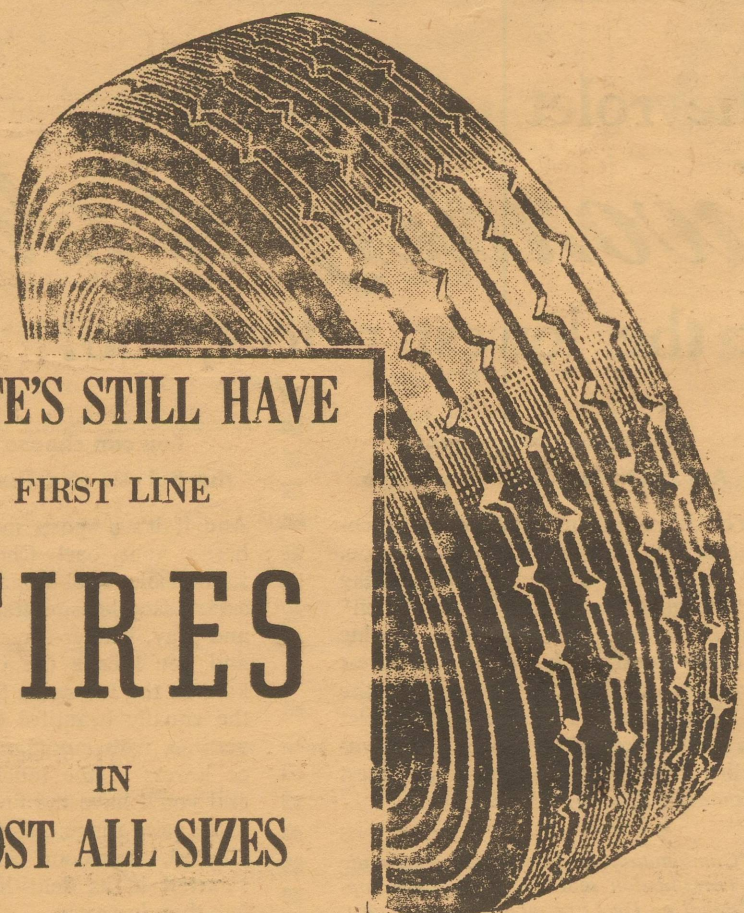

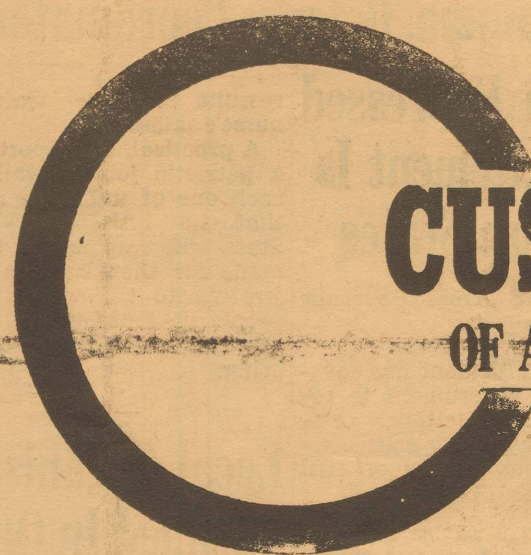
