





# Cheaper.

In spite of recent general reductions in living costs, according to the annual report on the subject by the National Industrial Conference Board, the cost of living has not reached prewar levels. At the close of 1931 it was still 34 per cent higher than in July, 1914.

During this same period, however, the AVERAGE COST of domestic electric service has decreased 32 per cent BELOW the July, 1914, average.
