The County Federation of Women's Clubs met at Bovina with the Busy Bee Club as Hostess Saturday, July 30. About fifty ladies were present. Following the business session a covered dish luncheon was served in the Home Economics dining room of the High School Building. The Bovina Club sponsored the special entertainment numbers on the program for the afternoon. The main feature of the program was a lecture on "The Art of Meal Planning" by Mrs. Hamlin Overstreet of Farwell. Mrs. Overstreet is a teacher of Home Economics and is an artist in her line of work. She treated the subject very thoroughly. Some of the things she said were: Plan your meals at least a day ahead—a week ahead if possible. In planning your meals consider the following things: 1—Cost; 2—Occupation of those eating; 3—Age and health of those eating; 4—Food value of foods served. She said that meals must have variety.

- 1—Variety of color.
- 2—Variety of taste.
- 3—Variety of textures of foods.
- 4—Variety as to food elements so that they contain Carbohydrates, protein, fat, mineral and vitamins.

Friona's Singing Convention.

The singing convention held here Sunday under the management of Cason Jones and Clarence Day, was from a standpoint of numbers perhaps the largest ever held here. The crowd has been variously estimated at from 1000 to 1500, and there were more than 300 cars parked about the school grounds.

Another point in favor of this convention as mentioned by many of those present, is that the singing was of a higher type than has been heard at similar occasions in the past.

Another feature of the afternoon's program was the short talk by Rev. Lipscomb of Amarillo, who was here conducting a series of revival meetings at the Methodist church. He is an able and fluent speaker and his remarks were cleverly put and his constant flow of witticisms kept the large audience in a pleasant humor, with frequent bursts of applause and laughter.

During the afternoon session the large auditorium of the grade school building was packed to its utmost, all seats being occupied and all standing room taken. One man remarked upon entering the room and finding no seat: "Well, I can only stay till bedtime, so I will stand up." The stage was also crowded to its capacity with singers, forming a choir of 50 or 60 singers, who were led in turn by various gifted singers, including V. O. Stamps and Freddie Martin, two members of the faculty who will conduct the three weeks singing school here, beginning Monday morning.

International Sunday School

Lesson

August 7

THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

Exodus 20:1-11

1. And God spoke all these words, saying:
 2. I am the Lord thy God, which have brought thee out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage.
 3. Thou shalt have no other gods before me.
 4. Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image, or any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth:
 5. Thou shalt not bow down thyself to them, nor serve them: for I the Lord thy God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children unto the third and fourth generation of them that hate me;
 6. And showing mercy unto thousands of them that love me, and keep my commandments:
 7. Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain; for the Lord will not hold him guiltless that taketh his name in vain.
 8. Remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy.
 9. Six days shalt thou labour, and do all thy work:
 10. But the seventh day is the sabbath of the Lord thy God: in it thou shalt not do any work, thou, nor thy son, nor thy daughter, thy manservant, nor thy maidservant, nor thy cattle, nor thy stranger that is within thy gates:
 11. For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that in them is, and rested the seventh day: wherefore the Lord blessed the sabbath day, and hallowed it.

Golden Text: Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might.—Deut. 6:5.

Introduction.

"The commandments are not out of style . . . because moral history has not changed, because people have not changed . . . because God has not changed. And the laws which he gave to man in the dawn of time will be the laws of God when the last day breaks. We speak of having left them behind. Far from that, we have not even caught up with them."—John Alexander Hayes.

Lesson Connection.

From the Wilderness of Sin the Israelites journeyed onward to Rephiddim, where three important things happened. (1) The water failing, the people were about to stone Moses, whereupon he was commanded by the Lord to obtain water by striking the rock. (2) Israel was attacked by a tribe of Amalekites, who were defeated, Joshua leading the army while Moses, with Aaron and Hur, prayed to God. (3) Moses was joined by his wife and two sons, also by Jethro, his father-in-law, who greatly helped by his suggestions concerning organization. Read Exodus 18 and 19 for the story.

Israel at Mt. Sinai.

From Rephiddim the journey was continued in a southerly direction to Mount Sinai, where, in fulfillment of the promise made to Moses at the burning bush, the Israelites worshipped Jehovah (Ex. 3:12). Moses was told that Jehovah was ready to enter into a sacred covenant with Israel, and for three days they prepared for the meeting with solemn ceremonies of purification. On the third day, as the people stood according to instructions, Jehovah came down in a strange and awe-inspiring manifestation of his majesty, and gave Israel the immortal Ten Commandments, the embodiment of moral

conceptions which became the very heart of Israel's moral code, and the guide of the ages since. They have never become obsolete, because they deal with matters fundamental and vital in every age.

The Impressive Surroundings.

The setting for the momentous revelation was most appropriate. The awesomeness of eternal granite and imposing precipice, and the impressive stillness that one encounters only in such places, give emphasis to the words of the Eternal as he utters them in the thunder's roar and the lightning's flashes.

Moses there on the mountaintop alone with the Eternal, is elevated into a greatness that is well-nigh superhuman; the tallest figure in history—excepting only The Christ—rising above David and Paul, Plato and Aristotle, Alexander, Caesar and Napoleon.

The First Commandment.

"Thou shalt have no other gods before me." The principle behind this First Commandment is fidelity. It does not recognize the reality of other gods, but it does face the fact that men in their ignorance thought there were other gods and were worshipping them. God has called Israel for the purpose of revealing himself to them and through them to the whole world. Fidelity to Jehovah is absolutely essential. For that our Saviour argues, "Ye cannot serve God and mammon." We need today to recall the spirit and words of Jesus: "Thou shalt worship the Lord thy God, and him only shalt thou serve."—Matt. 4:7.

The Second Commandment.

"Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image." Graven images, material representations of God, were stumbling blocks then as they are now. Although the golden calf of Aaron was meant to aid in the worship of Jehovah, it was a snare, because God was identified with it and limited by it. "God is a Spirit," said Jesus, "and they that worship him must worship in spirit and in truth."

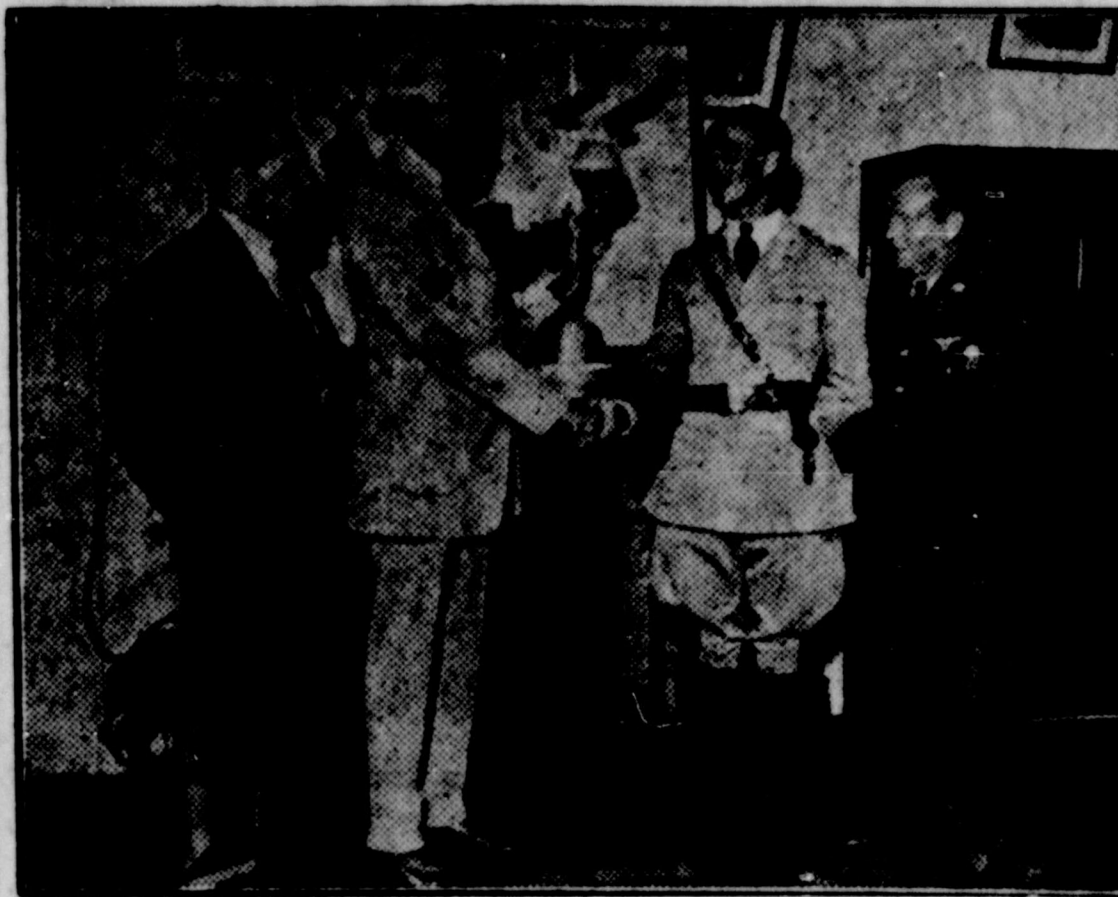
The Third Commandment.

"Thou shalt not take the name of Jehovah thy God in vain." Moffatt translates, "You shall not use the name of the Eternal, your God, profanely." This command forbids all irreverent use of the divine name, all light and trivial use of it as in swearing. Profanity is so common in America that it has been called "the great American sin." "Profanity is a sign of impoverished thought. Lord Byron remarked of an acquaintance, 'He knew not what to say, and so he swore.' Our Lord supplemented this commandment most helpfully when he said solemnly: 'I say unto you that for every idle word that men shall speak, they shall give account in the day of judgment.'"—Prof. Henry Sloan Coffin. "For Jehovah will not hold him guiltless that takes his name in vain." That is, God will hold him guilty, will condemn him; and the most terrible punishment will be a loss of the sense of spiritual things and an increasing separation of the soul from God.
