The South Korea government had established a temporary capital at Taejon approximately 90 miles south of Seoul. The capital fell to the invaders four days after the opening attack as the Communists used tanks and planes which the South Korea forces did not have.

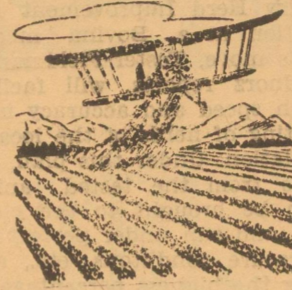

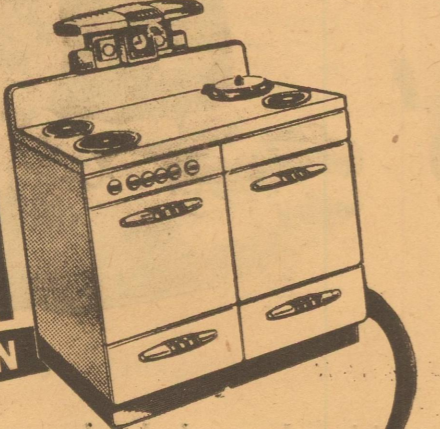

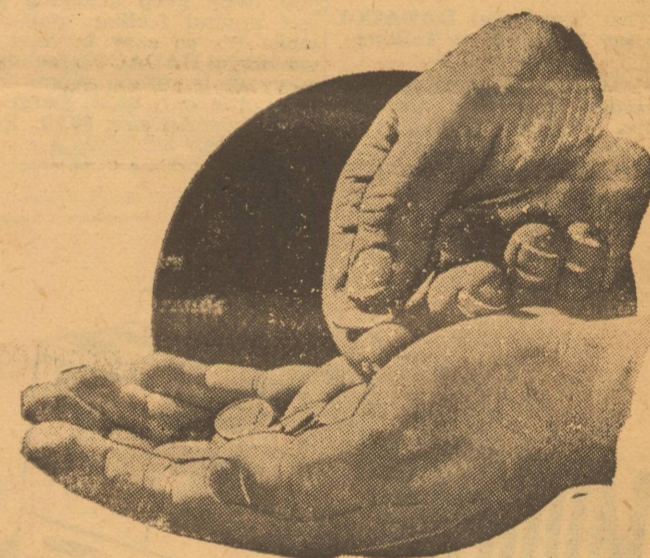

Other Editors Say:

The Pattern Is Familiar; The Lesson Still Unlearned, Says Editor Ezell

From The Canadian Record

For several months now, we've had the eerie feeling of living in some remembered past... not a far distant past, but the past of nine or ten years ago. We've a feeling that all of the things that are happening to our world today have happened before, and are merely following a familiar pattern at a somewhat accelerated speed. Only the names and the places are changed.

And with it all comes a grim feeling of being able to look into the future and to foresee, with uncomfortable clarity, the events that lie ahead... not the details, but the broad outline of history in the making. Prophets have never been a happy lot. The art of prophecy is one that we have never sought nor desired.

... but the visions of prophecy seem to have been thrust upon us so that even the dullest among us must see.

History has often repeated itself, we are told... but never before at such close intervals. Here, in a single generation, we are witnessing what appears to be a repetition of recent history, and apparently we have learned nothing from one horrible experience to give us the power to prevent its recurrence.

We have had our Munich... at Yalta and Potsdam. Pearl Harbor and Dunkirk are yet to come. For Korea read "Poland" or "Czechoslovakia" and then look back at recent world history and estimate for yourselves the number of our days.

But it's still business as usual on Main Street... and politics as usual in Washington. Congressmen with one eye on their favorite pork barrel appropriations and the other on the November elections are far too busy to concern themselves with such onerous problems as taxes and national security. While Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson blandly assures us that we can lick the world with one hand, a handful of young Americans in Korea are finding that it takes more than bare hands to stop a tank. While Secretary of State Dean Acheson is tending his parlor pinks, and Secretary of Agriculture Charles Brannan is dreaming up new plans to wreck the national economy, a piano-playing politician in the White House is trying to out-fiddle Nero and doing a fair job of it.

And what are we doing about it? We're breaking our arms patting ourselves on the back because some network nitwit assures us, over a national hook-up, that "the American people are way ahead of Congress and the politicians in their thinking." We're for raising the funds and spending the money and building the armies to defend our freedom, even if our leaders aren't.

Sure we are! We're for rais-

ing taxes, so long as someone else pays 'em. We're for cutting government costs so long as they don't cut out our own farm subsidies, or loop off our favorite dams or bridges or highway funds from the appropriation bills. We're all for building up the army, but we don't want to serve in it.

What are we doing? We're breaking our necks to get to the stores and buy goods that we think may be rationed. We're jacking up our prices because we think there may be price control. And we're voting, if we bother to vote at all, for the candidate who'll promise most glowingly to support our pet projects in Congress. We're way ahead of the politicians, all right. Don't forget: we're the people who put 'em in office.

If we're so far ahead in our thinking, let's do something about it. Let's raise such a clamor across the nation that we'll rock the dome of the capitol. Let's let our Congressmen our Senators, and our President hear from us... by wire, by mail, by telephone, by whatever means of communication we can find. Let's tell them to take their politics and chuck 'em into the nearest lake. Let's tell them to cut out the subsidies and the pork, and we can start right here in the Panhandle by telling them to call off our Canadian river dam and our Canadian river bridge... both of them waiting on Federal money. Let's tell 'em to raise taxes till it hurts... but to cut off the federal gravy trains at the same time. Let's tell them to forget about November elections... and warn them that if they don't their worries will just be starting in November. Let's tell 'em to cut out the farm program and the Veterans bonuses, and put the clamps on labor and prices on hoarders and Communists, and do it now.

If we've got the guts to do that, then we may be able to win this war, and what's a lot more important, the Peace that follows it.

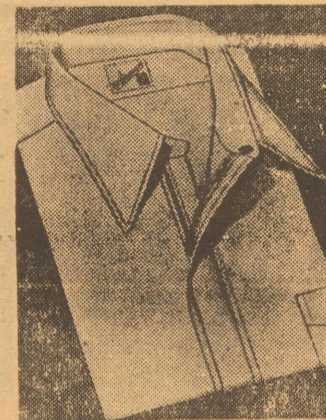
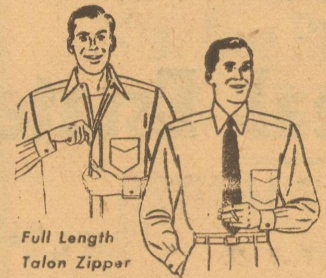

Junior Livestock Program Scheduled For State Fair

Commercial Steer Show Is Added to Calendar

The most constructive Junior Livestock program in the history of the State Fair of Texas will be carried out during the Fair's Mid-Century Exposition, October 7-22, Ray W. Wilson, livestock department manager, has announced.

Junior Livestock Shows, Oct. 17-21, will reflect the progress being made in Texas in the production of quality market steers, lambs and hogs by 4-H club members and Future Farmers of America, Wilson said.

Due to wide interest in the Junior program by these young farmers and ranchers, more than 200 Texas counties are expected to be represented. The youthful stockmen will compete for \$11,250 in premiums.

A Junior Commercial Steer show will be a newcomer to the Junior livestock list. It has been added to encourage more Future Farmers and 4-H club members to take part in a practical beef production program in Texas. The program has placed emphasis on economy in feeding out top market grade steers through the use of home-grown feeds.

Highlighting this year's Junior Livestock features will be the All-American Junior Jersey exposition. Young Jersey exhibitors from across the nation will compete for \$5000 in premiums. Judging will be Tuesday, Oct. 17 in the grandstand tent arena.

Future Farmers and 4-H teams from more than 30 states will compete in the Junior judging contest, Monday, Oct. 16. They will judge dairy cattle in open competition, Wilson said.

Premiums and awards will be presented to Junior Jersey winners during the All-American Junior Jersey awards banquet in the grand ballroom of the Adolphus hotel. The banquet will be sponsored by the Sears-Roebuck Foundation, he explained.

Other divisions of the Junior Livestock show include Junior dairy cattle, junior sheep, junior pig, junior negro pig and junior steer shows.

Grand finale of the Junior Livestock program will be the Junior auction sale Saturday, October 21, when top quality steers, pigs and lambs will be

sold by the young exhibitors. John W. Carpenter, general chairman of the auction sale advisory committee, and L. H. True, chairman of the auction committee, expect the most successful sale in history.

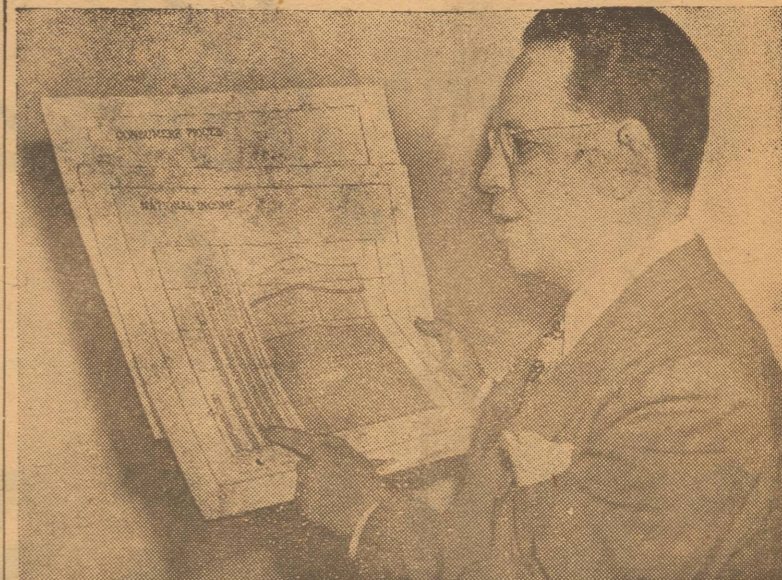

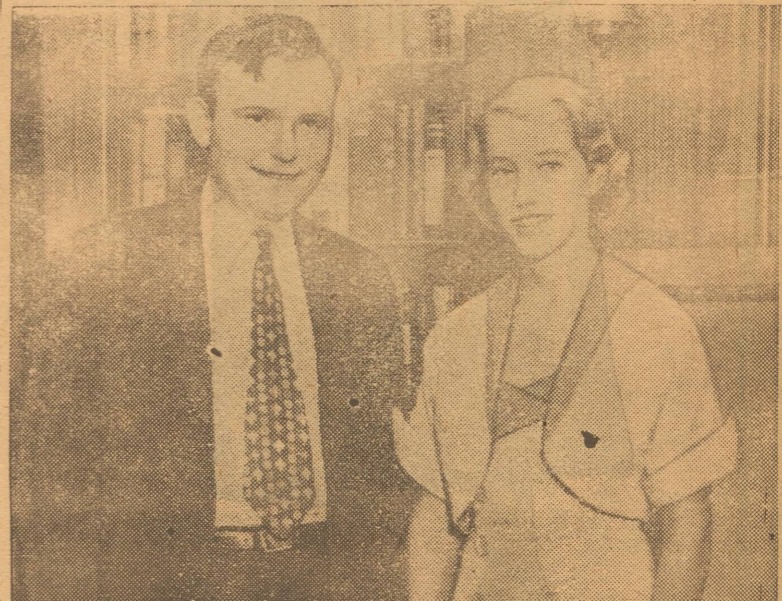

The Law & You

DO YOU KNOW what the community property of a husband and wife is:

Community property is all property acquired by the husband and wife after their marriage, except that which is received by either of them as a gift or by inheritance, or is in exchange for other separate property. Property owned by either of the parties at the time of their marriage is separate property, as is that received after marriage by gift or inheritance. The rents and revenues from separate property of either husband or wife becomes community property.

Both parties to the marriage are equal owners of the community property, and upon a dissolution of the marriage are entitled to have their rights to all of their separate property established and also to one-half of all of the community property.

The husband has charge of the community property during the period of the marriage, however he may not sell the homestead without the joinder of the wife. The wife has charge of her separate property during the marriage, but may not sell or encumber the real estate of her separate property without the joinder of her husband. Uncertain circumstances the wife may get permission from the Court to sell her real estate without the joinder of her husband.

Overhead, Not Guns Chief Defense Cost

Figures showing what the \$48 1-2 billion spent for the Military Establishment during the last four years means in terms of Federal taxes to various income groups have been released by the Council of State chambers of commerce. These show over the four years that:

A family of three with an income of \$3,000 paid \$645.59.

A family of four with an income of \$5,000 paid \$1,130.08.

A family of four with an income of \$7,500 paid \$1,799.92.

In addition these family groups paid out Federal taxes for other purposes connected with defense. These totaled a little less than \$4 billion and included such activities as arms aid to friendly nations, stockpiling of raw materials and atomic energy projects. But they meant \$49.85 in Federal taxes to the \$3,000 family group, \$87.26 to the \$5,000 group and \$138.99 to the \$7,500 group.

The Council's study revealed that \$6.75 out of every \$10 spent for the Military Establishment went for pay of all personnel, and for food, clothing and supplies for the soldiers, sailors and marines. Less than \$2 o' each \$10 spent for defense was used to buy guns ships and planes.

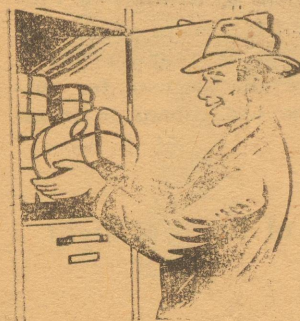
