Fire Truck Earns Additional Key Rate Reduction for Friona Policy-Holders

Ethridge Explains Complicated Rate

The oft-referred-to Friona fire truck has this week been instrumental in bringing concrete savings to Friona insurance policy holders, reducing the Friona Key Rate for John and Mary Doe's insurance premiums.

After numerous delays and excuses, the Fire Insurance Department, Board of Insurance Commissioners, at Austin have finally allowed Friona policyholders a portion of proper credit for the new truck.

Dan Ethridge explains that under Section 8, Fire Apparatus, Friona citizens have been charged 7c, but are now assessed only 2c, resulting in reduction of total charged from 80c to 75c in the complicated process of determining key rates.

Under credits now affecting our rates, local premium-payers receive 3 per cent credit for the

teaching of fire prevention in our schools, 2 per cent for arson reward now maintained, and 3 per cent for the fireman's drill school, giving 8 per cent or 6c credit as the 8 per cent is figured on the 75c, giving us new keyrate of 69c.

Further reductions are in line with the additional waterworks improvements, and they will in all probability be allowed in the very near future.

Ethridge gives the following example to illustrate savings effected: Amounts of saving will vary with the type property insured, length of policy, etc., but a certain \$10,000 policy recently re-calculated, was written on a tile building on a 3 year basis, and the saving totaled \$36.25. Ethridge states, however, that the savings are not sufficient for an insured to cancel existing policies for re-writing at the present rate; but the new rates will be applied to all new business written on or after September 1, 1950.

Reservist Students Not Automatically Exempt To Active Duty Call

Failure to comply with the regulations concerning deferment of Volunteer Marine Corps Reservists being called to extended active duty may result in the Reservist being denied such deferment or the possible loss of tuition fees in the case of certain college students.

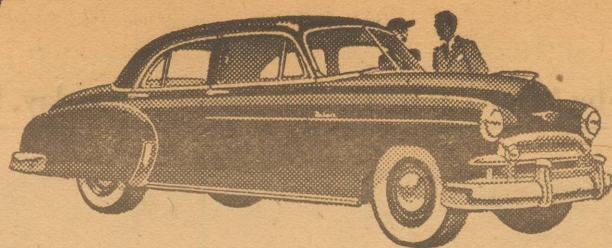
Major Claude G. Rollen, director of the Eighth Marine Corps Reserve district stated that instructions regarding deferment of Volunteer (inactive) Marine Reservists have not been complied with in many cases.

"This is particularly true," he said, "in the case of college students. It should be understood that all students, whether high school or college, are not exempt from call to duty merely because they are enrolled at the present time."

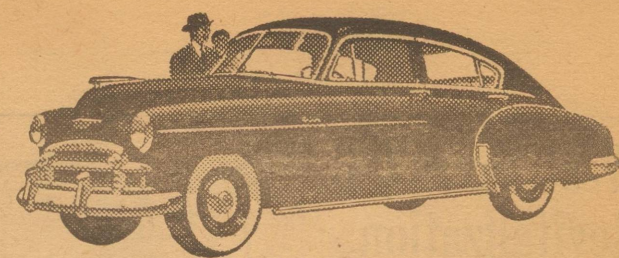
The regulations state that only those students who have one semester or less to complete for their college degree or high school diploma may be deferred for the period of time necessary to complete their school work, not in excess of six months in any case.

Students who have successfully completed undergraduate work and are pursuing an education in a field of scientific research, medicine, or dentistry may be deferred upon request.

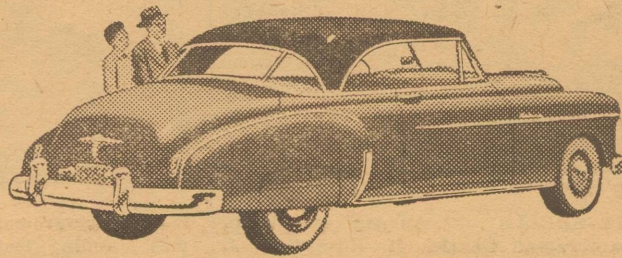
All reservists who apply for deferment for scholastic reasons should obtain statements for their school principals, deans, or registrars, which include a history of their scholastic record and present standing, and the time necessary for completion of their present course of instruction.



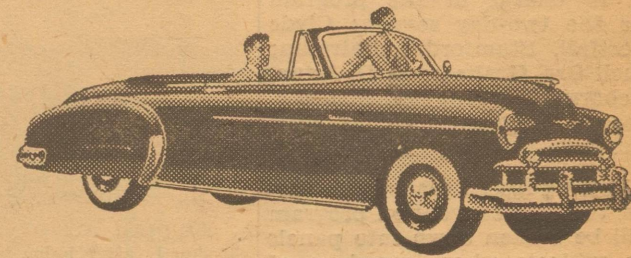

rector, will preside. Meetings will start at 10 a. m. and will be concluded at 3 p. m. State and national farm bureau officials will be present.

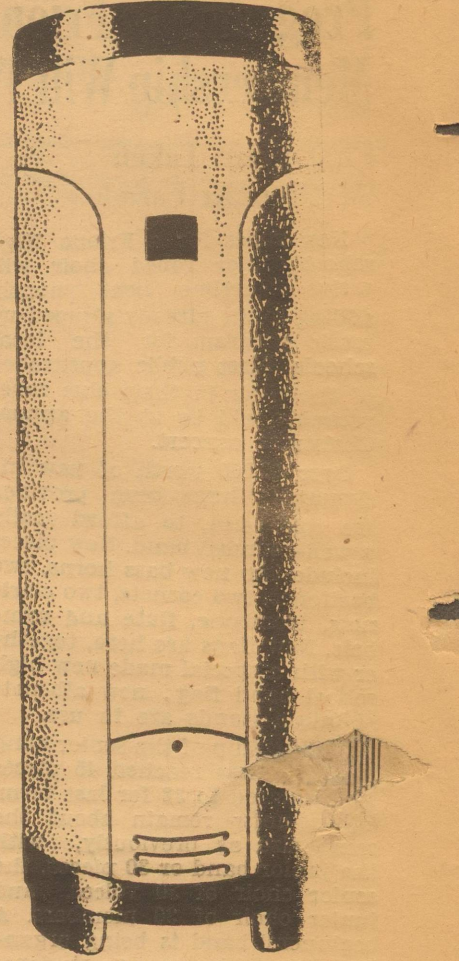

Ben Guill Reports:

During the last few weeks I have received literally hundreds of letters from the Panhandle asking why the United States government persists in coddling Communists at home at the same time that it is sending American boys overseas to fight Communists abroad. This letter is typical:

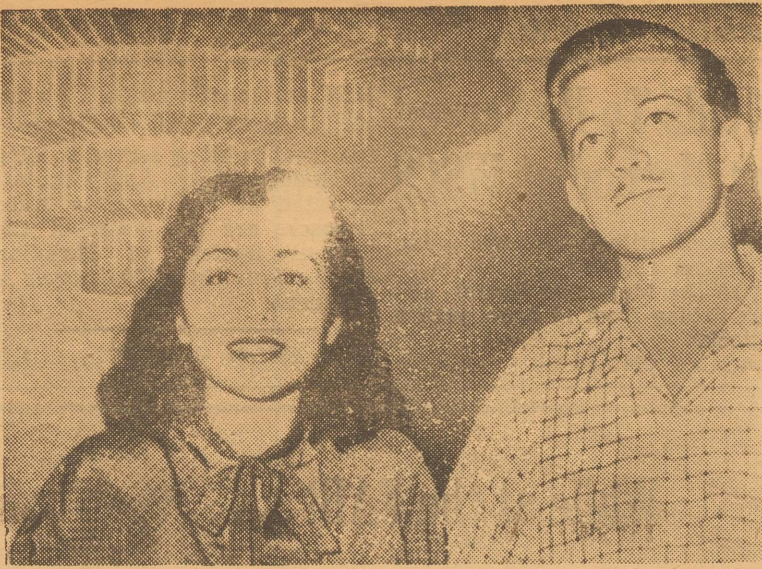
Dear Congressman Guill:
 "While our boys are over in Korea fighting the Communists we are over here coddling them. I am sick and tired of their insults and slander. Send them to their beloved Russia. Get rid of them any way you want, but get rid of them."
 "My last two boys have gone into the United States Navy and I'm proud of them. But I can't stand by and see the very thing they are fighting stand up in our own country and mock us and plot our downfall. I insist that something be done right now." The letter was signed by a mother in Amarillo.

I agree with this mother entirely. It's disgusting and bewildering that this government should give aid and comfort right here in Washington to those who wish to destroy us. We have been far too delicate about interfering with the so-called "rights" of those who would annihilate all civil rights if they had their way.

The most likely instrument of thwarting Communist infiltration into our government is that Mundt-Nixon bill. This bill would make it obligatory for every Communist in the country to register and would set severe penalties if this regulation were not complied with. It would also make it a serious criminal offense for a Communist to accept or retain a position in the Federal government or for a government official to employ a Communist in a Federal position. The bill would also make it obligatory for Communist front organizations to register and for the members of such organization to make themselves known to the authorities.

The Mundt-Nixon bill makes good sense. You would think it would be passed into law by acclamation. But it has had a very peculiar history in Congress.

In 1948 the House passed the bill by a huge majority. However, the bill never was reported out by the Senate committee on the Judiciary. Oddly enough the Republicans dominated the committee at that time but they held up the bill because there

were completed seven months ago but there has been no committee action.

The committees are dominated by administration chairmen who are almost dictators when it comes to reporting legislation out for action on the floor.

Why has the Mundt-Nixon bill been kicked around? Because of pressure from special interest groups with bloc votes

was some doubt about its constitutionality.

The objectionable parts of the bill were amended and the bill was re-introduced during the present Congress. The Senate committee reported it out favorably, by a vote of 12 to 1 seven months ago. That left it squarely up to Democratic Senator Scott Lucas of Illinois, the Senate Majority leader, to bring it up for a vote. Senator Lucas, acting on administration orders, has refused to bring the bill up for a vote. In the meanwhile, the Mundt-Nixon bill has been locked in the House committee for seven months. The hearings

to deliver. The Political Action Committee of the CIO has been particularly active in defaming the bill. The argument has been that the bill would violate "civil rights" and would create a Star Chamber which would be able to persecute anyone who disagreed with it.

Of course, the bill would do nothing of the sort. It requires that hearings be held on every disputed case. Under the present procedure, the attorney general, on his own responsibility, issues a list of organizations from time to time which he labels "Communist front." This is done without any hearings at all. That is Star Chamber procedure, if you will.

Despite the threat of a fifth column within our government, the powers that be have been playing politics in the face of national disaster. It is my opinion that once the Mundt-Nixon bill becomes law you would see

hundreds of Reds and fellow-travelers scurrying out of government employment.

Democratic Senator Pat McCarran of Nevada, is at this moment trying to lift the provisions of the Mundt-Nixon bill and put them into a bill of his own. A quick check on the Senate revealed that only twelve Senators will oppose the bill.

However, it doesn't matter if the legislation is introduced as a Republican or a Democratic bill. Politics is of small importance, if any, when the fate of the nation is at stake. The important thing is to get the bill passed as soon as possible.

Some of our most left-wing Congressmen who have opposed the bill bitterly are now beating their breasts and shouting "Me Too" in favor of the bill. They've been hearing from the folks back home. The folks back home are angry and they have every right to be.

I've said this before, but one cannot repeat it too often.

This country is in danger. Its danger is worse than at any time in its history. Anybody who can't put the safety and future of this country above politics should be kicked off Capitol Hill. This is no time for par-

tisan politics or bi-partisan politics. This is a time for non-partisan Americanism. Period.

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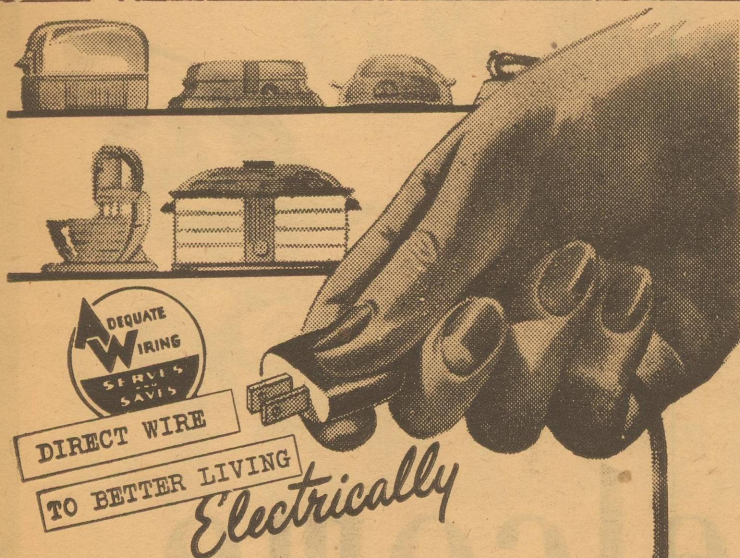

Homemade Drops Encouraged by Parmer Conservation Engineers as Practical In Reducing Water Speed

Used Oil Barrels Are Getting the Job Done

Steep ditches have plagued the irrigation farmer since the days of the Egyptians. W. G. Kennedy of the Parmer County Soil Conservation district points out; but Kennedy and his staff have been busy alleviating the trouble in 1950 to some extent. Engineers of the Soil Conservation Service have long been aware of the farmer's problems in handling water on a rapidly falling ditch where water backs up against a canvas dam and only a few tubes can be set. Of course concrete structures have technically given the answer to such worry, but relative high cost has been been preventative in most instances. John Alldredge and J. Sanders, SCS technicians, have come up with a practical and economical solution — fashioning oil barrels into drop structures.

Sanders made models out of quart oil cans and set them up as models.

The idea caught on in Parmer County. Steve Struve, living five miles northeast of Friona, had some of these made for his ditches. Roscoe Ivy tried some. Earl Drake followed suit and so did Eric Rushing, Kennedy reports. Ralph Wilson has some; and everyone who has tried them is still using them, to Kennedy's knowledge.

In gauging the effectiveness of these structures, the SCS boys point out that anything that tends to reduce the speed of water in steep ditches is good. Whether it be oil drums, sand bars, cross-ties, rock dams, or canvas socks, it gets the job done, its a practical application.

Rapid increase in participation in the National 4-H Leadership program since 1948 was announced by G. L. Noble, director, National in a Chicago interview.

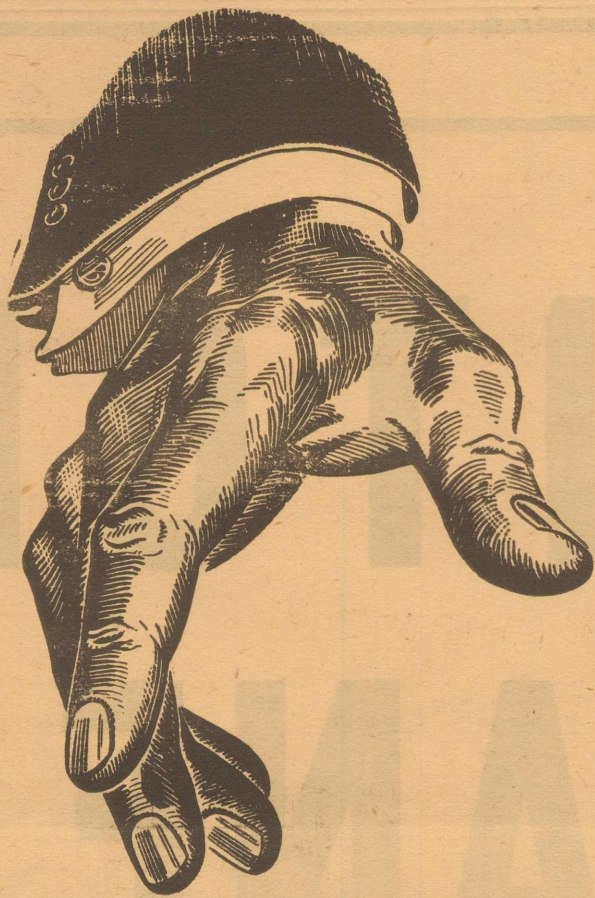

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Texas Cotton Production Falls As Grain Outlook Brightens, Is Santa Fe Report

Corn Harvest Predicted Second Highest Since Record 1926 Harvest

The cotton harvest has been completed in extreme southern Texas and is now underway throughout the central and northern areas. The state forecast of 3,000,000 bales compares with 6,040,000 bales last year, the decrease being due to acreage reduction and lower yields, part of the latter being charged to insects which are still active. A good corn crop is rapidly maturing and harvest is in full swing over most of the central counties and many fields in north Texas. Production is estimated at 65,730,000 bushels and the average yield of 21 bushels an acre is the second largest since 1926. The rice forecast now stands at 10,170,000 bags, compared to 9,815,000 bags last year.

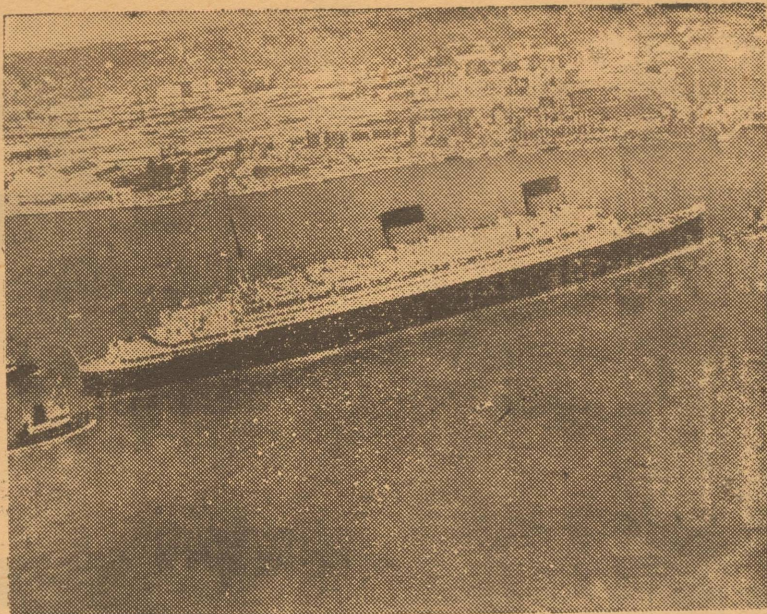
A record grain sorghum crop of 118,316,000 bushels is now indicated, compared to 92,676,000

bushels last year, and combining is in full swing over a wide area. Peanut production is estimated at 259,600,000 pounds, considerably under that of last year. Harvest of the early crop is nearly completed.

Farmers in northwest Texas are taking advantage of good moisture conditions by planting their wheat early and if favorable weather continues an abundance of wheat pasture will soon be available. Grain sorghums in this part of the state are looking good and a near record crop is indicated.

Sugar beets in the northwest, with planting estimated at more than 4,000 acres, are growing well and promises excellent yields. Heavy July rainfall reduced the cantaloupe crop in this area but the potato harvest, now completed, was satisfactory from the standpoint of both yields and quality.

A new lettuce deal is in progress in the irrigated belt around Brownwood. Some 200 acres have been planted and more

will be planted later for November movement. Early planted seed is up to a good stand and thinning will start soon.

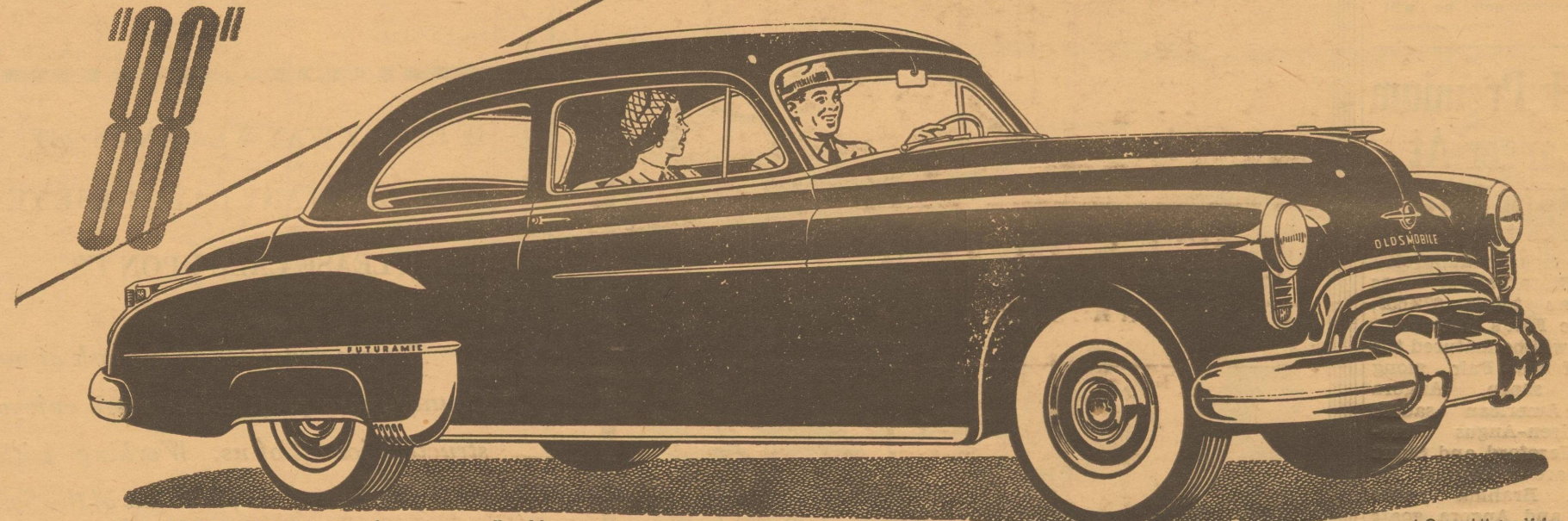

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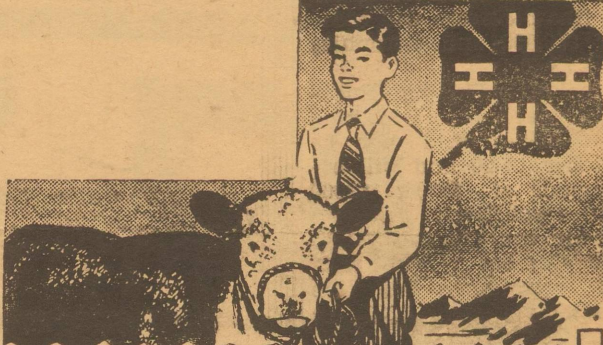
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The Law & You

govern our conduct and affect society as a whole, and which sets out the punishment for the violation of these laws. Damages collected in criminal cases are called fines and go to the governing authority, city, county, state or federal. Other penalties involve jail or penitentiary sentences or the death penalty. Criminal cases are handled in behalf of the State by County and District attorneys, who are paid by the State. The defendant hires his own lawyer, if he desires one, in all except a very few types of cases.

Situations may and do arise in which either or both civil and criminal actions may be had as a result of a given situation. Thus in an accident involving

two cars, one driver may be charged with a criminal offense, such as driving on the wrong side of the road, and he may then be sued civilly by the driver of the other vehicle for the damages to other persons or cars resulting from the accident.

Livestock Premium List Is Larger At Texas State Fair

The livestock premium list for the 1950 State Fair of Texas livestock shows totals \$72,659, largest in the Fair's history.

Beef cattle will be featured the first week of the Fair along with swine, sheep, Angora goats and American saddle horses. Aberdeen-Angus Hereford, polled Hereford and Short horn shows are scheduled for October 7-12. Brahma cattle, swine, sheep and Angora goats shows will be October 7-15. The American Saddle Horse Futurity of Texas will be October 7-9.

Beef cattle premiums total \$22,350, including: Aberdeen-Angus, \$3000; Brahman, \$4200; Hereford, \$7500; Polled Hereford \$3000; and Shorthorn, 4500. Grand champion steer will be awarded \$150. Sheep and Angora goat premiums amount to \$3773.

The All-American Jersey show and Junior Jersey Exposition, October 13-20, will be one of the most important dairy cattle shows ever held at the State Fair of Texas, Wilson said. It is the world's largest cattle breed show. More than 600 of the nation's finest Jerseys will compete for \$10,000 and trophies valued at \$35,000.

The regional Holstein-Friesian, Guernsey and Milking Shorthorn shows will also be held October 13-20 and will offer premiums of \$5200, \$3000 and \$2500, respectively.

Dates for the Quarter Horse show are October 10-16 with \$3000 in premiums. Palomino horses will vie for \$2500 in premiums October 17-22.

The Junior Livestock show, October 17-21, will offer \$11,250 prize money. Judging dates are: Hereford cattle, October 9, Polled Hereford, October 10, Shorthorn, October 11; Aberdeen-Angus, October 12, and Brahman, October 13.
