McLaughlin, Counts debate issues

SWEETWATER - It didn't take long for the forum between District 70 Texas House of Representative candidates David Counts and Scott McLaughlin to heat up here Tuesday night.

About two minutes, to be

McLaughlin, the Big Spring Republican businessman challenging the four-term incumbent Democrat from Knox City, was quick to the offensive, charging in his opening statement that under the leadership of elected officials such as Counts, state government has ballooned and special interests prospered, using a chart to show that state spending has doubled in eight years.

About 65 people attended the forum, sponsored by the State and Federal Committee of the Chamber Sweetwater Commerce and the Sweetwater Teacher's Classroom

Association. "If you look at where his financial support has come from, you'll see all the PACs (political action committees)

Both men pleased with quality of questions they encountered

SWEETWATER - Both David Counts and Scott McLaughlin felt Tuesday night's forum here went well.

"I think it was fair," Counts said. "There were some good questions, but just not enough time to respond.

"I think it's clear there are vast differences in where we stand and about what we can do (in Austin). Scott can dream all he wants, but in reality, you only have one vote when you get down

McLaughlin agreed that the questions covered a wide variety of key issues.

"I felt like we were effective in getting across the differences and the fact the voters have a choice between a professional politician and someone who views this office as a public ser-

vice," he said. Counts said he was fearful "that the (budget) cuts that Scott is talking about would end up hurting the institutions in West Texas we so depend on ... the community colleges, Texas State Technical College, Big Spring State Hospital."

He said. "If you live within your means and address the issues the best you can, you can continue to grow and prosper Texas. Rural Texas is the most vulnerable because we do not have the

between the two candidates is simple: "What policies do you support? Tax and spend or leadership? I'll only have two criteria for voting when I'm in Austin ... No. 1 ... is it in the best interest of the people of District 70 and No. 2 ... will it be in the best interest of my children and their children."

Counts, who seemed non-

ineffective in representing District 70. It would be an allegation that Counts would make numerous times during the 75minute forum.

'The issues that are important are the ones that are moving this state forward," Counts said.

Counts pointed out that Texas became the second largest state in the nation (population) last year and that with that growth comes a growth in expenses and budget.

"The people wanted criminals off the street, so we built more prisons. That took more beds and more guards ... that's part

of that growth. "We've been combining agencies ... doing away with duplication of services. We've reformed welfare to where Texans now

run Texas. "I don't have an issue at this time other than you're here and I want to hear what interests you," he said.

Questions posed to the candidates were submitted to a threemember screening committee and then passed along to moderator Jeanette Musgrove, who read the question.

Issues covered during the forum included school vouchers, property taxes and property tax relief, juvenile crime, the Texas Homestead law, economic development, the future role of community colleges and vo-tech schools, raising of the \$1.50 tax cap on school taxes and ideas for replacing property tax.

Campbell, Edwards enter verbal battle over truck parking

John Edwards thought the dilemma concerning where he could and could not park his truck had been solved, but no sooner than the ink could dry on one ordinance in Edwards' favor, complaints from neighbors caused the city council to

Councilman Jimmy Campbell and Edwards squared off over the issue Tuesday night with Campbell saying he was against trucks being parked in residential areas.

rethink its decision.

He asked Edwards if he still intended to not honor the ordinance if rewritten and passed.

At a previous meeting, Edwards had said it is less expensive for him to pay a \$5 per day fine because he's not in town long enough between trips to justify paying \$150 to replace a windshield, which gets broken when he parks his rig on a commercial lot.

Campbell said the issue was not a personal one, but after Edwards asked him where his brother, also a truck driver, parks his rig when he visits, Campbell said for brief periods in front of his house.

"It makes no difference," Edwards retorted. "You're against trucks being parked in residential areas, but you allow

your brother to do it." Campbell, after failing to get any votes other than that of Pat DeAnda on a motion to accept a rewritten version of the ordinance, suggested council revisit the ordinance and increase the \$5 per day fine to \$150 per day.


"I want teeth in the ordinance, in case someone chooses to

ignore the ordinance," he said. Councilman Chuck Cawthon made a motion to send the rewritten ordinance back to the traffic commission to be cleaned up in regards to issues pertaining to recreational vehicle and busses. The motion passed with Campbell and DeAnda voting nay

The council had voted 4-3 last month to amend an ordinance to allow Edwards to purchase a permit to park his 18-wheeler in his back yard when he's in

Candidates manage to punch one another's buttons

SWEETWATER — There were some hot buttons during Tuesday night's forum.

The first pushed belong to David Counts, who was openly agitated at a claim made in Scott McLaughlin's opening statement that he had been endorsed by Gov. George Bush, who, like McLaughlin, is a Republican.

"I take exception with the statements about my governor," Counts said. "He has not endorsed my opponent. I got a phone call from the governor's office and was told that he would not get involved in my race.'

McLaughlin, however, had a

letter from Bush's office that

said otherwise. "Scott McLaughlin will be a

conservative leader in the Texas House and work with me in making Texas a beacon state," the Oct. 15 letter read.

"The governor did endorse me," McLaughlin said. "He has been very selective in the races he has become involved in and I feel he has looked at this race and feels we can win.

Counts was also openly upset at a McLaughlin advertisement that appeared in Tuesday's Sweetwater Reporter.

"This is not my ad," he said. curtly in response to a question asking him to respond to it. "It's my opponent's and he uses halftruths. I guess the one statement in it that's more truth than not is that I was one of the

The ad, headlined "The Counts Credibility GAP," said that despite his claims to have "worked to pass three consecutive budgets with NO new taxes," that in 1991 Counts voted for "the largest tax increase in recent Texas history." It claimed he voted to increase state taxes and fees \$1.9 billion.

The ad also took exception to Counts' claim that "I cut billions of dollars with performance reviews," countering that the State Comptroller's office issues performance reviews, not legislators.

The ad also stated that even though the reviews "took out

\$300 million, the state budget grew by \$4 billion" and pointed out two votes where Counts voted to increase his own salary.

In regards to the "10 worst" part of the ad, it cited Texas Monthly's assessment of Counts following legislative sessions: "Counts kept finding ways to fail," and "Counts was a quadruple threat disaster: awful as a committee chairman, terrible as a bill sponsor, hopeless as a mediator, defenseless as a floor debater."

McLaughlin's response to areas he would cut from the budget brought gasps from one table of Counts supporters. McLaughlin cited elimination





Man acquitted of indecency charges

A 118th District Court jury deliberated for about an hour Tuesday before acquitting Domingo Lujan Galaviz of indecency with a child charges.

Galaviz, 33, 301 N.E. Seventh St., faced between two and 20 years in prison and a fine of up to \$10,000 if he had been convicted.

The indictment against Galaviz alleged that he molested a minor female in October 1995, but the jury did not take long to disagree with the state's assertion.

District Attorney Rick Hamby said he was disappointed with the verdict, but refused to second-guess the jury's decision.

"You can't have a reaction to these things," Hamby said. "It was simply a matter of the evidence available, and you must assume that the jury listened hard to the evidence. I have no reason to believe otherwise.'

City settles lawsuit



Section 18-147 of the City Code addresses the parking of trucks, vehicles transporting hazardous materials and buses, and defines a truck as the following:

"Any motor vehicle, designed maintained or used primarily for the transportation of property, which has three or more axles and/or a gross vehicle weight of more than 10,000 pounds."

"Only the truck's tractor may be parked in the backyard of the tractor operator in a residential zoned area only if the following requirements are sat-

·Adequate and safe ingress and egress are available and/or provided for from a city street to the backyard, as approved by the City Engineer.

 Application is approved by and renewed annually through the Building Official. The annual permit fee shall be \$30.

 The tractor shall be parked. Section 18-147, Subsection stored or screened in such a manner that it is not visible from any street, furthermore if a structure is required it must meet all applicable codes."

There was still disagreement. "I may be a little liberal on some things, but as long as a truck is parked in a back yard and not bothering anyone, I think we owe it to these people (truck drivers) to let them make a living," Cawthon said.

Campbell said, "It's fine until it's next to your backyard. I don't think the back yard is the place for an 18-wheeler."

On Tuesday, Mayor Tim Blackshear restated his position that he doesn't necessarily think the amended and rewritten ordinance is the answer to the problem, but is a start.

If the council decides to revisit the ordinance at a future meeting, Edwards because he already has a permit to park his rig, would be grandfathered under the rewritten ordinance and would not be affected by it for at least a year.

McLaughlin said he didn't think Counts offered effective arguments in contrast to his charges of ineffectiveness as a legislator.

"I wish we could have done this more," McLaughlin said, referring to the forum. It was the only face-to-face meeting between the two candidates during the campaign, although Counts sent representatives to two other forums when he said previous commitments kept him from participating.

"We've dealt with David Counts' record in Austin and when you do that, you quickly see that what he says he does and what he really does are two different things.'

Deputies ar ested with drugs at border checkpoint

CORPUS CHRISTI - Two deputies for a Hidalgo County constable have been arrested and charged with possession of marijuana with intent to distribute.

Jesus Mariscal Jr. and Leticia Real were brought Tuesday before U.S. District Judge Hayden Head Jr. in Corpus Christi to answer drug charges. The judge set bond at \$50,000 each, and they were taken to the Nueces County Jail.

Officials say they were stopped in separate cars Monday at the Border Patrol's Sarita checkpoint. Agents say they found more than 100 pounds of marijuana in each vehicle.

They say they were alerted to the vehicles by the smell of air freshener and of a paste commonly used in reconstruction of

A third person identified as Hermalinda Rosas also was arrest ed. The judge also set her bond at \$50,000.

Banks find thumbprints on checks cutting crime

AUSTIN — Since banks began requiring thumbprints for check cashing, the amount of non-customer fraud reported by financial institutions has dropped 71 percent, the Texas Bankers

The number of financial institutions requiring the fingerprints of non-account holders requesting check cashing services has reached 170 in Texas.

Customers maintaining accounts with participating banks are not required to give their prints.

The Thumbprint Signature program requires non-account holders to apply their right thumb to a fingerprinting device that leaves no ink stains or residue. The print is then placed on the face of the check between the memo line and signature line.

The program, developed by the bankers' association and the Clearing House Association of the Southwest and begun in December, includes retailers across the state. Projected savings for the first year for six banks monitored

were \$2.2 million. Convict labor helping repair state parks

AUSTIN — State parklands are benefiting from prison inmates' restoration work and maintenance in a program praised by cor rectional officers and parks officials alike.

Among more than \$2 million worth of convict labor is restoration of wetlands, construction of a handicapped-accessible marsh viewing stand and cleaning historic headstones at the Texas **State Cemetery**

"The discipline of work is important if these offenders are to be rehabilitated," said Allan Polunsky, chairman of the Texas Criminal Justice Board.

"And we find that the vast majority of inmates respond very positively to the opportunity to do something worthwhile for society," he said.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department said Tuesday that convicts contributed 304,164 hours of work — valued at \$2.12 million — during the last fiscal year, which ended Aug. 31.

Prisoners worked at 23 parks, 12 wildlife management areas and one state fish hatchery.

They typically work for days or weeks at a time at one site. then move on to the next project.

Direct mail ads garner most complaints from consumers

HOUSTON — What ticks off Texas consumers most? Direct mail advertisements that offer phony prizes as a lure to

buy an unnecessary service or item, according to the Texas attorney general's office.

The direct mail advertising industry garnered the most complaints 2,494 — from Texas consumers during the fiscal year

ended Aug. 30, Texas Attorney General Dan Morales said Tuesday while announcing the Top 10 customer gripes. Long-distance services who beg Texans to switch services, followed in the No. 2 spot (2,095) to push telemarketing to the No. 6

spot, which attracted 827 complaints for the 1996 fiscal year. That's very encouraging, Morales said. "Many law enforcement and community organizations around

our state have learned to work with consumers and warn them regarding the sweepstakes ... and other activities that occur,' Morales explained.

Medicaid now expected to show surplus

two years ago of a huge deficit in Medicaid haven't materialized, and the state's largest health care program is instead expected to reap a sizeable surplus in the current budget

The Texas Journal of the Wall Street Journal reported today that a surplus of almost \$279 million is now anticipated for the two-year budget cycle ending next Aug. 31.

The publication quoted state officials as crediting Texas' continued economic growth. It's reduced the number of people eligible for Medicaid, a statefederal health-insurance program for the poor, elderly and

DALLAS (AP) — Predictions state Medicaid officials requesteu big funding increases for the two-year budget cycle starting Sept. 1, 1995.

They based their request on projections that the number of Medicaid recipients would continue to surge — rising 14 percent in fiscal 1996 and 8 percent in fiscal 1997.

But that scenario hasn't played out. Instead, the number of Texans receiving Medicaid held steady through last month at about 2.1 million, the publication reported

According to an analysis by the Texas House Appropriations Committee, the lack of growth in enrollment means state Medicaid coffers will post a surplus of \$278.8 million for the current budget cycle.

State Medicaid officials don't dispute the projection.

The anticipated surplus follows years of explosive growth. The state Medicaid budget nearly tripled to \$9.7 billion in fiscal 1995 from \$3.3 billion in fiscal 1990, primarily because of changes in federal rules that required states to cover more people,

The Medicaid program "has become a budget monster for the states and federal government," state officials wrote in a May 1994 report.

Though Texas then ranked 48th among the states in percapita spending on Medicaid recipients, the program consumed 26 percent of the state's

budget, the report said. During the 1995 legislative session, state officials fretted that Medicaid faced at least a \$2 billion shortfall. Officials from the state departments of Health and Human Services had asked for \$7.1 billion in state funds to keep the program afloat during the 1996-97 budget cycle.

The Legislature's final spending plan for the program, \$5.9 billion, was close to the Legislative Budget Board's recommendation.

The program, however, didn't fall on hard times — in fact, just the opposite. Flat enrollment has turned the expected sea of red ink into a surplus.

One of the biggest areas of projected savings is a pilot program designed to trim \$119.2 million from the Medicaid budget over five years.

Jail named for prominent advocate of crime victims

HUMBLE (AP) - Texas officials have named a state jail after crime Pam Lychner, the Houston victims' rights advocate who died in the crash of TWA Flight 800 three months

Gov. George W. Bush, who toured the 2,100-bed facility for nonviolent offenders about 25 miles northeast of Houston, said Tuesday that the jail and efforts to pass tougher anti-crime legislation are tributes to Mrs. Lychner.

"She was an absolute warrior for victims' rights," Bush said as he stood near photographs of Mrs. Lychner and her two young daughters. "She was a victim herself.

Mrs. Lyncher, 37, founded the

For All in 1993, three years after she was assaulted. The group campaigns against early release of prisoners and for programs to aid victims.

The Houston woman and her daughters Shannon, 10, and Katie, 8, were killed when the Paris-bound jet exploded and crashed on July 17 off the coast of Long Island, N.Y.

After the disaster, state officials proposed renaming the jail in honor of Mrs. Lychner. It had been named for the surrounding community of Atascocita when it opened last year.

The jail focuses on rehabilitating convicts of property and drug-related offenses. The average stay is 16 months.



Shooting range dedication for Thomas was 'right thing'

Howard County's 4-H program its shooting sports club to be exact—has once again provided not only our youth, but all of us a lesson in respect and "doing the right thing."

Sadly, that lesson—a simple act of remembrance—probably went unnoticed in far too many corners.

Sunday, current and former members of the Howard County 4-H Shooting Sports Club gathered together in Knott to dedicate the R.C. Thomas Shooting Range.

In so doing, they memorialized the man, who in 1978 created what has become not only one of the strongest 4-H shooting sports clubs in Texas, but one of the state's best youth shooting programs, period.

Mr. Thomas died last year. He worked with the county's young 4-H shooters for almost 20 years.

Society's chief dread may be those who are bad teachers

Edwin Newman, in one of his books about the uses and abuses of the English language, noted that ungrammatical utterances could sometimes be strikingly expressive. He pointed as an example to an American soldier who had struggled in school and was asked his feelings about teachers. "Them's my chief dread," he said.

Take note of a recent study, ponder its conclusions, and you, too, may decide that a large number of American teachers are to be dreaded, not just by those young people luckless enough to be shorn of any obvious academic talent, but by the American population at large, by anyone, really, who understands that our economic future, the tenor of our society and the completeness of countless lives depend on their classroom competence.

The study plops on our laps thanks to the National Commission on Teaching and America's Future, which documents that many of the nation's education schools are inadequately preparing teachers to teach, that the nation's high schools are clogged with teachers who know little about their subject matter and that 14 percent of all newly hired teachers fail to meet state standards.

If the study ends up supporting some elements of the status quo more than you might have guessed at first glance, it nevertheless underlines just how lax states and school districts have become in filling a growing demand insufficiently supplied by capable, thoroughly trained applicants. The commission has issued recommendations whose costs, it says, can mostly be met by putting administrators to the useful work of teaching themselves. I think it's disputable whether all the recommendations should be acted on or whether billions more would still be

needed, but I don't think our society can afford to shrug its shoulders about uneducated educators.

Rather, we should require proficiency in teachers for the same sort of reason we require it in airplane pilots. Teachers' blunders can be catastrophic for others, namely the children whose minds and spirits we entrust to their care. Just one year in the hands of an unprepared teacher can cause a crash, and there might be no getting up.

To my mind, the most salient part of the study is its recognition that teachers should be masters of the subjects they teach. Has any one of us ever had a truly inspiring teacher who wasn't engrossed in his or her subject, a whiz at every aspect of it and as eager to share the glory as a missionary among the heathen?

I recall, as one of a number of teachers I could cite, Miss Moran, who taught English at Atherton High School in Louisville, Ky. I doubt any actor could have recited Shakespeare or Milton with more insight or feeling. We students would sit entranced, and we would study and think hard, the better to enter this inviting world in which the startling Miss Moran so enthusiastically dwelled.

"You can't teach what you don't know any more than you can come back from where you ain't been," is the way Will Rogers put it, as the study notes, and what the study shows is that many teachers have never been anyplace to come back from: Almost a fourth of high school teachers don't have even a minor in their teaching fields; more than half the high school students in the physical sciences are in the hands of teachers whose field is something else, as are 27 percent of those in math courses and 21 percent of those taking English, and students in schools with high minority enrollments have less than a 50-50 chance of taking science

or math from a teacher with a degree in the subject.

To begin to rectify the situation, the commission proposes that states mandate accreditation of education schools on the basis of exacting standards and then shut them down if they don't measure up. More than half the education schools in the country today lack accreditation, and a reason many don't achieve excellence, the study says, is that universities treat them as "cash cows," raking off their revenues to support more prestigious programs.

But Jeanne Allen, president of The Center for Education Reform, says accreditation does

not assure excellence and questions whether education schools should continue to be the monopoly provider of teachers. When New Jersey began hiring mid-career recruits, requiring them to serve as apprentices for a year after taking a six or eight week course, it found they were as able as any teachers they had recently hired, she said. The commission would permit alternative certification only after a year of postgraduate study, a prohibitive barrier to entry for many.

Another of the commission's recommendations is that no one should be employed as a teacher unless granted a license after a rigorous test on the subject matter to be taught and on knowledge of teaching. For a continuing license, the commission further argues, there should be a performance test within the first year or two. These tough-sounding procedures go far beyond what now obtains in most states. Much would depend, of course, on the quality of the tests.

on the quality of the tests.

The commission, whose members include past and present heads of teachers unions, is not nearly so firm on ridding classrooms of the unfit teachers already there. The commission agrees they should be removed, yet is squishy about how; their peers, it sug-

gests, should "counsel" them out of the profession. Although teachers certainly need protection from arbitrary dismissal, students just as certainly need protection from bad teachers, to furnish it than what the commission proffers,

The commission also proposes to reward excellence through a system of collaborative review. It has little faith in the judgment of principals, and balks at linking higher pay to student achievement, arguing that standardized tests are a crude measure of learning and don't take account of nonteaching influences. Perhaps tests should not be the last word in a comprehensive incentive plan, but to leap over student achievement as a criterion is to avoid accountability for what counts most in a teacher's performance.

As the commission itself points out, nothing affects student achievement as much as a teacher's knowledge and abilities, and as the study also points out, the achievements of students in this country remain something no one should brag about. "According to national assessments," the study says, "only about 10 per-cent of U.S. 17-year-olds can draw conclusions using detailed scientific knowledge: just 7 percent can solve math problems with more than one step; only 7 percent can read and understand specialized materials; and a mere 2 percent can write well-developed mater-

In the next decade, this country will hire 2 million new teachers, and they'll hold much of our future in their hands. I think the commission is asking the right questions about what we should look for in these teachers, even if I also hesitate to endorse some of the commission's answers about how to get it. But if we as a society don't find the right answers, we have much to dread.

Michael Kahoe apparently reached a plea bargain with prosecutors who still are scrutinizing four other suspended FBI officials for their role in the 1992 shootings at the remote Idaho cabin of white separatist Randy Weaver. The four include former Deputy Director Larry Potts, who supervised the case from head-

A one-count felony information was filed Tuesday by federal prosecutors here against Kahoe, who headed the FBI's violent crimes section at the time of the standoff. The charge carries a top penalty of 10 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine.

A Justice Department official, familiar with the case but requesting anonymity, saw no reason for Kahoe's case to depart from that practice.

The FBI had no comment. Kahoe could not be reached.

During the FBI's August 1992 standoff with Weaver, a bureau sniper shot and killed Weaver's wife, Vicki, and wounded Weaver and a friend, Kevin L. Harris.

"The government needs to prosecute those who issued the rules of engagement that resulted in the death of these people," said Weaver's lawyer, Gerry Spence. "The federal government is good at diverting our attention away from the real case" and toward a coverup case.

Still running behind, Dole hopes Truman upset a model for 1996

WASHINGTON (AP) Trying to shore up his support in the traditionally Republican South, Bob Dole was courting Georgia and Florida in an accelerated push to pull an upset on the scale of Harry Truman's surprise victory. "America's worth fighting for," he said.

Coming off a 10-city Midwest swing, Dole's campaign plans hopscotch stops in several other states, including up to three days in California — a 54-vote electoral prize the Republican nominee will contest to the end.

A new poll today indicated it will be an uphill battle — one Dole seems to relish; Clinton holds a 20-point lead over Dole among likely California voters. according to a Los Angeles Times poll.

"I fought for America before. and I'm ready to fight for America's future again and again and again," Dole said Tuesday in Westerville, Ohio,

referring to his World War II Thomas E. Dewey.

"We're very excited about this race."

The Times poll put Clinton ahead 54 percent to 34 percent, virtually the same as a month ago when he led 53 percent to Dole's 36 percent.

The Times Poll interviewed 1,551 Californians over a fiveday period beginning the day after the final Clinton-Dole debate in San Diego on Oct. 16. The sample included 1,038 registered voters who said they are likely to vote Nov. 5. The margin of error is plus or minus 3 percentage points.

Israelis, Palestinians appear on verge of Hebron withdrawal deal

Emerging upbeat from hours of talks with Israelis, Palestinian negotiators said today for the first time that agreement was near on an Israeli troop pullout from the last West Bank town they occupy.

"There were ideas today that were exchanged which will enable (us) to close the gap," said Yasser Abed-Rabbo, a Palestinian Cabinet minister and negotiator. "The atmosphere was better and more pracappeared optimistic over the proposed withdrawal from Hebron, and both sides agreed to resume the talks later today.

If reached, the agreement would be the first between the Palestinians and Israel's new hard-line government and would send a signal to the world that the hobbled Mideast peace process is on the mend.

The latest session, which began Tuesday and continued into the early hours today, focused on security issues of the

negotiators also long-delayed withdrawal "and these security issues are very complicated," said Abed-Rabbo. The talks appeared to have

been invigorated by U.S. mediator Dennis Ross' threat on Monday to return to Washington, apparently after concluding they were hopelessly deadlocked. Ross was en route to the airport when he received a phone call — one unconfirmed report said from Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu — and returned to

U.S. Embassy spokesman Richard Scorza said Ross had decided to delay his departure when it became clear that "we were in the midst of the most promising discussions to date on the issue of civil affairs. The discussions made significant progress.

In another sign of progress, the level of the negotiators was raised Tuesday and the teams included Israeli military chief Lt. Gen. Amnon Shahak and Mahmoud Abbas, Yasser Arafat's deputy.

Netanyahu told reporters Tuesday that "the negotiation is very close to completion" and said a meeting between him and Arafat would be "desirable" when an accord is reached.

The intensive talks began in response to a plea from President Clinton following a week of violence last month in which Palestinian police and Israeli soldiers traded fire and 79 people were killed. At a summit in Washington, Clinton persuaded the two sides to negotiate until they reached accord.

The United States reportedly has been pressing the sides to reach agreement on a Hebron pullback before the U.S. elections.

Under the Israel-PLO accords. Israel was to pull out of Hebron in March. But then-Prime Minister Shimon Peres delayed the move after a series of bombings by Islamic militants in Israel. Netanyahu postponed the withdrawal again, demanding better security for the 450 Jewish settlers who live in the city of 94,000 Arabs.

Warring Kurds accept cease-fire in principle

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) - The cease-fire in place beginning strikes on Iraqi missile targets week" U.S. Deputy Secretary of two warring Kurdish factions of northern Iraq have agreed in principle to a cease-fire and will hold more talks next week to narrow their differences, a U.S. envoy said today.

"Each side has accepted the principle of a cease-fire provided that the other side does as well and provided that supporting fire from the forces of Tehran and Baghdad also ceasęs," Robert Pelletreau said in a departure statement after concluding talks with two rival Iraqi Kurdish leaders.

However, it was not clear when a cease-fire would go into

immediately," the assistance secretary of state said. "This means that each side will take defensive positions and not initiate firing or hostilities.

Pelletreau added that the goal was to make a cease-fire perma-

He said further talks with the rival groups would take place in Ankara next week.

Massoud Barzani, the leader of Iraqi Kurdistan Democratic Party, and his rival Jalal Talabani, the leader of the Iranian-backed Patriotic Union of Kurdistan, met separately with Pelletreau.

The latest turmoil in northern Iraq erupted when Barzani, aided by Baghdad's troops, took

in early September.

Talabani retaliated two weeks ago and retook some of his lost

Iraqi Kurds had the chance to maintain a de-facto state in the north of the country under the protection of a U.S.-led allied airforce since the end of the Persian Gulf War. But a power struggle between Barzani and Talabani failed to make it sta-

Washington withdrew its mission, which worked as part of the allied air force from northern Iraq, last month because of security risks after Baghdad's

intervention. Americans have not decided if the mission will return.

bilateral defense issues with Turkish officials.

White ruled out speculation that U.S. troops would be moved into northern Iraq to maintain peace in the region.

"We have no intention of basing U.S. forces in northern Iraq. We have not even contemplated such an eventuality," White said.

The deputy secretary said flights by the U.S.-led air force to patrol northern Iraq resumed recently after a brief interval. He did not elaborate, but the interruption reportedly follows the Turkish government's objection to flights with bombloaded fighter jets.





Breaded chicken in the microwave

Pamphlets from big food producers have long been one of the most popular sources of recipes. Home economists, occasionally using suggestions from customers, develop recipes calling for at least one ingredient made by their com-

Sometimes they hit the jackpot. Think of all the canned pineapple that has gone into upside-down cake over the years. And how many people do you know who make onion soup from dried mix? Much of the dried onion soup sold, I'll wager, goes into the popular chip dip.

Copies of these recipe pamphlets, with pictures, are starting to turn up on the Internet. You don't even have to send them a stamped, self-addressed business-size envelope. I wonder how long it will be until food companies abandon these pamphlets and put all their recipes on the Internet.

These are some of the microwave recipes from those cyberspace pamphlets I've tried recently. One look at the ingredients and you'll know which product (or products) the recipe developer is promoting.

For this microwave version of an old favorite dip, I used a light mayonnaise and nonfat sour cream. It was just as good as when I've made it with the high-fat ingredients.

I did, however, grate the Parmesan cheese myself, just before mixing all the ingredients. Grated Parmesan from a box tastes so much like saw-

dust, I avoid it. HOT ARTICHOKE DIP

1/2 cup real or light mayonnaise or low-fat mayonnaise dressing

The trick is to get the chicken done just enough so it's cooked through, but not overcooked. Judge the time according to the quantity of chicken you're zapping, as well as the type. Boned chicken breasts cook more quickly and evenly than bone-in pieces. Boned chicken takes 4 to 5 minutes a

With bones, count on 6 to 7 minutes a pound. It will also continue to cook for a minute or two after you take it from the microwave.

Figure the time your chicken should need in the microwave, then check on it early and often. Often microwave chicken is hard, rubbery chicken.

Chicken has a tendency to 'pop" in the microwave. To avoid this, and to prevent bread crumbs from being scattered inside your oven, zap the chicken at 70 percent power. The zapping time will be just a

"June is about as easy to get along with as there is," said Bobby Hebert, who took over as starting quarterback when George was banished two weeks ago following a sideline confrontation with Jones.

George feels his reputation has been unfairly sullied and there's nothing he can do to change it. Maybe that's why he doesn't seem to be trying very hard.

"No matter what you do in this business, not everybody is going to like you," George said. "I go about my job, try to be the best quarterback I can and try to put my team in the best position to win."

At Purdue, he struggled as a freshman and was publicly ridiculed when, after being injured, his mother rode with him off the field in a golf cart. When the coach left after his freshman season, George had the audacity to proclaim he might leave, too, if the new coach didn't meet with his approval.

Disgruntled Kemp shows up at Sonics camp

SEATTLE (AP) — If Shawn Kemp is the best power forward in the NBA, then he thinks his salary should reflect that.

Kemp finally reported to the Seattle SuperSonics' training camp on Tuesday, saying his 22-day absence was about dollars and which players are getting them.

When you play for seven years and you've proved youself to be an All-Star, then you see guys who haven't proved themselves sign for millions of dollars, you have a right to be tipset," he said. Kemp, 26, missed the Sonics'

first five exhibition games. "What I basically did was to

And Kemp's All-Star teammate, Gary Payton, last season's NBA Defensive Player of the Year, signed an \$87.5 million deal during the offseason.

"It has nothing to do with Jim McIlvaine or any of my teammates," Kemp said. "It's not anything personal."

Instead, Kemp said, his unexcused absence from camp was his way of making a statement salaries in the NBA, precisely who is getting the money.

"After all those signings that took place this summer, I'm not going to sit here and tell you I wasn't ticked off," he said. "But I was ticked off with the NBA as a whole.

Robertson receives probation

SAN ANTONIO (AP) -Former NBA All-Star Alvin Robertson will spend the next decade on probation and pay a \$10,000 fine for burglarizing his ex-girlfriend's apartment.

Jurors deliberated about an hour before deciding Tuesday on the fine and 10 years' probation for Robertson, who had pleaded on the witness stand for another chance.

"I hope I get the opportunity to resume my place in society," said Robertson, describing himself as a "decent, honest, hard-working guy."

Robertson, 34, who played five seasons with the Spurs and last season with the Toronto Raptors, could have faced up to 20 years in prison for the felony conviction.

The state court jury found him guilty last week of burglary with intent to commit theft in connection with a rampage in June 1995 at the apartment of ex-girlfriend Sharon Raeford.

"I ask this jury to give me an opportunity," Robertson said on the witness stand Tuesday. "I'd like to have the opportunity to try. If I blow it, it's my own fault."

Ms. Raeford did not testify against Robertson and reportedly left town before the trial Robertson's wife, Jackie, testified Tuesday her husband was sorry for what he had done and said he was willing

to undergo counseling.

Coslet begins fix-it job with Bengals CINCINNATI (AP) - Three years after the New York Jets fired him for failing to sort out their mess, Bruce Coslet has

another one to deal with. There are so many problems with the Cincinnati Bengals and so little time to straighten them out that Coslet's second head coaching job will be as tough as the first.

'There's a whole bunch of little things that need to be fixed," Coslet said Tuesday, a day after replacing Dave Shula as head coach. "I can't even get into the specifics of it with you, but you've seen it. And it's just as things go along, I'll fix them — or, I'll try to fix

It's a long fix list. The team is 1-6, the fans have given up, the locker room is divided and the coaching staff is stressed.

With a home game against Jacksonville only five days away, Coslet had not yet spoken to the team Tuesday. Players had two days off after returning from a 28-21 loss in San Francisco.

"I've just started the process of telling them what I think needs to be done," Coslet said. "So far, so good. They've been receptive. We'll see how that portrays on the field.

"I'm like the fans out there — I'm a little skeptical right now. And they have a reason to be, and so do I. Nobody's comfortable. It's just a major change and it's going to be a difficult time for the next several

Tension is palpable at the team's Spinney Field complex. As reporters were escorted to Coslet's office for an interview Tuesday, two assistant coaches got into a fight in an office down the hall. Other coaches ran in to break it up.

"Hey, it's a stressful time for everybody," Coslet said. "We're like family, we're together so much. So something like that is not out of the ordinary. I've seen it happen before. And this has been a very stressful week. So don't read anything into it. There's nothing to it.

Players also are showing the strain. Quarterback Jeff Blake, who was with Coslet in New York, walked past reporters trying to get his reaction Monday

"I'm not talking about the coaching change," Blake said. Other players said there was division in the locker room.

"I think that has got to change," offensive lineman Scott Brumfield said. "No matter who's coaching this team, we're never going to win unless everybody pulls together. You definitely have players going their own ways. No matter who's coaching, you're never going to win with factions.

Coslet's job is to fill in the holes in talent and get the players working together, and to do it quickly. Although president Mike Brown talked about Coslet as a long-term coach, he has not given him a contract beyond this season.

"It's almost overwhelming," Coslet said of the team's defiiencies.

The fright stuff: Finding the right Halloween costume

It's not that there are going to be all kinds of witches and ghosts and ghouls out walking the streets on Halloween night.

It's not that it's suddenly going to be dark at 6 p.m., or that once again a toothy jack-o-'-lantern will be staring eerily from your neighbor's porch and straight into your bedroom

It's not even that they keep advertising a Halloween slasher movie marathon while you're eating breakfast and watching "The Brady Bunch" in the morning.

No, you could handle all that. Admit it: What's really, really got you scared to death about Halloween is deciding what costume to wear.

Granted, it's not easy coming up with something new and special every year. Mummies, zombies and poltergeists have been done to death. And who wouldn't like to drive a stake through the heart of his or her old vampire costume?

Yet, retailers say even folks with a serious case of the beenthere, done-thats will find that with a little creativity — and a little cash — Halloween can be more fun than frightening.

The trick is to start early. The treat is a costume that you'll never forget.

Whether you plan to rent, buy or make your own costume, early preparation is the key to having the best costume at the mall or party, says Dorri McDonald, manager of a fabric and crafts store where, she says, customers start checking out costume ideas as early as

While her store carries a selection of ready-to-wear cos-

tumes, props and decorations for Halloween, it's the idea of making a more original costume that suddenly attracts many non-sewers to the store. And thanks to simple patterns, hot glue guns and a helpful staff, almost anyone can create a dream costume.

'We're not going to make their costume for them, but we'll help them find what they need to do it and show them how to do it," McDonald says.

Handmade costumes can be as inexpensive or extravagant as you want them to be, she adds. The store stocks fabrics and patterns for just about any kind of costume you can imagine — from black and white spotted fur for a Dalmation or cow costume to shiny metallics and lames for potential princesses and dancing girls.

If you're not crafty enough to create your own costume, however, there is another way to avoid meeting yourself at the neighbors' annual Halloween bash: Rent a costume.

And many moms like the idea of renting because they don't have to worry about washing the costume or storing it in hopes that a younger child will use it someday, says Barbara Baier of the Masquerade costume rental shop in Naples,

But renting, too, takes early preparation. Many of the best outfits are rented out way in advance for Halloween, but selection usually is varied enough that there are almost always some new masks and costumes available.

Adults are more interested in theme groups, she added, like 'The Addams Family' or the Scarecrow, Lion, Tinman and Dorothy from "The Wizard of

Movie themes also are popular in store-bought costumes. says Stacey Murphy, a Wal-Mart manager. "Star Wars" and "Toy Story" costumes continue to be hot for kids, and characters from Hunchback of Notre Dame" are big with their parents, Murphy says. Characters from the "Goosebumps" book series for kids also are selling well.

The average off-the-rack costume at Wal-Mart costs \$13 for children and \$20 for adults. Although most are not of the same quality as the rental costumes, they are for keeps, and some can double as sleepwear or for dress-up play.

Whatever your course, remember it's more about creativity than cost, advises Val Touchton, a craft store manager. While vampires and witches are a dime a dozen this time of year, she's still contemplating this year's the most memorable costume idea she's come across: the mother making a costume for a girl who wanted to be a "dead cheerleader."

That may seem a bit too far over the edge, but it is different, and that counts.

'You're not going to get a prize for buying a Pocahontas suit," Touchton says.
