## Relatively Quiet Hallowe'en Week Noted in County

Hallowe'en week has so far proved one of the quieter weeks in Parmer County, as far as vandalism, break-ins, and robberies are concerned.

Last break-in reported Wednesday night was the Cicero Smith Lumber Company at Bovina Saturday week ago, when thieves attempted to open the safe there.

Hallowe'en night vandalism was limited in main to breaking of street lights and some plate glass windows, expensive to the city and property holders. Twenty-two of the twenty-four street lights in Friona were broken. Bulbs cost about 35c apiece and additional cost is incurred in securing a serviceman from Hereford to replace them. Among cracked plate glass windows were those of the Cash Way Grocery and Friona Consumers in Friona. Sheriff Lovelace reports a quiet week in both Parmer and adjoining counties, observing that possibly the thieves have decided the few dollars netted were not worth the risk and trouble.

## Honors Copped By Leon Langford In Statewide Contest

Two West Texas boys, Leon Langford, Parmer county and Bruce Gibson, Hall county, have walked off with top honors in the 1950 4-H Home Grounds Beautification contest. The announcement was made today by Floyd Lynch, state 4-H club leader of the Texas A. & M. College Extension service.

He says Langford will receive a gold wrist watch which signifies that he is the state winner while Gibson's record, he is a former state winner, will be entered in the national contest.

Donor for the contest is Mrs. Charles R. Walgreen, Chicago.

Langford, 14, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Langford. He has been a 4-H member for four years and has conducted demonstrations with beef cattle and home beautification. He has done well with his calf feeding demonstrations but the work he has done around the farmstead has changed the appearance of the place and is a source of great satisfaction and pride for the entire family.

The Langfords built a new home in 1947 and a demonstration in landscaping and home beautification was very much in order. Leon accepted the job and in January 1948, he started to work.

The first job was to clean the premises. Then came the job of leveling the yard, sodding and seeding grasses — Bermuda in structing walks and fences and setting the shrubs and trees. front, buffalo in the back — Leon tells his story with pictures and a glance at his record clearly shows the progress that has been made.

Windbreaks have been utilized about the farmstead; roses have been planted; a large outdoor fireplace is the center of attraction in the backyard along with the flower garden. Some 35 species of trees and shrubs have been planted and 28 different species of flowers were grown last year in the flower garden. It hasn't been easy, for Langford has had to combat dry weather and high winds but a glance at his picture story is testimony that the job has been successfully carried out. Parmer county agent Joe Jones has supervised his work, and he has received lots of help from the family.

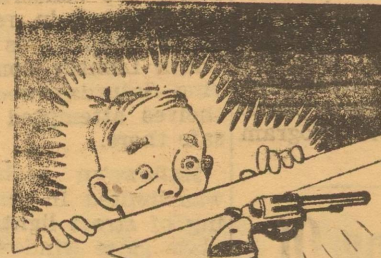

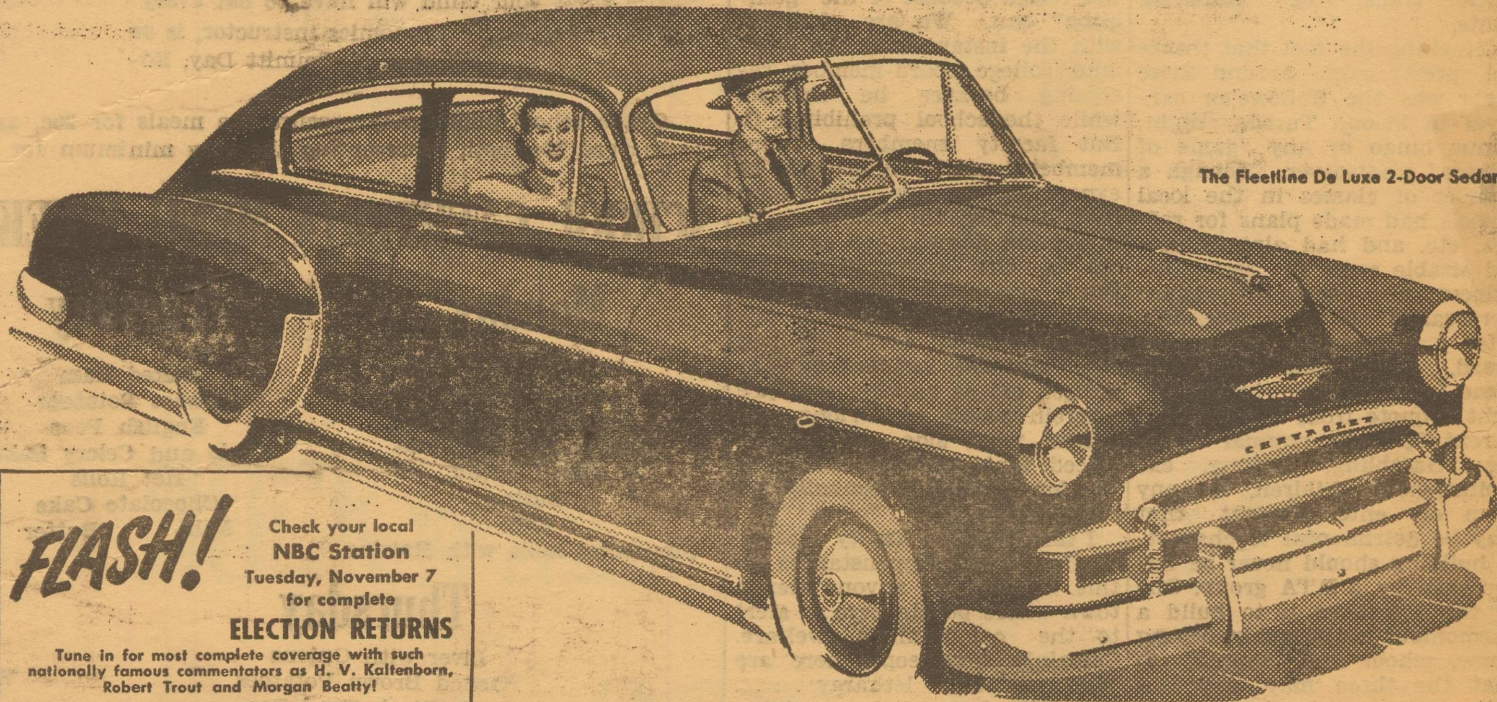

Do you know what "garnishment" is?

Garnishment is a proceeding to determine whether a third party has property, money, or credits in his possession belonging to second party, which might be impounded to pay to the first party what the second

party owes the first party. Garnishment also ties up such property so that, if in a case being tried, it is found that the second party is indebted to first party, that the first party can have the funds in the hands of the third party applied on this indebtedness.

The most usual use of garnishment is in regard to funds on deposit in a bank. However, just because a person has funds in a bank, does not always mean

that they can be garnished. There are certain legal requisites that must be met. The proceeding should be used very carefully and sparingly. Should the proceeding be instituted improperly the injured party would have recourse for damages.

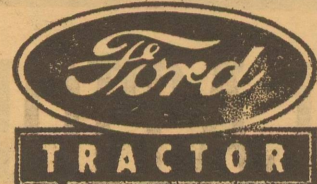

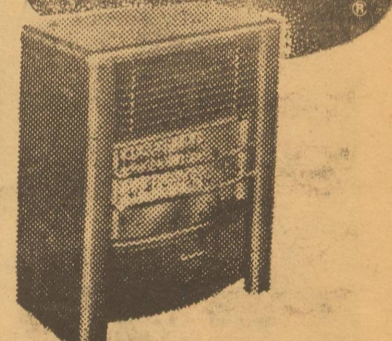

## Navy To Select 1600 In December For College Work

Annual competition tests to select 1,600 applicants for the naval reserve officers' training corps college program will be held December 9, Eighth Naval district headquarters has announced.

Application blanks are available at Navy recruiting offices and at NROTC units at Rice Institute, the University of Oklahoma, Tulane University and the University of New Mexico.

Male high school seniors and graduates between 17 and 21 may apply. Successful candidates will get a four-year college education with tuition, books, normal fees and \$50 a month pay at one of the 52 major colleges and universities with ROTC units.

To qualify, applicants must meet physical and mental standards and pass an aptitude test. State boards will select outstanding candidates to meet quotas assigned each state and territory, the Navy said.

They will enroll in the fall, 1951, term and will be deferred from draft until completion of their academic studies.

NROTC students participate in drills and summer cruises and must agree to serve two years on active duty after graduation and commissioning as ensigns in the naval reserve. At the end of the two-year period they may apply for retention as commissioned officers in the regular Navy.

Approximately one-half of all American adults neglected to register or pay poll taxes, preventing them from voting in the elections of 1948. Furthermore, scarcely one person in two has voted in previous elections. Yet, the American way of government is studied the world over, with both democracies and totalitarian blocs microscopically viewing our every move. Apathy of the United States citizen at voting time presents a sorry spectacle, indeed, presenting an unfair picture to the elected candidates and dangerously jeopardizing the benefits of a democratic system. Next Tuesday the Panhandle will select a congressman to represent us in Washington. One candidate has visited Parmer County on numerous occasions, courting the rural vote and backing up his campaign promises with examples of his past work for the agricultural inter-

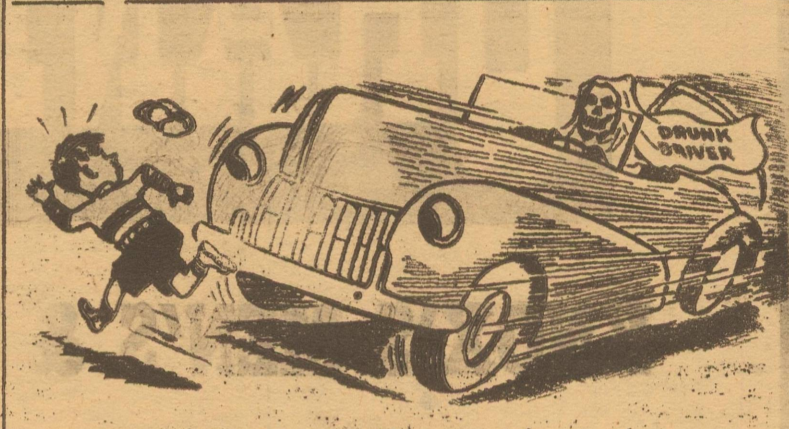
ests. The other candidate has spent some time and effort in soliciting the votes here and in the larger cities to our northeast. Both men have used the advertising mediums of the newspapers and radio, trying to convince the voter of his qualifications. And one of these men will be seated in congress. Which one? I have no idea. I predict that Gull will carry the southern tier of counties of the district. But with the complicated method of voting a split ticket, probably there will be many ballots thrown out because of misunderstanding of the correct way to mark the ballot, so the outcome is anybody's guess. But unless I vote, and unless you vote, we will have little justification in later standing on the street corner and criticizing the elected candidate. So, let's do our own little part in helping save the United States from lethargy, and express some opinion in next Tuesday's election.

# DO YOU REMEMBER

## Homer Fox Recalls Churchgoers of 1913; Tells Incidents in History of Friona Congregational Church and Members

A short time ago Tess and I drove around over Friona just to see the many new houses that had been built the last few years; it wasn't long until we found ourselves looking for the old houses that we knew, and they were hard to find. How the place has grown. We finally made it around to the corner where the little Congregational church stands; it is not the same old church, as the other one burned, but it is on the same lot. I lived just around the corner in the same block at Mother Reece's boarding house so I didn't have to back-pedal much to remember a lot of things about this little church. I remember the congenial, good natured, hard-working pastor, Rev. Hulbert; he had a fair sized job on his hands, because he had a pretty large flock to look after in the early days, and they were well scattered; and a lot of time he was their lawyer, doctor, general adviser and preacher. You see this little Congregational church was the only church in Friona and everyone that attended church (and most of them did) had to go to this

gational church? Most every Sunday this little church was pretty well filled up and the close ones were pretty faithful. The Coles, Rorbaughs, Ballards, Dugans, Suttons, Stevicks, Henschels, Kinsleys, Wynns, Hansons, Wentworth, Geo. Clarks, Sherris, Meades, Gischlers, Clennins, Goodwins, Drakes, Veilvertons, Maurers, Lillards, Weirs, Tiffles, Crawford, and of course a lot more that I can't think of right now. You could sit back and look that crowd over and find as good talent as you could find any place, and how they did love to neighbor, how they loved to do things for one another, and how they enjoyed these Sundays together. I remember one bright sunny morning in September 1913 just as Rev. Hulbert was dismissing his congregation, Mother Reece stuck her head in the door and yelled, "Clennin's house is on fire, and almost due south as the crow flies, we could see the house smoking. A man at the hotel told me to take his horse and buggy and go ahead. I rushed to the store to get out the fire extinguishers, everyone had them in those days, especially in those days, no water-works, anyway when I got to the store, some fellows had already broken the glass out of the door and had the extinguishers, one old boy yelled and said we couldn't wait, we had to have there a fire "distinguishers" I hopped in the buggy and me and the old gray mare took off. As we came up out of the draw, the Tiele brothers had their old two spot side winder "Mason" headed for the fire. I pulled old grey in next to the rail, took the corner on two wheels and passed that car. I didn't hold that lead long but it always made the Tiele boys faces red to mention it in company. We all got out there; we had enough willing help to put out the town, but no water. The windmill tank was dry and the house burned to the ground and I mean slowly. We had plenty of time to save most of everything in the house, but as usual a lot of it was broken up through too much haste. The people just stayed on, they forgot about dinner, they wanted so bad to do something for a neighbor in distress, you could see it in every face, and they did, a pat on the back, a word of encouragement from a kind heart, in words and deeds they helped the Clennins a lot. It was a hard blow to the Clennins, no insurance on the house, but they rebuilt that fall. But if it hadn't been for that little church they probably would never have known half of the friends and well wishers they had. I have seen a lot of churches of every size and kind in all these years, but like a fairy story to a little kid, this little Congregational church on the corner will always be the Community Church—God's House."

I was like most kids brought up in those days, and maybe they are still that way, I don't know. I was, and am a Democrat, cause Dad was, I was and am a Presbyterian because my mother was. I never heard of a Congregational denomination, so the thing that eked into my dull head and left the print there for good, was Congregational church, sure that means everybody's church, one church, one community; it sounded pretty good to me.

Well, I remember the first Sunday I attended the little church and the Rev. Hulbert clinched this impression that I already had formed in my mind, he was near the door when I entered and he extended his hand and said, "Come in son, you are welcome to God's Church and one God's House, House." One community, one where a bunch of the finest people on earth came to mix and worship. I thought about the rigs that were hitched around the church—buggies, wagons, spring wagons, horses and mules, can't remember a single car at that time. They came from far and near, maybe some would only get in a few times a year. The Houlettes, George Taylors, Boatmans, Spahns, B. Z. Taylors, F. W. Reeve, most of these lived pretty far out as I remember, also the Kaisers, Trieders, Reeds, Jeskis, James Singletons, and many more. Some would come on Saturday and spend the night with friends, some would leave home early and go back the same day, bring their own lunch or eat at the hotel, but spend the day with their friends visiting, hungry for news and companionship. I wonder what the people of that community would have done without that little Congregational church.



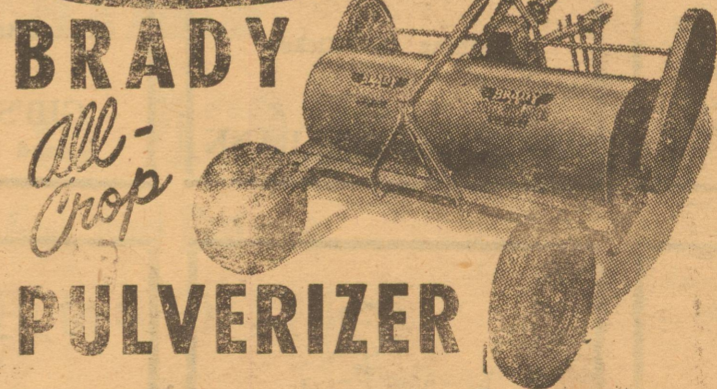

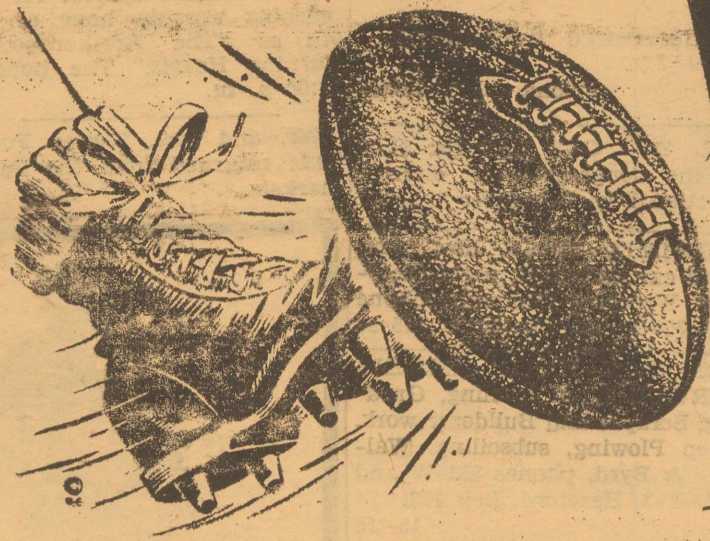
