

# RURAL TELEPHONE SERVICE IN PARMER COUNTY CONTINGENT UPON EARLY DECISIONS

(Editorial Comment)

The leading news story on this page carries some serious implications, deserving of more than mere report of events.

The fact is: If Parmer County rural residents want telephone service, a supreme effort must be expended. We do not mean half-hearted cooperation, but all-out exertion.

We will comment on this problem, working upon the assumption that the rural residents of this area do want telephones. We believe this to be true, especially at this time. With conservation rulings in the offing as the nation girds for defense, there is very likely possibility of rationing, to what extent we do not propose to prophesy. But with a tire ration, or a gasoline ration, the convenient telephone there at arm's length would save many a trip, would save many a dollar, or tire, or gallon of

oline.

Until Friday of last week, everything seemed to be progressing nicely, with a number of signers asking the Rural Telephone Cooperative Service, the preliminary surveys completed, and funds of \$454,000 allocated for construction.

But on Friday, the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company announced plans to form a Hereford Irrigation district rural telephone service. That firm, according to their already-drawn maps, would serve only a portion of the true irrigation area, extending west to a line drawn north from Black.

Now, if Southwestern Bell was sincere in its announced plans to construct this system, where would Parmer County be? Where would Castro County be? We would be out in the cold, for without the members of Deaf

Smith County, there likely would be insufficient local signers to insure the continuation of RTC plans.

In a special meeting at the Hereford REA office Tuesday afternoon, the RTC directors met in the same room with Southwestern Bell representatives. A number of our local men, who attended the meeting, said that the Bell officials flatly and bluntly stated that their purpose was to halt the RTC project.

This is very, very interesting, considering the fact that the Bell system has even had insufficient materials and labor to serve already established territories. Lubbock, and other plains cities are in dire need of telephone service improvement and expansion. Lack of materials has been the excuse for lack of actions. Yet the same firm proposes opening of a new territory. Can they be sincere? Do they plan actually to give this add-

ed service? Or could they merely be putting up a front, injurious to all, beneficial to none?

At a mass meeting called in Hereford Tuesday night, thirty-three rural citizens, living within a 5-mile radius of Hereford, were sounded out on their preference of service, from Bell or from RTC. Thirty-one of the 33 pledged support and preference to RTC. In fact, over fifty applications for RTC service were accepted at that meeting, with cash deposits backing up their intentions.

So... whatever the big, kind-hearted, service-minded Bell system does, there is chance of RTC construction only upon complete cooperation of the affected counties.

What will your wishes be? Let them be known NOW. For Bell solicitors are scheduled to commence their canvass in Deaf Smith County this week!

## H. B. Boardman Sweeps Field, Taking Herd Honors, Production Honors, and High Butterfat Score in Parmer D.H.I.A.

### New Herds Are Added To Parmer Association

Three new herds were added during December to the growing list of area dairymen and farmers joining the Parmer County Dairy Herd Improvement Association, supervisor L. V. Bednorz has announced. This brings the total number of herds to 21, with over 500 cows being listed.

During December total production of member herds aggregated 308,480 pounds of milk, 12,286 lbs. butterfat, with a per cow average of 569 lbs. milk and 23 lbs. butterfat.

High herd honors were taken by H. B. Boardman with his Jersey and Holstein cows producing an average of 890 lbs. milk with 37 lbs. butterfat. Following were the herds of Martin Fulcher and M. B. Caywood. Fulcher's Brown Swiss herd was barely nudged out of first position, producing 870 lbs. milk average, and 36 lbs. butterfat.

Most milk production was chalked up by Judy, belonging to H. B. Boardman, giving 1950 lbs. milk, with a butterfat test of 3.4, making 66 lbs. butterfat for the month, qualifying her to also take butterfat production honors.

Cows are now being tested by the association supervisor from Clovis to Canyon, with consideration being given to adding a vast territory in Swisher and Castro and Hale counties to this unit.

### Bids Called For Street Improvements Including 62 Blocks of Friona Paving

Proposals Must Be In Hands of City Clerk By 2 PM, February 7

Notice to bidders has been posted by the City of Friona this week, asking for sealed bids on the paving program authorized in the bond election of October 21, 1950. Proposals will be accepted at the office of the city clerk until 2:00 p. m., February 7, 1951.

The notice requires submission of proposals for furnishing all necessary materials, machinery, equipment, superintendence and labor for constructing certain street improvements consisting of approximately 42,165 feet of curb and gutter, 106,220 square yards of street paving, and other incidental items of work for the City of Friona. The project consists of approximately sixty-two blocks of street paving.

### Money Allocated, But Additional Memberships Needed for Go-Ahead

Community meetings have been scheduled for the January 16-Jan. 26 period for Parmer, Deaf Smith and Castro county residents desiring service by the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative.

Meeting places and dates in Parmer County are: Oklahoma Lane school house, Monday, Jan. 22, 7:30 p. m. Bovina American Legion hall, Wednesday, Jan. 24, 7:30 p. m. Friona American Legion hall, Friday, Jan. 26, 7:30 p. m.

The government has allocated \$454,000.00 for the construction of a telephone system in this area; but the money will be advanced to the Co-op only when the people put up the \$50 equity required by the RTA to give them assurance the people as a whole want the phone service.

This \$50 amounts to the lending agency, RTC, putting up 50 per cent and the people 10 per cent of the money required. If the Co-op is unable to meet the government requirement for a loan (insufficient signs), \$45 will be refunded together with the portion of the remaining \$5 membership fee remaining from expenses, acting manager Leo Forrest has announced.

The time that construction will start will depend on the early payment of a sufficient number of consumers. It is pointed out. In the three county area, 1350 subscribers are necessary for assurance of the system. After money is paid in for 1050 subscribers (\$32,500) the allotment will become available, and contract may be let, with assurance of the additional 300 subscribers by completion date.

Plans call for telephones of the dial type, with a monthly rental of \$4.25 for an 8-party residential line. Other type service will be available if desired. Any call outside the area will be charged at existing long distance rates from one town to another town.

Late telegrams from Senator Lyndon Johnson and from RTA officials in Washington assure the local cooperative that materials for this project will be given a high priority.

Much interest is being taken in the project, and a full turnout is expected at all community meetings, especially in view of the fact that Southwestern

# Editorial . . . .

## Full-Time Citizenship Is Imperative As Nation Girds Itself for Self-Preservation; This Is No Time for Social Changes or Social Expenditures At Any Level

Are we good citizens? Are we full-time citizens?

Hardly any subject could be approached which covers such a magnitude of factors. But we are primarily interested in these history-making days in the job of being staunch citizens contributing to the national welfare.

We are at war today. Call it a political cold-war or a police action, or whatever you choose, but the fact is that we are at war.

With the war clouds enveloping us in greater density in months to come, we, as good citizens, can do nothing else but channel our every resource and activity toward upholding our home government, our homeland, maintaining the liberties granted in the bill of rights.

And to maintain these privileges, we must recognize our responsibilities as never before. We must foster every essential move, and relegate every non-essential proposal to its proper place of oblivion. This is no time for social reforms, social improvements, or social this or that. It is a time for work, and sweat, and study. Not only must you and I practice this, but we must see that our representatives in Austin and in Washington religiously adhere to this action.

At best, the government inaugurates scores of socialistic practices each year, each non-essential to national welfare at a time like this. Out of the present state budget of \$514,000,000.00, only \$56,000,000.00 goes to the normal functions of government, with the rest allocated among

some worthy enterprises and some not so worthy, out all aside from the basic functions of essential government. Socialistic trends are responsible for much of this expenditure. Grandfather would turn over in his grave to note the paternal functions now exercised by the government. Basic government functions remain near constant in their expense. But when you take from you and give to me, there is no limit to the amount that can be spent. Cost of state government has increased 311 per cent in the decade just passed. Population increased only 19 per cent, and the cost of living but 70 per cent. Socialized reforms and services, together with their administration, accounted for much of the rest.

You and I are guilty of participating in these expensive socialistic trends. As individuals and cities we have worked for grants, asked for subsidies, maneuvered for favors to our individual sections of the country.

But now, the brakes must be applied. The interest of the entire United States must be considered. The government set up by our founding forefathers must be protected from within. Foolish spending will get us nowhere.

Essentials will be recognized more and more. Let us not be dilatory in converting our thinking and our labors to that end. It is not only a case of good business, but likely a fight for self-preservation.

# Weekly Review

## "Cry of the Thunderbird" is Cited As American Indians' Own Story; Legends And Facts Edited by Charles Hamilton

The Thunderbird is a symbol for the Indian, somewhat as the eagle is for the American white man. Therefore the title "Cry of the Thunderbird" is significant and appropriate for the book edited by Charles Hamilton which tells the American Indian's own story in his own words.

Though the average tourist knows the Thunderbird as a design used by Fred Harvey for his eating houses and inns, or as a unique design made by Indians seen on many articles the tourist buys; it means much more than that to the Indians. The bird's origin dates back thousands of years in their legends.

A well chosen collection of stories fill the volume from various tribes of the different sections of the United States and through the years when and after the white man came as well as legends preceding his arrival in America.

The other side of the story and white man, their encounters, both friendly and war like meetings are told herein. Other types of tales are ones such as Black Elk tells of the Sioux courtship of a maiden whose father set too high a price for her.

Reports on witchcraft of the medicine man is made by Chief Plenty Coups. It was medicine made by the witch doctor that cured a dying Crow warrior, according to the chief.

Long Lance gives the inside of the Sun Dance rites of his tribe. And the entrance of Dartmouth college by an Indian as a freshman is an unusual experience for an Indian and is told by Chiyesa who tells how it feels to do so.

In all history there is none to compare with Geronimo (1829-1909) for fierceness and a burning hatred for the Mexican and the whiteman and we get a better understanding why in reading the short paragraphs taken from his biography dictated in 1906.

It is the story of how his tribe was wiped out by the Mexicans and how he avenged their deaths. After that he was ever on the war path and one of depredation throughout the southwest.

At the time this happened the Mexican government was paying a bounty for Apache scalps, \$100, for a warrior's scalp, 50, for a squaw's scalp, 25, for a child's scalp. The total profit from Geronimo's family was only 175.

The story of his capture, betrayal and imprisonment are briefly given along with those of other outstanding Indians in history.

Battles from King Phillip's War, the Revolution of 1812, the Wagon Box fight, the Custer fight and the last stand of the Nez Percés are given from the Indian's view point.

The path of war was long and bloody and the Indian sheroe plenty, Pontiac, Black Hawk, Sitting Bull and others tell their eloquent stories in the "Cry of the Thunderbird."

# The Law & You

## Do you know what "community property" is in Texas?

This is the designation given to the joint property of the husband and wife. It includes all the property acquired by them after marriage, except that property given specifically to one, that property received by one as part of an inheritance, and that property exchanged for separate property belonging to one.

Both husband and wife have an equal interest in the community property, and all property belonging to them is presumed to be community property, unless the contrary is clearly shown.

Upon dissolution of the marriage contract by divorce the

wife is entitled to one-half of the community property, and the husband is entitled to one-half of the community property. Even though the parties should separate and not live together, so long as the marriage contract exists all the property acquired by them, subject to the above exceptions, continues to be presumed to be community property.

Upon the death of either party one-half of their community property vests in the survivor, and the other half passes to the heirs of the deceased.

# Other Editors Say --

## Poor Are Chief Givers, Says Warren In National Foundation Survey Quote

The Russell Sage Foundation survey of philanthropy in the United States shows that around four billion dollars a year are given to churches and other organizations with 60 per cent of the total coming from families with net incomes of less than \$3,000 a year.

Total giving has increased from 1.2 billion dollars a year 20 years ago to the present 4 billion. More than 90 per cent of gifts comes from living donors, while 82 per cent of the total came from families with incomes under \$5,000.

The lowest rate of giving is for those whose net incomes are between \$10,000 and \$20,000. They gave 1.9 per cent of income compared to 2.4 per cent for those earning 3,000. Highest per cent was by one donor with a net income of 8 million dollars, who gave 12 per cent.

The study included gifts to churches, educational institutions, community chests, health and welfare agencies and all other organizations where contributions are tax deductible.

Contributions were divided as follows: By individuals, 74 per cent; charitable bequests, 4

per cent; corporations, 5 per cent; foundations, 3 per cent, and income from capital, except foundations, 14 per cent.

Although about 50 per cent of private donations has gone to religious organizations, it lacks much of all going for direct church support. Hospitals, child care, old peoples' homes, schools, social service and foreign relief are among the varied benevolences supported in part by religious contributions.

The lowest income and the largest income groups are the best givers. The average income group apparently doesn't give in proportion because it must have other needs regarded as more important than churches and philanthropy.

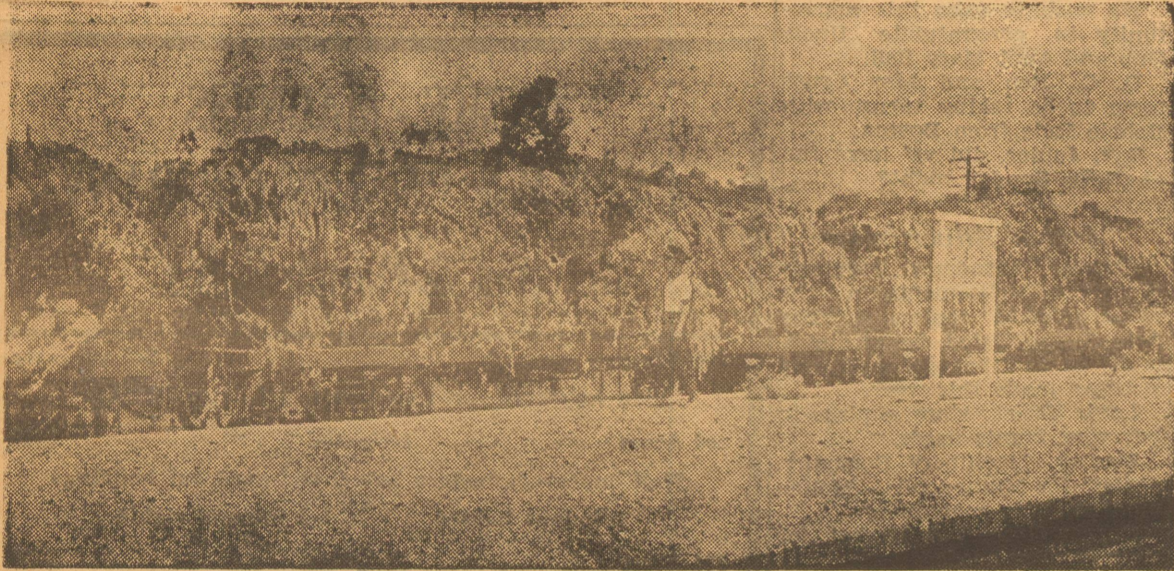
