Observance of Worldwide Brotherhood Week Is Urged; But Warning Sounded that Brotherhood Does Not Mean Weak-Kneed Political, Religious, Social Compromises

February 18th to 25th has been designated as "Brotherhood Week", proclaimed by the President of the United States and sponsored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

For the first time, this observance is being honored beyond the confines of the United

We suspect that the sponsors of the week are going all the way, advocating World Brotherhood, Understanding, Friendship, Tolerancce, and Forbearance among every race and creed as the happy cure-all for the ills of the world.

To our mind this assumption is theoretically correct and in most cases workable. But we still like to withhold a "whole-hog" attitude, simply because of the practical factors involved, the frailties of human nature.

If brotherhood means minimizing our own beliefs, compromising our religion, or even the Monroe Doctrine, we cannot string along, Bot if brotherhood is onderstood as meaning a sincere helpful attitude and intense study of the other man's ways with the object in mind of determining "which" practice of "which" man is ccorrect, then we enrodre the program in its

We believe that this matter of compromise is widely different from the true meaning of "brotherhood". We compromised, to our everlasting shame, when forfeited our desire to open sessions of the United Nations meetings with prayer to the Almighty God. How often, compromise really means forfeit And, believe me, I think we could have exercised a "brotherly" attitode to all nations of the world without debunking the necessity of prayer in such high-

We were "brothers" to the Philippine Islands for decades, giving them handouts of staples and frills alike. Why, that would not even be good for my own brother. Had those islands (I merely cite them as an example) been better indoctrinated as to the stern necessity of working for just pay rather than waiting for handouts, they would have been much better prepared to function as their own government when the time for them came to assume a brother's seat in the nations of the world.

Yes, let's be brothers, bot jost ones. Just decisions and actions call for wise understanding, not a wishy-washy series of compromises, conpromses, concessions and handouts that carry no promise of respect.

Acting as wise brothers, the citizens of the United States could accomplish untold tasks. And I do believe there is embraced within the confines of our country an ample store of wisdom. Maybe we should requisition a few more of the wiser attitudes from this storehouse before we go all out to consider the Chinese as brothers, capable of understanding and practicing Democratic government. The Oriental mind has for centuries clicked along in a different sphere from our own. It is not capable of coincidental democratic effort with our own at the present We anticipate that some day it will be, but today

In this same train of reasoning, proper brotherly action toward Uncle Joe's ilk would be a sound threshing, or at least a stern attitude based upon a clear-cut foreign policy simple and definity enough for Mr. Stalin and Mr. J. Q Public at home to understand.

So, we appeal, practice brotherhood 52 weeks per year, but KNOW what you are doing, don't just compromise!



A chattel mortgage is a lien; created upon personal property. Generally it is what the Bank wants on crops and machinery when a farmer borrows money from the bank. It also covers other personal property, such as furniture and cars.

valid oral chattel mortgage. Practically all chattel mortgages are reduced to writing and signed, and this is the preferred practice for several reasons. One is that it is easier to prove exactly what the parties agreed to, and not have to depend on memory. Another reason, is that the written chattel mortgage may be filed for record, and put interested parties on notice. An oral chattel mortgage is not binding on anyone knowledge of it.


