Do the Job With a Classified

Many people are under the impression that their home cannot be taken from them for delinquent taxes. This is an erroneous idea. The taxing units have a lien for their taxes, which they can foreclose, and sell the property, even though it may be a homestead.

In cases where the taxing enits decide to enforce the collection of their delinquent taxes, contract usually some attorney to handle all of their delinuent taxes. He is required to send notices to all persons regarding their delinquent taxes. On those who fail to respond to the notces, suit is filed, judgment secured, and the property sold at public sale to the highest bidder. The owner of the property, has the right to redeem his property for two years after the sale. During the first year after sale he must pay to the purchaser at sheriff's sale a twenty-five per cen (25%) penalty, and if redeemed during tht second year a fifty per cent (50%) penalty. After the two year period, the former owner loses all right to his property, and the purchaser at the sheriff's sale becomes vested with the title to said property. Congressional leaders privately advise small business leaders, "Tell your people not to be pantheir businesses as many did early in World War II."

Scare headlines by publicity seeking bureaucrats are putting a false front on raw material supstatements are made hoping investigations,

they say.

This is the C. W. Harder year bureau heads may roll, lopped off by the House and Senate Small Business Committees now gaining power through greater support from increasing organization of independent busnessmen.

First target in the battle to end material shortages for both civilian and military supply will be the Marshall Plan. Congressman Fred L. Crawford of Michigan on the floor of Congress has called attention to public bitterness over the diffusion of the American substance.

In a recent speech in St. Louis,
