Holsteins, Jerseys, Shorthorns Take Top Individual Honors in February Parmer County Dairy Herd Production

Kreighauser Herd Is High Producer of Month

Production tabulations March 1 released by the Parmer County Dairy Herd Association reveal the Harold Kreighauser Holstein herd as high herd of the month, with an average of 759 lbs. of milk per cow and 28.2 lbs. butterfat.

Closely following was the Jersey herd of Roy V. Miller, producing 492 lbs. milk and 26.9 lbs. butterfat. Virgil Teague was third with his Shorthorn herd.

High individual milk producer for the month was a Holstein belonging to W. E. Martin and Son, producing 169 lbs. milk with a 3.3 butterfat test.

Butterfat production honors went to a Shorthorn of the Virgil Teague herd, testing 4.9 on 1338 lbs. milk production to give 66 lbs. butterfat.

The ten high cows in milk production included animals from the herds of W. E. Martin and Son, Harold Kreighauser, Humphrey's Dairy, Ellis & Humphrey and Teague.

Ten cows in butterfat included individuals from the herds of Teague, Humphrey's Dairy, Kreighauser, Martin and Roy Deloshaw.

Seventeen herds now on official D.H.I.A. test, 393 of the animals now milking and 78 dry. Total milk production of cows eased during February was 292,857 ybs., butterfat, 11,189 lbs., and an average milk production of 621 lbs., and average butterfat production of 23.7 lbs.

COTTON GIN!

Locally-Owned Cotton Gin Is Reality With Purchase This Week of Equipment

Farmers Asked to Make Seed Requirements Known at Early Date

A locally-owned gin is assured for Friona and the surrounding territory as a result of purchase this week of a Hardwick-Etter 4-stand gin.

Wright Williams and Pete Buske spokesmen for a local group of men making the purchase, said the gin appeared to be the ideal type for operation here, having four "30" stands, and complete with all cleaning and drying equipment. It is natural gas powered.

The gin will be moved here from Oklahoma where it has ginned less than 2700 bales.

Williams stated that the gin definitely would be in operation here.

Farm Bureau, Chamber Of Commerce Take Lead Asking Consideration

Requests for a 90-day extension for the maturity date for Commodity Credit grain sorghum loans have been made in large numbers this week in Parmer County, the action sparked by the Farm Bureau Federation and the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Petitions were signed by grain sorghum producers, with some 500 signers affixing their names. These were submitted to both congressional authorities and officials of the Commodity Credit Corp. in Washington. First steps were taken when the Farm Bureau contacted Representative George Mahon and others, asking for extension. Rep. Mahon revealed on February 27 that all efforts had failed to receive consideration, and that further correspondence should be directed directly to the CCC. Immediately the local bureau and the commerce and agriculture organizations got busy, wiring, telephoning and writing the proper authorities. Similar organizations in the other Panhandle counties were contacted with requests for concurrent action.

Individuals and groups still are urged to join the petitioning. Bruce Parr, Farm Bureau President, emphasizes.

County Agent Jones Is Emphatic In Warning Of Deadly Poisons

With cut worms and green bugs prevalent over the county, County Agent Joe Jones this week has listed insecticides which he says give adequate control when properly applied.

In listing the preventatives Jones is emphatic in pointing out that all listed below are deadly poisonous to both man and animals, and should be applied with extreme care, and then only after consultation with the supplier or the county agriculture agent.

For green bugs, Jones suggests either Parathion or Tetra-Ethyl Pyrophosphate (Tepp). Application of either should be made at a temperature of around 50 degrees above zero and at a time the bugs are visible on their stems or leaves of the plant.

Cutworm control can be effected with DDT, Toxaphene or Chlordane, with the same rigid precautions being taken regarding poison. Jones states that from three-fourths to one pound of active DDT ingredient should be applied to the acre; for example, a 5 percent powder would require 20 lbs. per acre.

For Chlordane and Toxaphene, he says from 1 lb to 1-2 lb active ingredient per acre is correct.

Jones goes further to say that a spray is desired above other methods or applications with the residual qualities of the DDT lasting for several days in most cases when sprayed.

It is pointed out that the above poisons kill some of the beneficial insects as well as the harmful ones.

Worms are reported throughout the county to some extent with the bugs also present, but probably not so numerous as last year. The green bug is simply a wingless green-tinted plant lice, attacking wheat and other small grains.

February and March are generally considered the bad green bug months with other insects destroying them in April and later; with the local natural enemies of the green bugs being the lady-bug.

The Santa Fe crop report released March 1 hesitates to predict the 1951 wheat outlook, though citing it as somewhat more hopeful than it was a month ago, due to receipt of rain.

Still it considers the general conditions as ranging from good to almost complete failure, taking the Southwest as a whole.

With green bugs in some localities, and reports of considerable winter kill in others, the outlook can hardly be optimistic, the report states, pointing out that winter kill in some states has been extensive, with the tiny wheat roots, eakened by drought and insects, faring badly when recent temperatures dipped far below freezing.

While the verdict must await the coming of warm weather there are enough favorable reports from both Kansas and Oklahoma to indicate at least a fair crop under normal conditions from now on.

Editorial

Some New Angles of An Old Appeal . . . Trade At Home!

This editor gets "out of sorts" just about this time every month. We are not directing our ill feelings at anyone, but we are just upset about a situation that returns no good to Friona.

Each of our larger neighboring towns conducts a "Dollar Day" on the first Monday of every month. For a few days previous to this first Monday, Friona is deluged with sales appeal, all legitimately directed showing the benefits of trading out of town.

We have time and again sounded off in defense of trading at home. But this is a negative attitude. Positive action is needed; added inducements are imperative to keep the folks at home. Sure we have good prices here; we have congenial merchants; we have civic-minded merchants; we have merchants who direct more than their share of profits back into the growth of Friona. This is just reason for trading at home, but even these attributes do not speak so loudly to some as do specific "Trade Inducement" days, whether they are called Dollar Day, Trades Day, Get Acquainted Day, Appreciation Day, or whatnot.

A chamber of commerce is on the job in Friona; let's utilize its facilities, its power of organizing, and work out some method to clearly show to the entire vicinity that Friona is an appreciative town, appreciating the support of its patrons so much that it goes all out to make trading at home profitable and enjoyable.

All the days mentioned above are legitimate and advisable. But there are other trades appeals directed at the local housewives that are not so ethical. Sure there are out-of-town merchants who quote astoundingly low prices, skipping mention of the quality of the goods, offering no guarantee. There are the fly-by-night salesmen.

And there are efforts made to entice our trade elsewhere by clever recognition of Friona achievements, published prominently in neighboring publications. Well, and good. But these are published only in "Dollar Day" editions, spangled with the price ads that are quite, quite inducive. We cannot censor such practice. It just shows that someone is "on the ball"; what have we done to show we, too, are on our toes?

Air Force Pampering Is Pointed Out by Perryton Editor Who Petitions for Equal Opportunities And Benefits in All the Armed Services

Editor's Note: Having felt since the last war that inequalities definitely exist in pay schedules, opportunities and benefits available in the various armed services, we anticipated the investigation at the Lackland Air Base to bring to the open some comments on this. We scanned the editorial columns of both the daily and weekly newspapers, and sure enough, we find an editorial written by one of our own Panhandle publishers, setting forth some of these irregularities as he sees them. It's worth reading.

Members of the Congressional committee which recently investigated and reported on conditions at Lackland Air Base could profitably look into the underlying causes of this overcrowded condition—namely, preferential treatment of Air Force personnel.

The Air Force cannot be blamed for accepting as many volunteer recruits as they can get. All other services are doing the same thing but the outmoded and ridiculous system of flight pay and extra ratings for all Air Force personnel is causing most of the volunteers to head for the Air Force. Correct these inequalities between services and the problem will solve itself.

The sympathetic concern shown by the Congressmen for the mild inconveniences being suffered by the recruits at Lackland is sickening to Air Force veterans of World War II as well to those who saw more rugged service with the armed forces. In fact, there are few overseas veterans who at one time or another would not have considered the set-up at Lackland as strictly "luxury."

An hour's investigation on Korea would probably show the Congressional committee that many troops there have no stoves in their tents—they probably lack even the tents despite the fact that they are operating in one of the harshest climates on the globe.

The report by the congressmen indicated that the Air Force is trying to grab the "cream" of the volunteer manpower and infers that they are getting it. The howling of the Air Force recruits over a few minor hardships indicates to us that the spoiled darling of the services is getting more than its share of "mama's spoiled darlings." Since the ultimate objective of all military training is to prepare the recruit to meet the enemy in combat, the "cream" will need to have a lot of education and technical training to offset the disadvantages of having the ranks filled with lads who cry to Congress because there are no stoves in the tents and the cooking doesn't measure up to Mom's.

Since the congressmen have found that Air Force reception centers are over-crowded and many recruits are fed up with the set-up, we believe provision should be made to permit them to transfer to the infantry.

Of course, "griping" is a traditional pastime in all arms and services and likely most of the recruits in Lackland had no intention of their complaints being taken seriously enough to call for a Congressional investigation. The real slap in the face to frost-bitten men in Korea and the veterans of past wars is for Congress to dignify the complaints with an investigation.

In justice to all men in the service, the public should demand that opportunities and benefits should be equal throughout all the services.

Regardless of what an education costs, it will never be as expensive as the cost of ignorance.

The Law & You

DO YOU KNOW what a suit for "alienation of affections" is about?

The right of married persons to live together peaceably without some outsider enticing one of the parties away from the other is a valuable right which the courts will protect, and allow substantial damages in case some outsider does interfere with the home.

Thus where the husband and wife are living peaceably and happily together, and some woman gets interested in and shows considerable attention to and causes the husband to become interested in her, and to neglect and finally leave his wife and family for the other woman, the Courts will allow damages to the wife against the other woman for alienation of the affections of the husband for his wife. Similarly, the result would be the same, if it was the wife who was enticed away from the home, in which case, the husband would have cause of action against the other man.

M. F. Balls of Ashland, Ohio is visiting Mr. and Mrs. Leo H. Balls who live four miles south of Friona. Mr. Balls runs a butcher shop in Ashland and has farming interests. His home in Ohio is only a few miles from Louis Bromfield's famed Malabar farm which is the nation's top in conservation application. Asked if they had green bugs and cut worms in Ohio he said that they did not. He said a kind of wheat fly similar to the feared Hessian fly gives them trouble.

A topographic map was made for Leo Balls and ditch lines run for watering wheat.

Four days in March have given us four windy days and more wind is sure to come. It's a good time in the year to look around and see which farmers have the know how to protect their land from blowing. In a report to regional headquarters we estimated that less than 5,000 acres in Parmer, S.C.D. is subject to wind damage. This figure could easily change within 15 days. Crop residue and growing crops are adequate except on isolated spots of calcareous soils. The most careful farmer may have an area of calcareous or lime colored soil which is hard to hold. Areas like this, if handled according to the capability of the land, should be used for closely drilled wheat sorghum, irrigated pasture or alfalfa with a heavy application of barnyard manure.

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Weekly Book Review

"Danger from Deer" Is Strange Title of Baum's New Novel of San Francisco

Doubleday & Co. \$3.00

"Danger from Deer," is the Vicki Baum's new novel, story of two sisters, Ann and Maud, who are in love with the same man through the years. One has to looses but she wins him later when she makes everyone pay her price, the husband, the sister and the daughter of the two.

The crisis is brought about years later when she is determined to have her own way about her son's life just as she has with everyone else up to then. The daughter, Joy, is just as determined that her stepmother is not going to be allowed to ruin her half brother's life as her's has already been. Not even if she must resort to violence to prevent it and she tells Ann so.

The result of the decisions of the two women makes the story which has for its setting a train trip which begins at San Francisco with destination the East where they will meet Charley.

San Francisco history is interwoven with the background of the characters and is a place of great sentiment for Joy. In leaving on the trip on which so much is to occur before she returns, she sets back in her coach chair and thought with closed eyes, holding the image of the city in her mind. "Many superimposed ever different images of San Francisco at sunset. When the gale was blowing about in grey shreds and a brassy light struck the houses on the hills and the jagged skyscrapers down town—and such places as El Greco's Toleador Coit Tower, Telegraph Hill and Toscamia, these and many others she recalled with a reluctant leaving of them."

As the train rolls on the plot unfolds, as does the life of the two women speeding along with it by means of flashbacks, as they speed toward their destination as well as their destiny.

At fifteen, Ambros—the man who was to love the sisters—met her for the first time and she looked so like an angel that he called her Angelina then and ever afterwards. She had a delicate skin, silver blonde hair and big innocent blue eyes. All of this concealed a strong willed, selfish and determined woman even at that young age.

But in the closing scene Angelina surprises Joy as well as herself, by doing the seemingly impossible, the one decent thing of her life.

Those who like character study and development written in a modern manner of the time, today, will find Vicki Baum in her usual good style when reading her new book, but your reviewer still likes her "Tale of Ball's" best of all her novels.

KITCHEN MEMO BY JEAN CLARK

GREAT grandmother was right when she fed her family old fashioned Molasses Pie for the iron and calcium in molasses are important daily needs in anybody's diet. Combine 4 slightly beaten eggs, 1/2 cup molasses, 1 cup corn syrup, 1/4 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. vanilla, 1 cup melted butter or margarine. Mix well and pour into a 9-inch unbaked pie crust. Bake 35 mins. in a gas oven set at 350°F. For Molasses-Pecan Pie, add 1 cup chopped pecans to mixture before pouring into pie crust.

Grease may splash onto the wall behind your range. Cut a sheet of plastic to fasten on the wall. Then a quick wipe with a soapy cloth will keep it clean.

Quilted coverlets are precious possessions and need to be washed and dried with care. The sagging weight of a wet coverlet causes uneven drying on the line and distorts its shape. If you haven't an automatic gas dryer, borrow the use of one for drying your coverlets. Set the dial at high temperature to completely dry for 20 to 25 minutes and the coverlet will be soft, fluffy and perfectly shaped.

To prevent the flowerettes from breaking off as you lift cauliflower from the pan, put the vegetable into a clear cloth tied to form a bag. Cook, of course, over a low gentle simmer flame.

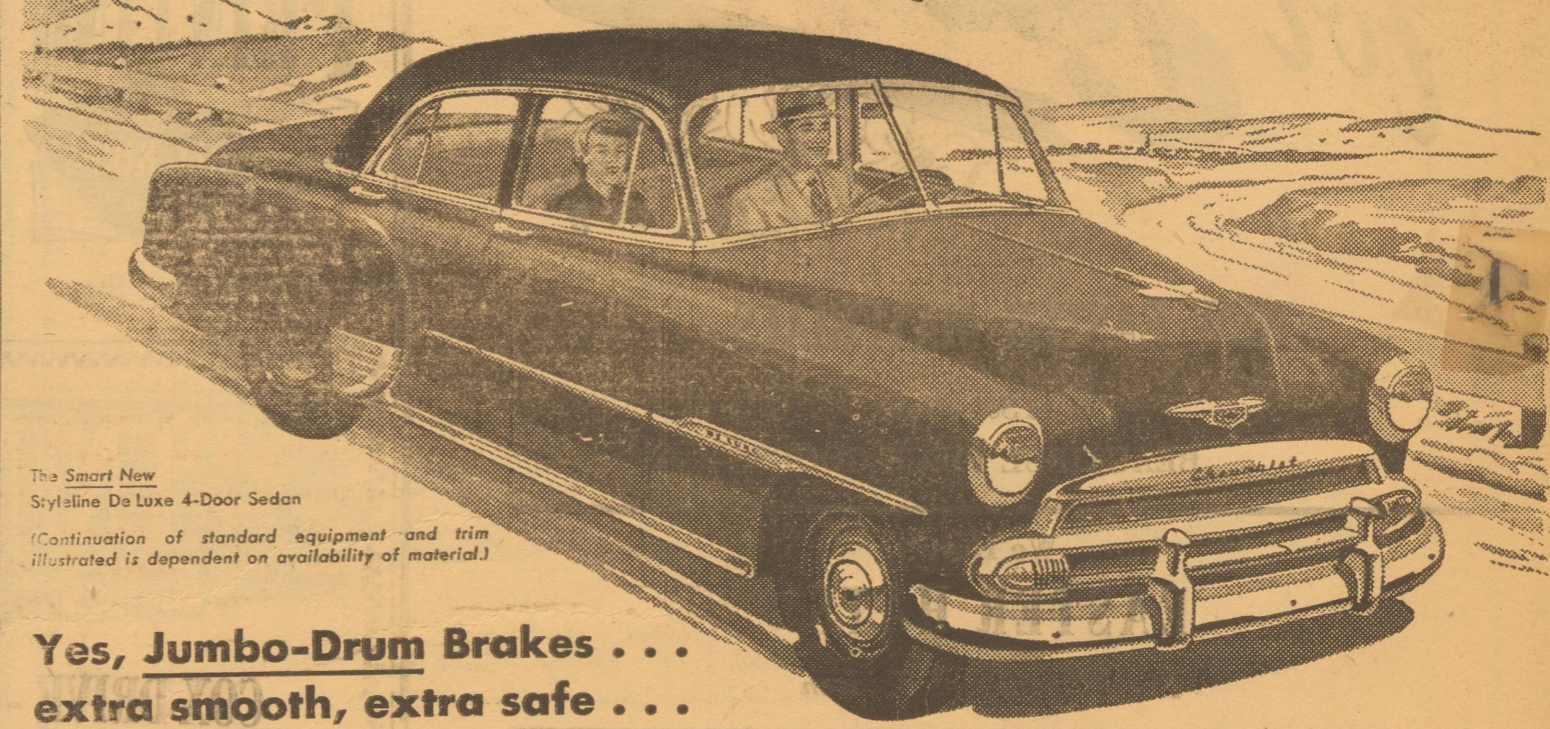

THE STATEMENT OF JOSEPH STALIN:

The great significance of the recent statement of Joseph Stalin does not lie in what Joe said or what he left unsaid, but in the fact that he broke a silence of approximately two years duration. It is well known that under the communistic theory "Silent Joe" is not supposed to say anything publicly unless it is for the purpose of settling inner party differences which are of such great concern as to require a definite announcement of preference his statement could well fore his statement could well indicate that there are repercussions within the higher echelons of the party in Russia as to the method of handling the great masses in Russian proper and the satellite nations. There is no doubt but that definite trouble has been encountered in the satellite countries that demanded some immediate and extreme measures. So it became necessary for Uncle Joe to speak his piece and to definitely under-write the policy that the "big lie" propaganda methods were still number one with the Reds. More about this later.

GRAIN SORGHUMS

The loan maturity date of grain sorghums could cost many farmers of the 18th district and 19th district lots of money. Congressman George Mahon and myself have conferred on several occasions with the Commodity Credit corporation hoping to secure a 60-day extension of the loan maturity date and have enlisted the aid of numerous other Texas congressmen in this fight. There are several excellent arguments against the extension of this maturity date, but we have kept up the fight and expect to meet with Commodity Credit officials sometime within the next few days for the purpose of trying to work this matter out to the benefit of Panhandle farmers. I have just talked to Mr. Underhill of the Department and expect to have

a conference with Mr. Kruse and Congressman Mahon within the next few hours

WHEAT TO INDIA

There is a sharp division in Congress on what should be done on the Indian situation. The grain being considered is not all wheat. The request has been for food grains, which of course includes grain sorghums. The Indians grind this and make bread. Perhaps we could do a little research on this problem and help our own grain sorghum market. There are many points to consider in the proposed food grain shipments to India. Would appreciate the thoughts of you people in the Panhandle concerning this. Many letters have already come in.

RAW COTTON CEILING

We are trying to do away with the ceilings on raw cotton. I placed in the Congressional Record a most pertinent resolution adopted by the State Legislature of Texas concerning this situation.

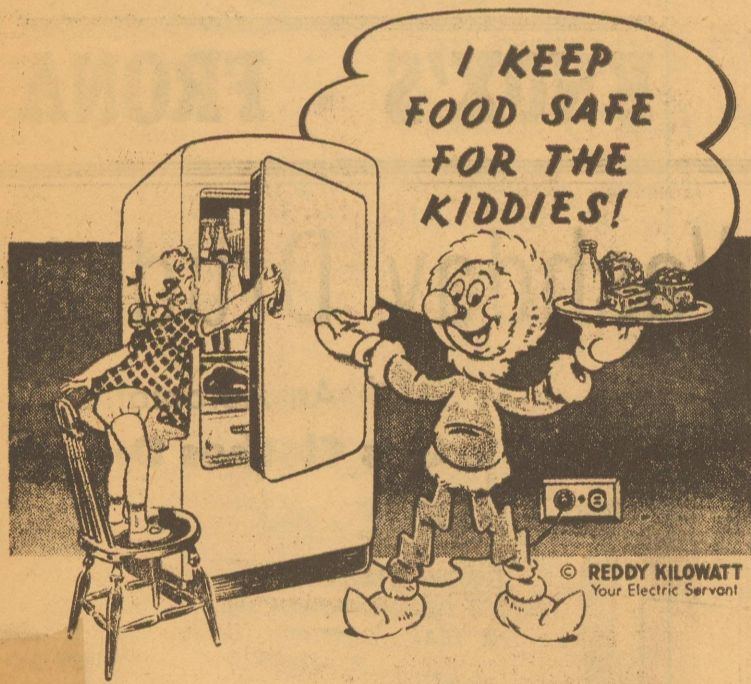

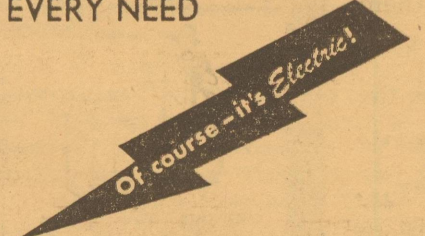

CRANBERRY SALAD

Mrs. Clarence Baxter
Springfield, Colo.
1 pound cranberries, grind and cover with 2 cups sugar and let stand overnight.
When ready to serve add 1-2 cup chopped nuts, 12 chopped marshmallows, 1-2 cup whipped cream, unsweetened.

CHERRY LAYER CAKE

(Actual mixing takes less than 5 minutes)

Mrs. G. H. Whitaker, Jr.
2 1-4 cups cake flour
1-2 teaspoon salt
3 teaspoons double action baking powder.
1 1-3 cups sugar
1-2 cup shortening
1-4 cup maraschino cherry juice.
16 maraschino cherries chopped
1-2 cup milk
1-2 to 2-3 cup egg whites, un-beaten
1-2 cup chopped California walnuts

Sift dry ingredients into bowl. Have all ingredients at room temperature, add shortening, cherry juice, cherries and milk. Beat 2 minutes, add egg whites, beat 2 minutes, fold in nuts, bake in two greased 8 inch layer pans in moderate oven (350 degrees) for 30 minutes. Frost with 7 minute frosting, decorate with maraschino cherry petals.

CRACKER TORTE PIE

Mrs. John Blackburn
3 egg whites
3-4 cup graham cracker rolled fine
1-2 cup finely chopped nuts
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup sugar
Fold sugar into stiffly beaten egg whites, add graham crackers, nuts, baking powder and vanilla. Mix well and spread in buttered pie pan. Bake 25 minutes in moderate oven. Serve with or without whipped cream.

LEMON CAKE PIE

Mrs. Owen Seamonds
To one unbaked pie crust add the following: 1 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons flour, juice of one lemon, butter sides of walnut 2 egg yolks and mix above well together add one cup of sweet milk, then fold in 2 egg whites that have been beaten stiff. Bake in moderate oven until firm. Bake about 350 degrees temperature.

"BUSY DAY" Dessert TIP

When making biscuit, reserve cuttings, knead these, roll very thin, cut with biscuit cutter (or into squares or triangles with spatula, turn in melted shortening, sprinkle with sugar (and spice if desired) and bake with the biscuits. These may be added to almost any type fresh or canned fruit for a quick shortcake or cobbler type dessert.

PINEAPPLE FLUFF PIE

1 cup crushed pineapple
1 egg
1-4 to 1-2 cup sugar
1 cup Daricraft milk
1 envelope plain gelatin
1- cup cold water
2 teaspoon lemon juice
Chill milk thoroughly, soften gelatin in cold water. Heat pineapple in saucepan, add beaten egg and sugar, boil 1 or 2 minutes. Remove from heat, add gelatin, cool. When mixture begins to thicken add stiffly whipped daricraft to which has been added the lemon juice. Pour into pan lined with vanilla wafers, baked pastry or graham cracker crust. Chill thoroughly and serve.

UPSIDE DOWN PIE

For crust use:
1 cup sugar
3-4 cup milk
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup flour
Melt 1-4 lb. butter in pan, add 1 cup of sugar to fruit and heat, put batter into butter and put the fruit on the batter. Cook about 25 minutes in 350 degree oven.

APPLE TORTE

Mrs. F. W. Reeve
1 well beaten egg
1-2 cup sugar, beat egg and sugar well before adding other ingredients.
Sift together the following and add to first mixture.
1-2 cup flour
2 teaspoon baking powder
Few grains of salt
1-4 teaspoon cinnamon
2-8 teaspoon each of cloves and allspice
1 cup chopped and peeled apples.
Bake 30 to 35 minutes at 350 degree oven.
