## Water District Of 21 Counties Now Proposed

The High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association will give strong support to creation of an underground water conservation district in a 21 county Panhandle-South Plains area board officials have announced following a meeting in Plainview March 8.

Efforts to organize a district will be renewed within the next few weeks following announcement by the Board of Water Engineers of its official designation of the area included in an underground water reservoir underlying the proposed district. The board has had the designation matter under advisement since last August.

Officials of the High Plains Association, which has 14 county groups as associate members, outlined the following procedure to be used in setting up a district:

Association members, largely composed of landowners and irrigation well users, will petition the Board of Water Engineers to create a district.

The State Board then must give notice through out the area affected of a hearing at which the board will determine whether the district shall be created. The hearing will be held somewhere within the 21-county area, possibly in centrally located Plainview. Underground water users and any other citizens affected will be given an opportunity to offer testimony on the desirability of a district.

If, after the hearing, the State Board decides that a district should be created, the Board will enter an order creating the district and appointing five directors from five different precincts. The primary function of these appointed directors will be to call an election within a short period, after proper notice has been given throughout the territory.

At the election the people will decide whether to accept the district and they will elect five directors from five separate precincts designated by the State Board. In designating precincts, the law provides that no town or city may be in more than one director's precinct.

The Texas Legislature in 1949 approved the farmer-sponsored underground water conservation district law as an alternative to a state-control measure offered. The enabling act provides that the districts shall protect, conserve and re-charge the ground water supply.

## Funeral Was Held For Willis Parker

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon for Willis Parker, 50, long time Farmer County resident. Rites were held in the Friona Methodist Church with Rev. J. E. Tidwell, pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Friona cemetery.

Mr. Parker suffered fatal injuries Saturday afternoon at near 3:00 o'clock while he was operating a power shovel, assisting in lowering a large bulk cement storage tank in the south part of Friona, just across tracks from the depot. Witnesses report the shovel overturned, pinning Parker against a bulldozer. The equipment was the property of Watson Whaley. Men working with Parker had to go about 1 mile to the Whaley Farm to secure jacks to enable removal of Parker, probably leaving him pinned at least 20 minutes. He was pronounced dead immediately upon being examined by the doctor at the local hospital.

Survivors include his wife, three daughters, Janie, Carolyn, and Mrs. Louise Woods, a son, Johnny, one brother, Lee Parker, and his mother.

A son, Arthur Parker, was believed the first Farmer County soldier killed in World War II.

Out-of-town relatives attending the funeral included an uncle, J. W. Parker of Tucuman, two aunts, Mrs. J. E. Williams and Mrs. Ben Bean, both of Rockwall, Texas, and cousins including Jack Parker and son from Colorado Springs, Colo. Mr. and Mrs. Emmett Meredith, Mrs. John Sears and son, and Mr. and Mrs. Bennie Willes, all from Rockwall.

Willis Parker was married to Miss Tommie Berry on August 4, 1930, in Clovis, New Mexico.

In the words of the minister, Willis will be remembered as a man who loved his family and friends. He would seek to do his part in supporting those things that build a community. He was never lazy but rather entered into his labors with a cockless abandon going from early till late, day after day.

### Demonstration On Hog Cholera Cops Award For Local Contestants

"Friona's crack farm skill demonstration team travelled over 700 miles carrying several pigs and a bale of hay to take 1st place in the Chapter Farmer division of the state leadership contest held on the Sam Houston State Teachers College campus" was the way the Houston Chronicle commenced their report on the state FFA contests at Huntsville last week. To gain their state leadership and this lead paragraph in the Houston daily, the Friona boys chalked up an enviable record of not only duplicating their feat of last year, but in winning over Big Spring (placing 2nd), Harlingen, 3rd., and Marshall, 4th., taking top honors in the meet attended by some 800 Texas contestants. None of the other first-place winners were repeaters from last year.

The local boys, under the direction J. T. Gee, had prepared detailed and comprehensive demonstration on "immunization of swine against cholera" last year the group demonstrated treatment of lumpy jaw in a cow.

In the Huntsville demonstration, Keith Brock was in charge, commencing the skill exhibition with introductory statements, after which M. C. Osborn cited the causes of hog cholera. J. Vonne Fuiks listed the symptoms, including post-mortem, and he used the epiglottis, spleen, kidneys, and bladder of a pig, explaining how these organs would be affected in case of cholera.

Ralph Reed explained how and when to use the single serum as he vaccinated a pig. The single serum, anti-hog cholera serum, is used for quick temporary immunity of the pigs, he explained, and is usually given in instance of sudden outbreak of the disease, and to pigs before weaning time, and in some other instances.

Keith Brock then took charge and gave demonstration of the double treatment, vaccinating a pig, using both serum and virus, explaining the process. Jack Redfean explained the use of the Colorado Hog Cholera vaccine and demonstrated. In conclusion Keith Brock summed up the demonstration and turned it to the three judges for questions.

The Friona boys performed before three judges in the preliminaries and three different judges in the finals, giving two separate demonstrations.

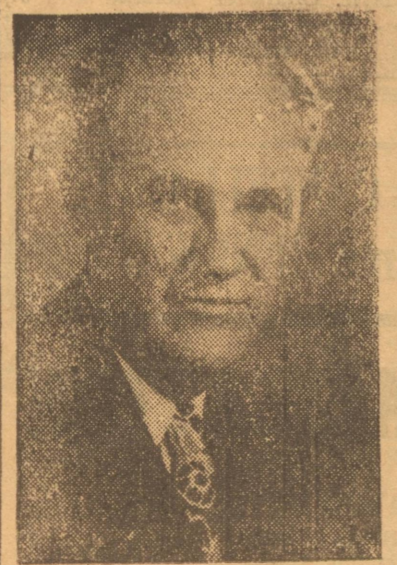

## More Inductions Slated March 29

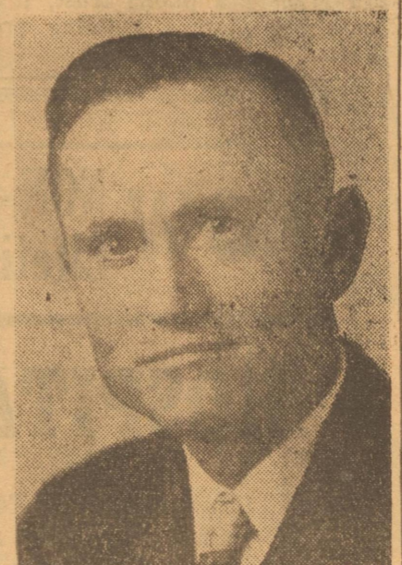

Editor's Note: This week our mind has been full of the rigors of political maneuvers . . . specifically the latest of the silly programs . . . that of the OPS, so-called Office of Price Stabilization. We're just afraid those merchants now feverishly completing their Regulation 7 Forms, under OPS, see no approach to price stabilization in those foolish reports.

Being heartsick over the political and economic trends confronting the average American of today and the children who will take the helm tomorrow, we turned away from the OPS form on our desk and sought to find some relaxation or at least some comfort in other sources; to our relief we found this editorial in a trade publication which we are passing on to you for its refreshing down-to-earth philosophy. We hope it also is soothing to you.

## LISTEN AMERICA . . . .

Take your mind away from the power politics, the race for prestige, the grasp for monetary gain . . .

Turn your ears from the blatant rasp of man's clash with man over minor, internal irritants . . .

Turn your hearts back from vindictive, avacious speed and petty envy . . .

Listen America, to your grassroots again. Think once more of grain growing, men in fellowship and worship, rippling streams and whispering woods . . .

It is such a little thing but there is precious little time. Listen, read and learn, America—before it is too late . . .

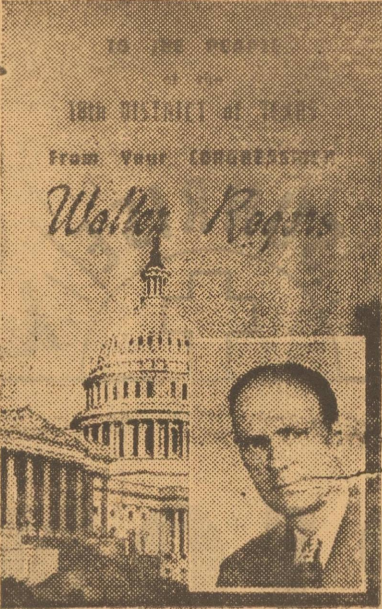
Then, awaken—

## BEHIND THE SCENES ON THE RFC INVESTIGATION

Here is the overall business picture of RFC operations to June 30, 1950: Numbers of loans, 600,000; amount loaned, 21 billion dollars; average loan 35 thousand dollars; net profit after all operating costs, interest and other expenses, 580 million dollars; dividends paid to U.S. Treasury, 325 million dollars; portion of net profits now being used in loan fund, 256 million dollars. The original stock issue, which is all held by the U. S. Treasury was 100 million dollars. This overall picture reflects a loss experience of less than one percent on the total amount loaned. There is a definite move on foot by Eastern capital and an Eastern Republican bloc to abolish the RFC. RFC has made many loans in Texas and the Southwest that have helped in industrializing Texas. Many of these loans could not be handled by banks. Some were handled partially by banks and partially by RFC. If it had not been for the RFC, the money for these industrial projects in our section of the country could not have been obtained. This same situation is true across the entire South. If the RFC is abolished, industrialization of Texas and the South will be seriously damaged. I do not want to see the RFC abolished because it will place our section of the country at the mercy of the big money interests of the East. This will certainly curtail further industrial development. Many people are wondering why the Senate sub-committee has failed to make public letters from Senators and Congressmen in both parties, some of which I hear are most interesting. Any skulduggery, chicanery, immorality or illegality in the operation of this corporation should be fully aired, and the parties responsible or connected with shady transactions should be punished. The same rule is true as to all other government departments, from the national level to the local, whether the offense be immoral or illegal. Immorality in a public function is just as bad as illegality. Immorality is the bud; illegality is the bloom. Violation of a public trust is just as serious, whether it be illegal or merely immoral. If there are not enough jails to hold people who are low enough to violate a public trust, it is time to start a building program.

## PRICE CONTROLS

The price control situation is definitely due for an overhaul and a streamlining. It would be humanly impossible for the Economic Stabilization Agency as now operating to properly examine the forms and figures that businessmen are being called upon to compile and file. I do not want to see any increase in federal employees except in vital defense projects. Businessmen already have enough forms to fill out without being called upon for more . . .

## PEACE CRUSADE

The Capitol was swarming yesterday with self-proclaimed peace crusaders. It was a conglomeration of all races and colors, both men and women. They came in on chartered buses, mostly from New York. There were also rumors of a Communist parade at the same time. It was difficult to tell who was for what when you looked at the entire mixed group, but none of it looked good . . .

Next week I expect to have some information on the number of foreigners coming to Washington seeking employment. All indications are that these applicants are meeting with no success . . .

## REMARKS ON THE FLOOR OF THE HOUSE

Mr. Speaker, I am placing in the record today a House Concurrent Resolution adopted by the Texas Legislature. In effect, says: "Resolved that the Congress of the United States of America and the President be respectfully petitioned and requested to immediately provide an adequate system of defense, including detection devices and aircraft of the latest and most effective type and design to properly guard the State of Texas, particularly the area or belt thereof one hundred miles wide along the coast of the Gulf of Mexico from the Sabine river to the Rio Grande." I call particular attention to the one hundred mile belt referred to because that belt is adjacent to the tidelands that the Federal Government has stolen from the state of Texas and it occurs to me that since the Federal Government has stolen these tidelands from Texas, it should certainly be its obligation to defend them as obligated in this Resolution. And while defenses are being prepared in this respect, I might further suggest that such defenses be set up on behalf of Texas, not only against Alien enemy attacks, but against further encroachments by the Federal Government . . .

# The Law & You

DO YOU KNOW whether you may go onto the land of another to hunt, where there are no "posted" or warning signs?

You do not have the right to set a foot on another man's property for any purpose, except with his consent, either expressed or implied. "Posted" or warning signs do not make the prohibition against trespassing any more binding than it is without the signs, except perhaps the warnings on a game preserve. The signs merely remind you that if you do not have some lawful reason for going on the property of another that you are a trespasser. You would be just as much a trespasser, if there were no signs . . .

By statute it has been made a criminal offense to go upon the lands of another for the purpose of hunting or fishing, without proper authority to do so . . .

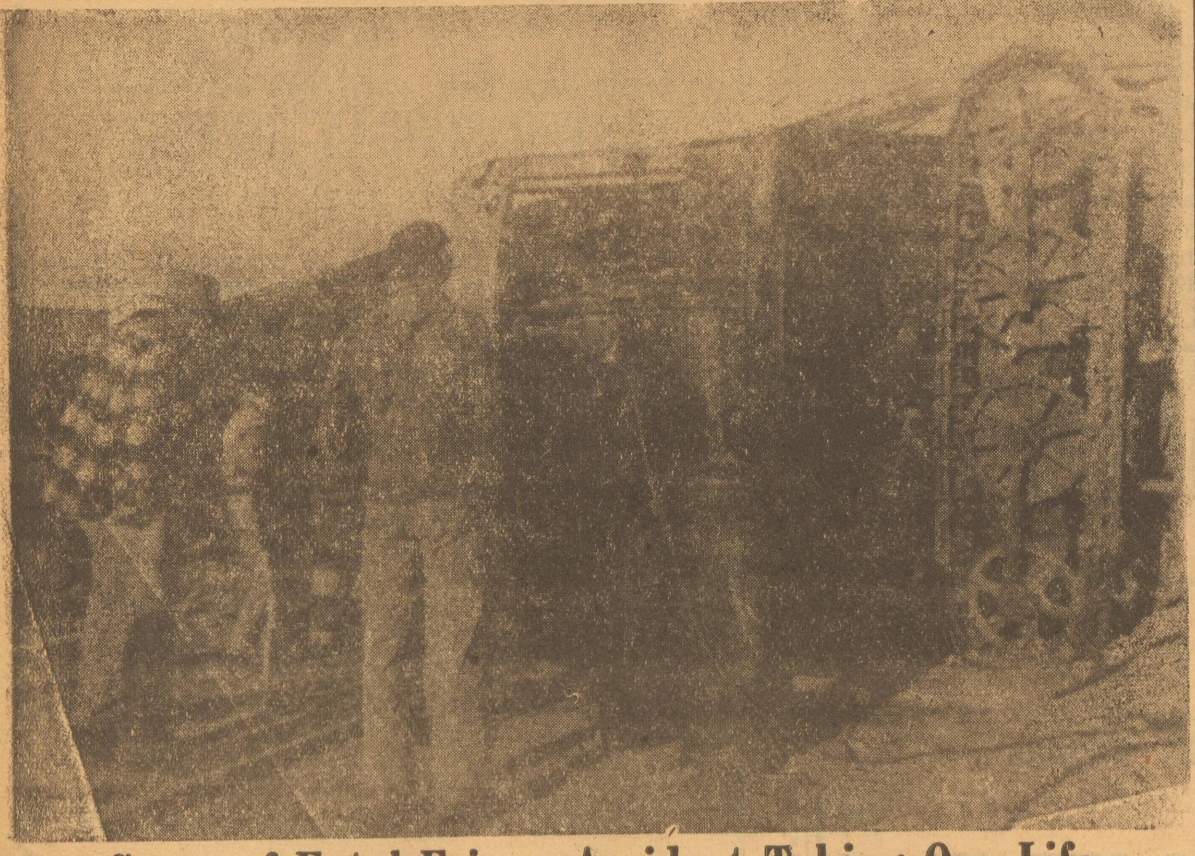

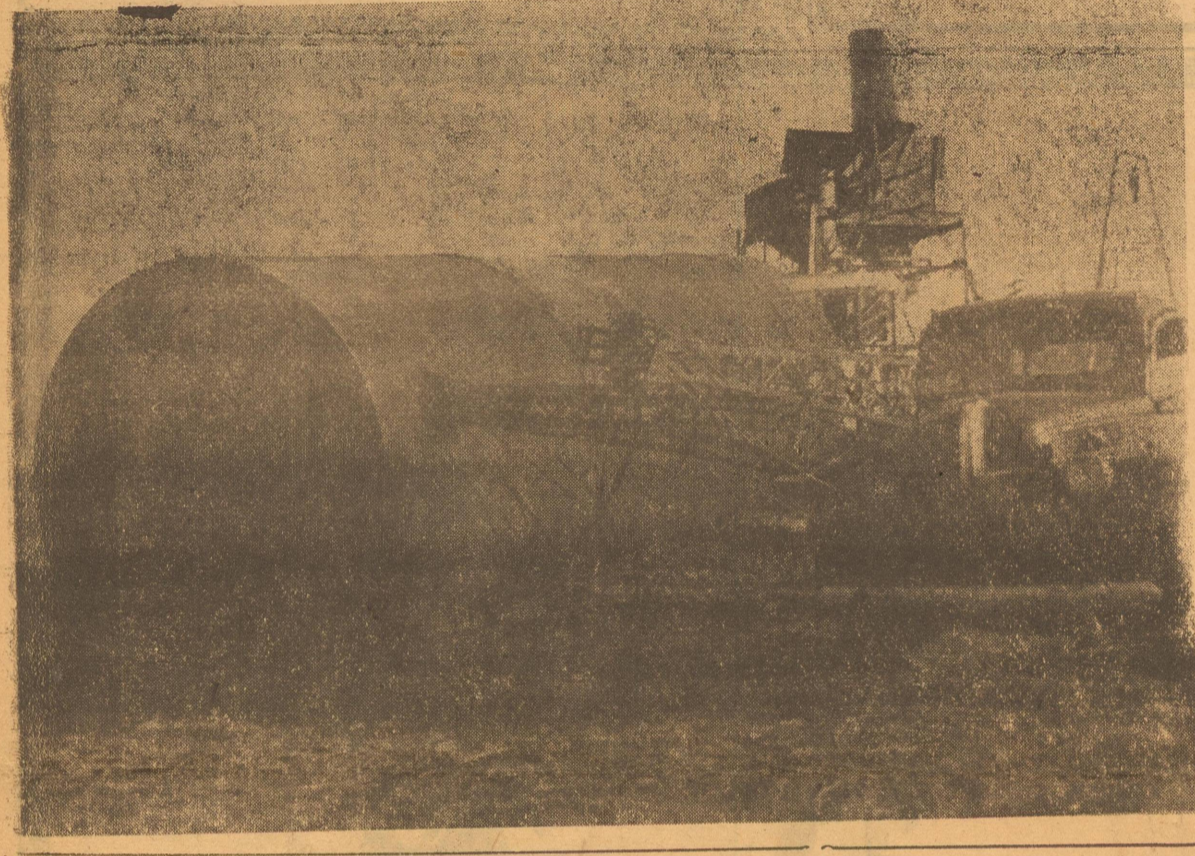

**LAST MINUTE FRUIT CAKE**

(Doesn't have to be stored—eat fresh)

Mrs. Willard H. May

- 1 cup seedless raisins, chopped
- 1-2 cup cooked and stoned prunes
- 1-2 cup chopped dates
- 1-2 lb. pkg. mixed candied fruit
- 1-2 cup chopped walnuts
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 1-4 teaspoon salt
- 1-4 teaspoon baking powder
- 1-2 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1-4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1-2 teaspoon ginger
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1-4 cup orange juice

Sift flour, measure and sift with other dry ingredients except sugar. Sift over combined fruit and nuts. Blend well; cream shortening and gradually cream in sugar, then beat in eggs one at a time. Stir in floured mixture and add orange juice last. Bake in a large greased pan in a slow oven (300°) for 1-2 hours.

Place a pan of water on floor of oven while cooking cake and it will stay moist.

**PUMPKIN PIE**

Mrs. Frank H. Wilson  
Bovina

- 4 eggs
  - 2 cups sugar
  - 2 cups rich milk
  - 2 heaping tablespoons flour
  - 3 cups pumpkin
  - 1-4 teaspoon cinnamon and nutmeg
  - pinch of salt
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Mix all ingredients together and cook in ten inch pie crust.

**SOUTHERN PECAN PIE**

Mrs. A. G. White  
Bovina

- 3 eggs
- 1 cup granulated or brown sugar
- 1 cup light corn syrup
- 1 cup pecan halves
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Beat eggs and sugar until thick add corn syrup, nuts and vanilla pour into 9 inch pastry-lined pan. Nuts may be sprinkled over filling after pouring in crust, if desired. Bake in slow oven (200 degrees) 1 hour. Serves six.

**DIVINITY FUDGE**

Mrs. K. E. Deaton

- 3 cups sugar
  - 1-2 cup white Karo syrup
  - 1-2 cup water
  - 2 egg whites
  - 1-2 cup nut meats
- Cook sugar, syrup and water until small amount of mixture forms a soft ball when dropped in cold water. Pour mixture slowly into the beaten egg whites, beating all the while. Add the nut meats and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Continue beating until it begins to harden. Then pour onto buttered pan, and cut in squares.

**BARBECUED SPARERIBS**

Mrs. Pat Sissell

3 or 4 pounds meaty spareribs to serve six. Use kitchen scissors or sharp knife to cut meat in serving pieces for easy eating. Two ribs to each piece is a handy size. Turn the oven on now set at 450 degrees.

On each piece place a thin slice of onion and a slice of unpeeled lemon. Anchor with a toothpick. Place in shallow roasting pan, meaty side up. Roast the ribs in hot oven (450 degrees) 30 minutes, while you make the barbecue sauce.

Sauce is simple; 1 cup catsup, 1-3 cup worcestershire sauce, 1 teaspoon each chili powder and salt, 2 dashes Tabasco sauce, 2 cups water, heat to boiling. Pour over ribs. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) until tender about 1 hour. Baste every 15 minutes. Remove the toothpicks.

**SMOTHERED STEAK**

Beat 1 inch thick steak good, salt and roll in flour. Place in hot skillet in which some suet has been added. Brown on both sides, pour 1 cup hot water in skillet and continue cooking for a few minutes, serve while hot.

**DATE LOAF CANDY**

- 2 cups sugar
  - 1 cup rich milk
  - 1 pkg. dates (cut fine)
  - 1-2 cup candied cherries (chopped)
  - 1 cup nuts (chopped)
  - 2 tablespoons Karo Syrup
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Boil sugar, milk, Karo and cook until forms a soft ball in cold water.

Remove from fire and add dates and stir until melted then add cherries, nuts and vanilla. Beat until thick and pour in bowl, or wet cloth, form into roll and chill until firm.

**SPICED TEA**

- 2 quarts water
  - 3 cups sugar
  - 1-2 cup red-hots
  - 1 tablespoon whole cloves
  - 1 dozen lemons
- Boil water, sugar, red hots and cloves together until red hots are dissolved and mixture comes to rolling boil; remove and add juice of the lemons, then add 2 quarts of prepared tea. Strain mixture. Serves about 25 people.

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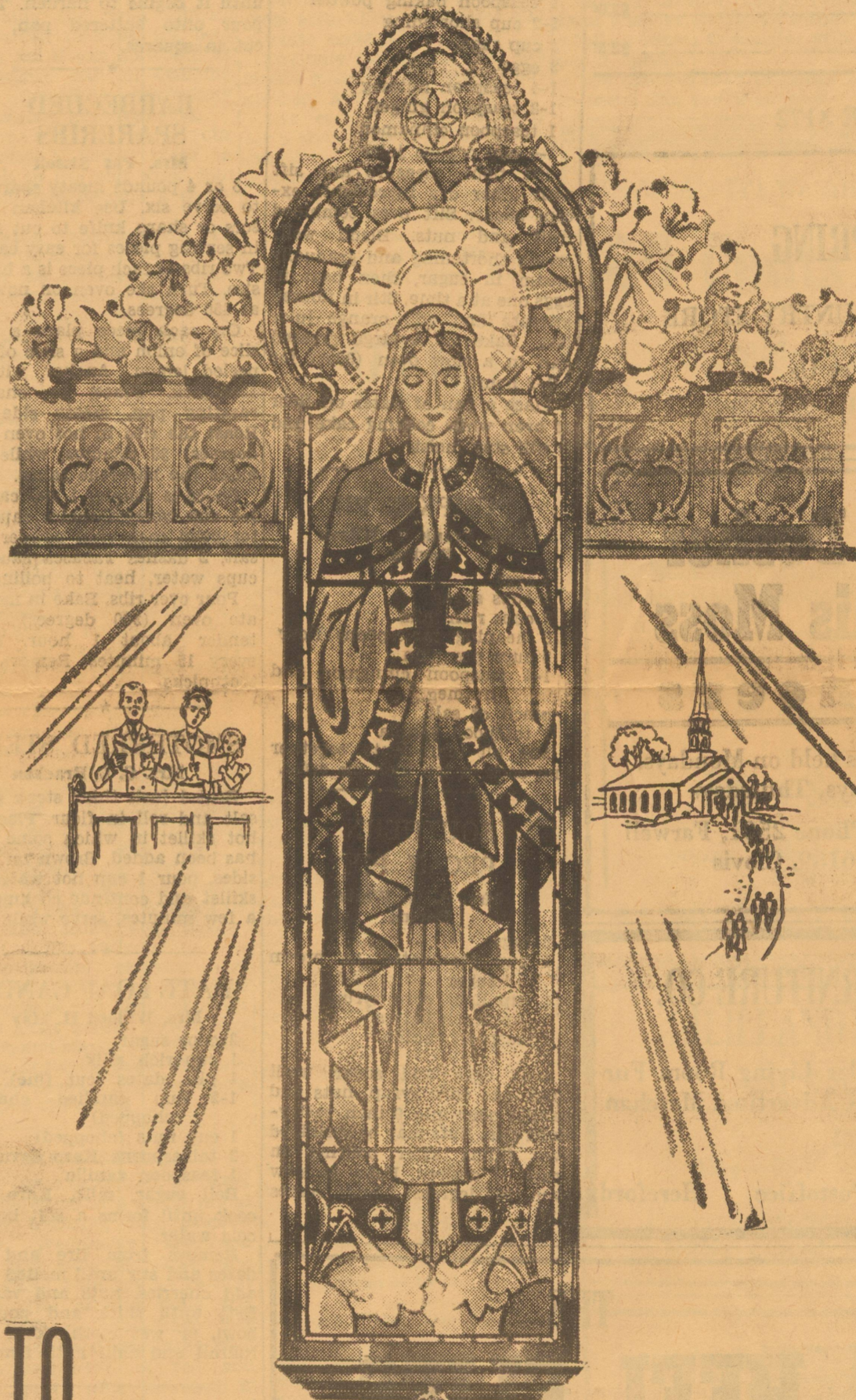

Southwestern farm cooperatives will observe the period March 18-24 as "Farm Cooperative Week." Appropriate observances are planned by farm groups throughout the Southwestern territory.

A general meeting is planned at Dallas March 19-20, to be attended by more than 8,000 farmers representing 450 farm cooperatives in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Colorado, Louisiana and Mississippi. This is the annual meeting of their farm cooperative organization.

Texas is proud of its agricultural heritage and of the men and women who carry it on today. This will be a significant occasion for them and, by the same token, for the State of Texas.

Texas will be happy to greet the delegates from other States and extend to them a traditionally hearty Texas welcome.

THEREFORE, in recognition of this important occasion and as a formal greeting from the Executive Department, I hereby designate the week of March 18-24 as

**TEXAS FARM COOPERATIVE WEEK**

and direct the attention of all State and Federal agencies to the important role of farmers and farm cooperatives in the economic life of this State.

Sanitation, Management Emphasized  
For Control Swine Enteritis Disease

Specific Preventatives  
Told by County Agent

Losses from swine enteritis can be most effectively guarded against by using good sanitation and management practices, says Joe Jones, County Agent.

Jones recommends isolating newly-purchased swine from the home herd for at least three weeks — until they are known to be free of disease.

He advises swine away from old hog lots, contaminated pastures, stagnant pools and other sources of infection.

Swine that are suffering from internal or external parasites, or from vitamin deficiency, may be more severely affected by enteritis than healthier animals. Jones points out that it is best to supply adequate rations to avoid lowering the hog's resistance to disease.

By earmarking their sows, farmers can identify and weed out the sow "carriers" of enteritis from their herds.

Jones advises farmers to watch their hogs closely for failure to convert feed into gains. At the first sign of trouble isolate the ailing hogs from the apparently healthy ones and get a veterinarian to diagnose the disease.

Enteritis symptoms are similar to those of other swine diseases. If swine suffering from enteritis are treated or vaccinated for other diseases, the result may be disastrous.

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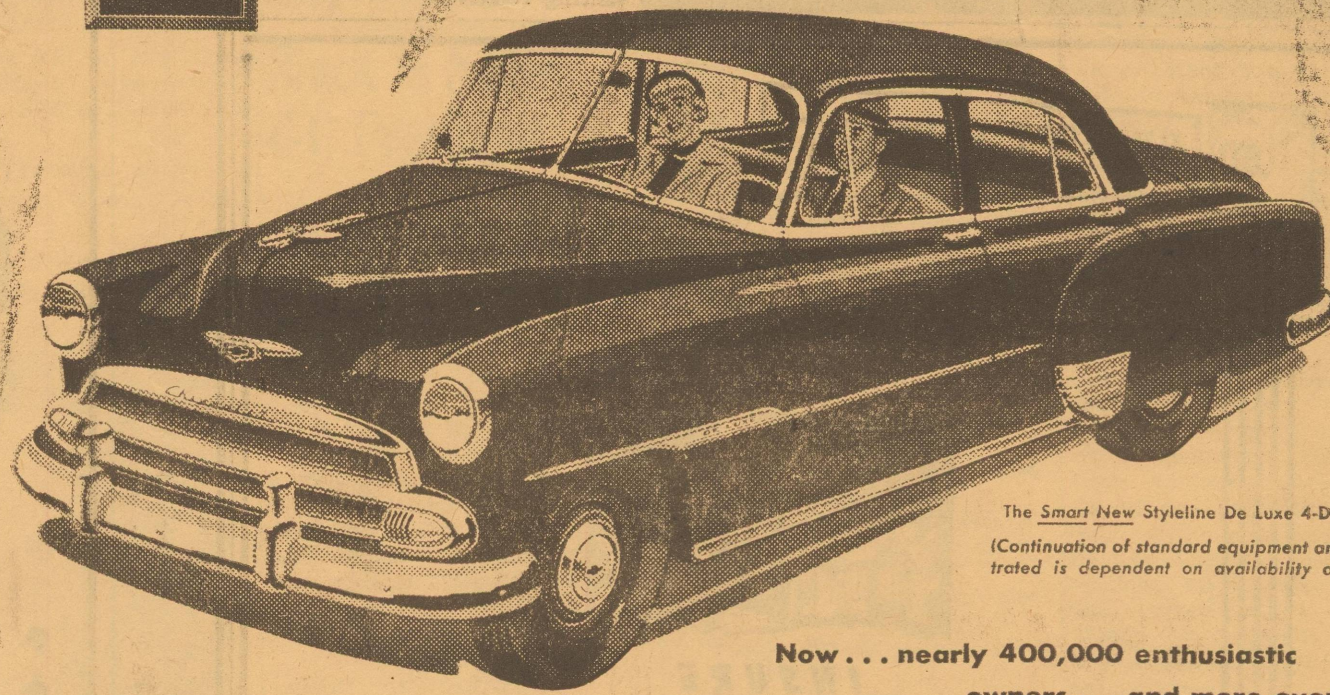

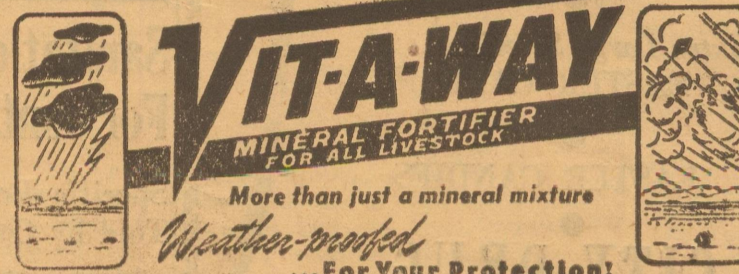

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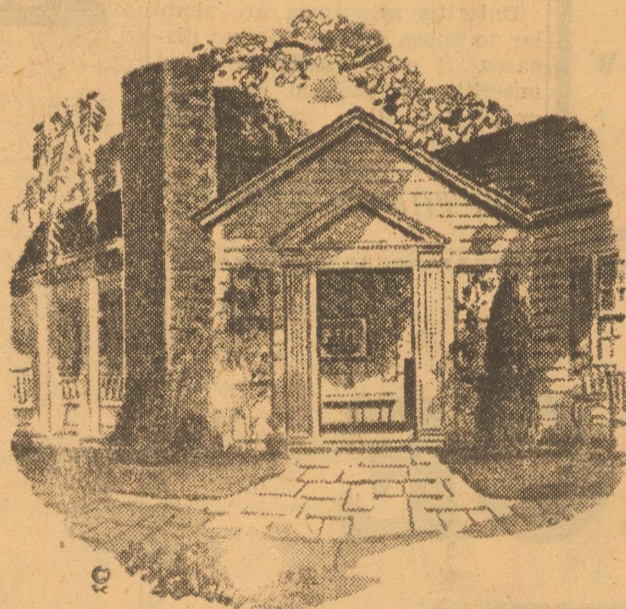
