Bricks falling from Permian Building bring area to standstill

Much of the area surrounding the Permian Building, once a thriving office complex in Big Spring's downtown area, was roped off by police Tuesday afternoon after hundreds of bricks on the building's east wall fell off the building.

Tuesday's incident is the second such occurrence in the last two months. In March, part of the West Texas Fire Extinguisher Company col-

City officials do not know the cause of the partial collapse, but immediately went to work to secure the area.

"The thing that's scary is that the wall didn't have any ties for the bricks to attach to," City Manager Gary Fuqua said. "Usually there will be ties on a wall like this."

Part of the remaining wall had a large section of bricks that seemed to just be hanging without any support.

Fuqua said a crane from Jack Cathey Construction Co. was brought in to flake some of the remaining bricks on off the wall so there would no danger of anyone being hit by falling

One of the more immediate concerns was that the wall is only a few feet from a TU Electric power line — a line that services several small businesses in the area such as Specs & Co. and Tatum Jewelry.

Power to those businesses and several traffic

signals in the area, including those at the intersections of Third and Scurry, Third and Gregg and Second and Main were interrupted until about 11:30 p.m., according to TU Electric District Manager John Toone.

"Because downtown is serviced by an old network system that feeds from all directions, most businesses in the area didn't have their power interrupted," Toone said.

According to Fuqua, the state will have to be notified about the incident because the power having to be shut off for the crane to work, affected the traffic signals on Third Street, which is also old state Highway 80.

"It didn't appear that the foundation of the Permian Building was affected," Fuqua said. "It seems that just the skin of the building was


The primary concern is public safety at this point, according to Fuqua.

"We'll probably have the area blocked off for a few days to make sure debris is cleared and everything is secure." Fugua said immediately after the incident. "We'll also bring in an engineer to do an assessment to see if we need to bring the rest of the east face of the building down."

City crews worked most of the afternoon Tuesday and part of the evening to remove the bricks and were able to restore the normal traffic flow to the downtown area.

Al Moore, owner of the building, said he was shocked when he heard about what was happen-

Trustee races draw almost 900 early votes

Tuesday's 5 p.m. deadline for residents who wanted to cast early ballots for Saturday's city council and school board elec tions has come and gone, and all that remains for candidates is two days to convince undecided voters that they deserve their vote.

As of 10 a.m. today, city officials were still tabulating the early votes in the three council races, which includes races in District 2, District 4 and District 6.

According to Howard County Clerk Margaret Ray, a total of 896 early ballots were cast in

VFD, commissioners talks come to a head

A series of meetings in the past several months between **Howard** County commissioners and the Howard County Volunteer Fire Department (VFD) came to a head at Monday's commissioners' meeting, with the VFD being instructed to give up rescue work

"We have come to the conclusion, based on several factors, that we don't feel the county should support or be involved with the first responder system at this time." Commissioner Bill Crooker said.

Crooker cited the county's ambulance contract with the city as the court's reasoning.

"The city has excellent access to areas outside of the city, and we will not be exposed to further liability," Crooker said.

One of the issues that commissioners and the VFD settled at their last meeting was that of timely maintenance on VFD vehicles In order to avoid having all

seven VFD vehicles at the county barn for repairs at the same time, as was the case a few weeks ago, a new maintenance form was developed and is now being carried in all VFD vehi-

Vehicle maintenance is one of the few items that both groups agreed on Monday.

"I'm ready to throw my hands up," Sullivan said. "I'm tired of fighting. We want to solve this." Sullivan also questioned why Crooker and Commissioner Sonny Choate went to the Big

Commerce, opened with a patri otic prologue, moved into "Meet Mr. Cooper & Sons before taking the audience through Duke Ellington's "Sound of Love."


Then, as band director CWO Freddie Vinson, Jr. explained, the band paid tribute to Woodie Herman with "Woodchoppers'



"I'll contradict that statement," Sullivan said. "I've been to those calls in the county."

Sullivan was backed at Monday's meeting by more than a dozen members of the VFD.

One member addressed commissioners about the impor tance of the first responder system, saying it only takes four to six minutes for brain death to begin in a cardiac arrest situation; six to eight minutes for brain damage to set in and in about 10 minutes death can

Crooker, sticking to his guns, said he will have to see documentation of the calls the VFD makes in order to make a decision on the VFD acting as a first responder.

Sullivan, still concerned about the change in dispatching protocol, asked Crooker why that decision was made without documentation

Official says new dam would not harm Valley cities

LAREDO - A new dam on the Rio Grande in Webb County will not hurt Zapata or cities in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. according to Webb County Judge Mercurio Martinez.

Martinez said Tuesday the proposed dam will be located in the 100-year Flood Plain area of the Rio Grande between Bridge Land Colombia Bridge and would not impede the flow of water to communities between Laredo and the Gulf of Mexico.

Zapata residents are concerned about the potential effect of the proposed hydroelectric dam on their community.

"It is not close to the Amistad or Falcon (reservoirs)," Martinez

Career criminal executed for double killing

HUNTSVILLE - Ernest Baldreg's long life of crime, which grew from burglary and drug possession to forgery and then murder, finally ended in the Texas death chamber

Baldree, 55, quietly was executed Tuesday evening for killing a Navarro County couple nearly 11 years ago.

Strapped to the death chamber gurney, he made no final state ment, responding only with a "No sir" when asked by Morris Jones, the prison warden, if he had anything to say before the lethal injection started. Then he closed his eyes, gasped a couple of times and stopped breathing.

He was pronounced dead at 6:25 p.m. CDT, seven minutes after the lethal dose began.

Morales says settlement with tobacco industry closer

AUSTIN - Texas Attorney General Dan Morales, skeptical of any possible settlements with the tobacco industry in the past, says he now believes a settlement is very possible.

Texas is one of 24 states suing the industry, seeking to recover money spent on health care for tobacco-related illnesses. Morales said Tuesday the number of states suing would likely "grow into the 30s."

Morales said he believes that tobacco companies genuinely are interested in settling the case. In the past, tobacco companies would engage in settlement talks and then deny that they were

doing so, Morales said. "I have been skeptical in the past, but I have changed my mind about that," Morales said. "I believe now that there is a very real prospect for settlement.

"I think they (tobacco companies) perceive that they have few options left, that the alternative to a settlement would be far worse to them," Morales said.





Army sends no-tolerance message with court martial's verdict

ABERDEEN PROVING GROUND, Md. (AP) — After a landmark verdict against a former Army drill sergeant charged with raping his trainees, women's advocates called for a review of how the military responds to sexual harassment claims.

Staff Sgt. Delmar Simpson, 32, was convicted Tuesday of raping six female trainees a total of 18 times in the most serious case yet to come out of the sex scandal that has shaken the Army and prompted investigations at installations worldwide. He could be sentenced to life in prison after a sentencing hearing on Monday.

impassively as the verdict was read. His wife, who is stationed at an Army post in Virginia, held his hand as they left the courtroom. The verdict will be reviewed by Army judges and could be appealed by Simpson.

Despite testimony from some trainees that the women accusing Simpson were liars and willing participants in consensual sex, military jurors sent a strong signal that sexual relations between Army superiors and their underlings will be punished.

"People who wear our nation's uniform have a responsibility to abide by

Critics say the Aberdeen Training Ground case is a brutal, frightening example of why things need to change. "Sexual misconduct and harassment

activity to see that women who join are protected from that kind of abuse of power," said Karen Johnson, a retired Air Force lieutenant colonel and vice president of the National Organization for Women.

Testimony in Simpson's case revealed that he and other drill sergeants routinely had sex with trainees without the knowledge of their company commander.

"This was a situation that would appear at some level was tolerated," said Susan Barnes, a Denver lawyer and former judge who heads Women criminal investigations.

DENVER (AP) — Lori Fortier once told the FBI she knew nothing about the Oklahoma City bombing. Now she says she knew a lot, including how Timothy McVeigh used soup cans to show how he would avenge the government raid on the Branch Davidians.

"He placed the soup cans on the floor in the same arrangement he was going to arrange the barrels in the truck," Mrs. Fortier testified Tuesday at the trial of her former friend.

He planned to put barrels full of explosives in a truck and arrange them in a triangle for maximum force, she said. He flipped through her dictionary looking for the chemicals he needed, and wanted to use her phone to call a company that sold them, she said.

Defense lawyers claim Mrs. Fortier, the wife of an old Army buddy of McVeigh, is lying to protect her family. She was expected to be cross-examined today by McVeigh's lawyers.



also released a report critical of Mexico, citing instances of torture and a lack of punishment for perpetrators. But the Foreign Ministry statement mentioned only the Human Rights Watch report, calling it "slanted and unobjective," and saying the timing of its release showed "dubious inten-

The ministry statement conceded that rights abuses had occurred, but said they had either been investigated or resolved by Mexican government

> The report called on Clinton to stress the importance of "strengthening the rule of law in the country and the need to end impunity for political violence."

But during a news conference in Atlanta on Tuesday, Zedillo said his government "would roundly reject any attempt ... to dictate ultimatums" to Mexico.

The Mexican government bristled earlier this year when its anti-drug efforts were the subject of a U.S. congressional debate, and when the United States implemented a tough new immigration law April 1.







Women's Care Update

By Michael S. Phillips, M.D. Diplomate, American Board Obstetrics & Gynecology EPIDURAL UPDATE

The traditional epidural provides pain relief to women in the throes of labor with an injection of analgesic into the outer layer of their spinal columns. Painkillers administered in this fashion take about 20 minutes to work and, because they affect the motor and sensory nerves, leave women confined to their hospital beds. There is also the combined spinal-epidural (CSE), nicknamed the "walking epidural". A CSE is administered deeper into the spinal column to provide relief within 2 minutes Because it does not block motor nerves, it enables mother-to-be to walk around during the early stages of labor. These advantages over the traditional epidural provide a more positive experience during labor and delivery.

Some women, who have never given birth, assume labor is like what they see on TV; the mother experiences her first contraction, lies contorted and shricking in pain, and is quickly rushed to the hospital to deliver. That is dramatic license! Most women are comfortable during the early stages of labor, and choose (after appropriate medical consultation) to stay at home. With the many options now available for mitigating pain, most patients who wish relief may keep pain to a minimum even in the late stages of labor an through delivery!
