Do you think greater diversification of farm crops would be beneficial to Farmer County? Why?

Wesley Foster: Definitely, diversification would lead to more laborers in the community, and I think we would be more sure of making some kind of crop and not have a total loss.

Harold Lillard: I believe it would. I think one crop is good when it makes. But if you had a failure in a variety of crops it wouldn't hurt as much to have the loss spread out over a period.

Arthur Drake: I think it would be beneficial, in any county. The same crop every year the ground runs out of the mineral that produces that particular crop. Whereas if the crops were rotated the ground would supply its own mineral.

H. C. Wells: Yes I do. It changes the land, it won't blow so bad and when put in row crop you have the stalks there to hold the ground, then if you want wheat the stalks give something to keep it from blowing. A variety of crops keeps the minerals that are needed in the land and it does not use all one mineral.

Jack Knox: Certainly. It is a benefit to any place. The more crops produced the more laborers that will be needed.

# U.S.D.A. PLANS UNIFICATION!

Plans for the merger of housing and many functional activities of the PMA (Production and Marketing Administration), SCS (Soil Conservation Service), and the state agricultural agencies (county agent's offices) has been the topic of several meetings this week, both in Friona and Parmer County and one of area-wide scope at Amarillo yesterday, and others on higher levels.

Imminent consolidation of all county offices of the U.S. Department of Agriculture dealing with conservation was announced recently by Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan; and it is highly likely that local application of this directive will be the first time farmers of this area had any direct contact and benefits from the "Hoover Commission" economy objectives.

Physical consolidation of the PMA and SCS offices within each county is expected to take place at an early date, with county agents in most cases joining in the program. Primary factors as to location and housing are stated to be (a) accessibility of the site to farmers and the public to be served by all agencies involved; (b) adequate and suitable space; (c) efficient arrangement and lighting facilities; and (d) cost.

## Mystery Surrounds Hack Hutton Death

Funeral services for Haskel (Hack) Hutton were held in the Friona Methodist Church this afternoon, with Rev. J. E. Tidwell officiating.

Mr. Hutton, brother of Mrs. Clyde London of Friona, was found dead Monday on a farm located near Mangum, Oklahoma. Morticians said the youth, 39 years old, had been dead at least 30 days.

Clarence Seat, tenant on the Revis Ponder farm where the body was found, went to the pump house about half a mile east of the farm home about 7:30 a.m. Monday morning; the pump house door was closed, but he opened it "for some reason" and made the discovery of the body.

The young man's head was propped against the corner of the pump house, and nearby lay a Stetson hat and a pair of crutches. Investigators reported the man's right leg was in a full-length plaster of paris cast.

It was learned today that investigating officers are studying evidence of likely foul play and murder in Hutton's death.

The Greer County sheriff and other officers investigated immediately and reported that although the body was decomposed, they could find no evidence of physical violence. Observers noted a small aperture under his left ear, but this was attributed by the morticians to the decomposition of the body.

Three pieces of paper and 14 cents cash were found on the body. One paper was a receipt for a Pullman ticket issued by the Santa Fe railroad. Evidence and notes on the other paper showed Hutton had left Los Angeles, Calif., for Mangum last November 28.

Hutton served in World War II, and was in the Battle of the Bulge.

Mr. and Mrs. Clyde London and Dave Mosley left Monday to make identification, which was effected by dental work and hair.

Hutton was a 1930 graduate of Friona High School, having moved here with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Winton, in 1932.

Pallbearers were Raymond Euler, Sam Williams, Arthur Drake, Ear Drake, Raymond Adams, and Glenn Taylor. Interment was in the Friona Cemetery.

# Editorial . . . .

## Are Not Conditions Ripe for A Greater Diversification Of Crops and Farming Operations On the Local Farm Scene?

Could it be that extensive diversification of farm crops is long overdue in Parmer County?

To this observer, the apparent answer is "Yes", diversification must be seriously considered in 1951 and future years.

The immediate cause of our inference is the high probability of loss of another wheat crop. But supporting reasons go back much farther than this year's wheat outlook or even that of last year. As early as 1935, soil in this area was being drained of vital minerals because of inadvertent exploitation of the soil by excessive wheat cropping and short-sighted farming methods. This situation was alleviated for over a decade by the advent of soil conservation practices as initiated and promoted by the government during those years. Then during the years 1941-1949 favorable weather conditions coupled with a souped-up market kept the local farmer and his operations aloft economically.

But what next?

We do not intend to cry "wolf, wolf", but we do see the benefits, economic and agricultural, of a diversified farming program in Parmer County. We have the water, the rich soil has never been denied, and present demand of a wide variety of soil-produced staples are in demand, some even supported by subsidies and support prices by the federal government.

Cotton evidently will be a major crop in 1951, contrary to previous years. We think this a good step; but why not go farther and plant acreages of other crops, some which might prove a worthy ally of the accepted wheat and cotton crops here.

Even the castor bean possibilities fascinate us. Very appealing are their immediate two-fold benefits: freedom from all insects whatsoever, and their demand and attractive support price. With ever-present demand of their oil for braking fluids and related uses in hydraulics, the government especially is in need of them for an apparent several years in their armament program; so much so that a price has been pegged. And boy, oh boy, just think about the freedom from insects—what a strike for liberty against Mr. Greenbug, etc.!

Why not at least experiment on a wider field than previously? Remember when declarations were popular that plains land was only fit

for range use? Could not our long dependence on wheat, cotton, and grains sorghums alone prove similar folly? Evidently we are in a transition period, agriculturally, in this area. This has been graphically illustrated in Deaf Smith County to our north and east. And again, there must be some reason for so many of our "old timers" in the wheat and cattle business seeking other locations. Sure, you have friends who have recently moved westward or to the Dakotas to carry on their ranching and wheat interests. There. Times already are changing on the Parmer County agriculture scene. Let's see to it that the change is for our economic advantage, our sound practice of conservation, and a greater Friona and Parmer County.

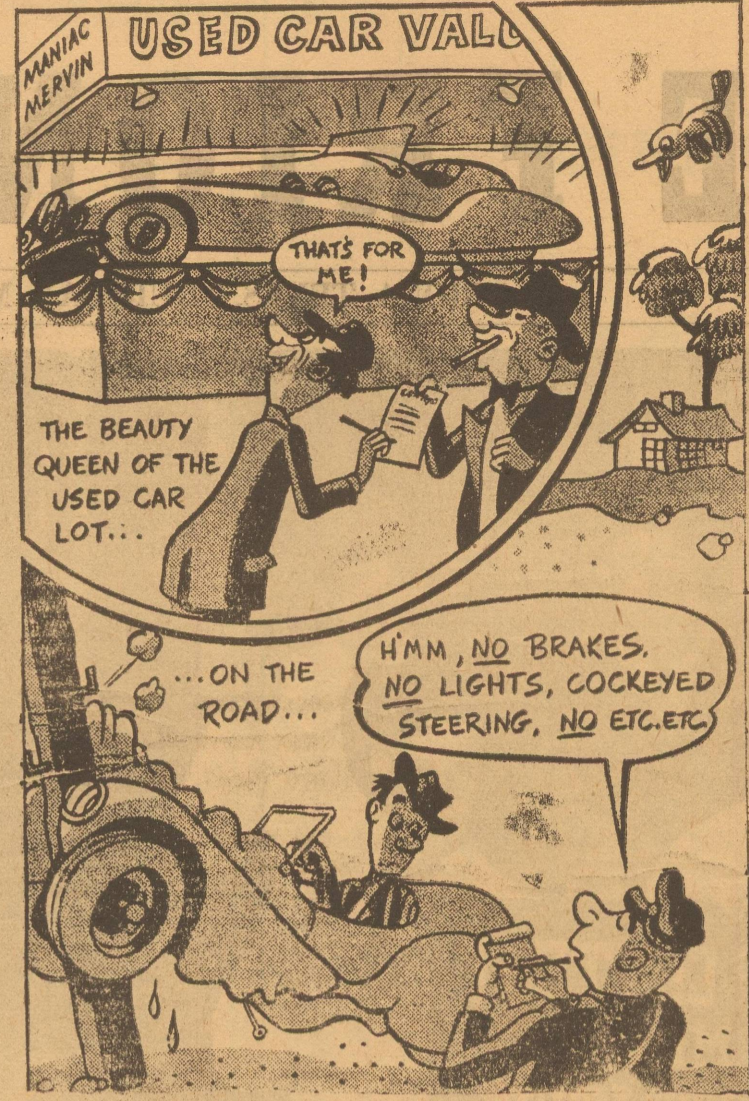

## "Miracle at Carville" by Betty Martin, Is Story of Courage of a Brave Girl

"Miracle at Carville" by Betty Martin is a story of heart break and high courage. Betty writes under a pseudonym as one can easily understand after reading her story, which is one of triumph over despair and fear that only those who have had the dread disease of leprosy could possibly understand.

At the age of 19 without any warning or preparation for anything so appalling she learns from her family doctor she has the disease. She is young, beautiful and until now had many advantages and wholesome protection of a good home and was engaged to be married to a fine man.

Robert, her fiance was the one chosen to tell her the doctor's final decision and he vowed to wait for her return from Carville, the famous hospital below Baton Rouge, where they planned for her stay and hoped for a speedy cure.

All plans were made hurriedly and in secret and Betty wanted to get away from her family and friends before she endangered them. At that time, in 1928, Betty had never heard of Carville but through the years it has become famous for what is being accomplished there. And in her book she hopes and believes she will carry its fame still further and in so doing give hope to many suffering from the disease and to encourage those who may develop it.

Her years, and it did take years there, never left a place in her mind and heart, the discouragement that came to her time and time again when her tests would prove negative for months then suddenly become

positive again were setbacks and sorrows never to be forgotten.

In time her fiance gives up hope and marries some one else and in time too, she falls in love with a patient at Carville then she has not only her own case to watch but his also. In a way this was an advantage as it took her mind off herself but it was bad when his tests would be adverse after good ones preceding them and he had to begin anew too. The tests had to be positive for a year and if at any time they turned negative, one had to begin all over again.

Betty's work and companions at Carville made up a world apart from the one on the outside. She and Harry made a break once and got away for a while but the disease became so bad they were forced to return and there they stayed until completely cured.

Before she was released as cured February 3, 1947 she spent 20 years fighting the disease, which when cured left not a scar nor mark on her face or body.

"Still the mark of more than lifetime of suffering was there, not always my own, but somehow no less acute because it belonged to others. I had lived through many lifetimes at Carville. I had seen lives break and end, not always by death. How much of that tragedy and loss of human pride might have been saved if the sulfones had been found before!" she writes.

Their return to the world and their readjusting is an interesting climax to the story of a brave girl and the man she married, who was loyal to her all the years.

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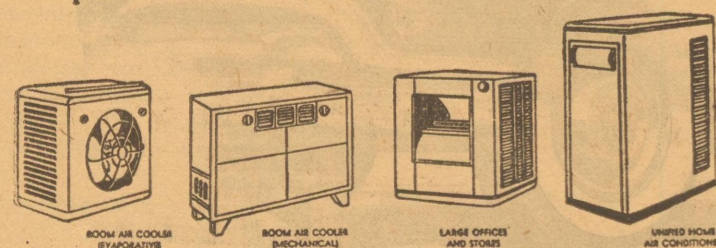

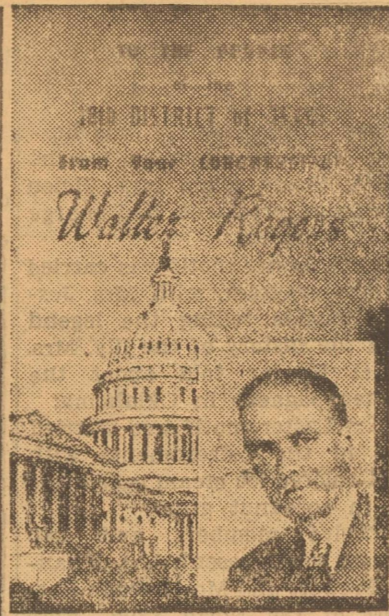

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**GOVERNMENT ECONOMY**

The uprising in the House of Representatives this past week is a mere mild reminder of what is to come. The Appropriations Committee and sub-committees are working day and night to cut every possible dollar off of the non-defense appropriations enough and pared them further. Congressman Gene Cox of Georgia told the House that this action was notice to the bureaucrats that the "honeymoon" was over. To fully appreciate what these cuts mean, we must understand that they were reductions in the appropriations for basic departments of the government—Treasury, Post Office, and so forth. This action of cutting these basic departments is a good indication that the many departments is a good indication that the many departments that have been established in the last few years can get ready for a good trimming when the appropriations bills get to the floor. One of the sub-committees is doing an excellent job of cutting down the expenses of the military, and I can assure you that the military is not going to get all they are asking for. They had better get their shop in order to see that every dollar spent shows a full dollar's return. This is not a temporary situation. It is a definite recognition of the need for reduced Government expenditures on a permanent basis. The moving force is the solid bloc of Southern and Southwestern Jeffersonian Democrats. Our weight is beginning to be felt. We are getting up a full head of steam and you can expect some drastic results.

**DEFENSE CONTRACT DISCREPANCIES**

The Congress is already uncovering some bad, if not dishonest, practices in carrying out construction work under defense contracts. There could be a repetition of many things that happened during World War II. For example on a New York project, it was discovered that one man on the payroll was shown to have ten hours a day straight for 4 days, 23 and a half each day for the next three days, and ten hours a day for the following days. The 23 and a half hour days are time and a half and double-time days. Anyone knows that it would be physically impossible for a human being to do this, and this Congress is going to stop that sort of dishonesty, regardless of whose head has to fall. This is just one example and there are a number of others. This sordid type of Treasury robbing is being fully investigated and will be fully aired.

**SENATE CRIME INVESTIGATING COMMITTEE**

Lots of publicity—no prosecutions. It is reliably rumored that some of those on the Government payroll who are conducting and helping conduct these investigations are planning on using the material gathered to write a book. This material has all been gathered at a tremendous expense to the taxpayers and if it is used by any of these Government people for personal gain purposes, the profits should all go to the Government to help repay the taxpayers for the expense for private gain by the investigators, those investigators should be investigated.

**CEILING PRICES**

The city-born and bred officials of the OPS appear dead set on fixing controls on raw cotton and livestock on the hoof. They carry out these threats, they are going to find that such procedure will amount to production control, rather than price control. What this country needs is a few good sound level-headed farmers and ranchers in some of those official positions.

**FARM NEWS**

**FROM THE SOIL CONSERVATION OFFICE CLOVER SEEDS**

Rosco Ivy, 4 1-2 miles north east of Friona seeded 12 acres of Hubam clover during the second week of March. He used the district grass seeder and put in about 9 lb. per acre. The drill sprickets were set on 6 and 12 and the plates in the small boxes were set on 5. Ivy intends to water about every week until the clover gets up. Hubam is an annual white blooming sweet clover that makes a growth for green manure. It is deep rooted and produces a good seed crop.

**RECALLS FIRE DAMAGE**

Press Abbott, who lives in Bovina, was at one time an XIT cowboy and he has lots of interesting stories about this part of the country. He was interviewed for the purpose of gaining more knowledge on the range, wildlife and land conditions in Parmer Co. before 1900.

In 1894 a great prairie fire swept across the plains. Press Abbott said that the fire started somewhere around Carlsbad, N. M. and for a week before the flames is far as Bovina, they observed a red glow in the West. They thought it was the moon setting. The fire continued on through the country and did not stop until it hit the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad near Amarillo.

This story is significant to Conservationists because of its after effects. Millions of dollars worth of forage was lost. Soil humus was decreased and weeds which had never been heard of before took root. When asked about old trails which one may observe around Bovina. Mr. Abbott said that their beginning may be traced back to the cattle drives. When snow was on the ground cattle would habitually walk in the same trail and continue to do so, even after the snow melted.

A crew of eleven men would drive the cattle from many different ranch headquarters to Bovina for shipment. Eight cowboys, a wrangler and a boss made up each crew. The wind blew the dust from the beaten out trails made by the hoofs of countless cattle and the wheels of wagons.

Mr. Abbott spoke of wild life. There was an abundance of antelope and quite a few prairie chickens. He said that the last buffalo was killed just after he got here. Passenger pigeons, a fowl now extinct, were not abundant here but passed over en route to the East.

How many antelope and prairie chickens can be seen around the country today? Mr. Abbott says we have no more rangeland. The few pastures which are left and plowed with broom weeds, loco weeds and yusca. Gullies may be seen leading down to lake beds. Fence bed accumulations may be seen almost anywhere.

**ON CONSERVATION**

According to Rozer Peterson, an orthologist, the passenger pigeon, were at one time the most numerous birds in the world. They out-numbered all other birds in the U.S. combined. It was estimated that there were 5 billion passenger pigeons in the states of Kentucky, Ohio and Indiana alone. The great columns of flight blotted out the sun and took as much as three days to pass. Trees broke down by their weight. Thousands of armed men slaughtered day and night and tons were shipped to cities where the delicious meat rotted on the streets. The remaining flocks dwindled. The last passenger pigeon in the world died in the Cincinnati Zoo in 1914. "Should man dwell upon this planet for millions of years, he would never behold another passenger pigeon." This story of destruction has been the same for generations. In a new country the grass goes first, then the wild life, then soil fertility and finally the soil itself.

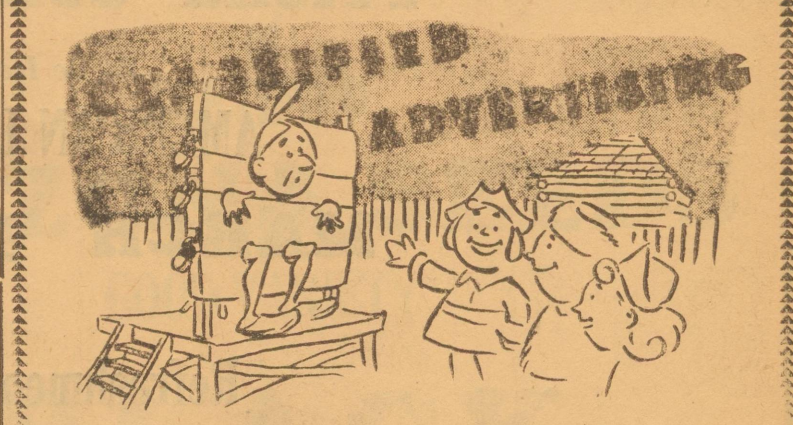

## State Agriculture Commissioner Eyes Poor Cotton Seed

Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White this week expressed alarm over cotton planting seed in Texas and urged farmers to exercise extreme precautions when making purchases.

"It has been known for some time that shortage of cotton seed existed for the 1951 goal of 11,000,000 acres", Commissioner White stated. "Quality seed were booked early and supplies completely exhausted. Texas seed stocks were supplemented by what amounts could be purchased from other states and much of this seed has come in labeled below standard for 60%."

"Additional seed stocks needed for this year's acreage in Texas will come from seed at gins, oil mills and from farmers themselves", White explained. "It is this seed about which I am alarmed and concerned since we have found in our two state seed testing laboratories that samples submitted from these sources run as low as 3% germination."

The Commissioner reminded seed purchasers that every sack of seed offered or exposed for sale in Texas is required by law to have a tag attached showing germination percentage. "In the case of bulk seed", the commissioner added, "the seller is required to furnish one tag for each one hundred pounds of seed sold."

"I urge all purchasers of cotton seed to exercise every precaution and care. A little discretion at this time in demanding to know the germination percentage of the seed will eliminate disappointments in stands as well as time, money and possible loss of crops," Commissioner White said.

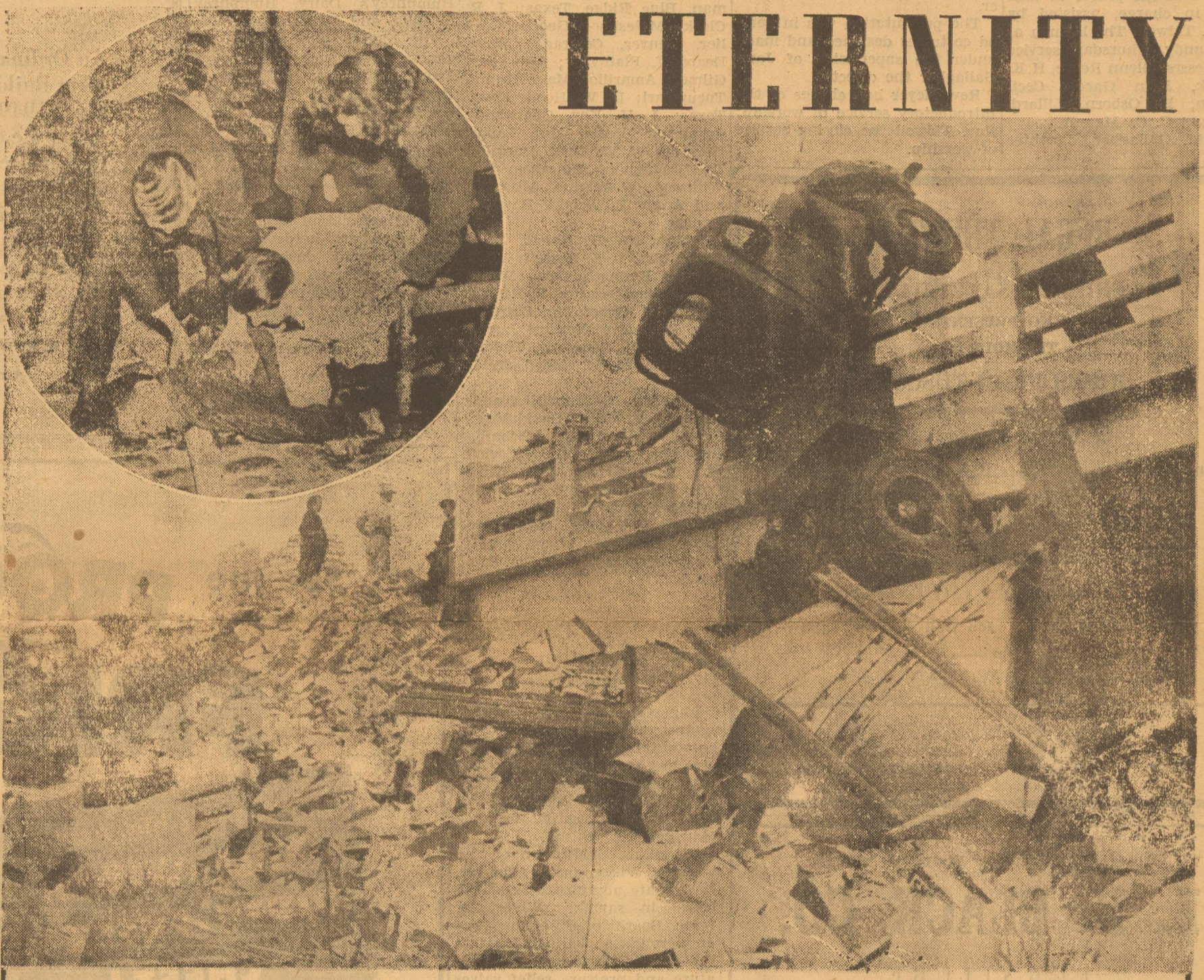

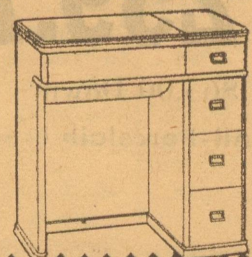

**Holstein Is Individual High Producing Animal**

High production honors for herds and individual cows in the Parmer County Dairy Herd Improvement Association during March went to a different list of animals from last month, but to a list which has shared practically every month in the better-than-average herds.

The Brown Swiss herd belonging to Martin Fulcher, Friona, took high herd honors away from Harold Kreighauser, last month winner, with a herd average of 802 lbs milk and 34.4 lbs butterfat. Runners-up were the Holstein herd of W. E. Martin; the Jersey-Holstein herd of Herbert Boardman, and the Holstein herd of Kester Duran.

High milk producer and butterfat producer was "Queen" a Holstein from the Humphrey Dairy herd at Clovis, producing 2090 lbs milk, testing 3.4 b.f. to give a total for the month.

The ten high milk producers included animals from herds of Humphrey's Dairy, Humphrey & Ellis, and W. E. Martin.

Ten high butterfat herds included cows from Humphrey's Dairy, Humphrey & Ellis, Jack Renfro, W. E. Martin and Martin Fulcher.

Seventeen herds are now under test in the association, with 732 cows milking, 73 cows dry, giving a total of 445 animals checked.

Total association figures show that members herds produced 315,505 lbs milk during March; 11,965 lbs butterfat, giving an average per cow production of 709 lbs milk and 26.8 lbs butterfat.

**Wilson Urges Proper Care. Installation Of Hot Water Heaters**

Importance of preventatives against explosions caused by hot water heater control failures has been called to local attention in a letter from the Texas State Board of Plumbing Examiners, and received by City Manager Roy Wilson.

In asking publication of the warning, Wilson quotes from Mr. Belk, state administrator of the board in saying: "While the State Board of Plumbing Examiners is cognizant of the fact that the installation of temperature and pressure relief valves on all hot water heaters should be written into your ordinance, we realize it does not come under our jurisdiction. Nevertheless, the board believes this safety installation is of such importance that they have instructed me to write you this letter calling the matter to your attention, with the hope that necessary action will be taken by you to give the public a badly needed protection to stop such accidents, preventing explosions, disastrous fires, injuries, and death."

No specific explosions were inferred by Belk, but the letter rather was one sent to all cities of the state.

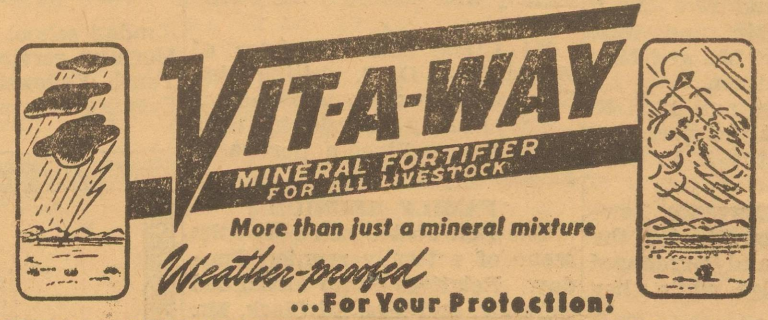
