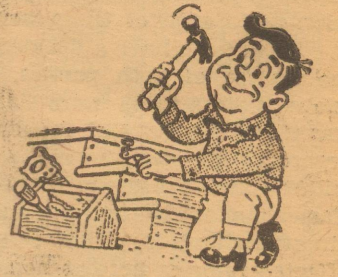

Excess of 400 Animals Were Judged In County Junior Livestock Show Here

Receipts of Sale
Totalled \$38,265.92

Over 400 animals were exhibited and judged in the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show held in Friona Friday and Saturday. There were 161 feeder calves 34 beef heifers, 41 dairy animals, and 189 swine registered in the show, an annual affair open to the Future Farmers of America and the 4-H Clubs of the county.

Grand champion bull honors were taken by an animal belonging to Ray Strickland, now serving with the 1st Marines in Korea. He was represented at the show by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Strickland of Friona. Strickland also took first place ribbons in several other classes.

Bobby Mercer, Friona FFA member, showed the grand champion Jersey cow.

Grand Champion Poland Chow was entered by Gary Crow, also of Friona.

Darell Thompson, 12-year old 4-H club member showed the grand champion Milking Short-horn.

Grand Champion Poland China gilt was exhibited by another Friona FFA member, Jake Rife. Grand champion barrow was shown by the Friona FFA.

Reed, Reed, and Redfern, Friona, showed the grand champion commercial beef female.

Nearly 500 people attended the Show Friday and Saturday, many of them exclaiming over the high type animals entered this year, possibly an improvement over any show to date.

SHOWMANSHIP AWARDS

Awards for outstanding showmanship were given this year to two exhibitors, Ben Wayne Jordan of Friona, and Leon Langford of Farwell. These prizes were made available by the Parmer County Farm Bureau.

OUTSTANDING JUDGES

Judges for the show included Bill Stanford, Hereford agricultural instructor, and Hugh Clearman, Deaf Smith County Agent, both judging beef animals; Homer Brumley, Hereford, swine judge; and Ed White, Muleshoe, assisted by Brumley in judging the dairy cattle. Show superintendents were J. T. Gee, Friona, and Joe Jones, Farwell.

SALE HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL

Total receipts for the auction sale came to \$38,265.92, according to John Blackburn, secretary of the Parmer County Fair Association.

In the sale, 74 head of swine brought \$5,152.57, and 129 beef calves sold for a total of \$33,113.35 under the hand of W. H. "Bill" Flippin, Jr., of Friona, auctioneer.

Biggest buyer in the swine sale was Brumley Hog and Cattle Company of Hereford who bought 52 head of swine for a total price of \$2,629.53. Buske and Chitwood, Friona cattlemen, bought 94 head of calves for a total price of \$25,885.50, Blackburn said.

Highest price paid for any one hog was 50 cents a pound paid (Continued On Back Page)

Editorial Award Received by Star

Award for the "Best Newspaper Editorials of 1950" was presented to The Friona Star last Saturday at the closing session of the Panhandle Press Association at Amarillo. The Star was in competition with 119 papers of this area.

A bronze plaque was presented Editor Bert Neelley by the president of the regional press association, J. C. Howell. The editorials were judged by a staff at the University of Texas, and the plaque was furnished by the Amarillo Times.

Professor Olin Hinkle, University of Texas journalism instructor, complimented the Star on its consistency in presenting editorials concerning local situations, with absence of any editorials written by a syndicated service.

Mrs. J. W. Baxter: That's too broad a subject for me.

Mrs. S. T. Thornton: That would be hard to say. I think he's a great leader but I don't think anyone is so great he can't be replaced.

Mrs. W. A. Tinney: I don't know.

Mrs. C. L. Bracken: I'm afraid so, seems like he's been over there too long. And he knows so much more about it than anybody else, that this is a critical time to dismiss him.

Mrs. J. G. McFarland: No. I don't think any man in our democracy is irreplaceable.

Mrs. E. B. Bannon: I think so. I think it was the wrong thing when General MacArthur was dismissed.

Mrs. W. H. Ford: I really do. I feel that MacArthur knows the oriental mind, as very few of the military leaders have the opportunity to do. I think it was a critical thing to do. Particularly for him to be removed of his command of the occupational forces more than military command of the Korean forces.

Mrs. Roy Clements: I don't know I feel that if he didn't carry out the president's orders maybe he had a right to be dismissed.

Cotton and Irrigation Share Attention In Meetings, Demonstrations Next Week

Cotton Meeting Called Tuesday at Okla. Lane

Irrigation Field Day Thursday, Tharp Farm

Many phases of cotton production and ginning will be discussed Tuesday night at the Oklahoma Lane School where a meeting will be sponsored by the Extension Service of Texas A.&M. College. The meeting will begin at 8 o'clock p. m.

Joe W. Jones, Parmer County Agricultural Agent, says that the 1951 insect control program will be stressed and thoroughly discussed. Present will be such authorities as Alen Gunter, Assistant State Entomologist; Harry Harvey, Extension District 2 Entomologist; Fred Lichte, gin specialist; and Fred Elliott, cotton work specialist.

The public is urged to attend; with indications of a greatly-increased cotton acreage within the county this year, the meeting is expected to attract wide interest.

IRRIGATION FIELD DAY

On Thurs., Apr. 26, the irrigation field day program will be conducted at the N. L. Tharp farm directly north of Farwell. The demonstrations will commence at 1:00 p. m.

Together with practical demonstrations of many phases of irrigation, a number of specialists in the irrigation field will be present for discussions. Miles Kelly of the Soil Conservation Service, and Bob Thurmond of the Extension Service will attend.

Among demonstrations will be those of under-ground concrete ducts, soil infiltration rate tests, bordering machines, equipment and methods pertaining to distribution of anhydrous ammonia, and grass seeding.

Fulcher's wins were listed last week, and later information revealed Barnett and Delashaw also gaining wide recognition and a large group of ribbons.

Effort Cited As Anti-Polio Measure, As Well As Beautification

Clean-up and Paint-up week in Friona has been designated for next week, April 23rd through April 28th.

Every effort will be made by the sponsors, the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, and the City of Friona, to conduct an all-out program, both beautifying the city and in a large measure minimizing the polio dangers in the polo season now approaching.

Two city trucks will be available throughout the week to carry off any trash or garbage from both the residential or commercial districts. Residents are asked to place the refuse in cans or dumps along the alleys for convenient pick-up.

The Main Street clean-up will commence Monday evening at 7:30 with the merchants asked to cooperate in sweeping down the entire street. New warehouse brooms have been secured for the job and a city truck will pick up the trash and dirt from the gutters as it is swept into piles. The fire department plans to wash the streets afterwards.

The Chamber of Commerce urges the merchants, whenever possible, to clean-up and paint-up the fronts of their establishments, presenting a row of attractive business fronts from one end of Main to the other. Already, some have signified their intentions to paint and remodel their fronts or awnings.

The streets will be marked for angle parking immediately after the clean-up City Secretary Roy Wilson and Chamber of Commerce Manager Al Romich have announced.

Clean-up week has been observed in Friona for a number of years, search through the files of the Star reveals, with some all-out programs executed in years past. The nationwide recognition of the annual spring clean-up activity probably began in 1912, when a resident of St. Louis, Allen W. Clark, promoted the idea in his own neighborhood, then expanding activity to higher and wider levels.

Friona Legion Post Voices Approval Of Stern Foreign Policy of MacArthur

Neelley Takes Duties As Post Commander

The American Legion Post 206, Friona, went on record last night going down the line with the MacArthur conception of foreign policy to be pursued by the government.

At a call meeting, the Legionaires endorsed five points, forwarding their vote to the Department Commander at Austin for such use as he might see fit.

The group voted unanimously against the United States continuing a delaying war confined to Korea only.

Blockading of the China Coast was given assent by unanimous approval.

A unanimous vote was given in favor of furnishing equipment to General Chiang Kai-shek for an invasion on the mainland of China.

Bombing of Manchurian bases was urged.

When asked if the group believed in the foreign policy as outlined by General MacArthur or that as outlined by the president in his radio broadcast of April 11th, a hearty vote was given the MacArthur plan.

Editorial

Small Danger of MacArthur-Truman Tilt Being Ignored!

With practically everyone the civilized world over having some definite opinion on the affaire de MacArthur-Truman, this paper also will take note of the situation, an incident of far greater import than the mere comparison of merits attributed to each of these world figures.

Though we have a decided opinion regarding the stature of both parties, we consider three related points to be more significant: (1) What was the background of the dismissal action, both regarding personalities and principles; (2) What will be the world-wide, and specifically Far-Eastern, analysis and consequential results of the situation; and (3) What will be the benefits or effected reforms here at home.

This paper believes the action of last week immediately due to conflicting personalities of a wavering, pressure-ridden president and a general of the army who knew what he wanted. First among our supporting reasons is that the replacement, General Ridgeway, has in times past and in recent days professed the same theories of Far-Eastern policy as did General MacArthur. He was just as liberal in making his policy known to the congress and the world at large. Certainly his appointment could mean no reversal of policy insofar as beliefs of the commanding general is concerned.

Incidents throughout the administration of Mr. Truman indicate that he lays great store by personal friendships and personalities. General Vaughan has been defended by Mr. Truman, although his errors have been legion. We could name many decisions of our president involving personalities.

We strongly suspect that General MacArthur did not release his letters and public statements of the war after only a spur-of-the-moment decision. Good soldier that he has proven to be for decades, we rather surmise that his apparent disregard of his superior officer did not come easy, but only after a heartbreaking and calculated study of the ends justifying the means.

How will the world react to the dismissal of this man who has upheld the prestige of the United States in the Orient for years? We anticipate the weaker democracies and "on the fence" nations to be very smug in their knowledge that Uncle Sam, personified by Mr. Truman, intends to follow a pacific foreign policy at all costs and humiliation, catering to the dictates of No. 10 Downing Street, compromising at any pressure point. The Philippines, Japan, and Korea will not be able to understand the move. They have

learned to respect General MacArthur for his dignified and just administration of their countries. The Communist group will be jubilant over the evident fact that the United States is split to the core in its foreign policy.

We were privileged to sit at a table last Saturday, hearing Mr. Riley Allen, publisher of the Honolulu Star-Bulletin, tell of the reactions in Hawaii. At the time of the flash telling the world of the general's "dishonorable discharge", Mr. Allen was dining with a very cosmopolitan group of dignitaries, including an ambassador from Korea. Taking up the comments of the Korean, the Philippines, the Hawaiians, and Japanese, Mr. Allen told of their conversations, bearing out the reactions cited in the preceding paragraph.

But we wish to emphasize that all this discussion of things past and gone, all the opinions of Mr. Truman and General MacArthur, are inconsequential compared to the action that must follow.

Definitely, a question of such magnitude cannot be ignored, even by the Trumanites. It cannot be ignored as was the script for MacArthur's address to the Veterans of Foreign Wars. It has been revealed that the general submitted a copy of his impending talk to the White House, and no acknowledgement was made at any time. Though the president scored the general for his talk, he at that time or since has not admitted that the copy was forwarded to the White House two weeks in advance of its release, supposedly getting lost on some clerk's desk.

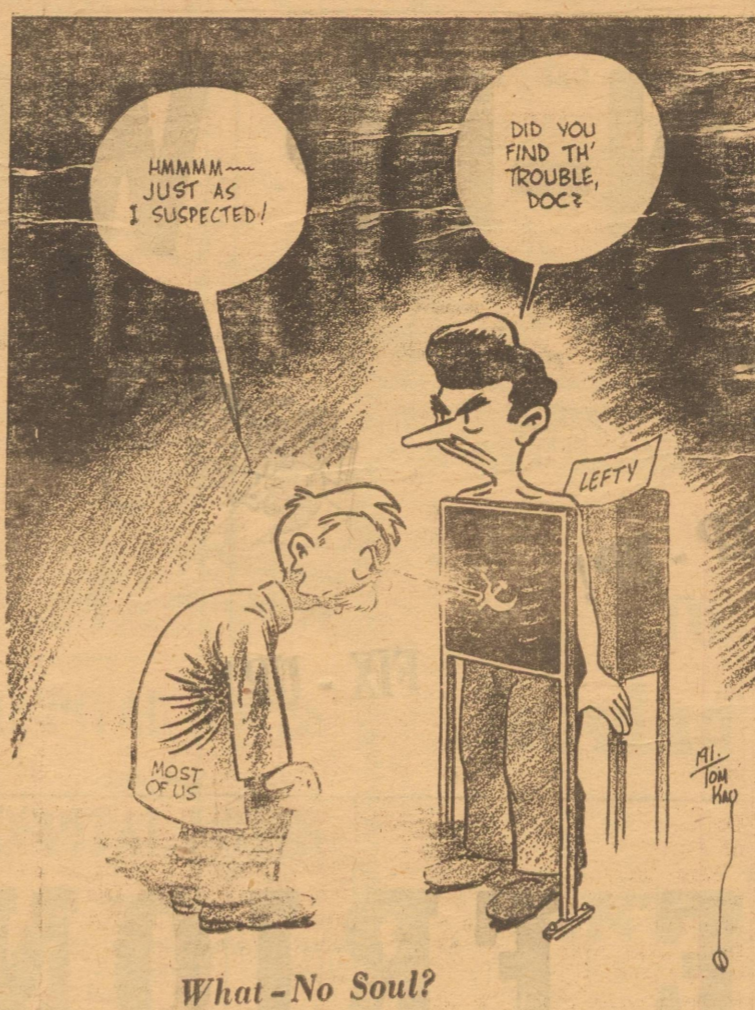
With the majority of people flooding Washington, as never before, with cries and letters appealing for justice, action must be forthcoming. Certainly it should crystallize into a definite foreign policy, to say the least; whether the staunch stand of MacArthur is vindicated or condemned by historians.

The Law & You

DO YOU KNOW what a "life estate" is?

A life estate is an interest in real estate which is effective for the period of the life of the party who holds the same. Such an estate may be created in a number of ways. It may be created by deed, will or operation of law. Such an estate may be created subject to various conditions.

Generally a life estate allows the individual who holds the same to enjoy the rents and revenues from property, so long as he shall live, and at his death the title passes to some other designated person.

A person owning a life estate in real estate may sell this interest, but the purchaser acquires no greater right than that held by the seller. Upon the

death of the seller, all of the purchaser's rights in the property would terminate as if still held by the original owner of the life estate. In some instances, when the life estate is created, the person given the life estate, is also given the authority to sell the land. In such a case title to the land passes completely to the purchaser. This authority must be definitely and affirmatively given to the holder of the life estate to be effective.

Weekly Book Review

Tibet, Stranger Than Fiction Revealed In True Account by Lowell Thomas, Jr.

Ever since we saw the show "Lost Horizons" based on James Hilton's book by that name we have wanted to know more about Shangri-La and now in Lowell Thomas Jr.'s new book we have found a new adventure "Out of This World."

While the first named was fiction, this is the real thing and is an invitation to all who love high adventure Lowell Thomas Jr., with his father, the famous radio commentators and one time news broadcaster of note, made the trip to Tibet, the forbidden land. By special invitation granted when the father applied for one, without much hope of gaining it, they were asked to visit there.

He thought now is the time or never, so for a special reason the high officials of that land granted the Thomasas permission. It seems they realized early the danger from the Chinese Reds and thought by this gesture to the Americans that they might make them aware of the danger and that they might have help from us when it came.

Only a very few have ever entered Tibet and the father and son were seventh and eighth Americans to have ever won this high privilege.

Unequaled in history are the photographs, colored and otherwise, taken by the author, of the mysterious kingdom and the people who live there. More than 100 of them, 32 of which are colored, illustrate the book. The rapidly moving story supplemented by the photos make one feel that they were right along with the travelers on the 300 mile trip across the so called "Roof of the World."

A journey that was made up of riding, walking, climbing, fording streams, and padding by boat across large bodies of water. Some of it so high that they looked down thousands of feet over sheer precipices into valleys below.

At the end of the hazardous trip they spent some time at the Holy City of Lhasa, capital of the Central Asia Buddhist world. It is a marvelous place the author says, truly "out of this World."

Here the two travelers saw

the boy king of Tibet, chosen for a very particular reason for this high rank. They witnessed strange rites and festivals in the gold roofed capitol, the Potola, palace of a thousand rooms.

They met the holy men who hold the real power in the Forbidden Land. The Thomases learned from these men themselves, why they and others there prefer it as it is rather than be slaves to a modern world.

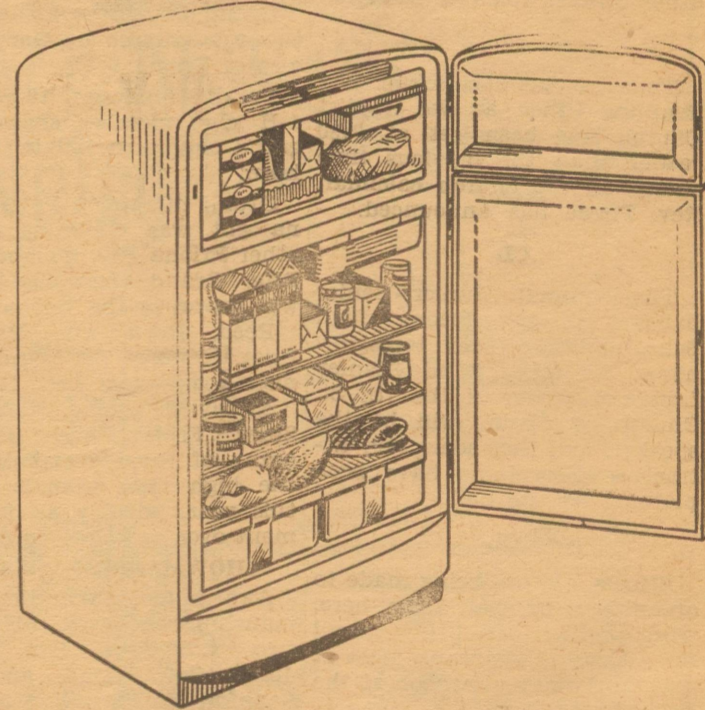
The pair saw and examined the wonderful architecture and watched the strange dances as well as made many observations of the way of life of the strange people. A people who are so devoted to their religion that they kill only few living things because they believe they all have souls striving to reach the Buddhist heaven.

Twenty thousand lamas and monks rule Tibet with an iron hand and one fourth of its population are monks of some kind. They learned much of the customs, rites, such as the strange use of prayer wheels, how their priestesses were chosen and so many unusual things in this land that their time spent there seemed too short and so much like a dream once they left it.

The journey went well until they were fairly well started on their return trip when the elder Thomas was seriously injured in a fall from his horse and had to be carried many miles before they could arrange for other transportation.

Their medical kit was not adequate for such an emergency and the father suffered greatly stowed to fall far behind their return schedule.

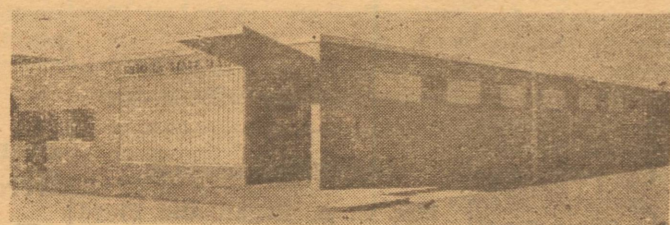

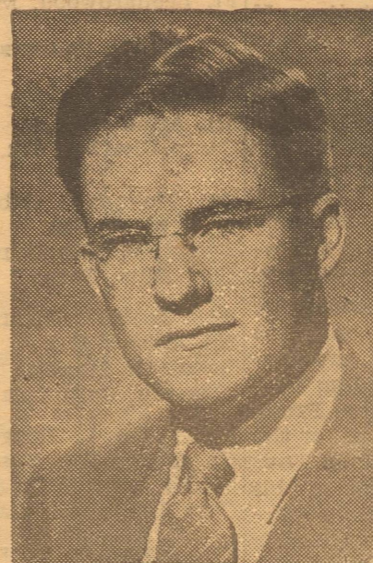

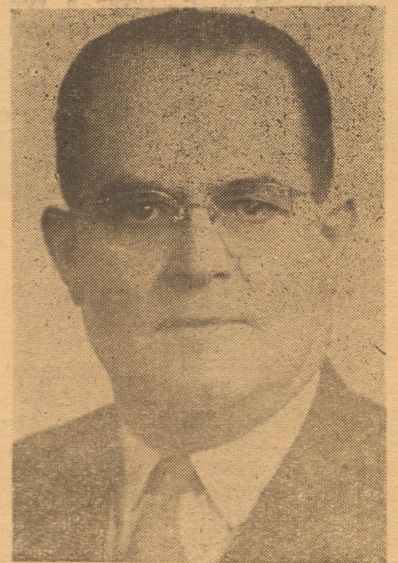

Howdy, Neighbor:

The committee of civic affairs met and the following information for clean-up paint-up fix-up was adopted and the schedule set. The proclamation by Mayor Mack Bainum—date set April 23rd to April 28th. On Monday night, April 23rd, the business men will meet at 7:30 p.m. and sweep the streets, then the fire department will follow up with the hose and water and wash all sand and dirt off Main Street. The city trucks will haul away all the dirt and trash. It is hoped that any and all cars and trucks will either park off the street after 7 p.m. or leave their keys in so that moving of the cars will not hamper the work.

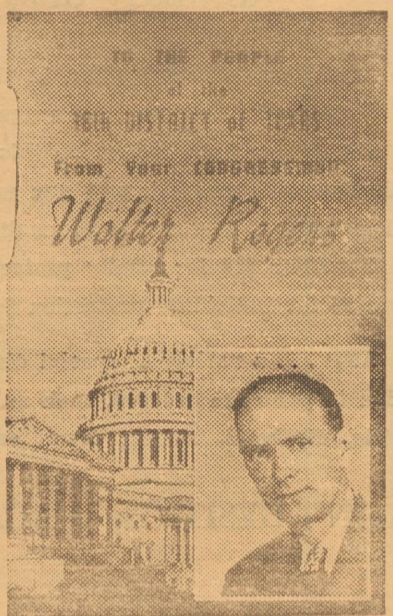

The farmers and merchants program held at the Regal theatre on Tuesday night was a flop. Only five showed up. To start with, Mr. Patterson, D.V.M. of

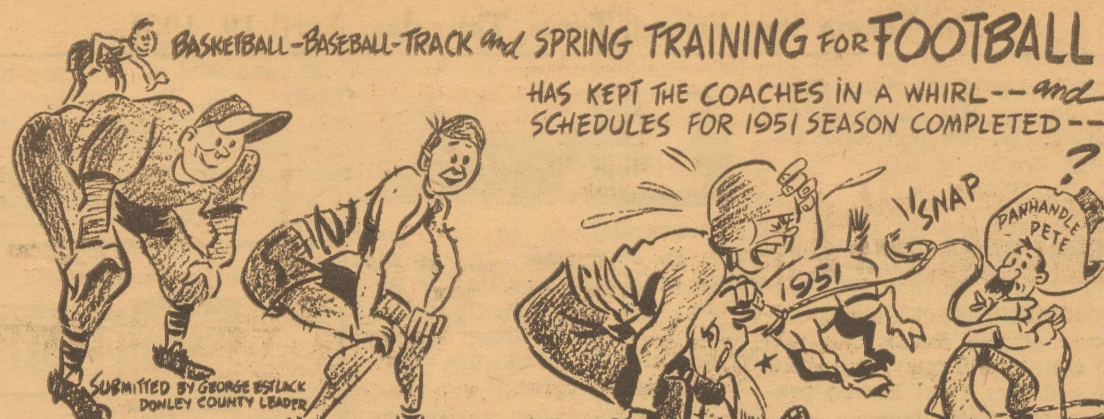

IMPEACHMENT OF THE PRESIDENT

My office has received approximately 100 telegrams signed by approximately 150 people. I have also received 100 letters and about 15 personal telephone calls concerning the action of the President in relieving General MacArthur of his command. Out of all of these communications there were approximately five that approved the action of the President. Almost all the others demanded the impeachment of the President, Dean Acheson and various other civil leaders. These communications came from the 18th District. I had other communications from outside the District totalling approximately fifty. These were divided in approximately the same ratio. The offices of other congressmen have also been flooded by these communications, most of them expressing heated disapproval of the President's action in this respect. This overwhelming expression of the sentiment of the people affords an excellent opportunity for any man in public office to play politics and to appeal to the aroused emotions of the people. Many have succumbed to this temptation and are attempting to use this serious situation as a political football. This I cannot conscientiously do, as indignant as I might feel about the action and as aroused as my emotions might be under the circumstances. If there was ever a time in the history of this country when cool, calm and collected deliberation was needed in the Congress, it is now. I sincerely regret that the action was taken and I pray to God that our position and our way of life will not be jeopardized by it. General MacArthur is an outstanding military genius. This no one can deny, not even the President. He was a military official, and under the Constitution and laws of our Government, he was and is subject to the orders of the civilian officials. However erroneous, however unsound or mistaken those orders might be, they are not grounds for impeachment. The American people are entitled to know the truth as it is written in the law and the Constitution. The provision of the Constitution providing for the impeachment of the President, Vice-President and other civil officers, Article II, Section 4, is as follows: "The President, Vice-President and all civil officers of the United States shall be removed from office on impeachment for a conviction of treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors."

The order of the President relieving MacArthur of his command was within his constitutional powers, and cannot, standing alone, constitute grounds for impeachment under the Constitution. If the President of the United States, or any other civil officer, is guilty of any act that comes within the provisions of the above quoted Section of the Constitution, impeachment proceedings should be instituted without delay and

prosecuted forthwith. I can tell you that every act of the President of the United States since his induction into office has been thoroughly and searchingly examined in an effort to discover grounds upon which impeachment proceedings could be instituted, and the same is true of Dean Acheson and the other public officials in the Administration. There is no doubt that such proceedings would have been instituted long ago had any evidence been uncovered that would meet the requirements of the Constitution. If there is a citizen of the United States anywhere who has any evidence upon which a public official could be impeached, it is his bounded duty as an American citizen to come forward with it and let the law take its course, let the chips fall where they may. At any time such information or evidence comes into my hands or to my knowledge I will consider it an honor to institute impeachment proceedings against the offending party, whether he be the President of the United States, or the lowest public official in our Government, regardless of his party affiliations. I have discussed the matter at length with members of both parties who have been in Congress for seven years and who have done a great deal of work on this subject, and not one of them has furnished me with any evidence of any facts of this nature that would come within the purview of the Constitution, and they have stated to me that it is their opinion that the facts they have uncovered would not be sufficient upon which to base such a course of proceedings.

I have cast my vote for a resolution inviting General MacArthur to appear before a joint meeting of congress, and will look forward to hearing a full discussion of his views. The Congress is entitled to this and the American people are entitled to it. This is no time for partisan politics. We are at the crossroads, and the issue is clearly cut. It is Americanism versus Communism.

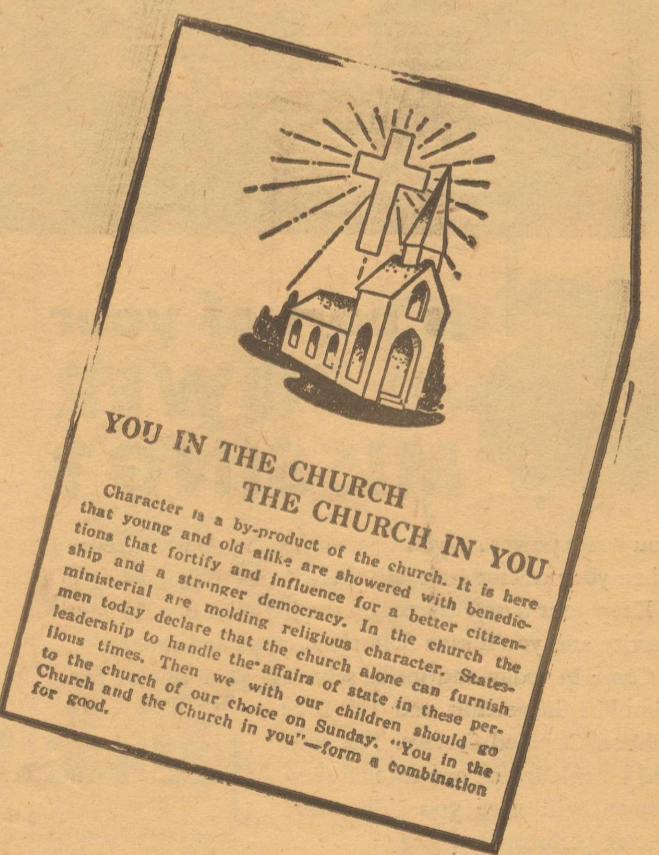
ATTEND CHURCH SUNDAY

New System of Farm Exhibits Announced For Texas State Fair

The State Fair of Texas, working closely with officials of Texas A & M College System, is blueprinting an entirely new type of agriculture show for the 1951 exposition, Oct. 6-21, R. L. Thornton, air president, has announced.

The show will be a balanced, correlated and highly-educational panorama of the state's agriculture as presented by the 14 agricultural extension districts of the A & M System.

Each district will have its own large exhibit, built from information on scientific agriculture furnished "from the grass roots level" by district and home agents and the committee they will designate.

This is one of the best informed groups of men and women in Texas on the state's agriculture because of their close daily contact with farmers and ranchers in their districts, Thornton said.

"The result should be the most outstanding agriculture show in Fair history," Thornton predicted. "We are investing more money in this effort than in any previous agriculture show to give the air's 2,000,000 visitors a better concept of the industry's varied output from the Panhandle to the Valley and from the Peney Woods country to the Big Bend."

Thornton added that Fair officials consider agriculture the most important industry in Texas, and believe this tribute to farms and ranches of the state will provide the show the industry deserves, one which will ap-

peal strongly to both rural and urban folk.

The plan was developed at a meeting early in 1951 between A & M and Fair officials, including Gibb Gilchrist, chancellor of the College System; G. G. Gibson, director of the extension service; Ben Cabell, general chairman of the Fair's agriculture and livestock committee; E. C. English, chairman of the agriculture committee; W. H. Hitzberger, Fair vice president; J. H. Stewart, executive vice president and general manager; and Ray W. Wilson, manager of the livestock and agriculture departments.

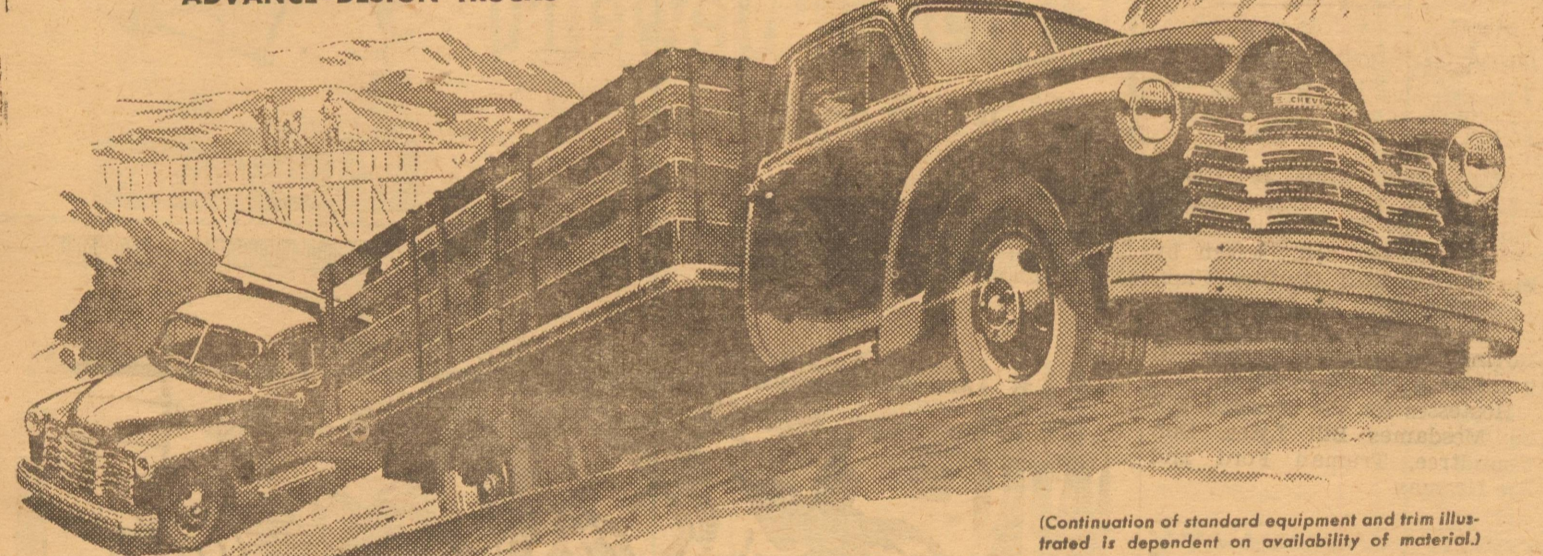

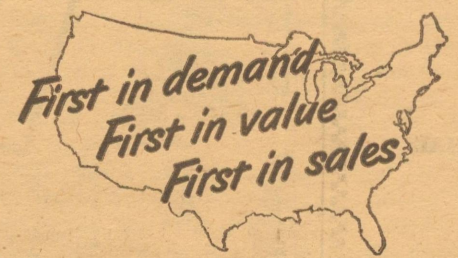
