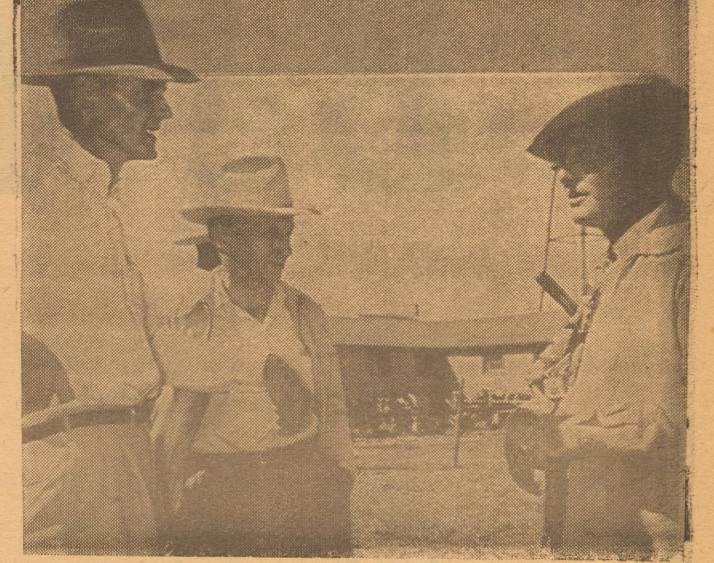
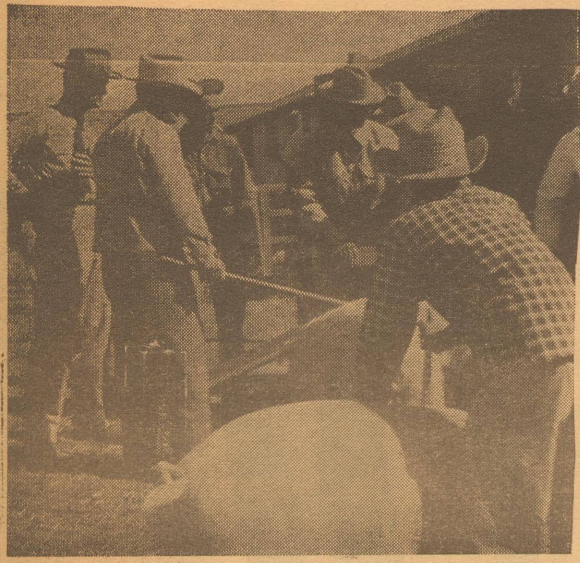

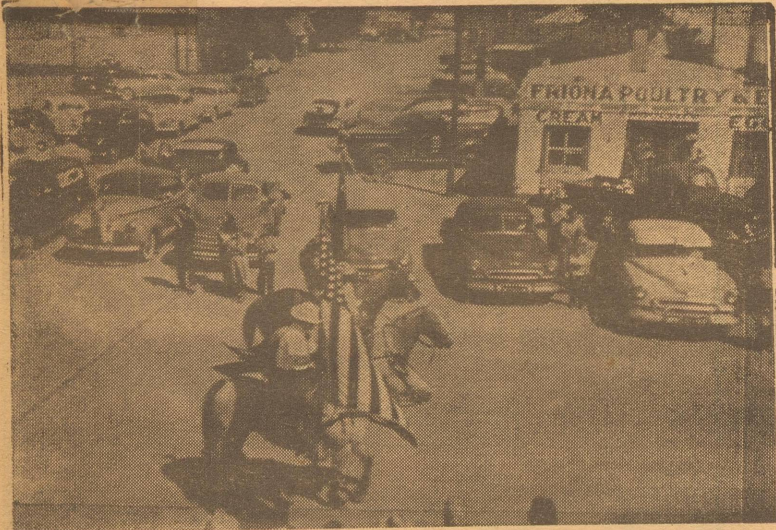

Shall We, Can We

Afford an Undernourished City Budget for Friona, Resulting in Unpaved Streets, Under-sized Water Mains, Unhoused Firefighting Equipment?

An Editorial

There has been considerable talk and agitation for street improvements in Friona.

Well and good.

And this week the city commission has accepted the last of the reports of its engineer and bonding company representatives, and all preliminary facts are assembled for study and action of the people of Friona.

The fact is: The proposed program will cost, just as all worthwhile endeavors call for outlay of effort and expense.

Friona, under its present financial structure, carries a credit of some \$60,000.00. The tax rate is \$1.00 based on 75% of 1942 valuations. Proposed city improvements include approximately 48 blocks of paving costing the city \$60,000 for their part including engineering fees, intersections and alleys; water pipe replacement and extension costing \$30,000.00; and \$10,000.00 earmarked for city offices and firetruck housing; all this totals \$100,000.00.

Few would minimize the need of the improvements. But, let's go on from there and see just how this could be financed. And it CAN be financed without undue inconvenience, as attempt will be made to show in this explanation.

The commission plainly is faced with the alternative of (1) raising property valuations, or (2) raising the rate.

This editor and the city commission believes a small tax-rate increase reasonable and justified, and we go on record as favoring this method of securing a sensible operating and building budget for Friona.

Naturally, property valuations fluctuate with the years; but we believe a constant valuation necessary to prevent injustices, mistakes, and inequalities inevitable over a period of time. If adjustments are made, let us effect them through percentage factors or rate changes. At the present, our taxes are computed in 75% of 1942 valuation. Now, this minimum amount is very pleasing, certainly; few towns in Texas, if any, enjoy lower rates. It is pleasing in the same manner as one enjoying the low upkeep and operating expense of a one-cylinder motor scooter,

when in reality, plain for all to see, the need is for a 6-cylinder passenger car. In municipalities, as in private operation, one gets what they pay for.

This all leads up to the proposal of rate increase from \$1.00 to \$1.25, an amount that the mayor and commission informs me will raise sufficient funds. You think that is too steep? Then consider this . . . an example entirely in line with your situation and mine. Today's property valued at \$6,000.00 quite likely was valued near \$3,500.00 in 1942, the date accepted for computation of our taxes in Friona. Alright, the amount is lowered still more, for only 75% of this latter figure is used, giving a taxable amount of \$2,625.00. Increase of rate from \$1 to \$1.25 would mean specifically that \$6.56 more taxes would be paid on the property. If this is asking too much of Friona property holders, write me a letter; I would "kinda like to know why."

I have before me a list of 45 Texas towns of populations similar to ours, varying from 950 to 1200. Twenty-one of them have even higher rate than we propose. From a study of 191 Texas towns, a San Antonio bonding firm finds that the average for towns in the 1,000 to 1,500 population bracket is \$1.36.

Friona cannot afford to be an under-average town, socially or commercially speaking. And we can hardly expect to be under-average on financial demands and retain leadership in the commercial channels.

Mr. Mayor and Mr. Commissioners, you as public servants are charged with the obligation to keep our city financially sound. To do this, you cannot do less than set a sensible tax rate, \$1.25 in this case. When you have done this you have fulfilled your duty; it is then up to the voters at a special bond election to determine the wishes of the townspeople regarding paving, firetruck protection, insurance savings through modern water main facilities, etc. And the public will not fail to voice their opinion at the polls; but they can do little till you take that initial step for which we wait, now.

C. C. Weis Funeral Services Were Held Tuesday in Friona

Funeral services for C. C. Weis, beloved Friona citizen, were conducted Tuesday afternoon at the Friona Methodist church with Rev. Reiger, Seventh Day Adventist minister of Amarillo officiating assisted by Rev. J. E. Tidwell, Friona Methodist pastor. Interment was in Friona cemetery.

Mr. C. C. Weis, son of Daniel and Mary Weis was born in Russia on February 13, 1873 and moved to this country when he was three years of age. He passed away on September 16, 1950 at Friona at the age of 77 years, seven months, and three days. He had four brothers and three sisters.

He married Katie Ehrlich on September 30, 1894 in Lehigh, Kan., and lived there until 1907 at which time he moved to Shattuck, Okla. He moved to Friona, Texas on November 1, 1929 and remained here until his death.

Following the death of his wife on December 7, 1949 he made his home with his son, H. H. of Friona. To this union were born four sons and one daughter. Two of the sons preceded him in death, Harry and Willie.

Early in his youth Weis joined the Adventist church and remained a faithful member and at the time of his passing he was a member at Hereford. To be a Christian was not simply a matter of profession but was his daily practice.

He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Sara Weis of Lincoln, Neb., and Mrs. George Ehrlich of Shattuck, both of whom were present; two sons, H. H. and Bill of Friona, and one daughter, Mrs. Ruby Renner of Donna, Texas; twelve grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren, and a host of friends.

Fire Demolishes Local Building

Fire broke out soon after midnight this morning to almost completely demolish the building and equipment of Sylvester's Machine Shop and the City Body Shop on Highway 60 in north Friona.

Firemen were called at 1 o'clock and the flames already had penetrated the roof, though late returners from the Amarillo Fair reported no sign of fire there shortly before the one o'clock hour.

Gasoline and oil drums exploding added to the commotion and noise as firemen battled the flames, gradually bringing them under control until all was reported in hand by 5 o'clock.

Indications are that the fire started in the northwest corner of the machine shop, possibly from wiring.

Both local firetrucks answered the call, one pumping from the Main and Highway intersection; the other pumping from a block south of the scene.

Lots of Visiting, Lots Of Better Livestock, Big Parade Mark Last Week's Bigger Fair

Friona and Parmer County livestock men, farmers and housewives, need apologize to none this week for the outstanding three day County Fair climaxed Saturday afternoon, with the parade of exhibits, riders, etc. down the streets of Friona.

Record number of livestock entries began coming in Thursday morning to swell to capacity the stalls of the large barn. But not only was quantity in evidence, but the quality was of the best, whether speaking of livestock, community spirit or home arts exhibits. "Mrs. Friona" who in this case was Mrs. Roy Miller, was featured in the long parade which included the Friona High school band, school floats, merchants floats, a lengthy pet parade, mounted riders from Friona and Hereford and prize livestock.

Complete placings in all divisions of the fair will be found inside this issue.

Quality of livestock might well be proven by the fact that the Milking Shorthorns placing high in the local fair went on to the Tri-State Fair at Amarillo to win first places this week. John S. Thompson of Friona showed the senior champion shorthorn bull, and his son, Darrell Kenneth, 11 years old exhibited the junior champion, thus meeting for competition for grand champion. The father's entry received the nod for grand champion after careful scrutiny by the judges. Roy Delashaw of Bovina showed the champion Brown Swiss bull at Amarillo.

Jereys, Herefords, Brown Swiss and Milking Shorthorns . . . all shared high honors in their exhibits at Friona. The Dairy Herd Improvement Association even prepared a special exhibit of its work and high production animals. The Brown Swiss breeders took much attention at the show with their fine stock belled with imported Swiss bells, used in Switzerland to assist the owners in locating their cattle in the Alps there. Each of the bells had its own distinct tone.

Top prize for best school float was the Freshman float dubbed "The Little Red School House." The Girl Scout float won first in the organization floats with the Modern Study cub following second.

In the pet division ponies entered by Rockie Hance of Bovina placed first. Dogs entered by Barbara Lloyd, Audrey Slagle and Elvin Horner took honors in the doggie division. Bike prizes went to Lolletta O'Brien, Frankie Spring, and Lou Ann Hardesty.

Tommy Jones, who exhibited the tiny car at the County Fair parade, entered this home-made car in the Tri-State Fair parade at Amarillo Monday, with the car carrying a large banner captioned "Friona FFA Chapter."

Reserve Deferments Are Considered On Merits Of Individual Cases

Instructions for the procedure to be used by individual National Guardsmen and members of the Army Organized Reserve Corps who are eligible for delays in reporting for active duty when called have been issued by the Department of the Army, Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, chief of the Texas Military district announced here this week.

In accordance with the announced Army policy, all delays will be on an individual basis, and will be granted for periods of time not to exceed six months for occupational reasons and not to exceed three months for compassionate reason and will be renewed only for the most cogent reason. Only in very exceptional cases will more than one six-month delay be granted. Blanket deferments of occupational groups are not authorized.

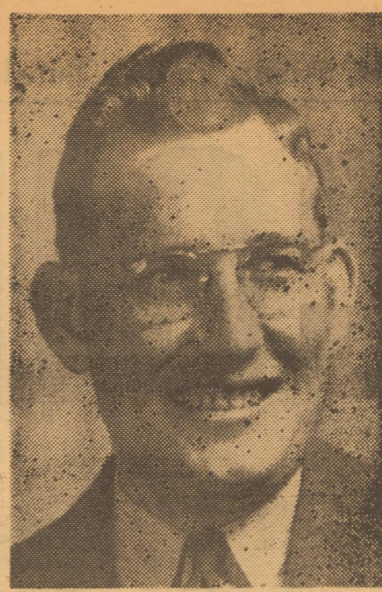
Basic criteria for deferment of reservists in civilian occupations are the Department of Labor List of Critical Occupations and the Department of Commerce List of Essential Activities. Fundamentally, the reservist must be engaged in a critical occupation necessary to a highly essential activity, and will be deferred only until he can be satisfactorily replaced.

Applications for delays, at present, may be made in the form of a letter by the individual stating his reason for the request and giving his present job description, if the request is made for occupational reasons. The letter should be indorsed by the individual's employer or by the head of his educational institution if he is a student. Forms for this purpose are available at Military Districts and in the offices of the Adjutant General. In applying for delays for compassionate reasons, applications should be accompanied by sufficient documentary evidence to justify the request.

Applications should not be made prior to receipt by the individual reservist of orders to report for active duty. This applies to both business firms requesting deferments for employees and individual reservists applying on their own behalf.

Reservists eligible for delay must be in one of the following categories:

- A. Those employed or engaged in critical civilian occupations and essential activities.
 - B. Those occupying critical key managerial jobs in industry or key positions in governmental agencies.
 - C. Those enrolled in educational institutions or engaged in research and scientific activities.
 - D. Those requesting delay for compassionate reasons.
- Individuals in the above categories who are ordered to active duty normally will have

approximately 21 days in which to settle private affairs. Therefore, the Army said, those who feel they should be granted delays should submit their applications immediately on receipt of orders if the delays are to be acted on before the 21-day period expires.

The individual seeking a delay may himself apply or both he and his employer may request the delay in the call to active duty from the Adjutant General of the state concerned if he is a member of the National Guard, or from the chief of the military district concerned if he is in the Organized Reserve corps. Detailed information on those eligible for delay is available at the offices of the Adjutant General and the chief of the Military Districts for those who are uncertain of their status.

After applications have been made, determination of whether or not delays are justified will be made by the Adjutants General of the states concerned for National Guardsmen and by the chiefs of the Military Districts for members of the Organized Reserve corps. In the event an individual wishes to appeal a decision, he may submit his appeal through the same offices for forwarding to higher headquarters of the components concerned.

Unless an individual request for delay has been approved, the applicant will report to his duty station as ordered.

If a delay is authorized after an individual has entered on military duty, as in the case of an appeal, he may take steps to be relieved and returned to civilian life for the period granted. In such cases, relief from active duty will be for the convenience of the government and at the expense of the government.

Individuals who are authorized delays become available for assignment to active duty at the end of the periods authorized in their delays. Depending on the needs of the military service at the end of the periods of delay, individuals will be required to carry out the original orders to active duty for a period of 21 months, or as prescribed in their orders. They will be subject to quotas from the Military Districts in which they were granted delays.

The Army has authorized individual members of the Organized Reserve corps who are not members of alerted units to communicate directly with the Chiefs of the Military districts. Replies to individuals also will be made directly.

A member of a National Guard unit will submit his application through his unit commander to the State Adjutant General concerned.

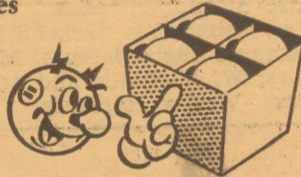
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**Area Girl Scouts

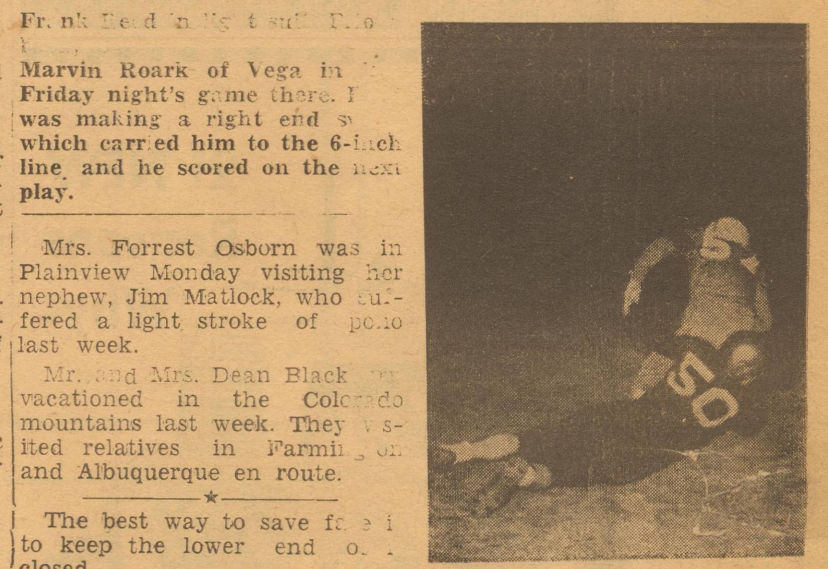
