## NEWER HOMES OF FRIONA TO BE ON DISPLAY MAY 11th

Plans are nearing completion for the Modern Study Club tour of the newer homes of Friona, scheduled next Friday afternoon, May 11th, from 2 to 6 o'clock. Proceeds from the tour will be used in the work of the club toward community service and youth conservation.

Details of the tour plans, together with hostess names, etc. will be carried in next week's Star.

Just completed is the Ernest Osborn home pictured at the top of the group. The house contains two bedrooms, and it is a very good example of complete utilization of floor space. A sewing room can at any future date be converted into a bedroom. The service room, like the rest of the house, features maximum storage space, with built-in closets and a built-in dresser in the child's room.

Possibly the patio extending from the livingroom of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Wright Williams is one of its most outstanding of many modern features; north and south picture windows lend beauty. The extra large bath contains a built-in dressing table, and casement windows are used throughout the house. With garage to the west of the house, there is no western exposure for

the prevailing southwest winds. One of the more publicized of Friona homes is that of the G. B. (Pete) Buske family; it is one of the newest and largest yet built here. Especially attractive is the large den finished in oak. Built-in desks are used in the girl's room. The home contains both a sewing room, and a utility room, and a special music room for the girls. Most unusual, but practical, are the radio-controlled garage doors, enabling operation from the driver's seat of the family car.

The Sloan O. Osborn residence, pictured at bottom, is another of the larger homes here, and certainly one of the most beautiful. Mr. Osborn's den is finished in driftwood with driftwood beams visible across the ceiling. Drapes are of bamboo. A large rumpus room is in the basement where a large wood-burning fireplace is located. Asphalt tiling covers the entire basement floor. Radio-operated doors feature the garage of the house. A divider between the living room and the dining room is constructed of Austin stone and copper dowsing.

The Fred White home also is one of the featured homes of the tour; pictures of this home did not arrive in time for publication, however. Well located on a spacious corner lot, the White home is especially noted for its beautiful lawns and flowering plants flanking the neat white stucco residence. A picture window rises above the sink of the north-side kitchen. Many built-in features are found throughout the house.

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## Locally-Owned North Plains Gin Co. To Begin Construction of Cotton Gin Early Next Week; Site South of Friona

### Williams, Buske Give Go-Ahead to Building

Construction of the gin at Friona is scheduled to start early next week, Wright Williams and Pete Buske have announced.

A location has been purchased and surveyed just across the draw south of Friona, and on the east side of the highway. The plot will cover 20 acres.

Equipment for the gin will be moved in immediately, although actual erection of the all-steel building may be several weeks in the completion, with slow deliveries of the metal anticipated, Williams said. An office building will be moved in next week.

The Hardwick-Etter 4-stand

gin was purchased in early March by Buske and Williams after surveys indicated a greatly increased cotton acreage within Parmer County and a growing demand for a centrally-located gin. The plant purchased is said to be an ideal type for operation here, having four "80" stands, and being complete with all cleaning and drying equipment. It will utilize natural gas from the line running across the purchased property.

The firm will be known as the North Plains Gin Company, the owners state. Operation is assured by ginning season, and cottonseed already is being secured through the firm.

# Editorially Speaking . . . .

## One Executive Viewed Even his Bookkeeping System in Perspective to the National Predicament — Not Unusual In Principle, but Shocking When Expressed so Boldly

A casually-dropped remark at a recent trade convention in Amarillo has been haunting this editor somewhat; in fact we believe it of sufficient import to pass along with added emphasis. Said the speaker at a round-table clinic: "Good bookkeeping, a necessity in your business and mine, will hold little meaning for any of us unless newspapers direct the American people back to the formula of self-government provided by the constitution."

In deference to this declaration, one cannot be other than startled after mulling over in his mind how all the streamlined bookkeeping procedures, all the know-how in keeping the perfect set of profit and loss figures, all the acumen of the bookkeeper himself, is nought if the present trend of government control and unwarranted guardianship by the national government is allowed to continue unleashed.

Mention was made last week in another column of this paper that the state of Texas alone had 238 agencies on which the treasury department keeps tabs; and in all fairness we must note that this number is considered by many authorities as a minimum requirement; much, much fewer than the national aggregate. But even so, a large number of these agencies are purely socialistic, exercising a protection or guardianship that hardly seems becoming to stalwart individualistic Texans and Americans.

Though the United States still can honorably claim the most democratic government in existence; we have reached the conclusion that it has become a far different implement than the self-government envisioned by our forefathers.

True self-government surely means government as designed and imposed in concordance with the desires of the governed. We are afraid a departure has been made somewhere down the line, possibly in the last two decades.

If you don't follow my meaning, ask yourself how many of the present government functions you would continue if left entirely in your hands. Would you dig deep into your pockets to provide funds for scores of new bureaus each year? Would you pay and pay and pay for the administration of new rules and regulations when half of those already existing

are unknown or forgotten? Would you attempt to be a guardian of the entire world? And would you become so engrossed in determining if Korean policies were of political or military jurisdiction that you would make a point of the question in blindness to the fact that our boys are losing their lives daily regardless of who is boss?

Yes, good bookkeeping, astute business, and even daily devotion to our vocations can so easily become fruitless if we neglect being good citizens, exercising our prerogatives of real self-government.


Seemingly, if one studies the daily tax proposals of the administration, we soon are to tax ourselves out of free enterprise; yes, that is more probable than possible under present trends.

Quite a problem with which we are faced, isn't it? The solution may not be determined for years, but aroused sentiment by the public expressed in every civic meeting, in every political convention, and in letters to our representatives in the seats of government, must finally be heard; and when we get a hearing, we'd better have a plan! Maybe a good nucleus of that plan would be a drastic return to self-reliance and initiative, and most certainly a pay-as-you-go government (and less government at that).

On the bulletin board of the Star there is pinned a snapshot we might view to our benefit, horrible as it is. This is a picture of a tortured and mangled youth, a victim of a recent traffic accident. The picture was left unpublished because it was of no direct local interest, being taken as we happened upon a car wreck in a nearby county.

But if you have any intentions of starting that trip a day late, of breaking the speed from Friona to the county-seat down at the corner of the county, or anywhere for that matter, you are extended special invitation to stop by and study the silent lesson of the picture beforehand.

## The Law & You

DO YOU KNOW whether or not it is illegal to sell a minor under sixteen years of age a package of cigarettes?

The Statutes of this State make it a misdemeanor to sell cigarettes or tobacco to a minor under sixteen (16) years of age. It is further illegal to give such a minor cigarettes or tobacco.

If you send your child to the store with instructions to buy himself a bar of candy, and to bring you back a package of cigarettes, the storekeeper is laying himself liable to a fine of not less than Ten Dollars and not more than One Hundred Dollars, if he fills your order and sells the minor cigarettes for you. There is one exception, the parent may write a note to the merchant instructing him to deliver the cigarettes or tobacco to the minor, and acting under such written instructions from the parent, the merchant may fill the order.

# Weekly Book Review

## Author of "Chicken Every Sunday" Tells European Travels In Amusing Account Titled "Harem Scare'm": Light Reading

For something light and frothy to induce a gay mood we recommend "Harem Scare'm" written by Rosemary Taylor in the same breezy manner as her "Chicken Every Sunday."

While making an educational tour of Europe, Rosemary Taylor and a girl friend visited art galleries, Museums and places generally seen by tourists who are out to "gain culture" as she says. But when they parted ways things began to really happen to the author.

Her friend proceeded to go to England continuing the regular tour and Rosemary took a side trip to Madrid, for a week—she thought, but things happened on the train to change that plan.

First, the porter tried to make love to her. This she could not understand since she had always been a wall flower and at that time looked anything but romantic she says. Upon receipt of a copy of the things which she had written about Gibbons made him angry with her. But they got things patched up and she went with him and some other reporters to do some stories about a civil war in Morocco at the time.

She didn't get rich off her writing she says but did see a lot of things not seen on regular tours, gained a lot of never to be forgotten experiences, fell in love with a British bank clerk, who had a girl back home and did not approve of lady roving reporters either. All of which makes amusing reading as she tells it some years later.

# Proper Well Spacing Emphasized in Plans Of New Water District

Locating irrigation wells too close together is a costly business, the High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association points out.

A farm loan official tells this illustrative story: His organization loaned a farmer enough money to put down an irrigation well. It stretched the farmer's credit to the limit, but he got a good well. Not long after a neighbor drilled a well about 60 feet away. The two wells

set up a mutual interference, with the neighbor getting most of the water.

The only thing our farmer can do now is lower his pipes. But that costs another \$1,000, and his credit won't stretch that far. And if he does lower his well, chances are that his neighbor will have to do the same.

The point, one that water conservation experts have long stressed, is that proper spacing of irrigation wells not only saves water, but also saves time and money . . . and sometimes saves hard feelings.

One of the main functions of the proposed underground water

conservation district it to promote proper spacing of all new wells. This would be done under a permit system, and while no person could be denied a permit to drill a well, issuance of the permit could be conditioned on the recommended spacing, thus protecting both the new driller and his neighbors who are already pumping.

### NEWS LETTER

#### Howdy, Folks

The Chamber of Commerce is ready and willing to do all it can to help the Federated Women's clubs here on their drive for health, general welfare, education, civic improvement and recreation. It is hoped that a general meeting will be called at their earliest convenience and some steps can be taken to start this worthwhile project which will be a benefit to every one, and it certainly would be something if in the end these women would win first prize of \$10,000.00.

Have you as a farmer and employer secured your number of identification from the Bureau of Internal Revenue? On January 1st, the farmer - employer will be liable, under general conditions to deduct from each employee in his hire 1-2% of the cash wage paid. You may secure form SS-4a from the post office which must be filled out and mailed to the Collector of Internal Revenue at Dallas, Texas. This is important and if you have not already done this, do it tomorrow!

While the Wichita Boosters were boosting Wichita, Kansas, our editor was really putting out the Friona Star to each member on the tour along with one of the Parmer County maps. Let's hope they will use the map and not forget to stop in when they are through this country. The map might help.

#### LEGISLATIVE BULLETIN

**MEDICINE**—The State Medical Association's Council on Education has endorsed Representative Jack Bryan's proposal for medical scholarships. Bryan's bill would permit the state to make scholarship loans up to \$5,000 to selected medical students. The debt would be extinguished, if the doctor practiced in a small town for five years after graduation.

**SLOW DOWN**—The legislative juggernaut which has moved so swiftly this session to solve many of Texas' outstanding problems slowed to a snail-like pace this week. Target of the slow-down in the House was the Senate-passed bill introduced by Senators Parkhouse of Dallas. This bill would place severe penalties in the present Right-to-Work Law. Representative Preston Mangum of Dallas said, "The only way to get the lawmaking machinery in high gear again is to get a decision on the Parkhouse bill." A concerted effort is being made to keep the calendar of Senate bills congested. This is delaying action on the Parkhouse bill.

In a brief session, the Senate decided to make the last Thursday in November the official Thanksgiving Day for Texans. This observance would begin in 1952.

**TRANSPORTATION**—On-the-spot unloading of overweight trucks got a final vote of approval 97-34. The House adopted the report of the conference committee. Thursday, the Senate also adopted the report of the conference committee and passed the bill by a vote of 22-9. The bill now awaits the signature of the Governor.

The House committee on Agriculture is working on a Senate passed bill to boost the maximum load of trucks from 48,000 to 58,420 lbs. Representative Joe Kilgore of McAllen, House sponsor of the bill, predicted a favorable committee report.

**DISLOYALTY**—A plan to eliminate disloyal persons from the state payroll is being studied. Persons who have been members of subversive or fellow-traveler organizations would not be eligible to accept a state pay check. It is high level legislative leaders give their approval, this proposal will be attached to the

general appropriation bill by a conference committee which is now writing the final draft. The proposal would bar anyone who has been a member of such an organization during the past twelve years. A list published by Attorney General of the U.S. in 1947 would be the guide in passing judgement.

**TAXATION**—Informed observers report that the Sewell bill, which proposes the levy of a one cent gathering tax per 1000 cubic feet of natural gas, is not being favorably received by the Senate. Predictions are that a bill such as Sewell's will not pass. There are possibly several reasons, but probably the best are these:

(1) A question about the constitutionality of the bill.  
(2) The administration has always advocated a broad tax base and not single shot tax legislation.

**WATER**—Our WTCC committee on water, headed by chairman Homer Grant, met in Lubbock this past week. A resolution was passed opposing the recommendations of the President's Water Resources Policy Commission proposing to exercise Federal control over the water resources of the several states. An analysis of pending water legislation before the Texas Legislature was also on the program.

House Bill No. 7, the Water Code Bill, has just been reported out by Representative Harold LLaFont, chairman of the subcommittee to revise the law. This amended bill leaves untouched the prior rights of municipalities to recapture water without the necessity of condemnation or remuneration. It also permits the creation of reservoirs not to exceed 200 acre feet of water without the necessity of securing a state water permit. The bill, as amended, would also strengthen the authority of the state water board, require an inventory of surface water, and provide for the cancellation of water permits which have never been put to use.

Other pending legislation makes it doubtful as to whether or not the Legislature will have an opportunity to act on this revision before the end of the current session. Another public hearing will be held on the Monday, April 30, at 2:30 p.m.

#### Families of Deceased Veterans Entitled to Added S.S. Benefits

The families of deceased veterans, including those who died in service may be entitled to increased benefits under the 1950 amendments to the Social Security Act, according to John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo office of the Social Security Administration.

The new law provides a social security wage credit of \$160 for each month of military service during World War II. There credits are given to all servicemen whether they have social security numbers or not and regardless of their present employment.

Widows and children of servicemen may be entitled to benefits until the children become 18. The children may qualify even though the widow has remarried. Parents who were chiefly dependent on the servicemen may also qualify for benefits in some instances.

It is not necessary that a living veteran take any action to get credit FOR his military service. The families of deceased servicemen or veterans should contact the Amarillo social security office if they have not done so. Proof of chief dependency of a parent of a serviceman or veteran who died prior to July 1, 1949, must be filed before July 1, 1951. For deaths occur-

#### Small Business Clinic Scheduled at Clovis; Frionans Are Invited

Senator Dennis Chavez of New Mexico announced today the Senate Committee on Small Business will hold clinics in New Mexico, May 7-11.

Senator Chavez said he would open the clinic scheduled for Albuquerque on May 7. The clinics will be held in Clovis on May 9, and at Las Cruces on May 11.

Businessmen of the Friona area have been extended a special invitation to attend the Clovis meeting.

The clinics are held by the Senate Committee to acquaint small business with government purchasing needs and to make suggestions on how the various suppliers might fit in to governmental needs. The clinics also delve into priority problems and financial needs as well as other problems of the small businessman, the Senator said.

"These clinics are for the businessman, and out of the information which comes at these clinics come recommendations for legislation in the Congress", Senator Chavez said. "The Senate Committee on Small Business have been very helpful to the smaller merchant in the war effort and in competition with larger business."

Charles E. Shaver, general counsel for the Senate Committee, will attend the New Mexico clinics along with experts from various federal departments and agencies, the Senator said. Senator Chavez said he had arranged the clinics to coincide with his planned trip to New Mexico early this month.

## Congregational Church History Sketched By Rev. George E. Meyer

The oldest of the Friona churches is the Congregational. It was organized on June 14th, 1908. It was incorporated August 7th, 1908. The directors were J. W. Karr, R. V. McWilliams and D. W. McMillen. The charter members of the church were: Mr. and Mrs. R. V. McWilliams, J. W. and Gertrude Karr; Mr. and Mrs. D. W. McMillen; Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Furgus; Wm. McCandlish; C. B. Olsen; and Mr. and Mrs. Seth Rousin.

Not only was the Congregational Church the first church established in Friona, it was the first one in America. The Congregational Church in America began on the day the Pilgrim Fathers landed at Plymouth. In that group were William Bradford, John Carver, Miles Stan-

dish, and William Brewster, names well known to all lovers of freedom. The Pilgrims left the old world and came to the new in order that they might be free men and worship God according to their own consciences. The Congregational Church has been known as The American free church. It took a very prominent part in nurturing the ideals of freedom and democracy

in our land. The democratic church and the democratic state have grown up together in the American tradition. The Pilgrims were aware of the value of education for all people. They set up schools to educate their children. Out of this interest in learning has grown the American system of free education. Incidentally it is interesting to note that the local

schools had their beginning in the Friona Congregational Church. Congregationalists established colleges, Harvard, Yale,

and scores of other great ones in the East and clear across the nation to the total number of more than two hundred.


