ISD board room at the high ISD boa Lunch will be provided.
Hilde Lara of HWP said organization members have been training for this program for
the past four months, but more mentors are needed.
The goals of the program are three-fold - to positively moti-
vate students to stay in school; vate students to stay in school;
to promote self esteem; and to provide students with a caring role model.
Despite particularly high
drop-out rates among Hispanic youth, Lara said the program wasn't centered just on that sector of the student population. tion for Hispanics," she said -We want to help kids. We want to help kids... and guide them in the right direction.
The mentor program matches need one-on-one assistance to achieve their potential, Lara
said. A mentor would perform tra-
ditional tutor duties, such as helping with homework, but also would be available to help
students with other problems as students with other problems as
