Add to Water Conservation

Resident owners of tax-rendered property of Parmer County will cast ballots Saturday in local option elections to decide whether each voting district shall become a part of High

There will be three voting places where two ballot boxes outside of limits of the cities.

The two-box voting places wi be Friona American Legion Hal Bovina American Legion Ha and the court house in Farwel A single ballot box for other living outside of an incorporate town will be at the Lazbuddie school.

To determine whether one is entitled to vote he should refer to a complete description of boundaries of the proposed district at the county clerk's office. Voting will be done in all of four and parts of 17 counties.

The district may consist of all or any part of that territory. depending upon the number of voting districts that return a majority in favor of creation of the District.

Only parts of the 17 counties lie within the District because its boundaries must be the same as those of the underground water reservoir, as it has been defined by the State Board of Water Engineers. That is the reason why voting precincts Members of the Friona High convening committee meeting will not have the same boundaries as in general elections.

Only those voting districts which return a majority in favor of creation of the District will be parts of it. A city or the portion of a county outside of a city or cities—either or both-may be in are out of the District because of the local option method of holding the lection.

So reads the deed of Block 50 in Friona, referred to as the "City" Park or the "County" Park. . . . the land under the trusteeship of the commissioners of Parmer County, the land which that commission has announced would be sold within 60 days at public auction.

We have ceased to become excited over the pronouncements of the state-line boys. Anpouncement was made from that far sector of the county some weeks ago telling of the Soil Conservation Office having already been moved. It had not been, as was duly pointed out in the Star, the Parmer County paper that took care to investigate with the proper authorities before transferring the allegations to print-

Should a tract of land be left my son for his education, certainly the whole community should severly censor me should I turn that property at profit for my personal and selfish gain. Of course such a hypothetical case, not so far apart from other instances we know, would be illegal in the first place. And certainly I could not walk down the streets of Friona or through the courthouse corridors down at the county corner, looking my constituants in the face.

We need go into little explanation of the park case, for other county-seat news gatherers have done a satisfactory job reporting the action of the commission. Understand - this viewpoint is taken because THEY, the commission, is taking the action. We're merely observing, for within the law we need do no more.

Actually, this is the situation to date:

The park is being surrounded by pavement.

This was not done in a haphasard manner. or without due investigation of proper procedures. The county of Parmer was assessed for the paving costs.

The County Commission, in September 10 meeting, entertained a motion by Commissioner Day that the county meet this bill. The motion died for want of second.

Commissioner Jefferson made a motion that the county appoint a commissioner to sell the property at public auction. This was carried by

The park has not been sold. The Soil Conservation offices were not moved.

So friends, especially those of you whose son's and brothers' names are emblazoned upon that soldiers' monument in the park, we hardly believe that monument will be relegated to any junk heap, being replaced by a commercial edifice erected by any mercenary bidder at the county's invitation.
