Editorially Speaking

Proposed Amendments Outlined

November 13th is election date for Texans; on that day five constitutional amendments will be submitted to the vote of the taxpayers.

These five propositions were submitted by both houses of the legislature by more than a 2 to 1 majority; but we think that the public should clearly understand the proposals before voting with the legislature or against them. So a brief explanation of the amendments is carried here, with the editor's own viewpoint, which we do not impose upon anyone, but rather list for your consideration.

Proposition No. 1 concerns a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees. This amendment was rejected in 1949, though a similar one was passed in 1946 with limited privileges: not allowing more than 5 per cent contribution by the employees or more than \$180 a year pension. Note, however, that in this new amendment there is no restriction upon taxes upon the county or contributions to be required by individuals. We see no reason to alter the popular vote of 1949 and we will vote against this amendment.

Proposition 2 involves the permanent fund of the University of Texas, permitting the University Board of Regents to invest part of its permanent fund in other securities, including bonds, preferred stocks and common stocks under rigid controls. Regarding this proposition, we draw our conclusions from remarks made by a fellow editor, Dave Warren of Panhandle, who also is a member of the university board of regents. Mr. Warren points out that the permanent fund has been built up through oil royalty and bonuses on University land to a present amount of more than \$100,000,000 which is-largely invested in low rate United States bonds. More liberal investment regulations, Warren states, should enable the income to increase \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000 a year. One third of this income goes to the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College. Warren has served on the finance board and will vote in the affirmative for the amendment, explaining that the increased investment income would take off the demand for more tax funds for current support.

The Texas Tax Journal elaborates on discussion of this amendment, indicating their belief that this is a policy amendment, and that the people should decide whether they want to continue a conservative policy of investment with low interest rates or prefer an opportunity for a higher rate and any hazards such a plan offers.

Proposition 3, SJR 8, would permit ad valorum taxes for rural fire departments, not to exceed 50 cents per \$100. We already have an amendment, passed in 1949, permitting a 3 cent levy for such purposes. However, the people would have to vote the 50c tax; it would not be automatic under the new proposal. We shall vote against this amendment as we believe such service dispensible, especially so in this area. There is possibility that in thickly congested rural areas, of which Texas has few, this would be beneficial; but we believe it would tend for waste and needless expense in the panhandle.

The 4th proposal would increase the veterans land bonds from \$25,000,000 to \$100,000,000. We will favor this; for we pointed out last week that this was one of the few government projects which has proved feasible - self supporting in fact. The Tax Journal insists upon defeat of this proposition, but we cannot string along. Under the original 1946 plan some 4,000 veterans have been granted loans at around \$6,000 each to purchase farm lands. On hand at this time are 270 applications. Another \$75,000,000 as

about 12,000 more loans; there are 800,000 Texas veterans. We are not going on record for this amendment merely because we have a prejucicial veterans' viewpoint, but rather because of the successful operation of this loan program in the past wherein the money is being paid back to the state, with interest, proving a good secur-

The final proposal, No. 5, HJR 6, is the old age assistance item. It would raise the ceiling from the present \$35,000,000to \$42,000,000 for help of the needy aged and blind. This amendment would not increase the check for each individual, but rather would increase the number of persons receiving the aid. We are not too familiar with the problems involved here, and withhold judgement at the present time. If more people actually are needing help than are receiving it, then it would be a good thing. But we understand that recipients under the new proposal would not have to be long-time Texas residents, but actual bonafide citizens of the state, making it easy for qualification by only a limited residence in the state. We don't like

Study these amendments, and go to the polls November 13th, for the outcome will be the results of your wishes and mine-only if we vote.





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

Milk to drink and dishes made with milk head the list of foods children need for growth and health. A favorite with youngsters and good for them, too, is creamy milk-rich tapioca pudding. They love it especially with fruit as described here.

Orange Tapioca

- 1 egg white 2 tablespoons sugar
- egg yolk
- cups milk or 3 tablespoons sugar
- teaspoon salt tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca
- teaspoon vanilla teaspoon grated orange rind (optional)
- 1 orange, sectioned, free from membrane

Beat egg white until foamy throughout; add 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, and continue beating with rotary egg beater until mixture will stand in soft peaks. Set aside.

Mix egg yolk with about ¼ cup of milk in saucepan. Add 2 or 3 tablespoons sugar, salt, tapioca, and remaining milk. Place over medium heat. Cook until mixture comes to a boil, stirring constantly—this takes 5 to 8 minutes.

Pour small amount of hot tapioca mixture gradually on beaten egg-white blending well. Then quickly add the remaining mixture, stirring constantly. (The hotter the tapioca and the faster it is blended in, the thicker and fluffier the pudding will be.) Add vanilla and orange rind. Cool, stirring once after 15 to 20 minutes. Chill. Place in serving dishes. Arrange orange sections on top. Makes 4 or 5 servings.







For God and Country, we associate ourselves together for the following purposes: To uphold and defend the Con-stitution of the United Staes of America; to maintain law and order; to foster and perpetuate a one hudred per cent Americanism; to preserve the memories and incidents of our associations in the great wars; to inculcate a sense of in in-dividual obligation to the community, State and Nation; to combat the autocracy of both the classes and the masses; to make right the master of might; to promote peace and good will on earth; to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice and democracy; to consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual help-

Over 500,000 Survivors of World War II Have Done So Because:

- The Legion was active in securing the passage of the G. I. Bill of Rights.
- The Legion is non-political and non-sectarian.
- The dues are very small, but the member becomes a stockholder in a \$65,000,000 corporation.
- The Legion is not run by a clique.
- The Americanism program of the Legion is a fighting one.
- The first duty of the Legion is the proper care of disabledveterans of World Wars I and II.
- The Legion since the close of World War I has taken a leading part in securing the passage of legislation relating to
- Departments and posts taken an active part in rehabilitation work through service officers.
- Since 1921 the Legion has been interested in securing gainful employment for all veterans.
- About \$40,000,000 of post funds have been invested in War Bonds.
