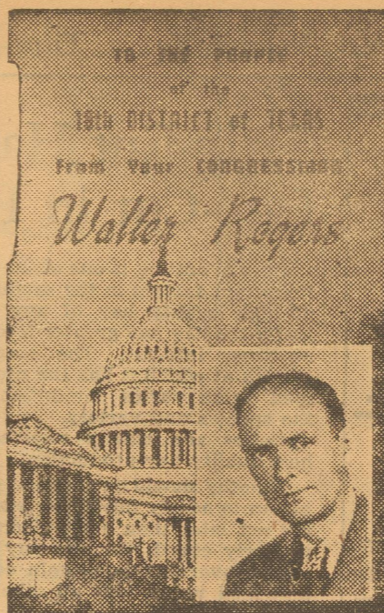

TAXES:

This news letter is being written just after my return to my office from casting a vote on the new tax bill. That is the tax bill that would increase taxes in order to gather another 5-3-4 billion dollars — the same tax bill that failed to pass on October 9th. My vote was cast against this tax increase on Tuesday and was cast against the bill on Friday. There is much that can be said both for and against the bill, and I have done my best to give deep and conscientious consideration to all of the amendments on both sides. I have never seen the House of Representatives quieter or more tense than during the roll-call vote on this bill. The final vote was 185 "yeas" to 160 "nays." Lack of space will not permit me to tell you of the many interesting incidents that occurred during the past week, especially concerning this tax measure, but I hope to be back in the district before long and will try to do it then.

PUBLIC DEBTS:

I told you in my letter last week that I would try to give you the present per capita public debt in the European countries as compared with the per capita debt of this country. Here are some of them:

You will note that the nearest

approach to the per capita debt of the United States is that of Great Britain. The figures on the foreign countries are based on the end of the 1950 fiscal year, except Great Britain, which is March 31, 1951. The figure for the United States is as of October 10, 1951.

FARM INCOME:

Here is some information that I know will be of interest to the farmers, since it seems to be the policy that every time a farmer gets his head above water, someone wants to hit him with an oar. Most of you know that the farmers have been subjected to much criticism about high prices, and this information is given you to show that the farmer is not to blame. For instance, according to present statistics, on an average basis, bread that is now selling for 16 cents a loaf was selling for approximately 2 cents less per pound in 1948. In January, 1948, wheat was selling at \$2.79. It is now bringing \$2.07. This shows that the farmer is getting over a cent less per pound for his wheat, while the consumer is paying two cents more for the bread. The same situation is true as to milk. The Texas average price is about \$6.35 per hundred weight, while in 1948 milk brought Texas farmers an average of \$6.60. In New York City the man who delivers the milk gets as much for this service as does the farmer for the same milk, and it must be remembered that the farmers not only provides the investment in his farm, his equipment and his cows, but must also feed and milk the cows. Hogs are now worth \$19.70. In 1947 hogs sold for \$27.10. Eggs are now

bringing farmers 55 cents over the country. Last year they brought 65 cents. It all adds up to this: Those who blame the farmer for higher retail prices are just not acquainted with the facts.

THE FARM LABOR PROBLEM:

Several of the Texas congressmen met again with officials of the Department of Labor this week in an effort to try to work out the problem that the farmers are facing in getting their cotton harvested. Other than myself, George Mahon, Clark Fisher, Olin Teague, Frank Ikard and Graham Barden, of North Carolina, were present at the meeting, and Omar Burleson worked long and hard for a solution of the problem and presented it to these officials, but it is my opinion that they are not going to do anything about it. We intend to continue our efforts for an amendment

to the Fair Labor Standards Act if the Labor Department does not straighten out the situation, and I firmly believe that we will be able to muster enough support to get this amendment through the first of next year. This is not going to help the farmers this fall, but, as most of you know, many of these battles up here are up-hill fights. We have some valliant warriors on our side in this fight, and certainly hope to win before long.

Their achievements in agricultural, homemaking, health, safety and morale-building programs are a chief contributing factor in bettering rural social and economic conditions. Some idea of their achievements may be gained from their estimated 1951 records, which show that 4-H'ers raised more than 120,000 acres of home gardens and 600,000 acres of field crops; 175,000 dairy animals and 750,000 beef cattle, sheep and swine; preserved 16 million quarts and froze 5 million pounds of food, and made and remodeled more than 2 million garments." Because of their public-spirited interest in rural youth and agricultural developments, donors are providing awards in the following national 4-H programs in 1951: Canning, Kerr Glass; Clothing, Spool Cotton; Dairy Achievement, Lederle Laboratories; Dairy Foods, Carnation; Dress Revue, Simplicity Pattern; Farm and Home Electric, Westinghouse Foundation; Farm and Home Safety, General Motors; Field Crops and Frozen Foods, International Harvester; Food Preparation, Kelvinator; Forestry, American Forest Products Industries; Garden, Allis-Chalmers; Girls' Record, Montgomery Ward; Health, Kellogg Co. of Battle Creek; Home Grounds Beautification, Mrs. Charles R. Walgreen. Also, Home Improvement, The Sears-Roebuck Foundation; Leadership, Edward Foss Wilson; Livestock, Cudahy Packing; Meat Animal, Thos. E. Wilson; Poultry, Dearborn Motors; Public Speaking, Pure Oil; Recreation and Rural Arts, United States Rubber; Soil-and-Water Conservation, Firestone; Tractor Maintenance, American Oil, General Petroleum, Pan-Am Southern, Standard Oil (Indiana), (Kentucky), and (Ohio); Stanolind Oil and Gas, and Utah Oil Refining companies. In General Achievement, awards are presented in the name of the President of the United States and the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work. Due to these awards, 1,200 4-H state, sectional and national winners, together with local club leaders, will be guests of the donors at the 30th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov. 25-29, 128 of whom will receive \$300 college scholarships for winning national honors. More than 50,000 medals of honor will be presented to county winners in various programs. Funds for leadership training in 4-H Tractor Maintenance and Recreation-Rural Arts programs will total more than \$60,000, and at least \$20,000 will comprise cash awards in Recreation-Rural Arts and Health programs. All these national 4-H awards programs are conducted under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service.

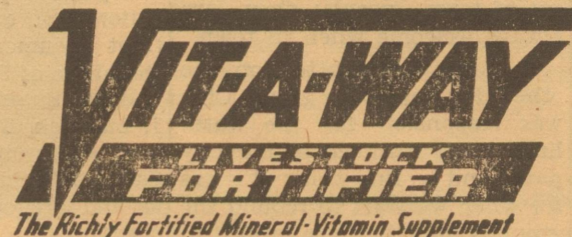
