### National Church, Civic Dignitary To Speak Here

The men of the community and the men of the Congregational Church in particular will be hosts to Walter A. Graham Sunday November 11th, at 3 o'clock p. m. "Men Working Together" will be his subject.

In addition to addressing the 3 o'clock Community men's meeting Mr. Graham will meet with the Congregational Churchmen following the Community meeting; will be the speaker at the 11:00 a. m. Morning Worship Hour of the Congregational Church and will be a special guest at the Church Family night which is to be held at 7:30 the evening of the 11th.

Mr. Graham is a member of the board of The General Department of United Church Men; Executive Director of the National Laymen's Fellowship of the Congregational Christian Churches, and as to profession, an attorney. He is to address a Community-Wide Men's meeting at 3 p. m. which is to be held in the Congregational Church to which all men are cordially invited, with a special invitation to all men of all brotherhoods and other church men's groups. His subject is to be: "What Men Can Do Together." There will be special music by a men's quartette, the Congregational orchestra and general singing preceding the talk.

Mr. Graham's experience in business, law, government service, management and teaching lie back of his energetic lay leadership. He is a member of the United States Supreme Court Bar, the United States Court of Appeals in Washington, D. C. and the courts of his home state of Kentucky, and city attorney in his home town of Pembroke, and is Vice-president of the Peoples Bank.

Mr. Graham's government work of 13 years included a special confidential assignment in Puerto Rico during World War II. He also held posts in the department of Commerce and the office of Censorship.

In 1948 Mr. Graham visited Europe and Great Britain conferring with laymen in twelve countries. He was the first lay worker from America to visit the Vocational Training Centers for Christian Laymen in Europe. While in Italy he had an audience with Pope Pius XII and conferences with the "Waldensian" (Italian Protestant) leaders.

### Farwell Taken 60-0 On Racetrack There

A highly successful season, marred only by the loss to Happy in conference play, will be brought to a close for the Friona Chieftains this Friday night when they engage New Deal here in a conference game.

The Friday night game promises to be a good contest, with New Deal reputed to possess a better-than average team.

At this point in the season, Friona finds itself the high scoring team in three districts of this area, racking up 241 points to 47 for all opponents. Darrell Robbins has been responsible for 84 of these tallies, qualifying him for 2nd high scorer in the three districts; and Frank Reed is holding 4th scoring honors.

### FRIONA 60; FARWELL 0

The Farwell encounter last week was under control of Coach Cook's ballhandlers all the way, with half-time score of 33-0, and final 60-0 tally.

Friona kicked off to Farwell who received on the 13 yard chalk only to lose the ball, with Friona's Reed running on first Friona play the 82 yards to pay dirt on an off-tackle play. Robbins scored the second touchdown soon afterward on a Farwell attempted punt on its own 30 yard marker. Coach Cook utilized all substitutes during the game. Throughout the game the field was a veritable race track, with the sub-freezing temperatures handicapping any passing attempts.

### TEAM RECOGNIZED

Signal honor was given the Friona team and Max Cruse in particular yesterday by the sports scribes of the Amarillo Daily News, with Cruse being cited as the News-Globe Class B player of the week.

Quoting from the Amarillo release, "Cruse played a bang-up game as Friona clouted Farwell last week, cutting down the defensive secondary on downfield blocks and stopping the Steers cold with his crushing play as left side linebacker. The Farwell coach estimated Cruse, 170-pound center, had been responsible for at least 1-3 of the Friona touchdowns."

The helium city writers went on to give full credit to Coach Cook, backs Darrell Robbins and Jay Cobb and the entire team.

### Speaker-Artist To Give Program At Legion Zone Meet

The monthly Zone Meeting of the American Legion and Auxiliary will be conducted in Friona Tuesday evening, with the local post and auxiliary as hosts and hostesses.

### County Has Visit From Secretary Of State Sheppard

Secretary of State John Ben Sheppard was a visitor in Parmer County today, being feted at a chamber of commerce luncheon at Farwell and by an informal coffee and tour at Friona.

Mr. Sheppard immediately won the attention of his audience at Farwell with his magnetic personality, telling amusing incidents within his own family, and then delving into a serious discussion of Americanism. He cited the dangers of indifference of the public to the biggest business in the world - government, and he cited as a cure-all the return to the 4 B's - Bible, Backbone, Brains, and Ballots. He emphasized the need of economy in government. Sam Aldridge, attorney, introduced Mr. Sheppard.

While in Friona Mr. Sheppard toured the city and remarked time and again on the improvements made here. He professed astonishment at the beauty and utility of the new auditorium and gymnasium, noting that this building would do credit to a town of 45,000 population.

### Auxiliary Collecting Gifts, Providing Handicapped Servicemen Christmas Gifts for Their Families at Home

Thousands of Veterans will be in hospitals this Christmas unable to go home. These boys will be remembering their families at home and perhaps be a little saddened by the fact they can not be with them, and are also unable to go to town to buy Christmas gifts.

Each year at this time, the opportunity again comes to give to those individuals who have given so much for us. Under the sponsorship of the Friona American Legion Auxiliary, Christmas boxes are now being packed to send to the veterans in the Veteran Hospital at Waco. These gifts are for the boys who have no other means to make Christmas gifts selections for their families. Each contribution is wrapped in cellophane paper and placed in one large room. The veterans who are able to walk and those in wheelchairs are then brought to this room, and each selects a gift for wife, children, mother, father, and sisters or brothers. For those who cannot leave their

beds, the gifts are placed on a table and the veteran makes his selections from his bedside. After the gifts are decided upon, members of the Auxiliary wrap and mail each one at Christmas time to the veterans family. A list of the articles needed is being placed in the following Friona stores: Knox's, City Drug, Plains Hardware and Furniture, Welch-Blackburn, and Foster's. These boxes will be open until Nov. 15th, for the gift gifts a person wishes to put in them. Last year the boxes were taken to the Veterans Hospital in Amarillo, and the on shortage in selections were in the teen-age group.

This is a wonderful way for each of us to express our appreciation for the men in our armed services, and in giving to those who really need help, perhaps we might also get a bit of Christmas spirit early this year. Auxiliary spokesmen concluded.

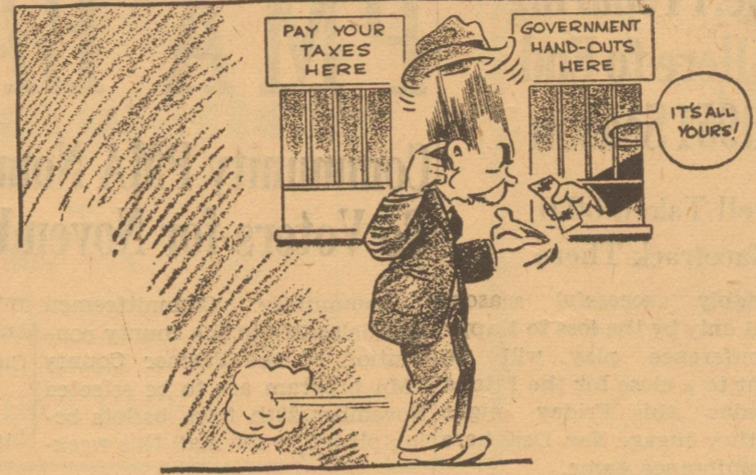
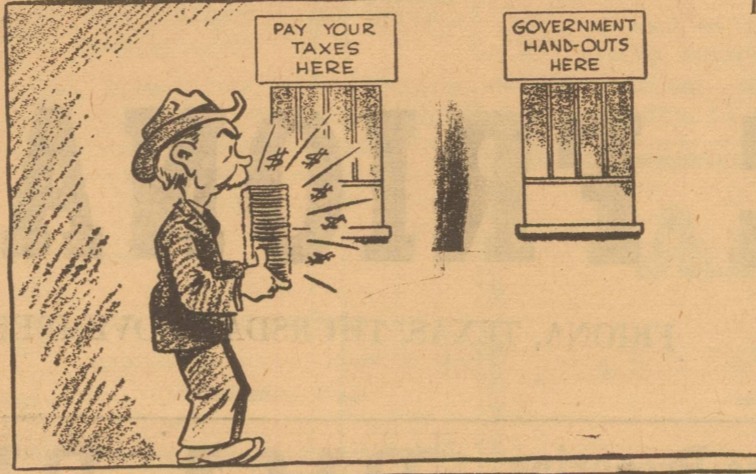

## The Law and You

DO YOU KNOW what "res ipsa loquitur" means?

The term "res ipsa loquitur" in a building is suddenly hit on the head by some plaster falling from the ceiling. In such a case it is a doctrine of law, which raises a presumption of negligence upon the part of the Defendant, by reason of the very nature as it should have been prevented by the use of ordinary care or inspection of the building, the party suffering the injury to his head from the plaster falling would be in position to invoke the doctrine of "the thing speaks for itself" and that the injuries received by him were the result of the negligence of the Defendant.

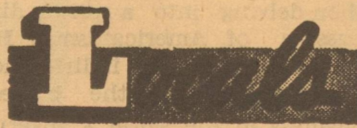

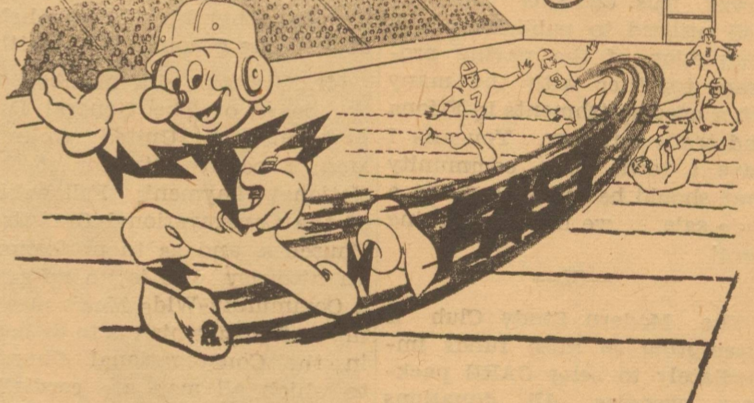

### Answer to Question No. 1:

It is a disease of the nervous system that often strikes in the early twenties. Its cause is a medical mystery, and there is no known cure. A new organization, the National Multiple Sclerosis Society, is however sponsoring a number of research programs in an effort to unlock the secrets of the disease.

### Answer to Question No. 2:

About half the cases recover without any crippling after effects. One patient in four is left with paralysis that requires prolonged medical care. Others have slight after effects that can be helped by physical therapy,

surgery, or simple corrective devices. Extensive research is under way to try to discover the cause or causes of polio. Until more is known, the best hope of avoiding it lies in maintaining good general health.

### Answer to Question No. 3:

Some 70 per cent of the body weight is salt water. We become thirsty when we lose enough water through sweat, excretions, or evaporation to upset the water-salt balance, according to one theory. Another view is that the thirst sensation results from drying of the mucous membrane of the throat.

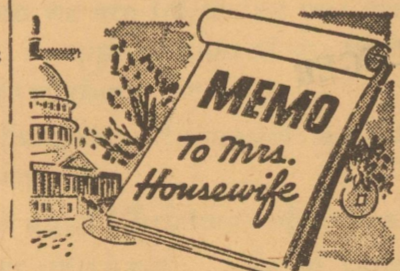

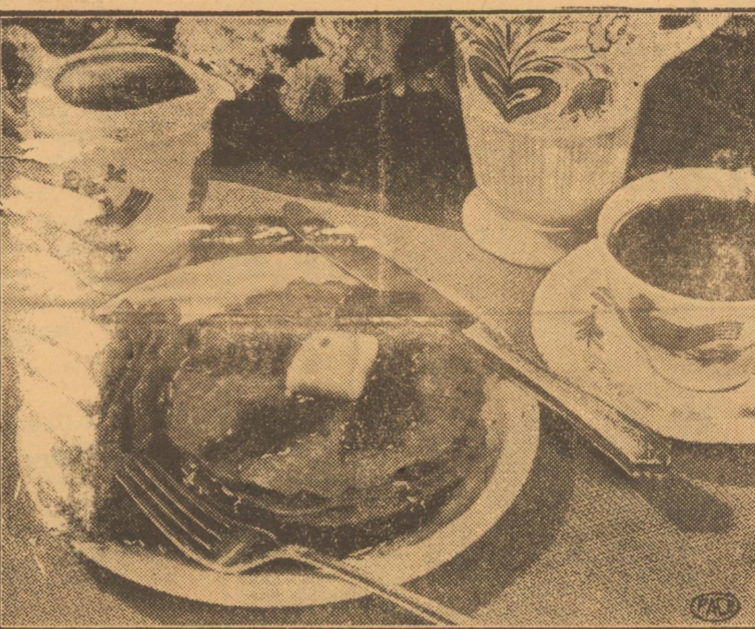
Warm left-over toast in the oven. Roll into crumbs and save in an air-tight jar to use for scalloped and au gratin dishes.

WHO can resist a stack of pancakes baked to a golden brown, served with warmed syrup and butter, rashers of crisp bacon and a big pot of hot coffee? That's any man's idea of a good breakfast!

Since everybody likes hotcakes, it's a good idea to serve them often—good family relations, you know. But they don't have to be plain pancakes. Every day you can make them different with little more than a flick of the wrist. Take Coffee 'n' Cream Pancakes, for instance. They're merely a matter of substituting strong, cold coffee and cream for the usual liquid, but the taste difference is amazing. Delicious! Coffee 'n' Cream Pancakes  
2 cups pancake ready-mix 1 cup strong cold coffee  
1 cup cream 1 cup cream  
\*Light or heavy cream or undiluted evaporated milk.

Measure pancake ready-mix into mixing bowl. Combine coffee and cream; add slowly. Bake on hot, greased griddle until pancakes are golden brown underneath and bubbles on top have set. Turn and brown on other side. Makes enough for six servings.

### Leon Langford, Parmer County Youth, Is Selected to Compete Nationally In 4-H Home Beautification Program

Texas' entry in the 1951 National 4-H Home Grounds Beautification Program will be Leon Langford of Parmer county, announced Floyd Lynch, state 4-H leader.

Young Langford was state winner in the 1950 program; therefore, he was not eligible to compete on a state basis this year. His record will be sent to Chicago for national competition.

The home grounds beautification program is sponsored by Mrs. Charles R. Walgreen, Chicago, Ill. Medals are awarded each county winner in the program, and the state winner receives a 17-jewel wrist watch.

Leon is the 15 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Langford. He is a member of the Farwell 4-H Club and a junior in the Farwell High School. In five years of 4-H club work, his demonstrations have included beef cattle, swine, safety and home grounds beautification. He has completed 13 demonstrations during this time.

Leon started his home grounds beautification demonstration in January, 1948. He says "The place was very unsightly be-cause

of trash and rubbish that had accumulated while we were building our home in 1947."

After hauling off or burning the rubbish, he leveled the ground around the house and set out Bermuda grass in the front yard and buffalo grass in the back. Sidewalks were built of concrete and brick, and trees and shrubs were set out.

"We have 75 plants and 35 species," says Leon. "Evergreens were planted in front of the house because they will stay attractive all the year. Trees were planted in the rear of the house to provide shade for our private picnic ground.

"In my demonstrations I have learned the names of shrubs that will do well in different climates. It is difficult to grow plants in Parmer county because of high winds, the semi-arid climate, and limited rainfall. We provided water by means of a pump jack and two storage tanks."

Leon's demonstrations are supervised by Joe W. Jones, Parmer county agricultural agent. Wendol Christian and Harold Carpenter are adult leaders for



## Soil Conservation Practices Reviewed By Local Officials; Irrigation Noted

### IRRIGATION FACTORS

Dr. M. F. Green of Muleshoe is a new cooperator with the Parmer County Soil Conservation District. Dr. Green's farm is located 4 1/2 miles northeast of Farwell. He is interested in improved methods of water application. Parmer SCD technicians were called upon to plan row guides and ditch lines and to locate three irrigation wells.

Points to be considered in the design of any irrigation system include:

1. What volume of water can be made available?
2. How will water be delivered to areas to be irrigated?

3. How fast will the soil take the water?
4. How much water will the soil hold?
5. What depth of soil can be removed in needed land preparation?
6. What crops are to be grown?
7. What type and size of equipment will be utilized in irrigation farming?
8. What are the economic returns expected?
9. Is there proper provision for removal of excess rainfall?

### RATE OF FALL

Ten miles north of Muleshoe is a quarter section of irrigated

land on which Floyd Templar wishes to put in six acres of irrigated pasture next spring. He does not prefer to bench level for this pasture unless there is danger of scouring. The district limitation on running water straight up and down the hill is five-tenths of one foot per 100 feet. This applies to most soil types.

### SIDELIGHT

A lot of Parmer County people are missing a lot of fun if they have not seen the dog races which are held just north of Templar's place. The next races will be Sunday, Nov. 11th, according to Templar. Rabbits are trapped and turned loose for bait on the dog track. If the dogs are not fast enough, the rabbit gets home safely by running into a wire cage.

### LAKES TAKE SPACE!

Parmer County has 362 lakes; Deaf Smith County, 366; and Castro County has 716. This is by actual count from aerial photographs. This information was called for by the Soil Conservation survey supervisor in Lubbock. It will probably be used in research toward underground water recharge. In these three counties 33,000 acres are unfit for cultivation because of the lakes; 10,000 of these acres are in Parmer County.

### CLOVER UTILIZATION

A Castro County farmer runs 40 calves on seventeen acres of Madrid clover for 44 days. Madrid clover will do as well in Parmer County.

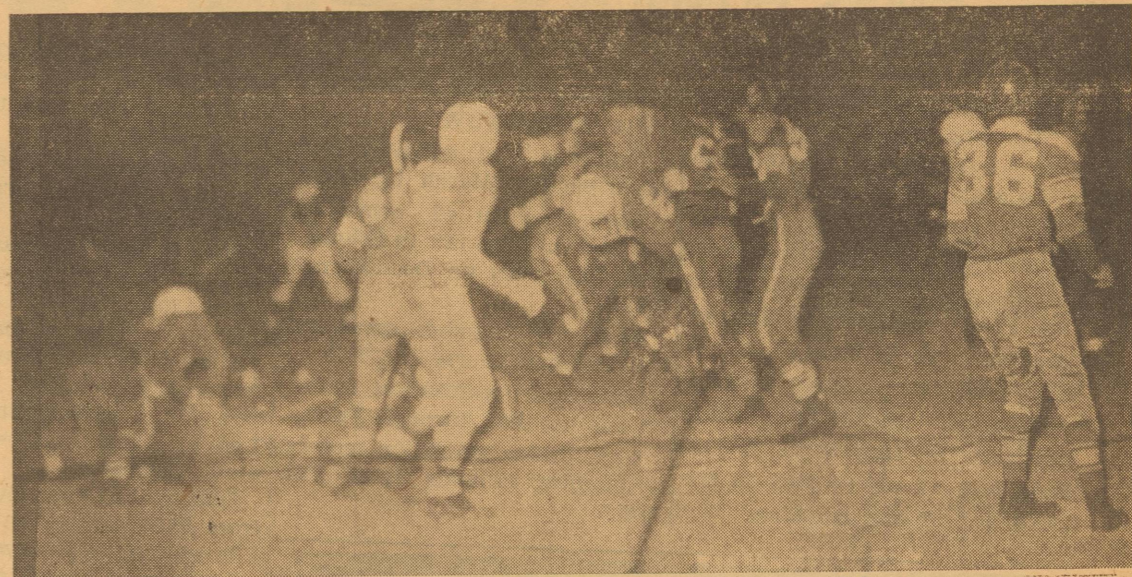

**THE PRINCESS:**

Washington rolled out the red carpet for Princess Elizabeth and her husband, the Duke of Edinburgh. They were accorded the traditional grand welcome and left a deep impression on the Nation's Capital. They both repeatedly expressed desires to visit the other sections of this country and hope that they can return with their children for an extended stay in the not too distant future. Their present short stay did not afford them the opportunity of making many appearances. The highlight of their visit was the reception at the British Embassy on Thursday afternoon, November 1st. The British Embassy is one of the most beautiful in the City and certainly well appointed. It was dressed up in real splendor for this memorable occasion. Everything went off like clock-work from the sound of the trumpets upon the arrival of the Princess and her husband until the last guest had departed. Approximately 2,000 guests attended. The British Embassy, as other embassies in the City, is not sufficiently large to accommodate that number of people, and many people wonder how these occasions are handled. It is rather simple. A circus type tent is erected on the grounds of the embassy and

connected by canvas-enclosed runways with doors to the Embassy. The guests, after greeting the important personages, move on through these doors into the large circus tent. Actually you would never know that you were in a tent because it is heated and proper floor covering is provided. At the French Embassy party honoring President Auriol last spring, wooden flooring was provided in the tent. However, this could not be done at the British Embassy because the ground is sloping, while that at the French Embassy is level enough to support the flooring. At the British Embassy the ground was covered with a hair-like carpet, and it really served just as well as the flooring. Jean and I were among the first to shake hands with the Princess and the Duke. They are both most gracious. The Princess inquired about Texas, and of course I did not miss the opportunity to extend to her and her husband an invitation to visit us.

My experiences during the day of November 1st made me feel almost like an international traveller. I had spent the early part of the morning with Mr. Elia Shagouri, of Damascus, Syria, discussing the problems of the Middle East. This seemed to be the beginning of a chain of events involving conversations with nationals from Canada, Mexico, France, England, (in addition to the Princess and Duke), Italy, the Philippines, and a final conversation with Madame Pandit, of India, who returns to her native India in the very near future. After this round of events, some of the people in the party at the British Embassy suggested that we go to a Greek or Chinese (Nationalist, that is) restaurant for something to eat, but Jean and I decided we had enough foreign relations for one day, and went home and ate Southern fried chicken with the children.

**VISIT HOME:**

I will be back home by the time this letter reaches you for a stay of about ten days. I must be back in Washington around the middle of November, as there are many things to do between now and the beginning of the next session, including several important matters. I plan to return to the district around the first of December for another stay before Christmas and the beginning of the next session of Congress in January.
