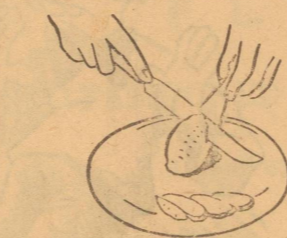

## HOW TO CARVE A TURKEY



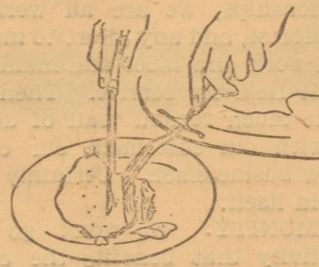
**REMOVE LEG** (thigh or second joint and drumstick). Hold the drumstick firmly with fingers, pulling gently away from turkey body. At the same time cut through skin between leg and body. Continue as follows: (1) **PRESS LEG AWAY FROM BODY WITH FLAT SIDE OF KNIFE.**

Then cut through joint joining leg to backbone and skin on the back. If the "oyster", a choice oyster-shaped piece lying in the spoon-shaped section of the backbone, was not removed with the thigh, remove it at this point. Hold leg on service plate with drumstick at a convenient angle.



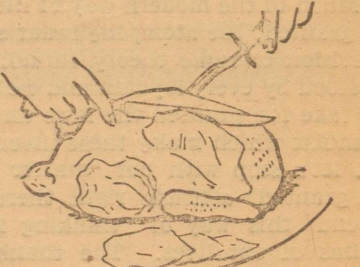
**CUT INTO WHITE MEAT PARALLEL TO WING.** Make a cut deep into the breast to the body frame parallel to and as close to the wing as possible. (2) **SLICE THICK MEAT.** Hold thigh to plate. Separate drumstick and thigh by cutting down through the joint to the plate (3). **SLICE DRUMSTICK MEAT.** Hold drumstick upright at a convenient angle to plate and cut down, turning drumstick to get uniform slices. (3)

firmly on plate with a fork. Cut slices of meat parallel to the bone. (4)



**SLICE WHITE MEAT.** Beginning at front, starting halfway up the breast, cut thin slices of white meat down to the cut made parallel to the wing. The slices will fall away from the turkey as they are cut to this line. Continue

carving until enough meat has been carved for first servings. Additional turkey may be carved as needed. Remove individual servings of stuffing from an opening cut into the side of the turkey where leg has been removed. (5)

## Train Hits Truck At Summerfield

A truck driver was still in the emergency ward at the Deaf Smith County Hospital in Hereford at 2 o'clock today, victim of a train-truck collision just west of Summerfield.

Identity of the trucker was possibly uncertain with only identification marks being a Kansas State Employment Service card on his person bearing the name George Kelly. He was driving a truck for J. W. Stengel of the Summerfield community, and he had just dumped the sugar beet load and turned north across the tracks when hit by the fast westbound noon passenger.

The truck was completely demolished, with the motor being thrown some 165 feet from the tracks.

Extent of injuries to the driver were not known at press time today, with a call to the hospital revealing him still under examination and emergency treatment.

### So You Wonder Why That Hunt Set You Back \$200 - \$300!

Analyzing big game hunting costs, a Game and Fish Commission wildlife biologist this week reported the average hunter stalking deer and turkey spent \$271.97 for the 1947 season.

He said the minimum expenditure per hunter that year was \$2—the price of the old resident hunting license—and that the maximum individual expenditure was \$3,618.50.

Broken down to the price of each prize bagged, he reported the cost of harvesting one wild turkey gobbler or one buck deer on the average was \$186.98.

The study was made by Henry C. Hahn, Jr., of Kerrville, veteran Game and Fish Commission staffer. He was aided by 14 biologists and six game wardens.

The \$271.97 spent by the average hunter included such items as the following:

Supplies and equipment, \$107.48; transportation, \$51.72; hunting lease, \$37.34; food, \$22.61; miscellaneous (camp cook, labor, insurance, etc.) \$16.84; refreshments and amusements, \$12.77; hunting dogs, \$10.68; mounting and tanning, \$3.88; game storage and processing, \$2.66; hunting lease elsewhere in addition to the one on Edwards Plateau, \$2.59; lodging, \$1.91; telephone and telegraph, \$1.49.

Another major item was hunting clothing. Transportation also was costly since the average hunter drove his automobile approximately 500 miles during the 147 hunting season. Some of the mileage was made prior to the season in trips to hunting leases and on general reconnaissance.

## Traffic Accident Toll Mounts

### WHO WILL BE THE MILLIONTH VICTIM OF A FATAL TRAFFIC ACCIDENT?

Experts predict the nation's millionth traffic death will occur somewhere in November.

Will that tragedy be in Parmer County? Nobody knows. Since Texas figures have been kept, beginning with 1935, a total of 30,153 people have met violent deaths on the highways of the Lone Star State. That includes the 1,905 billed

during the first 10 months of 1951.

Safer highways, better enforcement of traffic laws, and better education of drivers can bring these shocking figures of wholesale carnage down to more reasonable limits in the future. Achieving safer traffic conditions is a civic must. More leadership — more fellowship — both are needed in every community of Texas. Will you join in the effort for better engineering, enforcement, and education?

We live on the highway, and anyone who says the through traffic has not been slowed since the marshall has been on the job just doesn't know the score on that count! ## The Law and You

DO YOU KNOW whether or not you can sue the insurance company which carries insurance on the car of someone who runs into your car and damages the same?

For all practical purposes you may not sue the insurance company which carries insurance on the other fellow's car to protect him from suits in case of his negligence. You must look to the owner or driver of the other vehicle for your damages. Upon his becoming liable to pay those damages to you, then he in turn looks to the insurance company to make the settlement for him, or to reimburse him for the settlement which he has made.

If the case goes to trial before the jury, even though you may know that the other party carries insurance, if there arises any discussion of the fact that insurance is carried by the other party, then the courts have held that it is the duty of the trial judge to declare a mistrial. This means that you will have to start all over again and try your

case from the beginning before the jury, at a later date. Your case is not dismissed, and you do not lose your rights to be heard on your case because of the word "insurance" coming into the case, but it does mean that the trial then in progress must be dismissed and you must start all over again before a new and different jury.

The theory of the appellate courts is that the mere introduction of any evidence or any testimony to the effect that there is an insurance company involved in any way in the case, is highly prejudicial to the Defendant and his cause of action. In many instances, where there is either a small amount of damages or a large enough insurance policy behind the case to satisfy the damages in the case, the defendant is actually a disinterested party, but under

the terms of his insurance policy and the rulings of our court, he must become the active party in this cause of action.

The appellate courts further say that it is reversible error, that is such error as will set aside the findings of the jury, if the jury in retiring to consider their verdict discuss whether or not either or both of the parties might or might not have insurance to back them up or protect them.

**Ceiling Prices Set For Used Automobiles**

The Office of Price Stabilization this week issued a new dollars-and cents ceiling price regulation covering sales of used passenger automobiles, according to Hoyle Bowles, chief of the Industrial Materials and Manu-

factured Goods section of the Lubbock District Office of Price Stabilization.

The regulation sets dollars-and cents ceiling for each body style, line or series, of each make of used passenger car, for the years 1940 through 1951, and are listed in the regulation. These ceilings are to be reduced at the

rate of 2 per cent every calendar quarter beginning on January 1, 1952.

The dollars-and cents ceiling prices portion of the regulation goes into effect December 20. In the interim, current ceiling prices as established by the guide books adopted by dealers remain in force, Bowles said.

For models for 1940 through 1950, the new ceilings reflect a 6 per cent depreciation from the January 1951 price level, representing a 2 per cent depreciation for each of the first three calendar quarters of 1951. This depreciation rate is in accord with standard trade practice, Bowles pointed out. Ceiling prices for 1951 model cars are determined on the basis of current market prices.

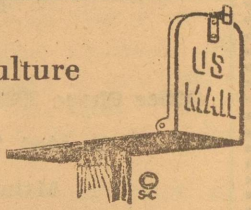

A committee went to Lubbock and met with Mr. McCarthy of the highway department, and he was of the opinion that with the precinct paying for these roads, more money would be released to the county to build other roads; Mr. McCarthy wrote to the county judge and court his belief. The local committee went to Austin Tuesday of this week, appearing before the state highway commission to secure further information concerning these roads.

Another meeting with the County Commissioners Court is scheduled for Monday, November 26th, at 10:00 a. m.; EVERYONE INTERESTED IN THE ACTION OF THE COMMISSIONERS COURT SHOULD BE PRESENT ON THIS DATE AND AT THAT TIME.

SCS News

Mr. T. E. Lovett, eight miles northwest of Friona, and C. M. Huggins, 8 miles north of Farwell, had a system of contour ditch lines laid out for watering wheat. Contour ditches are used to irrigate wheat and other close-growing drilled crops on slopes of one percent or less. Farmers who intend to irrigate drilled crops may consider these points in locating contour ditches:

1. Ditches should be spaced so as to give and maintain control of irrigation water. If you start to water and find you have too few ditches it is a hard job to go through muddy areas and make more ditches.
2. Fall along the ditch should be very slight in order to provide sections of slow-moving water.
3. Siphons should be used to remove water from the ditch so as to prevent cutting the banks.
4. The ditch should be designed to keep the water moving at a set rate so as to prevent scouring on steep sections and depositing of silt in flat parts.

Another good way for watering wheat is the border system. Slopes of over one-half percent usually sash, rill, or scour if the border system is used.

The Parmer County SCD has equipment available to all farmers in the county. This includes five land planes, two grass drills, a legume seeder, and a carry-all. A slight fee is charged for the use of this machinery. This is used for maintenance. Farmers interested should see H. T. Reynolds, Clyde Sherrieb, A. L. Black, Henry Ivy, or O. T. Jones.

New District cooperators this week include Davit Carson, C. C. Rucker, and B. C. Motley.

B. C. Motley comes from near Lamesa. He says that many farmers in that area have had good luck with deep plowing, but many more are weeping bitter tears. Sometime the soil which is turned up is worse than that which is turned under. Most soils in Parmer County are not the kind which benefit from deep plowing. Sweep type plows, chisel plows, tandem discs, one-way plows operated at slow speed, blade type sub-surface tillers, and moldboard plows get good results in this area. A deep-rooted legume or clover or alfalfa will break plow pans.

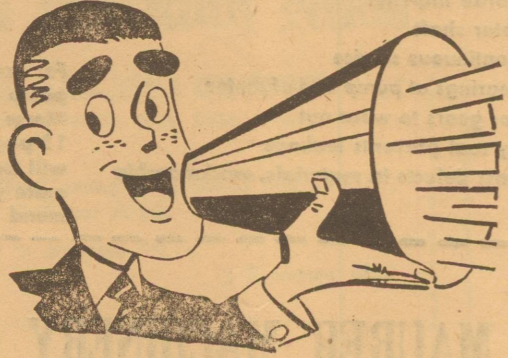

**Read the Seed Tag**

Reputable seedsmen label the seed they sell in conformance with Federal and State seed laws. These seedsmen and the Government authorities expect the farmer-purchaser to do his part to avail himself of the protection these laws were meant to give him.

Avoid buying seed that does not carry analysis tags or labels, seed which may be offered to you solely on verbal description.

Read the label to see if the variety and quality described cover what you are supposed to be buying. When you use the seed, retain the label or labels for possible future reference and identification of that particular purchase, and enter the date of purchase or delivery on the label. Save a little sample of the seed, too, for possible future checking.

You should know what the statements on the label mean in terms of quality. They are not too difficult to understand. The basic requirements of the Federal Seed Act and of nearly all State seed laws as to labeling of agricultural seeds are the same. The information required on the tag includes (a) the name of the kind, or the kind and variety of seed, (b) the lot-number, (c) the percentages of pure seed, other crop seed, weed seed, and inert material, (d) the percentage of germination and hard seed (if present) stated separately, with the date of test, and (e) the noxious weed seeds which may be present (number of seeds per ounce or per pound, as the particular State law may require). On some seeds, such as alfalfa, red clover, and open-pollinated corn, the origin of production must be shown. The analysis tag also must show the name and address or the symbol of the seller. State seed laws vary somewhat as to the weeds in the noxious class. In some States there are certain prohibitions or limitations on noxious weeds. Some States limit the percentage of weed seeds allowed.

Labeling of mixed agricultural seed is similar, except the percentage of each kind or variety in the mixture present at the rate of 5 per cent or more must be given, as well as the germination and date of test of each component of the mixture of 5 per cent or more.

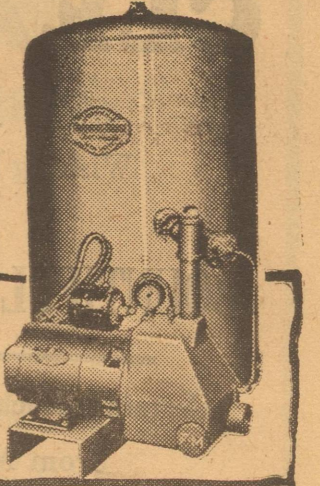

The auditor's report, submitted at this meeting, was described by board members as mighty satisfactory.

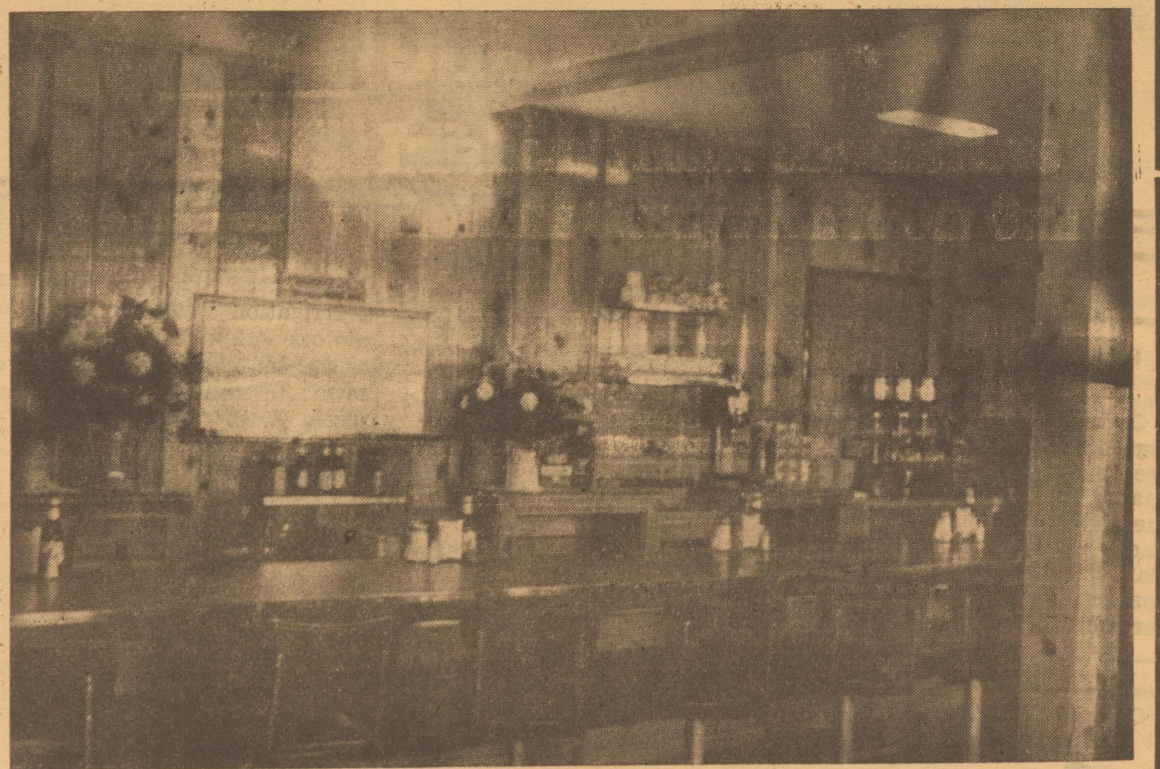
**STAR EMPLOYEE RETURNS**
