

Wrecker services hopes to make holidays a little more safe

Big Spring citizens who find themselves a little too consumed with the holiday spirit this Christmas Eve don't have any reason to get out on the road and drive home.

To help make the holiday a little brighter and an safer, Mitchem and Sons, Inc. wrecker service will continue its tradition of providing the "Tipsy Wrecker Service" on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve. Big Spring residents who have been drinking can call the wrecker service and someone will pick them and their vehicle up and take them home.

"If you haven't already been in an accident and you aren't in police custody, we'll come pick you and your car up at no charge,," said Mitchem. 'We'll take you from a party to your home. We will not take you from party to party."

Hours for the "Tipsy Wrecker Service" are from 8 p.m. to 1 a.m. "We just want to make the streets safer for our families and friends," said Ricky Mitchem, president of the company. "We do want everyone to have a happy holidays and we don't want want anyone to get hurt. That's

why we do it."

The company has been providing the service for more than 10 years. A time or two, Mitchem said, the company has received no calls. They usually average four or five calls. One year, there were 13 calls.

Travelers urged to use caution

The bad news for travelers is that freezing drizzle tonight may create hazardous road conditions.

The good news? Forecasters predict warmer temperatures ahead, with a high up to 50 degrees Christmas Day.


But Department of Public Safety officials were warning all those taking to the highways in the next day or so to take safety precautions first.

"Our reports are it's clear up until Abilene today," said Pat Holt of Midland DPS this morning. But from Abilene east to the state line, it's another story. "We're advising it's very adverse and hazardous for trav-

el," she said. The DPS keeps road conditions up to date 24 hours a day, on its toll-free telephone information number, 1-800-452-9292. The information line includes

road conditions throughout the state. "We advise that you call two hours before leaving to see what conditions are like where you're going to be traveling, Holt said.

Blessing Family whose home burned receives \$1,000 from anonymous donor

Christmas just became brighter for a Big Spring family who suffered a house fire earlier this month.

Dolores Green received a cashier's check for \$1,000 for her family after an anonymous donor read the story about her experience in the Big Spring Herald.

"We have been blessed," said Green, 22.

A real-life family drama began unfolding for Green and her three children Dec. 12, when their home caught fire and burned.

Just minutes before the front rooms of the home were destroyed by fire, Santos Villa Jr., her boyfriend, and Green ran outside with her sleeping children, 4-year-old Maggie, 3year-old Micheal and 2-year-old Brandon. Green said later that replacing all their belongings destroyed in the blaze was unimportant, compared to the miracle she received when the children escaped unharmed. "We look fine, we're alive, so this is going to be all right. We'll pull through," Green said. A benefactor read the story about their heroic efforts, and their determination to see the blessings in the midst of catastrophe, and contacted State National Bank. A spokesperson at the bank called the Herald, and was referred to Mark Gentry, director for the Big Spring Housing Authority. Gentry had the bank contact Danelle Castillo at the Salvation Army Castillo said the benefactor asked to remain anonymous, and only the bank knows their identity. Big Spring Housing was able to approve a home for the family. Green, Villa and the three

children have been staying with his mother in a one-bedroom home, Green said.

We've been approved for a house, and we're moving in now. Of course, we don't have too much to move, but we'll use this money to pay our utility deposits," Green said.

Along with paying for deposits, Green said she hopes to be able to purchase mattresses for the children's bed, as well as carpets or rugs for their rooms in the the new home.

"And we're hoping to replace our big TV, the one that burned, for the living room," she said.

Villa said he was thoroughly surprised and awed by the generous donation.

think I am still in shock, and I am amazed at how the Big Spring community came together to help us," Villa said.

Villa compared Big Spring to other communities where he's lived, and said this community far exceeds any other place he's lived. Green said she is still trying to catch her breath from the entire experience. She received Christmas food baskets and toys from the Salvation Army. "Here, it's not just family and friends who help, it's the whole community. I feel so grateful," Green said. A former Howard College student, Green has a part time job as a care giver for a local inhome service, she said. Villa is unemployed due to a physical disability. The first items Green and Villa moved into their new home were the Christmas presents given the children by the Salvation Army. Shoes, clothes, pillows and toys, including a toddler bicycle, were unpacked from the sacks by Green and Villa. Each gift was designated Maggie,

Local artist uses her talent at Scenic Medical Center

Scenic Mountain Medical Center's Intensive Care Unit offers anxious family members waiting outside the steel doors an opportunity to view an art painting on a unique canvas. Thanks to the commissioned efforts of local artist Sheree Moates, a colorful mural now decorates the wall near the ele-

vator on the third floor. "Something I do before every painting is pray, and I did that for this one, too," Moates said from her Luther community home.

"I asked God to help me paint a picture that would be peaceful for the loved ones who must wait anxiously and fearfully outside the ICU doors," she said. "And I've heard several people say how peaceful it looks as they've gotten off the elevators."

Moates said Barbara Hall. interior designer for the hospi-

tal, approached her about the project. She drew several sketches, and Hall selected the one she liked best.

"This is the first time I've ever done anything like this, and it was easier than I thought it would be. I've been a professional artist for 24 years, and I've always worked on canvas, in pastels and water colors," she said.

The mural is painted in semigloss wall paint, and Moates spent 21 hours completed the project.

We're hoping it will withstand people touching it, and cleaning. I've done limited editions of prints with a religious theme that are in stores in Big Spring and Lubbock and San Angelo, but this is the first time I've ever painted anything on a wall," Moates said.

The mural is designed to give the impression of standing on a patio made made with gothicstyle fence, overlooking a view

Octuplets rekindle debate over fertility drugs HOUSTON (AP) - While doc-

tors guard the fragile health of the world's first surviving set of octuplets, the births have rekindled the medical community's debate over the use of fertility drugs.

The babies born to Nkem Chukwu (nih-KEHM chuhk-WOO) were "a disaster" from an infertility standpoint, said Dr. Randle Corfman, director of the Midwest Center for Reproductive Health in

Robbinsdale, Minn. Corfman worried that insurance companies may reconsider providing health coverage for women like Mrs. Chukwu who have fertility treatment. Others question whether parents who take fertility drugs[®] really understand the health risks of underdeveloped multiple births. "The fact is that the vast

majority of these cases (of quadruplets or more) end in disaster, sometimes for the mom, most often for the babies," Dr. Alan Copperman said in today's New York Times.

Copperman, director of reproductive endocrinology at Mount Sinai-New York University Medical Center, said every time a case like the Chukwus' comes couples along. desperate become more willing to take greater risks.



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

B-R-R-R-R!: Cold weather arrives, on cue

For cold weather lovers, this is more like it. And for those dreaming of a white Christmas, their dreams might come true. The season's most powerful blast of cold air iced the nation

on the first full day of winter. The blustery, messy weather caught people off guard Southern Tuesday from California to Mississippi, and ended a snow drought in some Eastern ski areas as it sneaked in on the heels of balmy weather.

Within hours temperatures plummeted 30 degrees in several Pennsylvania cities.

"It's crazy, man, how fast it changed," Claude Reynolds, a student in Pittsburgh, said as he waited for a bus wearing a thick black goose-down-filled jacket and leather gloves.

At snow-starved Kissing Bridge ski resort in Glenwood, N.Y., south of Buffalo, a snowy forecast was a godsend.

"It's like a grand slam in the ninth inning when you're down

four runs," said Mark Halter, president of Kissing Bridge. The storm dropped about a foot of snow on Michigan's eastern Upper Peninsula, and some western counties reported accu-

mulations of up to 5 inches. "Everybody is looking forward to the holidays," said Doug Beard, assistant manager Bavarian Village Ski and Golf in Traverse City, Mich. "We've got snow, the skiing is good. Everyone is happy."

Snow also fell in northwestern Pennsylvania and was forecast for the Poconos.

The weather service forecast a 70 percent chance of a white Christmas in the Harrisburg and Philadelphia areas; odds were lower for the rest of the state

"Actually I hope it stays this way," said Cindy Schmidt, as she huddled outside in downtown Pittsburgh during a cigarette break. "Isn't it great? It's almost Christmas! When winter officially arrived

Monday at 8:56 p.m., not a single inch of snow had fallen in

Buffalo. But the city - which averages 92 inches per year got a dusting Tuesday and more was on the way.

After the temperature soared to 63 in New York's Central Park on Tuesday, tying the 49year-old record for the date, winter announced itself with gusty winds from the northwest. In 10 hours, the temperature fell 25 degrees in Central Park. By 9 p.m., it was 27 - but felt like 12 with the wind.

In Brighton, Colo., a 76-yearold woman was found dead in her nursing home parking lot early Tuesday as temperatures dropped below zero. A 73-yearold ice fisherman also died Tuesday after he fell through the ice in Colorado's Cherry Creek State Park

While the powerful cold system was funneling into the East and pushing lake-effect snow systems into high gear, farmers in California's San Joaquin Valley were battling a deep freeze that threatened navel oranges, lemons and strawberries

Two people die in I-35 pileups

AUSTIN (AP) - A thin layer of ice is to blame for two deaths during an early morning highway pileup on Interstate 35.

Austin police spokesman Kevin Buchman said icy conditions on an elevated portion of the I-35 near U.S. 290 caused a 24-vehicle accident shortly after 1 a.m. today in the northbound lanes of the interstate. A 19year-old female, whose name has not been released, was taken to Brackenridge Hospital where she died.

Three minutes later, ice covering the southbound lanes caused a 35-car accident. Buchman said a 30-year-old man was killed in the pileup.

Authorities said at least 15 people who were injured in the chain collisions were taken to area hospitals.

Interstate 35 was closed while police cleaned up the wreckage, Buchman said.

Cameras used to catch illegal dumpers

CORPUS CHRISTI (AP) - If you're dumping trash illegally, surprise - you might be caught on one of Corpus Christi's hidden cameras.

Over the next six months, the city's solid waste department plans to place cameras in trees, bushes or atop buildings to catch dumpers in the act.

"I'm hoping that people will think twice about dumping stuff from now on," the city's solid waste compliance officer, Joe New, told the Corpus Christi Caller-Times. "We're just trying to clean up this city.

Solid waste officials say some people believe the plan is reminiscent of "Big Brother" in George Orwell's "1984.

"Obviously, we know that this is sensitive and that people are maybe scared of this, but the sole purpose of this is to look at illegal dumping," said Andy Leal, director of Solid Waste Services. New, who will review the tapes, said the cameras will be used only to catch people dumping illegally.

"We're not a division of the police department," he said. "These cameras will be directed at one specific spot. They won't be panning back and forth trying to catch people driving by running stop lights or that sort of thing."

Thieves steal family's Christmas gifts

CORPUS CHRISTI (AP) - A husband and wife returned to their apartment after church and found someone had broken in and stolen their Christmas gifts - including presents for their unborn child, who's due on Christmas Day.

"They were the grinches who stole Christmas," said Corpus Christi police Lt. Robert MacDonald.

The burglars apparently entered Christian and Angel Heltz's apartment through a window Sunday, MacDonald said. They stole all the presents under the tree, including a pair of furry slippers Heltz had bought for his wife.

"We're not very rich," Heltz told the Corpus Christi Caller-Times. "I'm a cook and she was working special caterings so that she could buy things for me.'

Police found some of the gifts at a vacant house down the street from the couple's apartment. They arrested two men, ages 18 and 20, on suspicion of burglarizing the Heltz's home.

McDonald said police receive reports of stolen gifts every holiday season. He said families should resist the temptation to display presents around the Christmas tree and keep the curtains drawn

Heltz said someone stole a \$15 radio from his apartment about a month and a half ago, but he didn't report it because it didn't seem worth the hassle.

"This time my wife was crying and everything," he said. "I had to do something.'

Prosecutors fear more nudity on beaches

AUSTIN (AP) - State prosecutors say a man who had very little on poses a very large threat to public decency on Texas beach-

David Lacour, a 41-year-old state highway department worker from Kountze, was ticketed on a Gulf Coast beach in 1995 after a passerby complained to Jefferson County deputies that he was sunbathing nude.

Lacour said he was sitting in a lawn chair with a towel on his lap and reading a canoeing magazine when the witness drove by on the beach, which was off a closed road five miles from High Island

Lacour was convicted in a justice-of-the-peace court in Port Arthur. It took a while to seat a jury – the judge disqualified four women who had sunbathed nude on the same beach, the Texas Journal of the Wall Street Journal reported.

But'last month a state appeals court in Beaumont overturned his conviction 2-1. The court majority said Lacour wasn't breaking state decency laws because the beach is isolated and he was-

Holiday season looks gloomy for nation's retailers

NEW YORK (AP) - Many of the nation's retailers may be getting a lump of coal this Christmas.

Despite strong public optimism about the economy, retail analysts expect sales this holiday season to fall short of their predicted gain of 4 percent to 5 percent over last year.

Apparel sales are usually a mainstay for big department stores, but this year many people seem more interested sprucing up their homes than their wardrobes. And cheap computers and software are stealing kids away from toy stores. "This was a ho-hum holiday for many retailers, and it will not be the strong year that many people anticipated just a few months ago," said William Ford, senior economic advisor at TeleCheck, a check approval service that tracks sales by people using checks. Price, of course, is key to condecision making. sumer Retailers were helped by lower wholesale prices from suppliers in economically troubled Asian nations. Nonetheless, shoppers seem to

In January of 1875 the seven families pitched their tents just a mile from where the city of Rising Star is now. They decided to start their new life right there. Land was selling for one dollar an acre. Prime land brought three dollars an

Other families moved in and soon built a school and a church. Sipe Springs was the nearest post office and general store.

In 1881 the settlers decided they needed a post office of their own. They wanted to call the place Star, but that name was already taken by a village in Mills county. The residents decided that since it was a young, rising community, they would call it Rising Star.

Cotton was the principle cash crop. Soon there were gins in **Rising Star** named Blue Goose and Red Tiger. Rising Star became a thriving community with stores, barber shops, banks, a newspaper and black smith shop. The town was incorporated in 1903. The first

sis shifted from cotton to peanuts and soon there was a train called the Peanut Special traveling between DeLeon, Cross Plains and Rising Star. Oil arrived on the scene in 1917 and Ranger, Desdemona and Pioneer became boom towns. Ranger's population exploded from one thousand to more than 25,000. Rising Star's boom was not impressive, compared to the others, but the community did realize some paved streets, electricity and water and some new hotels and businesses houses.

Not far from Rising Star is Eastland, the county seat. In 1897 a courthouse was built. Someone put a horned frog inside the cornerstone. When a new courthouse was built 31 years later, the cornerstone was opened and the horned frog was flat as a pancake, but still alive. He is named "Old Rip" and rests in peace in a glass covered coffin in the lobby of the courthouse.

In 1927 a bank in Cisco was robbed by a man dressed as Santa Claus. Two men were killed during the robbery. The robber, Marshal Ratliff, was arrested and jailed. A crowd of about 1500 people took him out of the jail and hung him. It was the last mob lynching in Texas

Impeachment role will thrust chief justice into the spotlight

WASHINGTON (AP) - It's a short walk across the street from the Supreme Court to the Capitol, where Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist would preside over President Clinton's impeachment trial. But the trip will take him from the relative anonymity of the television-free court into millions of American living rooms.

Rehnquist would be only the second chief justice to preside over a presidential impeachment trial, but the first to comduct at least some of the proceedings on TV: While the high-profile trial

might mean he would no longer go virtually unnoticed on his daily strolls outside the Supreme Court building, many court watchers say he is a good

fit for the role. "He will run a very fair, efficient proceeding and he will not allow it to get out of control," said Washington lawyer Theodore Olson, who has often argued before the highest court.

Charles Cooper, a former law clerk to Rehnquist and a frequent advocate before the high court, predicted the chief justice would use his authority to keep an impeachment trial conservative members but is

"focused on the facts that are relevant and keep the extraneous or purely political stuff to a minimum."

Rehnquist is keeping his thoughts about an impeachment trial to himself. But at the court, he is known for his calm, gentlemanly manner and ability to run a tight ship.

The 74-year-old Rehnquist, nominated by President Nixon, joined the high court in 1972. He became the nation's 16th chief justice when promoted by President Reagan in 1986. He is one of the court's most

ideologies.

Rehnquist seemingly hates to waste time. He keeps oral arguments to a strict one-hour limit and has shortened the justices' private conferences. When a major snowstorm shut down most of Washington in January 1996, the chief justice kept the Supreme Court open for business.

At the Supreme Court, the chief justice acts as presiding officer and has one of nine votes. At a Senate impeachment trial, Rehnquist would have no vote and a limited role as pre-

well-liked by colleagues of all siding officer. He would rule on questions involving evidence and other incidental matters, but a simple majority vote of senators could override his judgment.

Rehnquist already is somewhat of an expert on impeachment.

His 1992 book, "Grand Inquests," detailed the 1868 Senate impeachment trial of President Andrew Johnson, presided over by Chief Justice Salmon Chase, and the 1805 ·impeachment trial of Supreme Court Justice Samuel Chase. acquitted. Both were

Rehnquist said in each case senators put aside partisan dif ferences to reach verdicts that confirmed the independence of the judicial and executive branches.

The trials established that "impeachment would not be a referendum on the public official's performance in office; instead, it would be a judicial type of inquiry," Rehnquist wrote. "It was not any technical violation of the law that would suffice, but it was the sort of violation of the law that would in itself justify removal from office."

Clinton directs his attention to the homeless

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

Israeli ambassador blames Palestinians for stalemate

WASHINGTON (AP) Israel's ambassador says the Palestinians are to blame for the delay in a pullback on the West Bank.

Insisting Israel had not raised new conditions, Ambassador Zalman Shoval said Tuesday that all Israel demands is Palestinian compliance with terms of the Wye River peace accords.


"Let us hope they will, so as not to miss another opportunity for peace." Shoval said at a gathering of American business leaders here.

 Infants, young children, older adults and people with weakened immune systems are most likely to become ill after eating contaminated foods.

To fight food-borne illness food safety experts recommend that we think about food safety at each step in the food-handling process from shopping to storing leftovers. Here are four simple steps to reduce the risk.

CLEAN: Wash hands, utensils and surfaces in hot, soapy water before and after food preparation; especially after preparing meat, poultry, eggs or seafood to protect adequately against bacteria. Using a disinfectant cleaner or mixture of bleach and water on surfaces, and antibacterial soap on hands, can provide some added protection. Be sure to rinse all utensils, surfaces and hands well. Be sure to use a clean dishcloth -- one that has been hanging around in the sink provides the perfect climate for bacteria.

SEPARATE: Keep raw meat, poultry, eggs and seafood and their juices away from readyto-eat foods. Never place cooked food on a plate that previously held raw meat, poultry, eggs or seafood.

COOK: Cook food to the proper internal temperature (this varies for the type of meat and poultry). It is wise to use a food thermometer to check for doneness. Cook eggs until the yolk and white are firm.

CHILL: Refrigerate or freeze perishables, prepared food and leftovers within two hours and make sure the refrigerator is set at no higher than 40 degrees F. and that the freezer unit is set at 0 degrees F.

Scientists estimate that each year, between 6.5 million and 33 million people suffer from the consequences of food borne illness, thinking they just have "stomach flu."

Roger Clemens withdraws trade demand, blasts Houston Astros longer demanding that the Toronto Blue Jays trade him. And if they do, he can refuse it

Clemens removed the demand Tuesday and also made it clear he would not play for the Houston Astros under their current management because of remarks they made in Nashville, Tenn., at baseball's winter meetings.

Clemens, the only five-time Cy Young Award winner, said he had no desire to play for Astros team president Tal Smith and general manager Gerry Hunsicker, who called a news conference during the winter meetings to blast Clemens' proposal for a \$27.4 million, one-year extension.

"I'm very upset about what Mr. Smith and Mr. Hunsicker said and how they directed things toward me as a person,' Clemens said at the offices of his agents.

"I don't know them personally and

SPRING (AP) - Roger Clemens is no they don't know me as a person," Clemens said of Smith and Hunsicker. "The disappointment I feel is that I have no interest in playing for two individuals like that who would make a statement like that and don't know me."

Clemens, who would have gotten \$43.5 million for the next three years if Houston had accepted his proposal, confirmed for the first time he had a written agreement with the Blue Jays allowing him to both demand and veto a trade.

He is guaranteed \$16.1 million in the final two years of his contract with Toronto and said he wouldn't ask for a renegotiation as part of a trade. He said he was walking away from an additional \$44 million in guaranteed money by staying with the Blue Jays - citing offers made by other teams willing to trade for him.

Clemens' decision didn't have much effect on Blue Jays general manager Gord Ash's agenda. He'll likely resume Clemens trade talks after the holiday break

"It doesn't mean much of anything if you ask me," Ash said in Toronto. "All it does is remove a lot of the clutter talk we've had the last couple of weeks and clarify their position.

Ash said Clemens' rights under the collective bargaining agreement, which allows veteran players dealt during multiyear contracts to file formal trade demands, would give the pitcher leverage over any deal.

"Any club that is going to give up talent of substance is going to want to know he'll be there beyond the year," Ash said

When Clemens signed with Toronto, Beeston agreed that the team would trade him if the pitcher became convinced the Blue Jays wouldn't contend. Clemens became disenchanted after

Investigations into biggest ethics scandal in Olympic history continue

NEW YORK (AP) ---Investigations into the biggest ethics scandal in Olympic history will be in progress when the IOC meets to deal with another pressing problem doping.

While the IOC expects to wrap up by Jan. 23 its own probe of alleged bribery in Salt Lake City's winning bid for the 2002 Winter Games, two other inquiries won't finish until after a worldwide drug summit set for Feb. 2-4.

The latest investigation started Tuesday, when the U.S. **Olympic Committee appointed** a five-member panel headed by former Senate majority leader George Mitchell.

Mitchell, who helped frame the Northern Ireland peace accords and is expected to play a key role in President Clinton's impeachment defense, said the panel would hold its first meeting next week and finish work by the end of February.

"We have to be thorough, but at the same time we have to do this promptly," Mitchell said. The Salt Lake Organizing Committee, meanwhile, said an investigation by its ethics board would report its findings

leading member said the dop-/ ing summit set for Lausanne, Switzerland, would not be delayed.

"That schedule will, not change," IOC vice president Anita DeFrantz said. "That affects the athletes, and the athletes are the most important thing."

Mitchell said the goal of his investigation was to ensure that future Olympics in the United States are as clean as fans and sponsors expect them to be.

"I believe the Olympic movement holds a special place in the hearts and minds of Americans and people around the world," he said. "We intend to investigate what happened in the past and make recommendations to assure that the selection of U.S. candidate cities for future Olympics is fair and above reproach.'

Third season no charm for ABL

PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP) - A pile of freshly typed paychecks sat on the front desk. A plastic bag full of homemade chocolate chip cookies and a wall covered with 1 bliday cards gave the

office a festive atmosphere. But those trappings did little to dispel the gloom in the offices of the American Basketball League a few days before Christmas.

.The nine-team ABL folded Tuesday, midway through its third season, unable to compete with the rival WNBA – which is backed by the money and marketing muscle of the NBA. As the league filed for bankruptcy protection, ABL franchises canceled their games and began drawing up plans for paying players and employees, and refunding ticket holders' money.

"I can definitely feel for people finding out they just lost a job. because that's obviously what happened," Nashville guard Michelle Marciniak said. 'We don't have practice. We don't have a game on Christmas Day. I have a calendar filled up 'til the spring. Now there's nothing.

The ABL had teams in Chicago; Columbus, Ohio; Hartford, Conn.; Denver: Nashville, Tenn.; Philadelphia, San Jose; Seattle; and Portland, Ore.

"At this point, the league is out of money," league cofounder and CEO Gary Cavalli said. "This is a sad day for our fans, employees, players and

coaches, and for women's basketball in general."

Cavalli said the ABL was unable to get the necessary TV exposure and sponsorship to survive.

"I am shocked. I never saw it coming," New England guard Jennifer Rizzotti said. "I am thankful for all of the loyal fans throughout this trying season. It's a shame this happened. I'm still trying to figure it out."

The ABL was launched in 1996, riding the enthusiasm of the gold medal-winning U.S. women's team at the Atlanta Olympics and the boom in women's college basketball. When the WNBA began play the following year, however, many began to wonder if two women's leagues could survive.

This year, the ABL hoped to take advantage of the NBA lockout, which has forced cancellation of at least half the season.

"I'm a little surprised about the timing of it," said forward Katie Smith of the Columbus Quest, which won the league's two championships. She plans to play with a national team this summer and then look into joining the WNBA.

Players, some of whom chose the ABL because it offered higher salaries than the WNBA. were informed of the shutdown when they called , the league office.

"We have closed our entire operation," a recorded message said. "The league is currently working on a plan to ensure that you'll be paid as much of

your salary as possible for the month of December. This plan is subject to court approval."

Seattle's Kate Starbird, whose signing two years ago was a major coup for the fledgling league in its battle against the WNBA, had practical concerns,

"I talked to my sister at work," Starbird said. "She's got 20 tickets that I think I have to reimburse her for the next game.'

The league's board of directors decided late Monday night to suspend the rest of the 1998-99 season that began in early November and file a Chapter 11 bankruptcy petition, leading to the league's liquidation.

At the office of the Chicago Condors, a woman who answered the phone refused to take a message.

"I don't think you understand, we no longer have jobs," she said, then hung up.

Though ABL attendance increased 23 percent last season to 4.333 per game and the league's TV ads this fall offered it as an alternative to hoops fans dismayed by the NBA lockout, it could not compete with the WNBA — which averaged 10,869 fans a game last season.

The WNBA, which has 10 teams in cities that also have NBA franchises, plays from June to August. The ABL played in the fall and winter.

"This is an unfortunate setback for the women's sports movement," WNBA president



Clemens removed the demand Tuesday and also made it clear he would not play for the Houston Astros under their current management because of remarks they made in Nashville, Tenn., at baseball's winter meetings.

Clemens, the only five-time Cy Young Award winner, said he had no desire to play for Astros team president Tal Smith and general manager Gerry Hunsicker, who called a news conference during the winter meetings to blast Clemens' proposal for a \$27.4 million, one-year extension.

"I'm very upset about what Mr. Smith and Mr. Hunsicker said and how they directed things toward me as a person,' Clemens said at the offices of his agents.

"I don't know them personally and

they don't know me as a person," Clemens said of Smith and Hunsicker. "The disappointment I feel is that I have no interest in playing for two individuals like that who would make a statement like that and don't know me."

Clemens, who would have gotten \$43.5 million for the next three years if Houston had accepted his proposal, confirmed for the first time he had a written agreement with the Blue Jays allowing him to both demand and veto a trade.

He is guaranteed \$16.1 million in the final two years of his contract with Toronto and said he wouldn't ask for a renegotiation as part of a trade. He said he was walking away from an additional \$44 million in guaranteed money by staying with the Blue Jays - citing offers made by other teams willing to trade for him

"It doesn't mean much of anything if you ask me," Ash said in Toronto. "All it does is remove a lot of the clutter talk we've had the last couple of weeks and clarify their position."

Ash said Clemens' rights under the collective bargaining agreement, which allows veteran players dealt during multiyear contracts to file formal trade demands, would give the pitcher leverage over any deal.

"Any club that is going to give up talent of substance is going to want to know he'll be there beyond the year," Ash said.

When Clemens signed with Toronto, Beeston agreed that the team would trade him if the pitcher became convinced the Blue Jays wouldn't contend. Clemens became disenchanted after

Gord Ash's agenda. He'll likely resume Interbrew SA, the team's Belgian owner, set a budget with a payroll of about \$40 million, and Toronto made little effort to re-sign Jose Canseco, who went to Tampa Bay.

Investigations into biggest ethics scandal in Olympic history continue

YORK (AP) NEW Investigations into the biggest ethics scandal in Olympic history will be in progress when the IOC meets to deal with another pressing problem --

doping. While the IOC expects to wrap up by Jan. 23 its own probe of alleged bribery in Salt Lake City's winning bid for the 2002 Winter Games, two other inquiries won't finish until after a worldwide drug summit set for Feb. 2-4.

The latest investigation started Tuesday, when the U.S. Olympic Committee appointed a five-member panel headed by former Senate majority leader George Mitchell.

Mitchell, who helped frame the Northern Ireland peace accords and is expected to play a key role in President Clinton's impeachment defense, said the panel would hold its first meeting next week and finish work by the end of February.

"We have to be thorough, but at the same time we have to do this promptly," Mitchell said. The Salt Lake Organizing Committee, meanwhile, said an investigation by its ethics board would report its findings at a Feb. 11 meeting. "All we need to do is determine what happened, at whose hand, and why," said Gordon Hall, a former Utah Supreme Court justice who heads the SLOC probe. "I don't envision that it will take a long time to do that."

Third season no charm for ABL

PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP) - Apile of freshly typed paychecks sat on the front desk. A plastic bag full of homemade chocolate chip cookies and a wall covered with holiday cards gave the office a festive atmosphere.

But those trappings did little to dispel the gloom in the offices of the American Basketball League a few days before Christmas.

The nine-team ABL folded Tuesday, midway through its third season, unable to compete with the rival WNBA – which is backed by the money and marketing muscle of the NBA.

As the league filed for bankruptcy protection, ABL franchises canceled their games and began drawing up plans for paying players and employees, and refunding ticket holders' money

"I can definitely feel for people finding out they just lost a job, because that's obviously what happened," Nashville guard Michelle Marciniak said. 'We don't have practice. We don't have a game on Christmas Day. I have a calendar filled up 'til the spring. Now there's nothing.'

The ABL had teams in. Chicago; Columbus, Ohio; Hartford, Conn.; Denver: Nashville, Tenn.; Philadelphia, San Jose; Seattle; and Portland, Ore.

"At this point, the league is out of money," league cofounder and CEO Gary Cavalli said. "This is a sad day for our fans, employees, players and coaches, and for women's basketball in general. Cavalli said the ABL was

unable to get the necessary TV exposure and sponsorship to survive.

"I am shocked. I never saw it coming," New England guard Jennifer Rizzotti said. "I am thankful for all of the loyal fans throughout this trying season. It's a shame this happened. I'm still trying to figure it out."

The ABL was launched in 1996, riding the enthusiasm of the gold medal-winning U.S. women's team at the Atlanta Olympics and the boom in women's college basketball. When the WNBA began play the following year, however, many began to wonder if two women's leagues could survive.

This year, the ABL hoped to take advantage of the NBA lockout, which has forced cancellation of at least half the season.

"I'm a little surprised about the timing of it," said forward Katie Smith of the Columbus Quest, which won the league's two championships. She plans to play with a national team this summer and then look into joining the WNBA.

Players, some of whom chose the ABL because it offered higher salaries than the WNBA, were informed of the shutdown when they called the league office.

"We have closed our entire operation." a recorded message said. "The league is currently working on a plan to ensure that you'll be paid as much of

your salary as possible for the month of December. This plan is subject to court approval."

Seattle's Kate Starbird, whose signing two years ago was a major coup for the fledgling league in its battle against the WNBA, had practical concerns, "I talked to my sister at work," Starbird said. "She's got 20 tickets that I think I have to reimburse her for the next game.'

The league's board of directors decided late Monday night to suspend the rest of the 1998-99 season that began in early November and file a Chapter 11 bankruptcy petition, leading to the league's liquidation.

At the office of the Chicago Condors, a woman who answered the phone refused to take a message.

"I don't think you understand, we no longer have jobs," she said, then hung up.

Though ABL attendance increased 23 percent last season to 4,333 per game and the league's TV ads this fall offered it as an alternative to hoops fans dismayed by the NBA lockout, it could not compete with the WNBA - which averaged 10,869 fans a game last season. The WNBA, which has 10

teams in cities that also have NBA franchises, plays from June to August. The ABL played in the fall and winter. "This is an unfortunate set-

back for the women's sports movement," WNBA president
