## Aggressive breast cancer gene identified

 the onset of the deadlies form of breast cancer has New Hampshire scien tists who say their discovery paves the way for screeniapies.
The protein is found in tumor specimens of an aggressive form of breast cancer that often carries an extremely poor progDartmouth Medical School say the protein a biomarker they've named nestin - signifies the presence of a difficult-
to-treat malignancy called to-treat malignancy called cancer.
"These patients are at very high risk of recurrence," said James DiRenzo, a Dartmouth
assistant pharmacology involved in the research. This form of cancer, he added, is note worthy for the presence of stem cells, which are believed to play a role in
the cancer's unruly behavior.
The cancer is more common in younger women and is most prevalent in premenopausal black
women, DiRenzo said women, DiRenzo said
Discovering nestin's link to the cancer marks the first time anyone has been able to find a signpost for the disease. Indeed, nestin was disDiRenzo said.
