

# Deadline arrives to pay property taxes

As many area residents turn their attention to their Federal tax returns, the end of January could spell penalties and interest for many local property owners.

The deadline to pay 2006 Howard County property taxes is today, according to County Tax Assessor Kathy Sayles, and for those that don't make or are busy and we have a steady

"Once the taxes go delinquent in February, the penalties and interest start at 7 percent and increases each month," said Sayles. "As of July 1, penalty and interest grows to 18 percent, with an additional penalty tacked on for attorney fees. "This is a very busy time for

An electrical arc fueled a grass fire that consumed more than 500 acres just west of Big Spring Tuesday afternoon.

No injuries were reported in the blaze, which started around 3 p.m. Tuesday in the vicinity of State Highway 176 and FM 2599.

"We're figuring the fire started when an electrical line arced in the field there," said Tommy Sullivan, chief of Sullivan

The Texas prison system is already one of the largest in the country with almost 152,000 inmates costing about \$2.5 billion per year.

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

One reason for the prison population explosion is tougher sentencing laws, which give judges few alternatives to incarceration, Fabelo said.

The state saw a massive prison buildup in the early 1990s and has added 13,000 more beds since 1997. At the current rate of incarceration, the state will have about 168,000 prisoners creating a space shortage of almost 17,000 beds.

According to Fabelo, felony convictions in Texas are up 29 percent since 2000 even while the state's violent crime rate dropped each year but one between 2000-2005.

Sen. John Whitmire, D-Houston, chairman of the Senate panel, has urged lawmakers to consider other options for low-level drug offenders and lowrisk parole violators.

According to Whitmire: • The state has 1,900 inmates already approved for parole upon completion of an alcohol or drug treatment program but must wait up to a year to get in one.

· About 700 have been approved for parole are still waiting to be released because there's no room in halfway houses or other facilities.

 Another 1,500 inmates on drunken driving charges are waiting to get



in treatment programs.

• In 2006, the state revoked probation or parole for 12,000 inmates on what he classified as "minor" violations, such as failing a drug test while awaiting entry to a treatment program, failure to hold a job or nonpayment of court-ordered fees.

Spending money on more halfway houses and treatment programs would help, Whitmire said.

Whitmire said such proposals involve only nonviolent offenders.

"We're not dealing with sex offenders. We're not dealing with dangerous offenders," Whitmire said. "We're dealing with low-level, primarily drug offenders.'

Gov. David Lt. Dewhurst, who presides over the Senate, said he supports' building new prisons as well as some of the reform ideas.

"We can do our rehabilitation and our parole better than we do," Dewhurst said, adding that he believes projected population growth alone will create a need for more prison space.

He would not say Tuesday how many new prison beds he thinks are needed.

"We've got bad people we need to get in prison so they don't harm someone," Dewhurst said.

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

# Few leaders on immigration reform

ontrary to the wishful thinking of immigrant rights advocates who applauded President Bush's vague words on immigration reform during his State of the Union speech, I'm not impressed.

He said he wants a guest workers' program and comprehensive immigration reform.

That's nothing new. He has been spewing that tired rhetoric for years.

As usual, the president was short on specifics, and even shorter on leadership. Had he addressed

the extremists in his own party and told them they must contain their mean-spirited sentiments and

accept a legalization plan for illegal immigrants, he would have really deserved praise for demonstrating rare leadership on this issue.

But, as usual, the president tried to please both sides of the debate. "We need to resolve the status of

the illegal immigrants who are already in our country, without animosity and without amnesty," Bush said.

But no one is asking for outright amnesty for illegal immigrants. Immigrant advocates want a legalization plan that would require these people to earn the right to stay here legally — by working, paying back taxes, staying out of trouble, learning English and paying a fine for entering the country illegally.

But - as if to feed the GOP xenophobic wolves — Bush keeps using the word "amnesty.

Even if immigrants were seeking a reprieve, when did "amnesty" become a four-letter word?

Yet some immigrant advocates were elated by Bush's speech, especially since-it-was delivered to a Democratic-majority Congress that is supposed to be more willing to pass true immigration reform.

But are they?

In his Democratic response to the State of the Union, Virginia Sen. Jim Webb mentioned most of the major issues confronting America today — except immigration!

Mind you, this was the spokesman for the party that regained its majority because in the midterm elections, seven of every 10 Latinos voted for Democrats.

Although Democrats included immigration reform in the Senate's list of top-10 priorities, the issue was left out of the House priorities for the first 100 hours of the new Congress.

If fact, instead of taking a leadership position now that they have the majority, some Democrats are still trying to blame Republicans for the lack of progress on immigration reform in Congress.


Some House Democrats, clearly playing politics with this issue, now say that the burden is on Bush to deliver Republican support for comprehensive immigration reform.

Those Democrats, who pretended to be the champions of immigrants before the midterm elections, are now saying that, by themselves, they are not willing to assume responsibility for a politically sensitive plan.

Some are even saying that as "a prerequisite" for their support, the reform has to be bipartisan, with the support of at least 50 to 60 House Republicans.

But, in fact, the burden is on Democrats. They are now in the leadership position and it is up to them to pass legislation or pay political penalties. Democrats cannot assume they can continue to take the Latino vote for granted.

If Latinos conclude that Democrats used them in 2006, the pendulum could take a swing in the 2008 election, especially if Republicans stop voicing their



Of course, some Republicans who thrive on racial and ethnic intolerance won't be able to shut up. The Democrats are counting on immigrant-bashing Republicans like Rep. Tom Tancredo to run for president and hand them the Latino vote on a silver platter.

While Tancredo's presidential bid may be great for Democrats, it can't be very good for illegal immigrants — not because he will sway many Americans with his draconian ideas, but because it will make Democrats believe they can win the Latino vote by default.

In his most recent outburst, Tancredo came out against racial and ethnic caucuses in Congress. He said that if we are striving for a colorblind society, these caucuses should be obsolete. Of course, coming from a man who is clearly not colorblind, the charge is cynical, hypocritical and repulsive.

Yet he does have one attribute many others lack: He doesn't pull his punches. In a sick way, he shows more leadership than the president and many Democrats.

On immigration reform, there are few outspoken leaders - and most are on the wrong side.

There are exceptions, of course. Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., was eloquent as he recently appealed to his colleagues "to put aside the mean-spiritedness and short-sighted policies driven by fear and recognize the dignity of those whose work contributes to reinvigorating America."

That's the kind of language and leadership that was missing from both the State of the Union speech and the Democratic rebuttal.

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# What's the fascination with ice?

ne of the most enjoyable times I had over the holidays was when our family went to see the ice sculptures at the Gaylord in

Grapevine. A 14,000 square foot freezer was created to keep temperature around 19 degrees so the bigger than life-size sculptures wouldn't melt. Forty ice artisans from Harbin, China were called in to spend 34 days creating the wagons, horses and manger scenes from two million pounds of ice.

We were given parkas to wear during the time we were viewing the unique exhibit. There was even an ice slide that most of the guests experienced. Five thousand ice blocks were hand-carved and transformed into a winter wonderland. Three different types of ice were used: clear, glass-like crystal ice, white ice that looked like compacted snow and colored ice which was dyed brilliant colors. Fourteen hundred lights frozen within the

ice created a dazzling display. We were all amazed. The hot chocolate and cookies we had after turning in our parkas were warm and welcome.

It just occurred to me that there's a lot of ice stuff going on. When we were in Queenstown, New Zealand one evening in December (summer over there). I noticed a room full of people wearing fur-lined parkas, boots and gloves. They were preparing to go into a nightclub named Minus Five Degrees. For \$30, you can head inside the bar, which is made of ice and drink vodka from glasses also made of ice and sit on ice chairs and place your glass on ice tables and admire the ice sculptures.

Patrons are only allowed to stay for 30 minutes. They wear timers to let them know when their halfhour is up. Even the bar staff only works in rotating one-hour shifts. One person who emerged from the bar said you wouldn't go to Minus Five for a night out. You should treat it like a ride on a roller coaster, something that only lasts a short time but is very memorable. What's cooler than being

cool?

I thought this might be a one-ofa-kind thing, but I found out there are several ice bars around the world. Sydney and Auckland both have Minus Fives, so do Paris, London and Tokyo. Beverly Hills and Las Vegas both have what they call Vodka Freezers and Manhattan has a long bar made of ice.

Quebec City has an ice hotel (or Hotel de Glace, as it's called in French). Everything is made of snow or ice, including the walls and roof. Transparent crystal columns and soaring archways don't take away the fact that a night there is an experiment in sub-freezing survival. If you feel chilled, you can soak in the hot tub before climbing into your sleeping bag. There is a permanent structure with central heat, bathrooms and a fireplace.

The hotel has been there six winters. For the past five years it has been frozen in place in the Station touristique Duchesnay, a forest reserve 30 minutes west of Quebec. It has 34 rooms and can accommodate 84 guests. Nobody stays a second night.

Miller is a crucial witness against Libby in his perjury and obstruction trial. She says she had two conversations about CIA operative Valerie Plame in mid-2003 with Libby, who was Vice President Dick Cheney's chief of staff. Those conversations are at the heart of the trial because they allegedly occurred well before Libby says he learned Plame's identity from another reporter.

Libby's defense strategy revolves around showing jurors that he didn't lie about his conversations with Miller and others, but simply forgot them. If defense attorneys can cast doubt on Miller's memory and her story, it would bolster Libby's case.

During a sometimes heated cross-examination Wednesday, defense attorneys pressed Miller to acknowledge that she might have heard about Plame elsewhere. In mid-2003, Miller was investigating allegations by Plame's husband, former Ambassador Joseph Wilson, that the Bush administration ignored certain prewar intelli-

### Bush aims at executive salaries in speech today

NEW YORK (AP) -President Bush took aim today at huge salaries and bonuses for corporate executives, going to Wall Street to say compensapackages should tion hinge on how good a job a CEO does for the shareholders.

Bush came to New York to highlight optimistic news about the economy and to bring his economic message out of the shadows of the Iraq war. Shortly before he spoke, the government reported the economy grew at a faster-than-expected 3.5 percent pace in the final quarter of last year.

The president also was acknowledging the anger of Americans at stories about the enormous salaries and other perks for CEOs.

'Government should not decide compensation for America's corporate executives," the White House said in a report ahead of Bush's speech. "But the salaries and bonuses of CEOs should be based on their success at improving their companies and building value for their shareholders."

The White House statement appeared aimed in part at legislation that Rep. Barney Frank, D-Mass., chairman of the House Financial Services Committee, has said he will push, requiring shareholder approval of executive compensation plans. Huge salaries and other perks for CEO have drawn ire from investors and made splashy headlines. Home Depot chief executive Bob Nardelli was earning an average of \$25.7 million a year excluding stock options -before he was forced out in a furor over his hefty pay. He left with a severance package worth about \$210 million. In 2001, General Electric Co. paid chief executive Jack Welch \$16.25 million. Welch was replaced that year with Jeffrey Immelt, who earned \$3.4

### U.S. astronauts start first of 3 spacewalks

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) – Astronauts Michael Lopez-Alegria and Sunita Williams started the first of three spacewalks over a nineday period outside the international space station Wednesday.

U.S. astronauts have never attempted three spacewalks in such a short period without a space shuttle docked at the station.

The astronauts plan to connect ammonia loops that keep the U.S. lab cooled from a temporary to a permanent system, and to jettison a sun thermal shade and shrouds during their three trips outside the sta-Besides tion. Wednesday's trip, spacewalks are planned for Sunday and the following Thursday.

If the spacewalks go as planned, Lopez-Alegria would have little time to rest before going on a fourth spacewalk set for late February.

It's not uncommon for U.S. astronauts to conduct three spacewalks over a short period of time during a visit by a space shuttle to the station four were carried out during Discovery's trip in December.

The extra astronauts are handy for helping the spacewalkers prepare their spacesuits and the airlock, and for operating robotic arms on the station and shuttle to provide camera views or

"They were run through our databases. No derogatory information came back," he said.

### Ex-border agent wants job back after being cleared

McALLEN (AP) - A former U.S. Border Patrol agent who was convicted in 2001 of violating an illegal immigrant's civil rights during a fight has been cleared of the crime in a second trial.

Sipe requested a new trial on the grounds that prosecutors suppressed evidence that would have helped his defense.

WASHINGTON (AP) -Trying to tighten the federal budget, the Bush administration on Wednesday proposed to reduce farm payments \$18 billion over the next five years.

Agriculture Secretary Mike Johanns is not seeking major changes in the nation's farm subsidy program, which major farm groups and lawmakers in Congress want to retain. However, the adminis-

tration is seeking to eliminate farm payments for wealthy producers and to limit subsidies to those who make less than \$200,000 in adjusted gross income annually. The current income cap is \$2.5 million.





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# Why not check this out ... at the county library

as prolifically as cotton, conservatives and windstorms. While nobody questions where the conservatives come from in a city that a

MCCRIGHT recent nonpartisan study ranked as

America's second most conservative, many people wonder why Lubbock is such fertile ground for creative spirits who want to expand the boundaries of thought in music and art.

HOLLIS

Is it just that "there's nothing else to do," as some have suggested, or is there something in the character of Lubbock that encourages creativity as much as conservatism? In this book, Christopher Oglesby interviews 25 musicians and artists with ties to Lubbock to discover what it is about this community and West Texas in general that feeds the creative spirit. Their answers are revealing. As a whole, the interviews create a portrait not only of Lubbock's

musicians and artists, but also of the musical community that has sustained them, including venues such as the legendary Cotton Club and the original Stubb's Barbecue.

"The Texas Sheriff: Lord of the County Line" (363.282 SIT T) by Thad Sitton is an entertaining history of the sheriff's office in the state of Texas. Serving as county sheriff is very different than it was in the 1800s, 1900s and even today. This is a very interesting take on how sheriffs enforced the law of the county and how the county commissioners, county judge and grand jury tried to control the workings of the office. In the epilogue, Sitton writes that many "oldtime" sheriffs retired in the late 70s because that is when the Commission on Jail Standards began to supervise and regulate how the county jail could be run. A few books in Large

While there may have been some fat, now the meat is being cut. In 2003, the state terminated the Texas Library Connection, thereby depriving schools access to important databases. The library community is working toward reestablishing funding to secure K-12 databases for the students of Texas. By

spending \$2.5 million per year, databases that would cost millions if bought individually by school districts, can be purchased. In essence, the \$2.5 million purchases \$10 million of databases.

Did you know that there are 554 public libraries in the state of **Texas?** Most are funded via local tax revenue. In counties where the tax base is low, libraries may only receive enough money to stay open 10 to 20 hours a week. They sometimes must choose between paying the electric bill instead of purchasing materials for patrons to enjoy. These libraries in many instances are the only place to make copies, fax an item or access the Internet.

Please write, call, email or fax Rep. Heflin and Sen. Seliger to support TSLAC's exceptional item request for the LoanStar program, which directs state aid to libraries. By reinstating the \$1.3 million and increasing program funding for an additional request of \$11.6 million, many libraries will be able to purchased needed reference materials, beef up their collections and support schools in educating the children of Texas.

While these numbers sound like it will be a windfall, please note that among state funding for libraries, Texas ranks among the lowest. I always said that I was grateful for Mississippi,

because Texas usually did spend more. However, Mississippi funds their libraries higher than Texas!

I could go on forever in speaking of the importance of libraries but space is growing short. Please feel free to stop by and I would be glad to visit with you on how you can support your public, academic and school libraries.

Howard County Library hours are 9 to 6, Monday to Friday and Saturday, 9 until 5. The Internet/Video room closes one-half hour before closing. The Library is located at 500 S. Main St. In case of bad weather, it is always a good idea to call to see if we are open. Our general policy is this: if the school districts open at 10, the Library will open then. 

# Mavericks sink SuperSonics Bonds gets his payday with Giants

Nowitzki was off his best 17 and Devin Harris' game and Josh Howard was out for the birth of his first child, so Austin Croshere had to pick up the slack for the Dallas Mavericks.

Croshere had a careerhigh 34 points and seven rebounds as the Mavericks beat the Seattle SuperSonics 122-102 on Tuesday night, stretching their home winning streak to 14 games.

Dallas is two wins shy of the franchise record for consecutive home wins, set last season.

Croshere, who began the night averaging 2.9 points per game, played 24 minutes as a reserve in Howard's absence after scoring in double figures only twice in his first 21 games this season.

Acquired in an offseason trade with the Indiana Pacers, Croshere went 11-for-14 from the field, including 7-of-10 from 3-point range, and finished tied for 12th in franchise history for bench points.

"With Josh not here, I had a chance to get in early," Croshere said. "I was just trying to stay ready for the opportunity to play. I got the chance and I played well."

DALLAS (AP) - Dirk Greg Buckner's season-16 helped the Mavericks set a season high for points and beat the Sonics for the ninth straight time.

> Ray Allen had 35 points, 19 in the first half, for Seattle, which tied a single-season club record with its 13th consecutive road defeat. Nick Collison and Earl Watson both had 15 points for the Sonics.

Croshere, who set a career-high for 3-pointers, had his previous careerhigh of 32 points for the Pacers in a game against the Mavericks on Feb. 5, 2002.

Howard is Dallas' second-leading scorer (19.4 points per game) and third-leading rebounder (7.2). Minus Howard, the Mavericks needed more minutes from Croshere, who didn't see any action the previous four games. Croshere had a total of 15 points in the first four games he played in January.

Croshere can't wait to meet and thank Howard's child for the playing time.

"I'm going to give the kid high-five," Croshere said with a laugh.

Nowitzki, who started the night averaging 25.3 points and 9.6 rebounds, finished with 15 points. Nowitzki was 3-for-12

from the field.

But Dallas got a seasonhigh 63 points off the bench led by Croshere and Buckner.

"It was a great night for Cro," Dallas' Jerry Stackhouse said. "Everybody's been pulling for him. He's been very supportive of us. Cro was our MVP tonight."

Croshere capped a 13-4 run spanning the late third and early fourth quarters with a threepoint play and a 3-pointer on consecutive possessions to give Dallas a 91-82 lead with 10:37 left.

Croshere added another 3 with 7:54 left to stretch the Mavericks' lead 100-

Dallas took a 66-54 halftime lead with its highest scoring half this season.

Seattle rallied to tie twice in the third quarter before fading down the stretch.

'We really pressed them," Sonics coach Bob Hill said. "It was a fivepoint game but we couldn't sustain it in the fourth quarter."

Hill said he wasn't surprised at Croshere's big game.

"He's capable of doing what he did," Hill said. "That's how their team is made up. He's paid to do that."

SAN FRANCISCO -Barry Bonds never wanted to leave the Giants. They have been his team for more than a decade. They were the team of his late father and also his godfather, Hall of Famer Willie Mays. After nearly two months

of negotiations, Bonds finally has his new deal to stay put right where he believes he belongs.

and San Bonds Francisco completed a \$15.8 million, one-year contract Monday night after the slugger spent hours at the ballpark being examined by team doctors.

The club announced the deal, which took significant time to finish after the sides agreed on financial terms Dec. 7 on the last day of baseball's winter meetings.

Now, the 42-year-old Bonds can focus on the upcoming season. He has 734 home runs, 22 from breaking Hank Aaron's career record, and he plans to play beyond this year if he fails to set the mark in 2007.

"I think I'll be around until I'm 100, or at least try to," Bonds said.

Before the contract was completed, Bonds had to pass a physical and the parties had to work out complicated language regarding his behavior and what would happen if he were to be indicted.

A federal grand jury is investigating whether Bonds perjured himself when he testified in 2003 in the Bay Area Laboratory Co-Operative steroid distribution case that he hadn't knowingly taken any performanceenhancing drugs.

"I knew things would work out. This is where I always wanted to play and always loved to play,' Bonds said. "The city of San Francisco is what I love. The people of San Francisco are who I love. There's no better place for me to be. This is my history. The people in San Francisco deserve it all." On a conference call late Monday night, Bonds was asked why it took so long for his contract to be completed.

"I was on a skiing vacation," he said, laughing. "It didn't take any time. It's normal procedure." As part of the deal, Bonds' trainers — Harvey Shields and Greg Oliver – will no longer be allowed in the clubhouse, where they previously had their own lockers next to Bonds' space. "I have no problems

"(Oliver) and Harvey will be with me, just outside the ballpark."

Shields and Oliver will no, longer be on the Giants' payroll and they won't be permitted in restricted areas in any big league ballpark. If they were to make road trips, it would be on Bonds' dime or their own, two baseball officials said, speaking on condition of anonymity because of the sensitive nature of such details in the contract.


Bonds, who traveled to the Bay Area from his offseason home in Southern California, underwent Xrays and many other tests from multiple team doctors Monday.

The seven-time NL MVP waved and smiled as he left the stadium and then quickly drove away, with agent Jeff Borris in the passenger seat.

Bonds can earn another \$4.2 million in performance bonuses \$500,000 for 250 plate appearances, \$1 million each for 300, 375 and 450, and \$700,000 for 525.

"I'm very excited and very happy we got it all done," Bonds said. "I'm just glad to be on the team and glad things worked out. I think we should be

After missing all but 14 games in 2005 following three operations on his right knee, Bonds batted .270 with 26 homers and 77 RBIs and drew 115 walks last year. He passed Babe Ruth to move into second place on the career home run list May 28.

Dear Dead: You seem pretty sure there's "a collection." He may not have kept a thing. In any case, do not make the first move. This woman may never get in touch with you.


