Plug pulled for now on BSISD laptop proposal

Big Spring school trustees decided the time is not quite right to pull the trigger on a million-dollar laptop program from students at Big Spring High School.

Trustees postponed plans to purchase laptops for BSHS teachers and students, putting off a decision on the \$1.4 million plan until at least March.

In the interim, school officials will conduct a survey of parents of high school students to get their opinions on the proposal, while Principal Mike Ritchey and others from the high school conduct a tour of districts that already supply laptops to students to see how well the program works.

Big kids have way at local bee

The big kids had their day at the Big Spring Independent School District Spelling Bee Thursday.

After years of the event being dominated by entrants from local elementary schools, students from the larger local campuses proved themselves as the class of the competition Thursday.

And Michael Akin of Goliad Intermediate was the class of that class.

Akin, a fifth-grader, held off a determined challenge from Big Spring Junior High School's Blake Brorman over nine rounds to capture the local title and advance to the regional spelling bee in Lubbock March 9. The winner there advances to the national bee in Washington D.C.

Elementary school entrants had dominated earlier BSISD bees, but that was not the case Thursday. By the end of three rounds, a combination of difficult words and jittery nerves had eliminated the younger contestants, leaving the stage to Akin

Legislation would increase PE requirements

Lawmakers call for more physical education in Texas schools to combat obesity

AUSTIN (AP) - A week after President Bush called childhood obesity a costly problem for the country, two lawmakers are calling for more physical education in Texas schools to help combat obesity related diseases like diabetes.

moderate to vigorous daily activity for all students in kindergarten through eighth grade for at least 30 minutes a

"More than a third of our students in Texas are overweight, putting them at higher risk for numerous chronic diseases

Their proposal would require including heart disease," said Sen. Jane Nelson, a Republican from Lewisville, who is leading the effort in the Senate. "We are seeing in adolescents the types of diabetes that we used to only see in the middle aged."

The legislation would require a physical fitness assessment of all public school students at the

beginning and end of each school year and reported to the Texas Education Agency, with students' names made anonymous. The TEA would be required to analyze the results by school district annually, comparing results to students' grades, attendance, obesity, disciplinary problems and school

Current law requires 30 minutes of physical activity per day or 135 minutes per week for children up to the sixth grade. But some critics say that no checks are in place and schools have too much wiggle room to





Southern Baptists on defensive

ormer presidents Bill Clinton and Jimmy Carter; Paige Patterson, president of Southwestern Theological Seminary in Fort Worth; and I have something in common. We're all Southern Baptists.

The fine print on what it means to be a Southern Baptist keeps evolving. Faith, and its expression, should be inclusive, welcoming all. But the Southern **Baptist Convention is** instead creating more ways to eliminate those who disagree with its conservative theology, and its politics, on behalf of the Republican

The denomination keeps adding exception and exclusion clauses to its membership contract, redefining the image and tossing out members who don't meet the new criteria.

It appears some people just aren't holy enough, spiritually, or good enough, politically, anymore for SBC membership.

Chief among the apostates are Clinton, for his sexual indiscretions while in office, and probably Carter, whose views have shifted left of political center since he left office and who disavowed his SBC membership in 2000. That group also encompasses anyone who dares disagrees with Patterson's fundamentalist Biblical worldview, which includes me.

And it includes Sheri Klouda, whose unpardonable, unforgivable sin, according to the SBC, is she was born the wrong gender - as

in she's not a man — not that she had any say in which chromosomes she got. Klouda is a woman, much to the chagrin of the current powers-that-be at Southwestern seminary, who recently gave her the Texas boot and an "Adios, Partner," out the door. Kouda taught Hebrew at the seminary since 2002 — to women and men until it denied her tenure, presumably because of her gender.

Did seminary officials just have a revelation from a higher being that Klouda is a woman?

The apostle Paul wrote in the book of I Timothy in the Bible, "But I do not allow a woman to teach or exercise authority over a man, but to remain quiet." SBC leaders — the men folk —interpret that verse literally, and every other way conceivably that guarantees their control of the denomination's 16 million members.

It's heresy in the SBC for women to teach men, or to be pastors to "lord over" men. It ain't-goingto-happen, not with the tight menonly cadre at the top, or not until Jesus Christ returns to earth to repreach his gender equity message as a reminder to the same. No chance of women ripping that veil in two to penetrate the SBC leadership.

Logic will not reclaim Klouda's job (although a lawsuit damage award might help assuage her for the loss of it) nor will it change SBC denominational views on women in leadership.

Logic says that gender does not impact intelligence. Logic says that gender does not affect job performance or capability. Logic says women should not be excluded from professional positions seminary professor or pastor —

solely because of gender. But Southwestern's leadership also has the privilege as a private institution - even if they are errant about Biblical inerrancy - to exclude women professors from its school of theology. Patterson is the decider.

SBC heretics could argue theology with Patterson and other Southern Baptist elitists, only to be told how and why we are wrong.

Or we could follow Clinton and Carter's lead, and find an alternate path to express our faith.

The former presidents recently joined together to create the "New Baptist Covenant," a coalition of small and medium-sized churches, both African-American and white with an approximate membership of 20 million — to offset the religious, social and political influence of the SBC.


The coalition will put faith in action - some feet on the street, not just theologians in the ivory tower — working on social justice and public policy issues, including poverty, environment and immigration.

Faith should be expressed with works, not arguments about words, and faith shouldn't be used as a weapon to discriminate against women.



depressants. On Thursday, authorities say, a private nurse found Smith unconscious in her room at the Seminole Hard Rock Hotel and Casino and called 911. A bodyguard performed CPR, Seminole Police Chief Charlie Tiger said, but Smith was declared dead at a hospi-

Later Thursday, two sheriff's deputies carried out at least eight brown paper bags sealed with red evidence tape from Smith's hotel room.

Edwina Johnson, chief investigator for the **Broward County Medical** Examiner's Office, said the cause of death was under investigation and an autopsy would be conducted Friday.

If Smith died of natural causes, the findings will likely be announced quickly, but definitive results could take weeks, said Dr. Jose Perper, who was to perform the autop-

Smith's son's death in the Bahamas on Dec. 10 came just a few days after she gave birth to a daughter, Dannielynn, whose custody remains in dispute.

Senators push for more BRAC funding in spending bill

WASHINGTON (AP) -Texas' senators pressed Thursday for more money in a sweeping spending bill to pay for the restructuring of military bases, but Democrats said additional money would come next month.

Sens. Kay Bailey Hutchison and John Cornyn, both Republicans, wanted to add \$3.1 billion to the spending bill. Democrats were resisting amendments to the bill because of a looming deadline for funding the federal government.

The senators predicted delays in the six-year plan to restructure military bases and economic consequences for communities wanting to develop bases closed in the latest round of Base Closure Realignment Commission hearings in

More lawmakers ask Perry to rescind order

AUSTIN (AP) — Thirtytwo state representatives sent a letter to Gov. Rick Perry on Thursday reiterating their plea for him to rescind his anti-cancer vaccine mandate for schoolgirls.

The letter, signed by 31 Republicans and a Democrat, said Perry's order "usurped the legislative process."

"While philosophic differences will dictate where our beliefs fall, no Texan would willfully abdicate their voice in the Legislature to a single office of their government," the letter said.

Perry's order required the Texas Health and Human Services Commission to adopt rules requiring the Merck & Co.'s new Gardasil vaccine for girls entering as of September 2008. The vac-

strains of the human papillomavirus, or HPV, that cause most cases of cervical cancer.

The governor has been widely criticized for mandating the vaccine without letting the Legislature hear from scientists, doctors and parents. But he has firmly defended his actions, saying the vaccine will save many lives.

Olguin said Daveon's brother has been placed in a foster home. The teen's siblings are staying with family members until officials determine whether their home is safe, Olguin said.

County allowed to test tent jail

1. Minimum. Since your heart response on the two-level promised 10 or more points, partner cannot be in the 16-18 range, because he would have jumped to four hearts rather than raise to three. His three-heart bid is not forcing

2. Intermediate. With a minimum opening bid, partner would raise to two spades; with a maximum, he

would jump to four. Three spades is highly encouraging but not forcing, and can be passed with a bare six or seven points.

3. Intermediate. Partner's voluntary climb to the three-level in a new suit shows well above a minimum opening bid. With a 13- to 15-point hand, he would either rebid two spades, raise you to three hearts or possibly bid two notrump. Three diamonds is 100 percent forcing.

 Ambiguous. Partner may have anywhere from 12 to 18 points, and there is no way of telling how many he has at this juncture. He cannot have 19 or more, as he would have jump-shifted to two spades rather than bid just one, which is not forc-

5. Intermediate. Two hearts is a "reverse" bid and shows roughly 17 to 19 points. The reason for this is that your spade response may be based on only six points, and partner, by bidding two hearts, may force you to the three-level if you prefer clubs to hearts and cannot rebid your spades. By bidding in this manner, partner implies that he holds the extra strength necessary to make a nine-trick contract feasible.

6. Intermediate. Partner's jump rebid shows 16 to 18 points, at least a six-card spade suit, and is not forc-





Mickelson eagles 18th for share of lead

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. -Phil Mickelson finally showed signs of turning the corner Thursday.
