

Blair announces withdrawal of some British troops from Iraq

LONDON (AP) - Britain will withdraw around 1,600 troops from Iraq in the "coming months," aiming to cut its force to below 5,000 by late summer if Iraqi forces can secure the southern part of the country. Prime Minister Tony Blair said Wednesday.

British troops will stay in Iraq until at least 2008 and work to secure the Iran-Iraq border and maintain supply routes to U.S. and coalition troops in central Iraq, Blair told the House of Commons.

The actual reduction in forces will be from the present 7,100 itself down from over 9,000 two

years ago and 40,000 at the time of written by Iraqis," Blair said. the conflict — to roughly 5,500," Blair said.

He told lawmakers that "increasingly our role will be support and training, and our numbers will be able to reduce accordingly."

Blair said Iraqi Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki had agreed to the plan.

Dependent on Iraqi capability Britain would draw down further, "possibly to below 5,000" once a base at Basra Palace is transferred to Iraqi control in late summer, Blair said.

"What all of this means is not that Basra is how we want it to be. But it does mean that the next chapter in Basra's history can be

Denmark also said Wednesday it will withdraw its 460-member contingent from southern Iraq by August. The decision had been made with the Iraqi government and Britain, under whose command the Danish forces are serving near Basra, Danish Prime Minister Anders Fogh Rasmussen said. He added that Denmark would replace the troops with surveillance heli-

copters and civilian advisers. And a government spokeswoman in Lithuania said the Baltic nation is "seriously considering" withdrawing its 53 troops from Iraq.

Indicted woman booked into jail

A Howard County woman accused of trying to kill herself and her 12-year-old daughter was arrested on attempted murder charges Tuesday afternoon following an indictment handed down in 118th District Court late last week.

Callie Jo Nickle, 51, of 1811 S. Nolan, was arrested at approximately 4 p.m. Tuesday, and is accused of trying to kill herself and her 12-year-old daughter by means of an overdose of medication on June 7, 2006.

According to police reports, The two were discovered by Nickle's 24-year-old daughter and were subsequently transported to Scenic Mountain Medical Center.

Nickle quickly recovered from the incident, but her daughter had to be transported to a Lubbock hospital, where she remained for some time before recovering.

According to investigators, the 12-yearold has recovered and is currently living with relatives.

Nickle faces a possible prison term of between two and 20 years.

Music companies target colleges in latest crackdown

WASHINGTON — Cracking down on college students, the music industry is sending thousands more complaints to top universities this school year than it did last year as it targets music illegally downloaded over campus computer networks.

A few schools, including Ohio Purdue universities, already have received more than 1,000 complaints accusing individual students since last fall - significant increases over the past school year. For students who are caught, punishments vary from e-mail warnings to semester-long suspensions from classes.

The trade group for the largest music labels, the Industry Recording Association of America, identified at the request of The Associated Press the 25 universities that received the most copyright complaints it sent so far this school year. The trade

group long has pressured students caught twice and software programs it has tarschools to act more aggressively against online pirates on campus.

"It's something we feel we have to do," RIAA President Carey Sherman said. "We have to let people know that if they engage in this activity, they are not anonymous."

The top five schools are Ohio, Purdue, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, University Tennessee and the University of South Carolina. The RIAA complained about almost 15,000 students at those 25 universities, nearly triple the number for the previous

school year. "They're trying to make a statement," said Randall Hall, who polices computers at Michigan State University, seventh on the list with 753 complaints. Michigan State received 432 such complaints in December alone, when students only attended classes for half the month.

The music group said each university should set its own penalties for stealing songs and said campuses are rife with such thefts. "When we look at the problem, it's particularly acute in the college context," RIAA chief executive Mitch Bainwol said.

Under federal law, universities that receive complaints about students illegally distributing copyrighted songs generally must act to stop repeat offenders or else the schools can be sued. The entertainment industry typically can identify a student only by his or her numerical Internet address and must rely on the school to correlate that information to trace a person's real-world identity.

Some schools aggressively warn students after they receive complaints. Others don't. Purdue, which has received 1,068 complaints so far this year but only 37 in 2006, said it rarely even notifies students accused by the RIAA because it's too much trouble to track down alleged offenders. Purdue said its students The music group said popular aren't repeat offenders.

Denmark to withdraw its Iraq contingent by August

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) -Denmark's prime minister said Wednesday that his country will withdraw its 460-member contingent from southern Iraq by August and transfer security responsibilities to Iraqi forces.

Prime Minister Anders Fogh Rasmussen said the decision had been made in conjunction with the Iraqi government and Britain, under whose command the Danish forces are serving near Basra.

Fogh Rasmussen said Denmark would replace the troops with surveillance helicopters and civilian advisers to help the Iraqi government's recon-

struction efforts.

"The Danish battalion will be brought home by August," Fogh Rasmussen told reporters in Copenhagen.

"We expect that the Iraqis during 2007 will take over security in southern Iraq."

Denmark would also boost training of Iraqi soldiers and increase support to Iraqi refugees in nearby countries, the prime minister said.

He added that the government was planning to increase its presence in Afghanistan, saying Denmark will deploy "more troops if there's a need

Blair, who has said he will step down by September after a decade in power, has seen his foreign-policy record overshadowed by his role as Bush's leading ally in the unpopular war.

As orecently as last month, Blair rejected opposition calls to withdraw British troops by October, calling such a plan irresponsible

"That would send the most disastrous signal to the people that we are

passed a non-binding resolution opposing President Bush's Iraq strategy, an action Neugebauer opposed. "It was harmful in

every respect to our nation," he said. "(The resolution) was not in our best national interest, but to throw rocks at our president."

He said a reversal of policy in Iraq would be disastrous in that it would dishearten America's allies and embolden its enemies.





You acknowledge and love us, Lord, may we acknowledge and love You.

Immigrant bigots cause indigestion

hen your mail is filled with hatred and vicious remarks from xenophobic nativeborn Americans who are inexplicably offended by your calls for compassion for illegal immigrants, somehow you get used to it. You accept the fact that intolerance is prevalent in this "nation of immigrants.'

But when those remarks come from foreign-born Americans, immigrants who want to deny other immigrants the opportunities they had when they came to this country, you can't help it — you get indigestion. At least I do. They make me want to puke.

The moment they arrive here, they want to shut the door for everyone else. And if they came legally, these immigrant bigots act as if somehow they are superior to other immigrants who came without papers.

Take the two Cuban-American women who used numerous obscenities in an e-mail recently. They heard me on TV, advocating a legalization plan for illegal immigrants. And, since these "ladies" came here legally, they had to express their superiority. On CNN, I was discussing a con-

troversial comment by White House adviser Karl Rove, who explained the Bush administration's support for a guest-worker program by saying, "I don't want my 17-year-old son to have to pick tomatoes or to make beds in Las Vegas."

I argued that Rove was only recognizing that many immigrants legal and illegal — do the work that many Americans don't want to do. I explained that Rove's comment struck a special chord with me, since my own relatives came here legally and my mother once

made beds in Miami Beach hotels and my grandmother worked at a tomato farm in Florida.

I used that opportunity to express my gratitude for the sacrifices my deceased relatives made so that I could get an education. But these two vipers used my comments as an opportunity to release their venom.

"Until today, we believed that you were Mexican," they wrote. 'You do not know the shame that we feel, to have known that your mother and grandmother were Cubans. Why don't you go to Mexico, if you like the Mexicans so much?"

So here's more shame for them: I'm Cuban, too - born and raised - except I'm not the kind of Cuban who looks down on other Latinos. Unfortunately, although these warped attitudes are rare among Cuban-Americans, those who express them give all Cubans a terrible image. They are the reason why other Latinos often see Cuban-Americans as elitists and racists.

"You are not Cuban, you are ... a liar, saving that those damned illegals do the work that the Americans do not do," they wrote. "Those damned illegals are everywhere, not picking tomatoes and lettuce, as you say.

But their problem is not only with illegal immigrants. Since they came from Cuba in the 1960s, they think they are better than other Cubans who came later.

"We Cubans, had (to go through) a very long process to leave Cuba," they wrote. "I say, the Cubans that came in the '60s. The real Cubans came here legally, we did not jump any fence, we did not swim any river.'

Neither did I. I also came legally, on an airplane, in the 1960s, and it doesn't make me better than any other immigrant.

But there are many other Cubans who, since the 1960s, have been coming here on rafts, without legal papers, and have been

able to stay — thanks to the compassion and generosity that has not been offered to other undocumented immigrants.

Of course these two "ladies" don't recognize that.

In fact, using language even stronger than that of the most extremist American bigots, they wish death for their fellow Cubans who are coming on rafts.

"Those are not Cubans," they wrote, "nobody is persecuting them in Cuba. And we are glad when they (U.S. authorities) intercept them and return them to Cuba, and also when they drown at sea."

Is that sick or what? What about the children who drown on their way here - do they deserve to die too? And if these rafters are no longer persecuted in Cuba, why don't these "ladies" return to Fidel Castro's Communist paradise?

While some Cuban rafters are economic refugees, surely most of them are fleeing to escape political persecution — just like the Cubans who came in the 1960s.

The e-mail is so coarse and vicious that several sentences simply cannot be quoted. They suggest that I defend Mexicans because I must be part of a ring of smugglers bringing drugs across the Mexican border. They say that Mexicans will never get legal papers, unless it's toilet paper. They even make an unsavory remark about my dead mother.

And yet these two vulgar vipers consider themselves superior to the millions of decent illegal immigrants who humbly toil as the hardest working and most exploited people in the United

They say they felt shame upon discovering my Cuban heritage. I know that feeling.

That's precisely how I feel about

"The cup of Ireland's misfortune has been overflowing for centuries, and is not full yet." In one of his orations, Sir Boyle

My favorite: "Why should we put ourselves out of our way to do anything for posterity? What has posterity done for us?"

In 1968, during the riotous Democratic convention in Chicago, Mayor Daley told the press that the police were not there to create disorder but to preserve disorder.

Movie mogul Sam Goldwyn was a prolific breeder of Irish bulls: "A verbal contract is not worth the paper it's printed on," and "anybody who goes to a psychiatrist should have his head examined," and "I'm living beyond my means but I can afford it," and "if I could drop dead right now I'd be the happiest man alive," and "we're overpaying him but he's worth it," and "I never liked him and I

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Former New Deal Police chief indicted

LUBBOCK (AP) — A former New Deal police chief accused of using a city credit card for personal expenses and stealing water from the city was indicted

Sam Butler, 43, was charged with four counts of credit card abuse, one count of aggravated perjury, one count of theft and one count of theft by a public ser-

Each credit card abuse charge carries a maximum penalty of two years in jail. The other charges have maximum prison sentences of 10 years.

Butler is accused in the indictment returned by the Lubbock County grand jury of using a city credit card to purchase personal medication, making a false workman's compensation claim and stealing water from a city water for years, court records show. The crimes are alleged to have happened between 2004 and 2007, the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal reported in a story for its Wednesday editions.

The New Deal City Council fired Butler in December, after 16 years of service.

New Deal is about 11 miles north of Lubbock.

Lubbock man accused of terrorizing cyclists

LUBBOCK (AP) — A Lubbock man who claims he was trying to protect the environment stands accused of terrorizing cyclists by stringing wire between two trees on a mountain biking trail.

A Lubbock County grand jury indicted David G. Knape, 62, on Tuesday on one count of attempted aggravated assault with a weapon and one count of attempted aggravated assault with intent to cause serious bodily injury.

Investigators say Knape strung a wire between two trees at Canyon Lake No. 6 in eastern Lubbock with the intent of hurting passing cyclists.

Riders who use the trails say they have seen traps there for at least a year, the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal reported in a story for its Wednesday editions.

Cyclist Dewayne Wallace said he has seen bottles, nails, and large rocks pushed into the trail and had been watching for the person responsible for about six months. Wallace said he reported Knape to police on Nov. 6 when he saw him stringing wire.

Knape told investigators he was trying to protect the environment.

DNA test confirms wrong brother was imprisoned for rape

CONROE (AP) - Recent DNA tests confirmed that a Conroe man sexually assaulted a 13-year-old girl in 1986 — the crime for which his innocent older brother spent 18 years behind bars.

Marc Brumberger, Montgomery County assistant district attorney, said the statute of limitations has expired and it's too late to try Charles Mumphrey, 36, for the sex assault in Conroe, about 40 miles north of Houston.

"It's a closed case," Brumberger said. "Unfortunately justice was not served for any brother."

Charles Mumphrey's brother, 43-year-old Arthur Mumphrey, was released from prison last year based on DNA evidence that cleared him of the crime. He was pardoned by Gov. Rick Perry and awarded \$450,000 in restitution from the state.

DNA test results released last week showed Charles Mumphrey committed the crime, as he had already told an investigator last year.

On Tuesday, Charles Mumphrey apologized to the victim, her family and his older brother.

"I'm really sorry for what happened to the girl and I apologize to her and her family," he said. "I have two daughters myself. If I could ever replay that night, it would have never happened."

Charles Mumphrey said he's been conflicted for the past 20 years over his brother's wrongful conviction, He hopes his brother will eventually forgive him.

"It was like a cancer eating me up," he said. "I cried many times about it. I thank God he's home.' Charles Mumphrey, who was 14 at the time of the

assault, said he was drinking wine and smoking marijuana near the railroad tracks when he joined Steve Thomas, an older teenager, in sexually assaulting the girl at knifepoint.

Thomas agreed to a plea and received a 15-year sentence for testifying against Arthur Mumphrey.

Charles Mumphrey said he told police what he had done shortly after the crime occurred.

But he claimed the police were more interested in arresting his brother and accused him of making up the story to cover for his brother.

Police have said Charles Mumphrey recanted his story.

Ag officials levy fines in deaths of 27 horses

AUSTIN (AP) - State agriculture officials said Tuesday they have fined two men who violated state pesticide laws last summer at an equestrian facility where 27 horses died.

Necropsies suggested the horses ate toxic feed in July at Carousel Acres Equestrian Center and Stable in College Station.

Brad Raphel, co-owner of the stable, was fined \$4,000 related to five violations in applying a restricted-use pesticide in July, the Texas Department of Agriculture said in a release. Each violation brings a \$1,000 fine but the cap for a single incident is \$4,000.

According to the release, Raphel used the pesticide

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without a license, without the direct supervision of a licensed applicator and in a manner inconsistent with the product's label.

He also received a warning for failing to notify employees before fumigating the horse feed.

Raphel and Walter Cronin, the other man fined, each

declined to comment Tuesday. Cronin, who said he was a friend of Raphel's, was fined \$1,000 for failing to properly supervise the use of a restricted-use pesticide, according to the release. He also received a warning for failing to maintain records

for the first time the pesticide was applied. Dr. H. Richard Adams, dean of the Texas A&M University College of Veterinary Medicine, said shortly after the deaths that three of the animals' stomach cavities contained phosphine gas - a product of a fumigant that is released from the pesticide tablets, which are designed to kill weevils in horse feed.



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


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Judge blocks Perry's coal plant permit order

Associated Press Writer AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. Rick Perry's executive order fast-tracking the permitting process for coal-fired plants is not binding on state hearing administrators, who must reconsider environmentalists' requests for a hearing delay, a judge says.

Judge Stephen Yelenosky listened to arguments in state district court Tuesday then agreed with citizen environmental groups who claimed Perry didn't have the constitutional authority to issue his fast-track order in October 2005.

A major permitting hearing for six coal plants was set for Wednesday in Austin.

Yelenosky's temporary injunction did not cancel the hearing, but he said administrative judges should reconsider the schedule.

"What he's saying (to administrative hearing judges) is the executive order does not tie your hands.

"It is without merit. You are now free to make your own decisions," said plaintiffs' attorney Jim Blackburn.

Lawyers for citizen groups argued before Yelenosky that Texas and Oklahoma residents opposed to the coal plants were at a disadvantage because there hadn't been enough time to prepare for the high-stakes permit hearing.

The Texas Attorney General's Office, which represented Perry in the case, referred all comments on the judge's ruling to the governor's office.

prised that a single liberal Austin judge would rule against Gov. Perry and his efforts to increase energy capacity Texas,' spokesman Robert Black said. "We will take a close look at the ruling and make a determination on how we will proceed."

At issue is Dallas-based TXU Corp.'s proposal to build six coal-fired plants in North, East and Central Texas.

"We're obviously disappointed in this decision," TXU spokeswoman Kim Morgan said. "Every day of delay means that meeting the goal of providing newer, cleaner power generation is denied."

TXU contends the coal plants will lower utility costs and help provide needed power supplies for the future. The hearing should be held and the plants should be built, Morgan said, or the state will move closer "to the potential of widespread rolling blackouts."

Unless action is taken now the electricity supplies in Texas will fall below reliable levels by 2009, she said.

Plaintiffs' attorneys said the Texas governorship is intentionally weak under the Texas Constitution and that Perry's executive order interferes with the legislative branch.

"The governor is doing something that he has no power to do," said attorney David Kahne, representing Citizens Organizing for Resources and Environment, known

The Legislature set up the State Office of Administrative Hearings as an independent forum legacy behind."

"No one should be sur- for contested cases, and the governor doesn't have the authority to direct the way it holds its hearings, Kahne told the judge Tuesday.

State attorneys said the plaintiffs failed to show how they would be irreparably harmed by the upcoming environmental hearings.

"There is no injury based on this purported accelerated schedule" of hearings, said Shelley Dahlberg, an attorney for the state. She said the citizen groups don't have legal standing to make the argument that they've been harmed at this point, though they might after the hearings, depending on the outcome.

But Yelenosky disagreed and found that the plaintiffs did have standing.

A number of Texas cities and citizen groups oppose the plants.

"We're actually in the ring of fire," said Robert Cervenka, a rancher in McLennan County who lives amid proposed coal plant sites.

Outside the courtroom Tuesday, he said he and his wife worry that the proposed plants would hurt the air quality for animals and people.

Katrina Baecht, whose family farm is six miles from the site of a proposed plant in Fannin County near Oklahoma border, said she also worries about air pollution if the coal plants are built.

"I'm concerned about as CORE, along with what it's going to do to other plaintiffs. - the health of the area the health of the area where I was born and raised," she said, "and I want to leave a better


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Group open to death penalty for the worst sex offenders

AUSTIN (AP) - A victim's advocacy group that has opposed the death penalty for second-time violent child molesters is softening its stance, saying it would likely be a rare situation and left up to a prosecutor to decide

The Texas Association Against Sexual Assault had opposed the death penalty provision of "Jessica's Laws" bills filed in the House and Senate. A House committee scheduled a public hearing on its version Tuesday night.

Because child sex victims are often the only witness to the crime, the group worried it could lead offenders to kill the child to silence the witness.

But after discussions with the bills' sponsors, the group has been assured the death penalty would be an option for the worst cases and not mandatory for all repeat offenders, a spokeswoman

"It doesn't completely resolve the concern," said Torie Camp, deputy director for the Texas Association Against Sexual Assault.

"It would be an unusual case," she said. "That would be the rare circumstance where the death penalty option is

Shannon Edmonds, spokesman for the Texas District and County Attorneys Association, would not speculate how often prosecutors would seek the death penalty against repeat sex offenders.

But he noted Louisiana has had a similar law for years with only one offender sent to death row

"They're not afraid to use the death penalty over there, but so far, it's only

been one case," Edmonds said. Legal experts question whether the death penalty is constitutional in cases

where the victim was not killed.



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Suicide blast kills 11 people in the Shiite holy city of Najaf

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BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — A suicide car bomber struck a police checkpoint Wednesday in the Shiite holy city of Najaf, killing at 11 people in the spiritual heartland of the militia factions led by radical cleric Muqtada al-

In Baghdad, political tremors grew following claims that a Sunni woman was raped while in custody of the Shiite-dominated police — a case that threatens to escalate the sectarian friction that drives many of the bombings and attacks across the country.

Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki fired the head of the influential Sunni Endowment after the official called for an international investigation into the rape allega-

The Najaf blast hit while streets were filled with morning shoppers. At least two of the victims were police and the rest civilians, authorities said. It was the first major bombing in months in the city, which is heavily guarded by police and al-Sadr's powerful Mahdi Army militia.

On Aug. 10, a suicide attack near the Imam Ali mosque killed at least 35 people and wounded more than 100.

U.N. nuclear watchdog prepares report that could trigger further U.N. sanctions

VIENNA, Austria (AP) - The U.N. nuclear watchdog on Wednesday put finishing touches on a report expected to confirm that Iran continues uranium enrichment activities, a finding that could trigger harsher U.N. Security Council sanctions against Tehran

Officials at the International Atomic Energy Agency said the report by Mohamed ElBaradei, head of the Vienna-based IAEA, would likely say that Iran has expanded enrichment efforts instead of freezing them.

Once it is ready — likely Wednesday but possibly Thursday — the report will be sent to the agency's 35nation board and to the Security Council. The council set a 60-day deadline on Dec. 23 for such a freeze and said continued Iranian defiance past that ultimatum, which runs out Wednesday, could lead to sanctions additional to those it imposed last month.

On Tuesday, the eve of the expiry of the deadline, top Iranian officials showed no signs of compromise.

President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad, speaking to a

crowd of thousands in Iran, said his country was ready to stop its enrichment program, but only if Western nations do the same — something the United States and others with similar programs are unlikely to even

Rice, Abbas to hold meetings on Palestinian power-sharing pact with Hamas

BERLIN (AP) - World powers sought common ground Wednesday to confront Palestinian Hamas militants who are politically emboldened by a new powersharing pact with moderates.

Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice and Palestinian leader Mahmoud Abbas were scheduled to hold separate meetings in Berlin on the pact he made with Hamas. The deal, although not final, falls far short of international demands that Hamas drop its signature anti-Israeli policies. Hamas has refused to bend despite a boycott of vital international aid.

Diplomats from the United States, Europe, Russia and the United Nations were conferring Wednesday on g group. the agreement two weeks ago. The group, known collectively as the Quartet, are stewards of a mothballed 2003 peace plan that would eventually establish an independent Palestinian state.

Rice planned to brief foreign ministers from the group about her meeting Monday with Abbas and Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Olmert. The United States pointed to positive momentum from the talks, the first of their kind in six years.

Weary residents join with rowdy visitors at New Orleans' Mardi Gras

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - Thousands of hurricaneweary residents joined with rowdy visitors for Fat Tuesday, taking a break from rebuilding New Orleans to put on wild costumes and celebrate the second Mardi Gras since Hurricane Katrina.

John Ferguson, who is still rebuilding his house almost 18 months after the storm, said of the celebration: "We never needed it more."

"I work all day at my job; then I work all night and all weekend on my house," Ferguson said. "I just want to eat, drink and have fun today."

Many spectators spent the day along the parade routes or in the French Quarter, where the first Mardi Gras parade of the day was staged by the 1,250-member

Zulu Social Aid and Pleasure Club, a predominantly black group that wears grass skirts and black face makeup in parody of stereotypes from the early 1900s, when it was founded.

SALEM, Ore. (AP) - Two days after electronic locator units helped rescuers locate three missing climbers on Mount Hood, veteran mountaineers pleaded with state lawmakers not to require them to carry the devices every time they head for the summit.

Some warned Tuesday that requiring locators would foster passivity among climbers who get into trouble and activate the beacons.

"They will wait for a rescue, and not do enough to rescue themselves," said Leslie Brown, a spokes-woman for Access Fund, a national mountaineering

WASHINGTON (AP) - In a victory for President Bush, a divided federal appeals court ruled Tuesday that Guantanamo Bay detainees cannot use the U.S. court system to challenge their indefinite imprisonment. A Supreme Court appeal was promised.

The 2-1 decision by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit dismisses hundreds of cases filed by foreign-born detainees in federal court and also threatens to strip away court access to millions of lawful permanent residents currently in the United States.

It upholds a key provision of the Military Commissions Act, which Bush pushed through Congress last year to set up a Defense Department system to prosecute terrorism suspects. Now, detainees must prove to three-officer military panels that they don't pose a terror threat.



Tiger seeking 8 wins in a row

MARANA, Ariz. Tiger Woods has compiled some amazing numbers during the longest PGA Tour winning streak in 62 years. He has won those seven tournaments by a combined 22 shots, is 109 under par and has posted 24 of his last 28 rounds in the 60s.

The math is much more simple at the Accenture Match Championship.

To make it eight in a row, he has to win six in a row.

"This has always been one of the tougher events to win just because of the nature of the format,' Woods, the No. 1 seed, said Tuesday. "Match play, anything that happens is unpredictable. Sometimes, it takes a great round to advance. Sometimes, you can shoot over par and advance. All I know is you have to beat one guy at a time. You don't have to beat a whole field. Just six guys."

The 64-man field assembled in the high desert of The Gallery Golf Club represents the best in the world from 17 countries. The only guy Woods cares about Wednesday is Ryder Cup teammate J.J. Henry, his first opponent.

How fickle is this tour-

Woods won in 2004 during his worst season on tour, when he went through another overhaul of his swing. He was in top form two years earlier, winning the Masters and U.S. Open, yet he couldn't get past Peter O'Malley in the first round of the Accenture.

"You can shoot 65 and lose. You can shoot 73 and win," Henry said. "You never know what you're going to get. Of course, I know if I play Tiger and shoot 73, I might as well pack my bags.


Henry is fortunate to even be in the field.

He was expecting to be the first alternate until Charl Schwartzel of South Africa decided to withdraw on Sunday and play at home in Telkom PGA Championship on the Sunshine Tour, where he has a chance to win the Order of Merit.

Red Raiders gets ripped by No. 19 Longhorns

AUSTIN - A.J. Abrams scored 18 points and No. 19 Texas stayed in the thick of the Big 12 race with an 80-51 win Tuesday night over Texas

Kevin Durant added 17 points for the Longhorns (20-7, 10-3), who had all five starters score in double figures but didn't have a 20-point scorer for the first time this season.

The win keeps Texas a halfgame behind Texas A&M for second in the Big 12 and a game behind leader Kansas. The Longhorns play both in their last three games.

Alan Voskuil scored nine Knight, the winningest men's points to lead the Red Raiders (17-11, 6-7), who shot just 29 percent. Jarrius Jackson, who came in averaging 20.7 points, was 2-of-10 for 7 points.

It was the Longhorns' second rout of the Red Raiders at home in the last two seasons. Texas beat Tech by 34 in Austin last

This one left Tech coach Bob Knight sitting and stewing on the bench most of the game as the Longhorns built a big early lead and never let the Red Raiders threaten.

Texas is 17-2 against Tech in nine seasons under coach Rick Barnes, who is 12-2 against coach in college basketball.

Durant, who scored 30 or more points in six of his first nine Big 12 games, hasn't scored more than 21 in the last four.

Justin Mason provided the Longhorns' scoring punch in the first half, hitting all five of his shots.

Durant, who had 37 points and 23 rebounds in a win over Tech in Lubbock earlier this season, scored his first basket on a steal and dunk and hit two 3-pointers in the first half. All of them came in a 24-8 run that opened up a 37-15 lead.

With Durant drawing Tech

defenders, Mason had all kinds of room to roam to the basket or pull up for open jumpers. Texas shot 58 percent and led 48-26 at halftime.

Durant, who has made a case for national player of the year honors, is finding his shooting touch going through long dry spells as the season wears on. His first shot of the second half was an airball 3-pointer, but he followed it with a lightingquick spin and 10-foot fadeaway jumper.

D.J. Augustin hit a 3-pointer to open the second half and Mason fed Damion James with

Cowboys name Garrett offensive coordinator

Jason Garrett finally has a title with the Dallas Cowboys nearly a month after being hired to the coaching staff. And it's not a surprise.

Garrett was named the coordinator offensive Tuesday for new coach Wade Phillips, who also elevated Tony Sparano to assistant head coach with a contract extension through 2009.

Cowboys owner Jerry Jones hired the 40-yearold Garrett to the coaching staff Jan. 25 after interviewing him for the head coaching vacancy. It had been expected since then that Garrett would be the offensive coordinator, even though his only coaching experience was the last two seasons as quarterbacks coach in Miami.

"We believe that Jason is one of the bright young offensive minds in the NFL," Phillips said. "He has extensive experience in working with some outstanding offensive coaches through his years of professional football, and he is well prepared for this position.

Garrett was the backup to Hall of Fame quarterback Troy Aikman for two Super Bowl titles in Dallas from 1993-99. He later played four seasons

with the New York Giants before splitting 2004 between Tampa Bay and Miami. He played in 40 regular season games, and his only nine starts

came with the Cowboys. Sparano, the offensive line coach, shared in play-calling duties for coach Bill Parcells' staff last season.

"Tony's past performance with the organization and the respect that he has from our players made this an easy decision," Phillips said. "His contract commitment will provide stability for our staff for a long time, and that was also an important factor in this deci-

The Cowboys scored 425 points (26.6 per game) and averaged 361 total yards per game last season, their best since 1995.

It was their most productive offense since 1995, when they won the last of their five Super Bowl titles.

Spurs come home to beat Iverson-led Nuggets

SAN ANTONIO - The San Antonio Spurs were happy to finally play at home again.

The Spurs returned home for the first time in more than three weeks on Tuesday night in a 95-80 win over Denver.

Tony Parker scored 17 points, Manu Ginobili added 14 and Tim Duncan had 12 during the Spurs' first home game since they went on a lengthy road trip, where they split their eight games.

"It was very important to establish not only a win here, but to come home and have a good game," Duncan said.

Not even the return of Allen Iverson could boost Denver. Iverson missed nine of the Nuggets' last 10 games before the All-Star break with a right ankle sprain. He scored nine points on Tuesday.

"The shots that I took, I know I can hit with my eyes closed," said Iverson, who went 3-of-11 from the field. "Maybe I should have closed them. I took 11 shots, and I thought I got 11 good looks."

Iverson said his ankle bothered him on a couple of plays "but for

the most part I was all right.

"Usually when I come back from injury, I have my rhythm back. I didn't today," he said.

Carmelo Anthony led Denver with 15 points, Nene had 13 and DerMarr Johnson had 11. Anthony and Iverson combined for just 24 points. Their previous low when playing together was 49.

"It's going to take some time," said Marcus Camby. "And those guys haven't had a lot of time together."

It was the Spurs' third straight win. It was Denver's second loss in

"I said all along I'm surprised we haven't already had one of these flat games with all the changes and all the craziness we've had," said Nuggets coach George Karl. "I would have thought we'd have already had one.'

Playing at home this season hasn't been as good to the Spurs as in the past. They've lost eight at home so far, one more than all of last season.

Still, after the road trip, which has brought the team more success in previous years, San Antonio's AT&T Center was a welcome sight. "We've lost too many games in

this building to start the season,' Duncan said. "And to come out of the break and continue to win like we did the last two on the road and then win one at home does a lot of good here."

After trailing for most of the first, the Spurs took a 25-21 lead into the second quarter. Parker helped them extend the lead scoring 10 of his points in the quarter. San Antonio led 49-38 at the break.

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The Spurs broke the game open in the third quarter outscoring the Nuggets 30-10. Anthony and Iverson were just a combined 1-for-10 in the quarter as Denver had nine turnovers.

There are players who spend so much time memorizing complicated bidding conventions, or trying to master squeezes and other advanced plays, that their ability to reason correctly - which counts more than anything else you can name - frequently gets lost in the shuffle.

Take this case where East, playing more by rote than reason, misdefended three notrump. Declarer took West's opening heart lead with the

queen, led the jack of diamonds and let it ride. East won with the queen and returned a heart, taken by South

Declarer then led a diamond to dummy's eight, ducked by East, and a third diamond lead dislodged the ace. East shifted to a low spade, but declarer won and finished with 10 tricks, losing only a spade and two If East had taken the time early

in the play to work out declarer's probable values for the jump to two notrump, he would have held South to just the eight tricks he was entitled

To begin with, South had to have the K-Q of spades, A-Q of hearts and A-K of clubs for his two-notrump bid. This in turn meant that unless declarer had four spades, he could score only two spade tricks, three hearts and two clubs and would therefore need to make two diamond tricks. East's defense consequently should have been aimed at limiting South to one diamond trick.

To accomplish this, all East had to do was to let South's jack of diamonds hold at trick two. That would have effectively killed dummy's remaining diamonds, and no matter how South continued, he could not have come to nine tricks.
