The city saw major increases in the number of murders and assault cases in 2006 when compared to totals amassed during 2005.

According to statistics released this week by the Big Spring Police Department, murders were up 200 percent with 2 reports compared to 2004, when no homicides were reported. Assault cases also rose more than 277 percent, with 83 reported in 2005 and 313 reported last year.

"There really isn't one particular thing to pinpoint the cause of the increase in assaults," said Lonnie Smith, Big Spring Police Chief. "I've seen some articles that suggest assaults and violent crimes in general are on the rise all across the nation, so this isn't just a problem in Big Spring. It's a problem everywhere."

Sexual assaults saw no fluc tuations between 2005 and 2006, with 18 reported cases in both years.

The number of robberies rose slightly last year, with 15 reported cases in 2006, compared to 13 in 2005, accounting for a 15.4 percent increase. Of the robberies, the number involving firearms rose 300 percent, with one in 2005 and four in 2006.

"A lot of the robberies that were reported last year would have been simple shoplifting charges," said Smith. "However, the suspect made physical contact with the store clerk - sometimes just pushing them out of the way or threatening them — and that elevates it to a robbery.'

The number of robberies involving knives fell 400 percent last year, with five reported in 2005 and only one case reported in 2006. By far the most popular weapon, however, was hands and feet, which rose 100 percent with five reports in 2005 and 10 reports last year.

Burglaries only saw a slight increase of 2.1 percent last year, with 337 cases reported in 2005 and 344 in 2006. Of the

residential burglaries reported last year, 53 occurred at night. 79 happened during the day and 105 happened at unknown

The number of non-residential burglaries in Big Spring rose in 2006, with 27 occurring at night, seven during the day and 73 happening between unknown hours.

Thefts jumped considerably in the Big Spring area last year, rising 53.7 percent with 741 cases reported in 2006 and 482 cases reported in 2005. Shoplifting saw the biggest jump — rising 251.7 percent with 204 cases reported in 2006 and only 58 cases reported in

"It's really hard to say why thefts rose so much in 2006. I suppose you have to point to the economy," said Smith. "Sometimes, when the economy is going well for the rest of us, it's going well for those that decide not to work for a living as well."

Smith said he doesn't feel gas

thinking, a little patience classes, but mainly, she and creativity - and a learned the old-fashioned handful of glass rods — is about all you need to make beautiful jewelry.

Padron, the proprietor of Miss Mollie's Creations in Big Spring, has been following that simple formula for the past five years, turning glass rods into decorative beads and jewelry.

She said making one's own jewelry isn't necessarily a craft that takes years to learn.

"I just wanted to make my own jewelry," she said. "I couldn't find the color combinations and kinds of beads I was looking for, so I started creating my own ... I started out making Venetian beads until I got tired of that, then I bought some glass rods and started making glass beads."

Padron read every book she could find on the subject, browsed the Internet By Lorrie Padron's for ideas and took some way — by doing.

> "A lot of it is just trial and error," she said.

Making beads can be either quick work or time-consuming, depending on the amount of detail placed on each item. Padron said the process can last anywhere from five minutes to an hour. Multiply that by the number of beads that go into a particular piece of jewelry, and you have a rough idea how much time she has to spend on her creations.

That patience is starting to pay off for Padron. who travels to several gem shows a year, "and that number is growing,' she said. "I do arts and crafts shows, too."





Four arrested after weekend vandalism

Two adults and a pair of juveniles were arrested over the weekend and charged with criminal mischief after police officials claim more than \$23,000 in damages were reported at nearly threedozen locations.

Johnny Isaias Gonzales, 18. of 810 E. 14th Street, and Robbin Lynn Barnes, 17. of 1407 Nolan, were both arrested on a charge of criminal mischief Sunday after what police officials describe as a destructive spree.

"The majority of the damages reported have been to vehicle and vehicle windows," said Sgt. Tony Everett, public information officer for the Big Spring Police Department. "By the time you count up all of the criminal mischief reports from the city and the county, we're looking at 34 reports at this time, and we believe all of them

are related."

Everett said locations hit by the vandals include the 500 block of Seventh Street; the 700 block of 11th Place; the 2700 block of Central; the 700 block of Settles; the 2600 block of Ann; the 800 block of Owens; the 1400 block of Nolan; the 600 block of Ridgelea: the 1000 block of Bluebonnet; the 400 block of Westover Road; the 1100 block of Birdwell Lane; and the 1500 block of Runnels.

"We also have several we're looking at in the county," said Everett. "By the time it's all said and done, I believe we're looking at about 34 reports that are related to this, worth about \$23,000. We're still trying to sort everything out, and we have a third juvenile we're investigating."

Motor vehicle thefts also saw an increase, jumping 31.1 percent with 59 stolen vehicles reported in 2006 and 45 reported the previous year. Of those, 42 were recovered locally and five were recovered out of jurisdiction.

Criminal mischief only saw a slight increase of 8.5 percent, with 447 cases reported last year and 412 cases reported in 2005.

Family violence saw a considerable increase in 2006, with 236 reports compared to the 190 reports filed in 2005.

Reports of drug possession shot up 47 percent last year, with 100 cases reported in 2005 and 147

reported last year.

The amount of marijuana selzed in the Big Spring area almost doubled, as police officials 2006, compared to 107 ounces seized in 2005.

While seizures increased in 2006, it was cocaine seizures that showed the largest increase, with 3.21 ounces recovered in 2005 and more than 76 ounces seized last year.

Other seizures saw dramatic increases compared to 2005, including \$106,383 in property; \$142,754 in currency; \$15,609 in clothing; \$459,480 in vehicles; \$31,752 in office equipment; \$153,082 in radios and televisions; \$27,864 in \$28,405 in firearms; goods; and domestic \$270,997 in miscellaneous

items. The number of major traffic accidents in Big Spring fell 8.7 percent in 2006, with 138 reported last year and 150 reported in 2005, while minor accidents saw a stiff increase of 38 percent, with 570 reported last year and 413 reported in 2005.

The number of calls for service in the city decreased only slightly in 2006 compared to the previous year, with 19,200 reported last year and 19,298 reported in 2005. The police department also saw a slight drop in its patrol statistics, with a 7.3 percent drop in the number of miles driven and a 5.5 percent decrease in the amount of fuel used.

"These decreases are a direct result of us being understaffed in our patrols," said Smith. "We actually had to decrease the size of our investiga-

And while the number Crossroads area was on the rise in 2006, the number of arrests made fell 7.6 percent, with 1,486 made in 2006 and 1,599 made the previous year.

"When you're understaffed the way we are, you have to be reactive to crime, instead of being proactive," said Smith. "And when you do that, you're going to see an increase in the crime rate. Hopefully, once we get some officers out of the academy and can get some more certified officers on the street, we can go back to being proactive."

Open records technology is a step forward

ure, to some people this may seem to be "Oh, get a life" stuff, but for advocates of open government, it's an important step.

The Texas House of Representatives has begun putting copies of bills and their proposed amendments online during floor debates, updated in real time so anyone who wants to can follow the action as it takes place in Austin. Live video of those debates has been available online since 2001, but sometimes the process is a little hard to follow if you can't see the documents under discussion.

The new system is an expansion to the World Wide Web of the computerized displays that have long been available to members sitting at their desks in the House chambers.

Under rules adopted last month, the House also will speed up online publication of record vote reports. Texans will be able to see how their representatives voted within an hour of the votes.

Both of these services rolled out last week through links on the Texas Legislature Online Web site, http://www.capitol.state.tx.us. Initially. they're in a test phase, but they seem to be working well. Any flaws are expected to be fixed by Thursday.

Over in the Senate, business is still done by distributing pieces of paper. Anyone who is interested can watch online, but (for floor amendments especially) they can't read the words that lawmakers are arguing about. Vote results are reported in the Senate Journal, usually online later in

No newspaper is going to argue against the value of words on paper, but spreading those words instantly by the Internet is an excellent advancement in technology and open government. Secretary of the Senate Patsy Spaw says that her side of the Capitol expects to work on delivering online displays of floor documents during the 2009 legislative session.

When it comes to how government works, more information to those who are governed is always good — and sooner is better.






Insurance: A wart on the body politic

t's very good to have insurance. What's bad is to have an insurance company. How often, for example, do mothers say, "My son, the insurance broker?" Perhaps they'll say, "My son, the doctor," or maybe even, "My son, the lawyer," but the "insurance broker" may make one wonder, "When does his trial start?"

Iraq, curiously, can again help us grasp just where insurance fits into our social framework. It seems that another of the many provisions the United States inserted in the Iraqi constitution requires that foreign insurance companies be given

free rein in the local

industry. Insurance there, as here, is a cash cow and insurers close to the Bush administration didn't want to miss out on claiming their share of the booty.

Not that there isn't plenty of booty here at home. Connecticut's attorney general has his hands full dealing with complaints from customers, agents, and miscellaneous abused parties. Our state remains. at lest in its own mind, Insurance Capital of America, much as Waterbury remains the Center of the Universe. Indeed the whole

nation is an insurance battleground, but with so many companies headquartered here, our courts are a hotbed in the national struggle.

Symbolic of industry mentality is United Health Group Inc. of Minneapolis. Its chairman, William McGuire, rode off into the sunset in December with an annual pension of \$5.1 million and severance pay of \$6.5 million. Seems there had been some problem with backdating of stock options so he

had to go. This helps explain where our premiums go too.

For all of us though, it is worth reflecting on how insurance companies maximize profits. There are two ways. One is to deny coverage to applicants who look as though they might one day file a claim. The other is to find ways to deny claims that have already

been filed. Health insurers thus try to avoid customers who have ever been sick, and auto insurers avoid drivers who have ever had an accident. Property insurers are similarly staying away from regions that have ever had a storm.

And once you're sick, health insurers often resist covering your illness or your medication, an may severely limit your number of days in the hospital or in rehab. It's nothing personal, mind you,

just business.

I our own household the auto insurance seemed to be getting a little steep recently, for a couple with no accidents, so the local agent looked around for us. He found another company that quoted the same price for a year that the first company wanted for 6 months. That's called a "competitive marketplace." There are lots of competing prices out there, but only a clairvoyant shopper can find them for herself.

Nor can one necessarily trust the independent agents either. Another scandal involved insurers paying agents (including one of the nation's biggest) under the taable to steer business their way. And now insurers are taking heat for steering auto repair to certain shops with whom they have a secret deal. You don't always end up with very good parts that way.

Luckily for health care there is a way to escape all this conniving uiversal government insurance, as Europe and Canada have. (Medicare for All!)

For other coverage you probably want to give your agent a lie detector test.

Their business putting you to sleep

MINNEAPOLIS - A good night's sleep has become big

Sleep centers are popping up to address what seems to be an epidemic of sleep problems ranging from the plain old lack of nightly rest to complex disorders that can raise the risk of hypertension and stroke.

Nationwide, there are now 1,106 accredited sleep centers, up from 374 a decade

"Sleep disorders incredibly prevalent, and most are treatable," said Dr. Mark Mahowald, a neurologist and a pioneer in sleep medicine at Hennepin County Medical Center in Minneapolis.

At \$800 to \$2,400 for an overnight sleep study, the boom is occurring at big hospitals as well as smaller outfits that aren't always staffed by certified profes-

What's clear, though, is more people are seeking help. Consider Fred Fox. For

months, his wife urged him to see a doctor. He not only snored, she said, he regularly seemed to stop breathing at night. Finally, Fox went to Regions Hospital's Sleep Health Center Maplewood, Minn. In a hotel-like room, technicians attached wires to his head, chest and abdomen. Lines zigzagged across a computer screen — mapping brain

waves, blood oxygen levels,

chest and eye movements -

while Fox slept. The results were eye-opening. Fox learned that he stopped breathing up to 70 times an hour, sending the oxygen levels in his blood plummeting. When he left the next morning, he was carrying a facemask and a bedside device the size of a clock radio to help push air into his windpipe.

Not all disorders require a sleep study - insomnia doesn't, for example - but they are the fastest-growing part of the sleep business.

How fast? Three years ago, Regions Hospital in St. Paul opened two beds for sleep studies, then went to four and then six. Even then, there was a 55-day wait to get in, said Gretchen Leiterman, a vice president at Regions. When the hospital opened its Maplewood center last summer with 10 to 12 to 14 days.

The center's statistics further illustrate the rapid rise in interest: Regions did more than 2,300 sleep studies in 2006, up from 244 in

Doctors say patients these days come in much more aware of sleep disorders.

Ten years ago, if you told a patient to wear a mask to sleep, "they looked at you like you were an alien," said Dr. Patrick Wright, a pulmonologist at Minnesota Sleep Institute, which has four standalone centers in the Twin Cities area. "Now you might get a patient who goes hunting or fishing with five other guys and all of them have a mask.'

cheap. At North Memorial Medical Center in Robbinsdale, Minn., charges for an overnight sleep study start at \$2,400, but insurers often negotiate discounts. Medicare typically pays about \$800, while a private insurer such HealthPartners might pay as much as \$1,500, said Bob Bryant, supervisor of North Memorial's sleep center.

Wright and others worry that the wider popular interest in sleep disorders is leading to the proliferation of storefront sleep labs that are more focused on profits than cures. Some patients are misdiagnosed, given masks that don't fit well or equipment with faulty settings.

Mahowald of Hennepin County Medical Center said he believes some facilities are skimming off the most profitable part of the business — diagnosis — while leaving the actual care to others.

When Mahowald started the Minnesota Regional Sleep Disorders Center at HCMC in 1978, sleep disorders were thought to be rare

HCMC's physicians have since gained international recognition for their work on parasomnias, which include sleepwalking, sleep eating and sleep paralysis.

But Mahowald says wider recognition of the problem doesn't help research, since patients are spread over a larger number of centers, making it harder to spot patterns or identify new disor-

On a recent Tuesday, doctors gathered over lunch at HCMC's sleep center. At one point, Mahowald passed around a grab bag from the expanding marketplace of sleep health — a \$65 tub of an oral supplement carrying the motto "Never Sleep Again" and a flier advertising better sleep through

"Feng shui," Mahowald said. "Gimme a break."

A French classic made healthier

Miso is a basic Japanese ingredient made from fermented soybeans. It has the consistency of peanut butter and comes in many different flavors and colors. It is used as a flavoring agent for sauces, for example, but primarily as a base for soups that range in color from pale gold to deep russet.

Miso's flavor can vary in saltiness, sweetness and even its slightly "meaty" mouth feel. It can be found in most supermarkets as well as in specialty food stores. Like all soy products, it is believed to offer many health benefits.

Onions, so essential to a classic French countrystyle soup, are linked to a decreased risk of several cancers, including those related to the digestive

MISO ONION SOUP

2 Tbsp. canola oil, divid-

3 peeled red (Spanish) onions, halved and thinly-

1 tsp. sugar

1 Tbsp. Dijon-style mus-1 tsp. dried thyme

3 cups fat-free, reduced-sodium beef

5 cups water Salt and freshly ground black pepper

6 1-inch thick slices whole-wheat Italian bread 1/4 cup red or brown

rice miso 1/3 cup freshly-grated Parmesan cheese (optional)

Heat half the oil in large Dutch oven or pot over medium-high heat. Add

the onions, stirring to coat them with oil. Cover tightly, reduce heat to medium low and cook until onions are wilted. about 10 minutes.

Sprinkle the sugar over the onions and stir in. Increase heat and sauté until onions are well browned, about 12 minutes, stirring often.

Remove the pot from heat and scrape it to loosen all the browned bits on the bottom. Stir in mustard, thyme, broth and water. Return to high heat and cook until liquid comes to a boil. Reduce the heat, partially cover the pot and simmer until the onions are very soft, 30 to 40 minutes.

Meanwhile, brush bread both sides with remaining oil. Grill or toast bread in 400 degree oven. Set aside to cool. Cut into rough cubes with a sharp, serrated knife.

Place the miso in a small bowl. Gradually stir in about 1/4 cup of the soup, mixing until well blended. Stir the mixture into the soup. Season to taste with salt and pep-

Ladle soup into deep



bowls. Sprinkle top with toasted bread cubes. Sprinkle 1 scant tablespoon cheese on top (optional).

Makes 8 servings.

Renovated Fort Worth Water Gardens reopen

FORT WORTH(AP) - A prayer and the unveiling of plaques honoring six people who died from accidents at the Fort Worth Water Gardens marked the reopening of the downtown park on Sunday.

The park of artistic pools and fountains closed following the June 2004 drownings of four Chicago tourists in town for a religious convention. Since then, more than \$3 million in modifications to improve the park's safety have been made.

Jailed serial child killer eyed in East Texas murder case

BIG SANDY (AP) — Authorities are investigating whether a former soldier who pleaded guilty to killing three young Dallas-area girls in the 1980s could also be responsible for the disappearance of an East Texas girl in the same time period.

David Elliott Penton, who is serving a life sentence in Toledo, Ohio, for killing a 9-year-old Columbus girl in 1988, allegedly mentioned Ara "Niecie" Johnson to fellow inmates, said Detective Freddie Fitzgerald of the Upshur County sheriff's office.

The 5-year-old was abducted from her bedroom in Big Sandy, about 95 miles east of Dallas, one night in April 1986.

We have to talk to him — there is no getting around it," Fitzgerald said. "We have to err on the side of caution, but this information brings hope to a case where hope was all but abandoned."

Penton said in an Ohio jailhouse interview with the Tyler Morning Telegraph that authorities are using him as a scapegoat to settle old cases that he had nothing to do with.

Laredo police crack down on student scavenger hunt

LAREDO (AP) - A citywide scavenger hunt turned sour for 40 high school students when Laredo police caught wind of the caper and arrested them on felony charges of theft and engaging in organized criminal activity.

Police accused the students - most of them seniors at Laredo high schools of swiping up to five truckloads of loot from across town. The scavenger list included items such as city traffic signs and pinatas, police said.

"We will cooperate fully, review the case and collaborate with officials to

determine all the facts," said Marco Alvarado, spokesman for the Laredo school district. "If needed, we will take appropriate action as specified in the student Code of Conduct.

Police arrested the 32 adults and eight juveniles early Saturday morning. The students' names were not released.

Officers first uncovered the escapade when a group of five students was pulled over for speeding. The car contained numerous stolen stop signs, a garden hose and other items, police said.

A short time later, the police department started receiving calls from residents who were angry about commotion caused by cars speeding in their neighborhood and stopping at a vacant lot.

Police determined the lot to be a dropoff point for stolen items. Officers then set up surveillance of the area and arrested the students as they came to drop off stolen items, the department said.

The older students were taken to the Webb County Jail, while the younger students were taken to a juvenile detention center. The police also impounded several of the students' vehicles.

Juan Cruz, an attorney for United Independent School District, said the district would review the criminal charges on Monday and figure out what action to take.

A third-degree felony charge of engaging in organized criminal activity is punishable by up to 10 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine. A state jail felony theft charge is punishable by up to two years in prison and a fine of up to

Police: Irving father fatally shoots infant, injures toddler

IRVING (AP) — An Irving man fatally shot his 8-month old daughter and gravely wounded his 3-year-old son before turning the gun on himself, police said.

Irving police spokesman David Tull said officers found Hector Rolondo Medina lying in the front yard of a home shortly after 6:30 p.m. Sunday. The 27year-old had multiple gunshot wounds to his upper body but was still alive.

Inside the home, police found Medina's injured son and daughter. The children were rushed to a Dallas hospital, where the girl later died, Tull said. The boy was listed in grave condition late Sunday.

Tull declined to release the children's names.

Medina, who is the children's biological father, was listed in critical condi-

The children's mother was gone when Medina and the two children were the only people in the house when the shooting occurred, Tull said.

"From what we've put together so far, apparently there were marital problems ongoing, but nothing that had risen to magnitude," Tull "Unfortunately it looks like it's a domestic violence situation that went terribly, terribly wrong."

Police were investigating Medina for a possible murder charge but he had not been charged as of early Monday, Tull

Coast Guard searches for four people missing in Gulf of Mexico

GALVESTON (AP) — The U.S. Coast Guard was searching Sunday for four people after a man called Galveston police to say his boat was sinking in the Gulf of Mexico about 10 miles offshore.

Melquisedec Acevedo reported in his first call to authorities that his boat was disabled. While a rescue boat crew was en route, Acevedo called to say his boat was sinking, Petty Officer Mario Romero said in a news release.

There was no sign of the boat or crew when the rescue boat arrived. One of those reported to be on the boat was a 12-year-old child, Romero said.

Two rescue boats, a rescue helicopter crew, a jet and two patrol boats were helping in the search.

Boy, 14, shocked when gunfire cuts power line

WACO (AP) - A 14-year-old boy was seriously injured Sunday when a power line severed by gunfire fell on the car he was trying to get into and shocked him, police said.

The teenager, whose name was not released, was flown to Parkland Hospital in Dallas from a Waco hospital.

Waco police say the strange turn of events began when dozens of shots were fired in the parking lot of a club. Investigators believe two men shot into the air and the bullets struck a power line, cutting it in half.

The power line fell onto the car, jolting the teenager who was trying to get in it. Residents nearby lost power for part of the morning, authorities said.

Officers were sent to disperse the crowd after getting reports of shots being fired. Police found more than 30 shell casings at the scene.

28 Union Pacific cars derail in East Texas accident

CHANDLER (AP) - Twenty-eight cars of a Union Pacific train derailed Sunday afternoon just west of the Neches River in Henderson County.

No injuries were reported but some nearby homes were evacuated as a precaution when a fire broke out, Henderson County Sheriff's Lt. Pat McWilliams said. Evacuations also took place in Smith County. Residents were allowed to return to their homes Sunday.

Joe Arbona, a spokesman for Union Pacific, said Sunday night a grass fire that appeared unconnected to the derailment but may have involved some rail ties had been extinguished.

Some lubricant oil had leaked from one of the cars. But there were no toxic inhalants in the 28 cars that derailed. The cars were carrying a variety of

things and some were empty, Arbona said.

Greg Morgan, operations manager for Tyler Water Utilities, said the city shut down its Lake Palestine water treatment plant as a precaution because some material spilled into the lake.

Nazareth didn't disappoint on its 22nd trip to the state tournament as the Swiftettes won their 18th state championship.


The Swiftettes bombarded the Lady Kats from beyond the three-point line all game long, knocking down 9-of-19 from beyond the arc while outrebounding Garden City



Sampay to be asset for Hawks at region

For the past two seasons Brandon Sampay has been a fixture in the starting lineup for Howard's basketball team and, according to the coaching staff, he has been model student-athlete who will be missed when he graduates.

Sure as the Hawks take the court in white uniforms with red trim at Dorothy Garrett Coliseum, Sampay starts at power-forward. In fact, during his two seasons, only once did he not start and that was due to a family emer-

"Brandon's work ethic in practice is second to none," Howard assistant head coach Jason Sauter said. "Over the past year he has improved his play in the post, become more dependable on the boards and he continues to run the floor extremely well. Everyone we have ever talked to is amazed at how well he runs the floor."

The 6-8, 255-pound sophomore from Inglewood, Calif., is enrolled in four classes at Howard right now, but needs only one to graduate. On the court he is averaging 13.4 points, 6.6 rebounds and 1.5 steals a game — good enough to rank in the top 10 in scoring and top 20 in steals for the Western Junior College Athletic Conference.

According to the Hawks coaching staff, Sampay has been nothing short of an asset to the entire Howard College athletic program.

"Brandon has always done well in the classroom and he has always represent-

ed Howard College the right way on and off the court," Sauter said.

"He's a lead by example type of guy and we're pleased to have him on campus. When he graduates from here, he is going to move on and help another college win a lot of ball games.'

Some of the schools that have offered Sampay a scholarship are Wichita State, UNLV, Cal State Fullerton, Wyoming and California, to name a few.

"I've been to Wichita State and I really enjoyed my visit," Sampay said, when asked if he was leaning toward one school or another. "Right now I'm concentrating on the Regional V Tournament this week — I'll have plenty of time to decide where I go from here when the season is over."

At this time, according to NCAA rules, Brandon must wait until April before he can sign with another school.

Upon arriving at Howard, the young kid from California admitted to looking like more of a football player than a hoopster. According to Sampay, the coaching staff at Howard trimmed his physique and helped mold him into the player he is today.

"One of the biggest improvements in my game is at the free throw line," Sampay commented. "When I was in high school I shot 33 percent from the line. After working with the coaches here, I improved to 48 percent last year and right now I'm shooting 71 percent. My next goal is to develop a second move down low, something I must have

After great thought, he bid five diamonds - which East, of course, doubled and everyone passed.

West led the king of clubs and

continued with the ace, East discarding a heart. West then shifted to a spade. Declarer took dummy's acc and returned the ten of diamonds, covered by the king and acc. He then crossed to the ace of hearts and led the nine of diamonds, covered by East's jack and South's queen.

Six tricks had been played, and South had won four of them. At this point, East turned to declarer, showed him his cards and said matter-of-factly, "I think the rest are And so they were. East had the 7-

6-5 of diamonds and K-O-J-3 of spades. Whatever declarer led next, East would win the trick with a trump and cash the 7-6 of diamonds and four spades to defeat the contract seven tricks — 2,000 points! Of course, South could have saved





On March 5, 1946, Winston Churchill delivered his famous "Iron Curtain" speech at Westminster College in Fulton, Mo. Said Churchill: "From Stettin in the Baltic, to Trieste in the Adriatic, an 'iron curtain' has descended across the continent, allowing police governments to rule Eastern Europe."

On this date:

In 1770, the Boston Massacre took place as British soldiers who'd been taunted by a crowd of colonists opened fire, killing five people.

In 1849, Zachary Taylor took the oath of office at his presidential inauguration. In 1868, the Senate was

organized into a Court of Impeachment to decide charges against President Andrew Johnson. In 1933, in German parliamentary elections, the Nazi


