"Blacks hate us," Eng wrote. Every Asian who has ever come across them knows that they take racist remarks at us." Wilson, who noted that Eng "did touch a chord with some Asian-Americans," also remarked on how inaccurate hatred was. She knows: Her father is African-American and her late mother, Japanese-American. News organizations have a responsibility to print copy that
withstands vetting. As for Eng's withstands vetting. As for Eng's work, Wilson noted, "It's not jou
nalism, and it's not acceptable."

## 200 years for child pornography

Ten Ten years is the minimum sen
tence in Arizon tence in Arizona for any crime minor," and the rule is that sentences for multiple counts must be served consecutively. So the sentence for 20 counts automatically becomes 200 years. Mr. Berger's lawyers argued in the papers filed with the Court cuted in federal court, as he coul have been, for possessing the same images, the sentence would have been five years, as it would have having no prohibition on early release or good-time credits. Arizona's law, as applied to the facts of this case, produces the harshest sentence in the country, according to the dissent in the
Arizona Supreme Court. That court upheld Mr. Berger's sen tence in an opinion that focused on the legality of the 10 -year min
of them, served consecutively The petition to the Supreme Court focused on the total term. Surely a differential of 195 years
between what the feds think the cotween what is "worth" and what
conduct Arizona thinks might suggest that the Arizona scheme is fundamentally out of whack, which is essen tially what's required for a conclu sion that a punishment
and unusual' within the Constitution's prohibition of such treatment.
It's easy to understand legislators voting for a law setting tough
minimum sentences for those who minimum sentences for those who are in any way involved in "sexu-
al exploitation of a minor," includ al exploitation of a minor, includ
ing those who pay to view it. After all, it's just such demand that cre ates the market for the product. And who wants to be the one to argue for different levels of crimi nality for the viewer, the purveyor so may lead to the label of being "soft" on crime, especially kiddie porn, a label that requires no further explanation, and invites none, from voters? When it comes to crime, and this kind of crime in
particular, the conventional wisdom, at least for those seeking office, is that you can't be too tough.
The problem is that when you apply the results to real cases, multiply mandatory minimum to sentences, as they do here, you can be too tough. The justices of the Supreme Court have been increasingly willing to examine been denied the ability to judge due to federal sentencing guidelines that have limited their discretion to individualize sentences
ively increasing the power of the prosecutor to set sentences by deciding what to charge, comes at he expense of the person who is smartest in the room, and the one chosen for that function. This shift is increasingly well-recog. nized.
But th But the Court has been much less willing to look at the sen-
tences themselves, lest they be tences themselves, lest they be
required to start drawing lines for which there is no particular basis. If not 200 years, then what?
A hundred? A hundred? Fifty? Twenty? Short of death what is too much, and how do you define it, given that there is no question of what constitutes just punishment?
Interestingly enough, no similar reluctance affects the Court when ment viewed as unduly harsh As Ohio State University law professor Doug Berman has point ed out, both in his blog and in press interviews, this Court has repeatedly shown jits willingness to limit "extreme corporate punout excessive punitive damage awards, most recently vacating order against Phillip Morris just last week. ## Kings forward Artest arrested after woman reports violence

SACRAMENTO, Calif. Sacramento Kings forward Ron Artest was arrested Monday and excused indefinitely from the team after a woman said he
shoved her to the floor inside his home and prevented her from calling 911.
Placer County sheriff's
authorities said authorities said the woman reported she and Artest were
arguing inside the home arguing inside the home
Monday morning when he pushed her. The argument moved outside when Artest tried to leave in his Hummer, sheriff's Sgt. Andrew Scott said during a news conference. Scott said of the argument "Mr. Artest had shoved the victim to the floor several times, then he attempted to leave." The woman threw a pot at the Hummer, shattering its wind
shield, Scott said. He would shield, Scott said. He would not
disclose the woman's relation ship with Artest but said a 3 -year-old girl was inside the house during the incident. Deputies arrived around 9:30 a.m. at Artest's five-acre estate in the Sacramento suburb of
Loomis and arrested him on
suspicion of domestic violence, suspended and still was being
