Ultra-modern High School Building Near Completion

And from the ashes there arose . . .

In this case there has emerged one of the very finest high school buildings of the plains serving a community of comparable size to Friona.

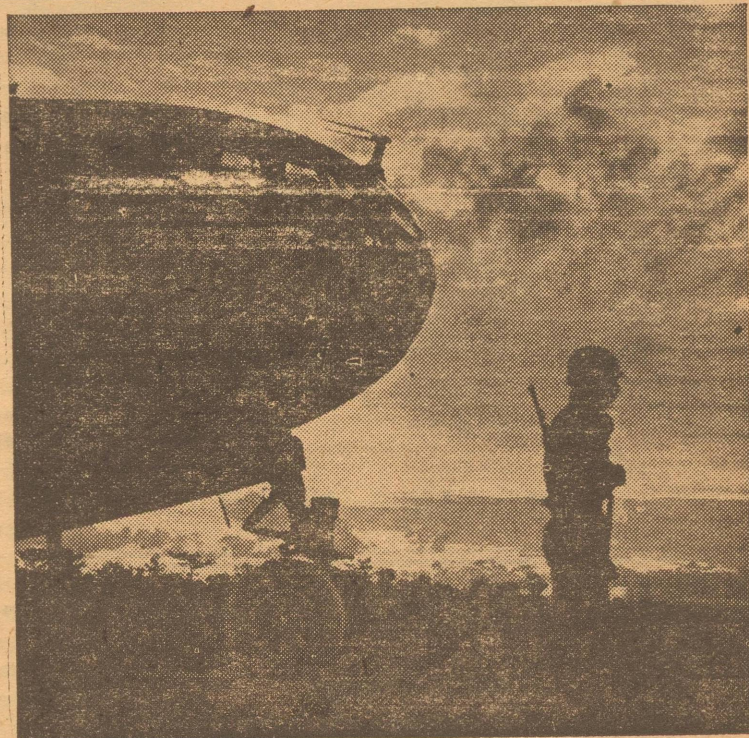
Contractors and school officials disclosed this week that completion of the rebuilt and enlarged high school building in Friona will be accomplished soon after mid-July, and moving from the temporary quarters used in many instances last year will commence immediately afterward.

So complete has been the rebuilding and so thorough has been the furnishing of the entire school with the latest equipment available, that one not acquainted with the history of the structure might well marvel at a beautiful all-new plant.

On approaching the building from any side, probably the first impression recorded would be that of the large window space. Actually, no additional windows were installed in the re-built section of the building, but the designs of the aluminum framed panes present less interference with the view and the light. There are 103 windows in the entire building, each to be protected by metal screens.

The outside appearance of the building has been further improved by sand blasting of all the stone and brick work; no differential is thus noted between the renovated brick and the new material.

Principal Dillie Kelley, assisted by Tom Jarbo, is devoting the entire summer to direction of the re-modeling and moving of furnishings into the classrooms.

Largest Department

Largest single unit of the new building is the agricultural-vocational department, occupying near one-third of the total floor space of the structure.

Situated in the northwest wing of the building, the agricultural department consists of a metal and woodworking shop where power tools, a forge, etc. are to be installed, an adjacent office for instructor J. T. Gee, a tool room finished with lumber walls forming a natural tool rack, a science room where new laboratory equipment is being installed for milk testing, etc., and a classroom.

Features found throughout the building include tile floors in varied colors and walls in eye-appeal pastel colors including tans, greys, greens, and off-whites. Engineers planned the painting of all walls to correspond with the amount of light admitted to that particular room.

Most often the walls are of a darker color up to wainscot height, and a different shade is painted on the front of the room, providing at least three pastel shades in each classroom. Paint used is of the highest grade, being a water-resistant rubber paint.

Each lecture room also is equipped with a cork bulletin board together with a light green blackboard. Twin lockers are in each classroom for use of the teacher. Slack-faced tile of wainscot height lines the halls of the building.

Safety Emphasized

Both safety and appearance factors have been paid special attention throughout the construction.

tion. For instance there is no

in-entrance to the basement boiler room in compliance with safety recommendations. The roof of the entire building is of floating concrete design. Each outside entrance opens into a small vestibule separated from the halls by glass doors and glass walls to the sides and top. Every wall in the structure is of sound-proof construction.

New Homemaking Facilities

Another of the more spectacular departments is the homemaking section on the west side of the building where new equipment is being installed including four complete Youngstown kitchen units, each grouped around a new stove (three gas stoves and one electric, each of different make to be installed). An ample number of electric outlets line the room providing power for the sewing machines, work tables, the laundry unit consisting of an automatic washer and dryer, and the freezing units.

A fitting room and supply room joins the large laboratory to the north.

The band department is being housed under the same roof, located in the northeast corner of the building. This sound-proofed unit consists of a large hall and a store room.

A two-way communication system is being installed throughout the school, with outlets in every lecture room. Three telephones also are incorporated in the plans, one each to the offices of the superintendent, principal, and vocational instructor.

The janitor will also benefit by the re-building plans, now being afforded one room and two closets

Miss Mary Reeve is working in the Friona area on the easement sign-up. She will be at the Reeve Chevrolet firm in Friona all day this Saturday, and those desiring the rural phone service are urged to contact her there for

signing of the easements. No additional expense is involved for those already having paid their membership fees. Miss Reeve is making rural calls this week, and some 80 signers have been contacted in the local area, but this is a very small percentage of the total needed, she pointed out, and she would appreciate the would-be consumers contacting her Saturday.

Mrs. Floyd Schlenker is working on the same project in the Rhea Community.

Miss Reeve also announces that she has application forms on hand for those who yet have made no application for the phone service, and she will be glad to help fill these out at any time.

Contract for the construction of the lines is hoped for by July 30th, and this will be possible, authorities note, if enough signers are obtained before that date. A considerable amount of material already is on the ground for construction use just as soon as the contract is negotiated.

Those wishing ballots mailed to servicemen, however, must get the addresses to the clerk's office immediately so that the GI will have time to get the ballot back before the July 22nd deadline.

Texas Press Association Asks For Publication of Public Expenditures In Local Newspapers of The State

The following resolution was entered in the minutes of the recent Texas Press Association, and we think it represents a move long overdue. We re-print:

We draw attention to the inadequacy of our laws requiring publication of legal notices on the part of our public officials, whose authority and responsibility it is to collect and disburse public funds (commonly known as our tax money).

WHEREAS, many departments of our government, city commissions, county commissions, school board districts, and others of similar nature, seldom if ever have published in newspapers serving the community involved, understandable audits of public expenditures, for the benefit and criticism of the voters and tax payers:

WHEREAS, the only hope we have of placing a curb upon the careless, wasteful, extravagance, and often corrupt handling of public funds, is by turning the light of publicity, and revealing the truth, upon such collection and disbursement of public funds.

WHEREAS, Thomas Jefferson pointed out the danger inherent in carelessly turning everything over to men whom we elect to office simply because we individually might have confidence in them, warning that such men in public office should be bound down by law,

WHEREAS, it is quite obvious that those charged with spending the tax-payers money would give more serious attention to each individual expense item if at the time the money was being spent public officials exercising this authority knew that the public (and the nextdoor neighbor!!!) would read about each and every expense item in the home-town newspaper;

WHEREAS, state laws in other states recognize the need of such detailed publication of all expenditures of public monies, wherein said expenditures are listed in the local or regional newspaper, item by item, dollar by dollar; and that experience in other states proves that the cost of publication is more than justified by its enormous saving in the tax payers' money;

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Legislative Committee of the Texas Press Association be called upon to study this particular phase of our state law and that said committee be empowered to suggest corrective measures for consideration by the State Legislative body.

Friona is without a chamber of commerce manager at this date, with Al Romich leaving over the week-end to accept his post at Elizabethtown, Kentucky.

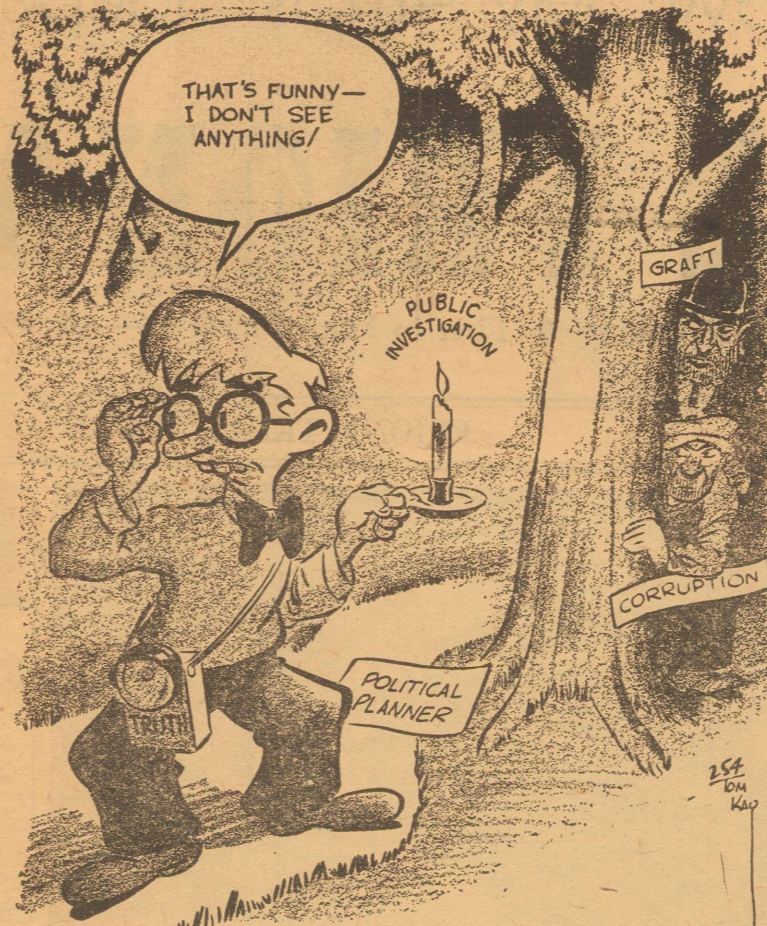
We wish to record our name on the side of the ledger with those who recognize that much has been accomplished in the two years just past in which concentrated attention has been given community service through a commerce organization.

WASHINGTON AND—"Small Business"

Make no mistake about it. The millions of dollars, almost \$100 million, extracted from everybody's income to keep thousands of officials of the Office of Price Stabilization, known as OPS, or Office Plenty Screwy, are not wasted.

The Office Plenty Screwy, may, and has, let prices advance on most things going on the family dinner table, but there OPS draws the line. If you pay more than ceiling prices for the use of a pool table, the OPS is ready to crack down hard.

That's what the man says. The man is Lambert S. O'Malley, acting enforcement director for OPS. He said it in the 1480th OPS press communique.

Mr. O'Malley is one tough hombre, indeed, because he states 230 actions have been filed by OPS against service trades businesses; the filing of 625 more is contemplated.

The press release says nothing about violations of any bureaucratic price ceilings. These businesses are just accused of failure to keep and file records and reports, needed by the army of OPS officials to appear they are doing something for fat government checks.

In issuing this edict, the Office Plenty Screwy places on a high plane the nation's pool and billiard rooms, and bowling alleys. They number among the service trades in the press release of which Mr. O'Malley says "It is required in this important area of our economy that all service trade establishments be brought into compliance immediately."

In the listing of service trade establishments, Mr. O'Malley goes even further. Not only are pool halls and bowling alleys listed as big factors in the cost of living, but also every establishment that has "a juke box."

And apparently to make OPS edicts retroactive to cover the pages of time, livery stables are also included.

It is possible that Mr. O'Malley and his associates may have many idle hours and thus a large part of their incomes may go to pool halls and bowling alleys.

But to hard working small businessmen and their employees, it is doubtful that such establishments materially increase the overall family cost of living.

They can also figure out which would be of more benefit to them. To hold the price of a game of pool down, or to save the millions of tax dollars spent keeping legions of the Office Plenty Screwy marching down every highway and byway.

It is interesting to note that on the same day OPS released the earth-shaking pool table edict, that MSA, successor to the Marshall Plan, announced another \$10 million given away. \$20 million were given away two days previously.

U. S. coal, to the extent of \$2,400,000 was shipped to France who has great coal fields, \$15 million worth of crude oil was shipped from Saudi Arabia to Italy, paid by U. S. taxes.

And copper, which officials say is in short supply in the U. S. is shipped on that day to the Netherlands. A full half million dollars worth, taken from the U. S. supply. Perhaps the OPS is not the only Office Plenty Screwy in Washington.

The Law and You

DO YOU KNOW what the Sixth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, being a part of the United States, is?

Amendment Number Six states "In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which districts shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense."

This Amendment means that a Defendant may not be kept in jail for an extended period of time without being tried, and that he has a right to have on the jury those who are not prejudiced against him, and that the jury shall be made up of impartial men, who have formed no previous opinion as to the guilt or innocence of the Defendant. It also means that the individual may be tried where the offense is committed, and not taken a great distance away from the place of the offense and tried, and thus be deprived of witnesses in his favor. This Amendment also gives to the Defendant the full force of the law to require witnesses

in his behalf to attend Court and testify in his behalf, and guarantees to him the right of legal counsel to defend him on his trial. It gives to every man his day in Court, and his right to be heard. This Amendment has saved many an innocent man from punishment, where the first appearance of the evidence against him looked very bad, but upon a full ex-

amination of it before the Court his innocence was established. It gives full force to an old saying, "Even though a man may be guilty, and due to be hung, he has a right to be hung legally."

Tips on Touring

Women's Travel Authority Although our national forests are accessible by car to virtually every vacationer, they are usually less crowded than national parks. Maintained by the Forest Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, more than 176 million acres of hilly and mountainous terrain in 36 states are available for the enjoyment of all amateur woodsmen.

The national forest tourist can combine the ease of resort life with the ruggedness of trail life in any proportion he or she prefers. Along with plenty of free campgrounds, there are also dude ranches, private hotels and cabin camps.

The vacationer who really wants "to get away from it all" can penetrate deep into wilderness areas via trail or water. Those who prefer to observe nature in comfort can enjoy thousands of miles of wooded high-ways.

The focus of publicity on national parks is certainly well-deserved, but it has made them the vacation mecca of millions. Not one person in ten, on the other hand, is aware of the recreational possibilities of our national forests. So they are uncrowded, inexpensive, and tailor-made for the motoring vacationer.

Grass Roots

Speaking of left handed compliments!!! Steve Clements told me that last week's column was the best I had ever written. Thank you for your kindness. Steve, however, flattery will get you nowhere incidently, the reason for the blank spaces in last week's column was not due to my going fishing.

BUFFEL GRASS: There is quite a lot of interest in this grass now and from all indications it will play a very important role in pasture programs in some sections of the country. On my trip to the meeting at College Station, I saw this grass growing five feet tall under dryland conditions. It is doubtful, however, that this grass will survive the winter in this area. It is quite possible that the growth of this grass during the summer months will be such that we could afford to seed it for an annual. For a check of this, I bought five pounds of the seed and talked Jay Boston into seeding it. It was seeded during the last cold spell we had in May, and didn't come up until the ground had warmed up in June. The grass has made a very rapid growth since it came up though, and looks good to date. However, I will not make any recommendation for the seeding of Buffel Grass until I can tell what our trial planting is going to do.

KRILIUM: Reader's Digest, Look, and several of the other leading periodicals, carried the story of this wonder chemical. It is not a fertilizer, but a soil conditioner. This chemical reacts in the soil similar to plowing under organic matter. Krilium is not ready for extensive agricultural use as yet because of the expense, but it is available in small packages for use in gardens, flower gardens, and on lawns. Here are some of the things Krilium will do. Increase water penetration, makes soil easy to work, allows good

eration of roots, prevents shifting and packing of soil under rainfall. What does all of this mean—just this—Krilium will turn hard clay into loose loam-like soil at once. To make a long story short, this stuff works. I had several places in my new lawn that packed and washed until it was as hard as cement, and water wouldn't penetrate more than a quarter of an inch. The result was a long bare spot in my yard. I put this stuff on the ground the first of the week, wet it down good, and it hasn't dried out a time since. The soil instead of being tight and packed, is now loose and friable. I'll show it to you and also have some spots of similar condition where I didn't use it for comparison. You people with problem soil, where you are trying to get lawns, gardens and flowers to grow, will profit first from Krilium, however it will only be a short time until the stuff will be available for use on large acreage.

VETCH: This program is getting underway and still warrants all the propaganda I can put out about it. The Hill Brothers have some hundred acres already seeded, and Ed Dzuik was in yesterday talking over the possibilities of this fine legume.

Picked up an interesting piece of reading from the University of Wyoming. The pamphlet boiled down to about this. Cows eat what tastes best. Noting that cattle usually grazed fertilized pastures more rapidly than unfertilized, scientists tried to find a reason. It seems that the phosphorous, essential for proper sugar metabolism in plants, often is low or lacking in unfertilized grass. Since both phosphorous and sugar make grass palatable, cows don't like fertilized grasses best. Simple, isn't it?

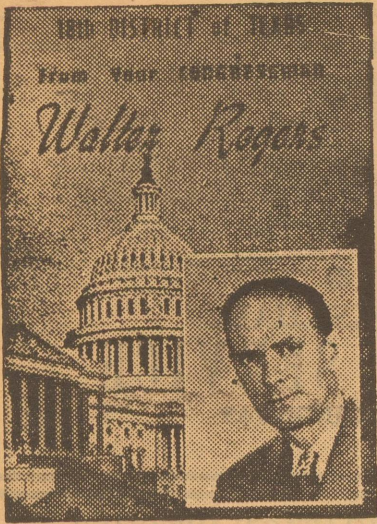

As most of you know, the House action on controls virtually eliminated all controls that the Members of Congress felt were unnecessary and detrimental to the economy. This bill goes to a conference committee between the House and the Senate to reconcile the differences between the two Houses. A number of the controls that were killed by the House are still in the Senate bill, and it is entirely possible that the conference committee will be confronted with some difficulty in agreeing on a final bill. In any event, the action of the House of Representatives was another step away from federal regimentation and government control. There are a number of strategic materials and supplies that are in short supply, and these must necessarily be subject to proper allocation in order to insure their availability

for defense purposes. It has always been my position that this matter should be set up and treated in separate legislation so that the Congress would not be placed in the position of having to accept undesirable and unnecessary controls on materials and products not in short supply in order to insure proper allocation of these strategic products and materials. It was interesting to note in the proceedings that twelve of the Texas members cast identical votes on this legislation on all roll calls. These included four amendments and the vote on final passage. It was also interesting to note that all during the debate on this bill the gallery was well filled with employees of the OPS and many OPS cars were parked around the Capitol. If the House version of this bill prevails, it will mean that there will be a sizable reduction in the federal payroll insofar as the OPS and similar agencies are concerned. It will also mean that many small merchants in all fields will be relieved of the tremendous burden of having to devote most of their time to filling out government forms and trying to understand the double talk that is contained in most orders and regulations issued by these agencies. I know that this will be a relief to these merchants and small business people and that they will certainly welcome it. You will no doubt be told that such a course will inevitably lead to inflation. Such is not the case. If any inflation results, it is going to be strictly man-

made, and the people of this country can prevent it. There will no doubt be attempts by some selfish interests, political and otherwise, to frighten the American people by forcing prices up on

some articles. This situation can be remedied very quickly by retaliation on the part of the house wife, who does most of the buying, and I hope that the people of this country will not permit themselves to be taken advantage of by selfish interests, either political or extra profit seeking.

During the debate I offered an amendment to try to correct the wrong that has been imposed upon the farmers under the Fair Labor Standards Act. It is that provision in the Fair Labor Standards Act that caused the farmers of our section of the country so much trouble the past two years during harvest. However, absenteeism caught up with us and cost us the amendment. There were only approximately 110 members present when this amendment came up, about one-fourth of the membership of the House. A great majority of these were big city members, and you can imagine what happened to us country boys when we tried to help the farmers and the migrant workers. It was

another case of these so-called coalitions in the House falling to pieces. The extreme liberals teamed up with the so-called extreme conservatives and snowed the country boys under. We got two votes on the Republican side of the Aisle and eight on the Democratic side. However, this is not a new experience for those of us from the South and Southwest, but we never give up, and that is what worries the big city boys. We knew that we didn't have a chance of passing the amendment under the circumstances, but I wanted to separate the sheep from the goats, and that is exactly what we did.

The New Immigration Bill

The House soundly overrode the President's veto on the new immigration bill, and I sincerely hope that the Senate will do the same.

Tidelands

The tidelands bill is still in the Senate waiting to be voted on, on the question of overriding the President's veto. It presently appears that this vote will not be taken before fall. It was originally agreed, as I told you in a previous newsletter, that the vote would be taken between June 5th and the 10th. However, both sides were rather reluctant for an immediate showdown and postponed the matter. Unless there is a change in the plans, it could well be that the vote will not be taken until Congress reconvenes after the November elections, which is not improbable. This is one reason that I will hesitate to vote for adjournment sine die, as I want to see this tidelands veto overridden as soon as possible and these lands returned to their rightful owners, the States.

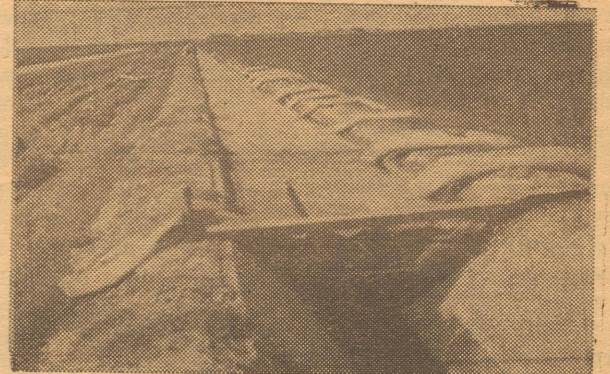

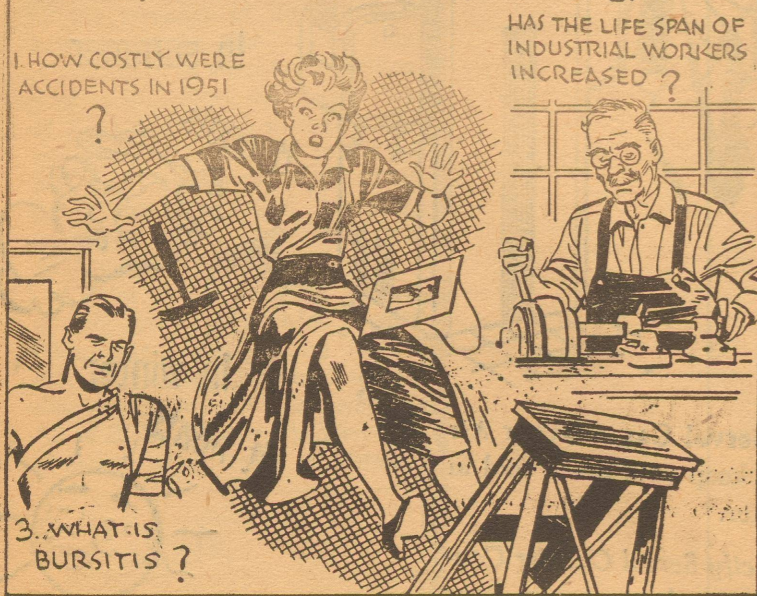

Answer to Question No. 1:

Estimated losses from fatal and non-fatal accidents in 1951 were \$9 billion, including wage losses, medical expenses, insurance costs, production delays, damage to equipment and property. Accidents killed 93,000 people in the United States during the year and injured more than 9 million others. One out of every seventeen persons in the country suffered a disabling injury during the year. Automobile accidents killed 37,500, the highest toll in ten years. Home accidents took 27,000 lives and occupational mishaps caused 16,000 deaths. This should be a warning to all of us. Be careful!

Answer to Question No. 2:

The average life expectancy of industrial workers in the United States today is more than 68 years. This represents a sharp increase over the average life span of industrial workers early in this cen-

tury when it was only 47 years. It reflects, among other things, the wide expansion of medical knowledge, the defeat of many diseases, advances in sanitary practices, improved diet, and better working conditions.

Answer to Question No. 3:

Bursitis is one of the most common, most discomforting and least understood of ordinary human afflictions. It commonly involves the bursa (sac with fluid over a joint) over the shoulder. Bursitis usually comes from an injury or an infection and frequently can be treated by simple means under the direction of your family doctor. If it does not readily yield to this treatment, the physician may withdraw the fluid or give X-ray treatment, or apply a restraining brace. Surgery is rarely needed.

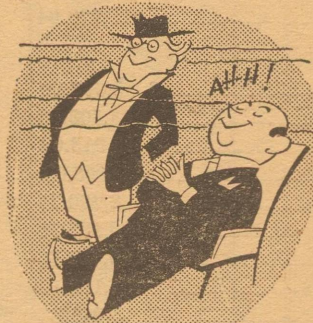

**Showers, Hot Days Mark Harvest Week;
Some Areas Receive 3.5 Inches Rain
In Friday and Tuesday Thundershowers**

Harvesting is well along in Farmer County this week with most communities benefitting from hot days of sunshine lasting until much of the wheat was cut. Heavy showers and rain fell in various sectors of the county

over the week-end, however, halting some harvest but being welcomed by the cotton and row crop farmers.

Friday afternoon clouds brought up to 1 1/2 inches of rain northwest of Friona in the vicinity of the E. G. Phipps farm, and they were followed that evening by over 1 inch in the same vicinity. Friona received 1.01 inches Friday night. Showers that night varied over the county, with most parts receiving some moisture.

On Tuesday afternoon heavy showers fell in the northeast part of the county and in parts north and west. Joe Moyer reported that he received over an inch from this fall.

Highest wheat yield reported to The Star this week was that of the Schlab brothers 4 miles east of Black, harvesting some 55 acres of irrigated, fertilized grain for a yield of over 64 bushels per acre. This was delivered to the Black Grain Company.

Harvest of the panhandle wheat crop has been conservatively estimated by the agriculture specialists of the Santa Fe railway as 37,000,000 bushels in contrast to the last forecast of over 41 million bushels.

The Kansas wheat harvest is being dubbed second largest in history there, with 300 million bushels forecast. Harvest there is about half complete. The United States Department of Agriculture says that the grain cut there to date is averaging 20-22 bushels per acre.

Cotton stands throughout Texas are reported generally good with growth about normal. A heavy set of squares covers fields in the Houston area, and much of the crop is blooming there. Local cotton, though much of it has been re-planted, is looking good since the rains, but additional moisture would be welcomed.

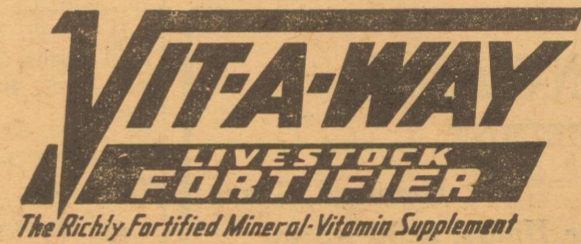
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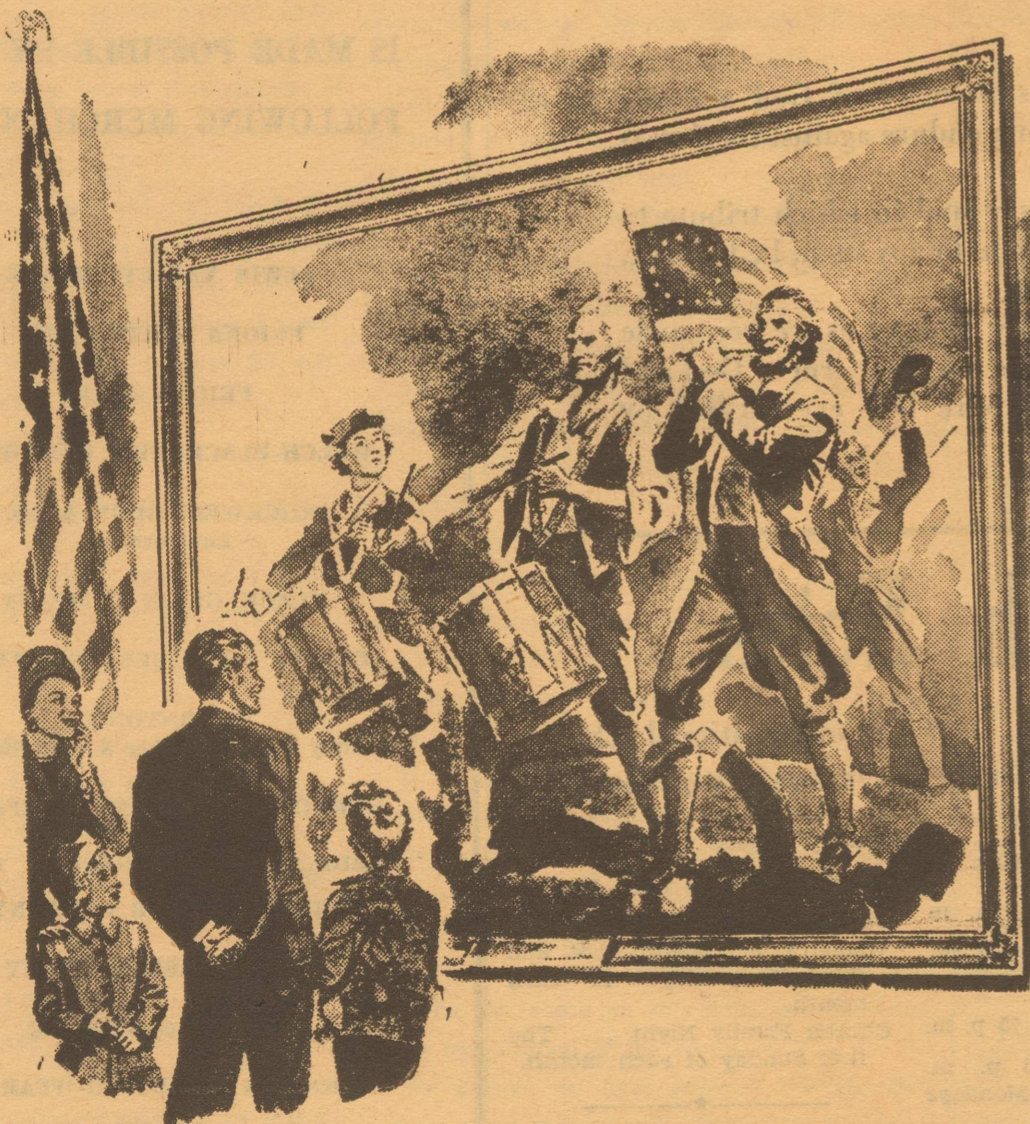
