### Monday Morning Musings...

#### Studied the Platforms?

In checking the major planks of both the national Democratic and Republican parties, this writer finds no striking differences, inasmuch as the wording used by both groups is at times ambiguous. Both parties pledge sounder government - financially and politically - although the Republicans are more definite in their plan to economize in foreign spending and in inter-

So for this reason, we minimize the platforms themselves in studying the placing of our vote. Rather we are considering the personalities involved, the benefits that we believe will come by a change in adminstration, and the psycological effect that would have its repercussions both here and abroad if the nation again endorsed the party in power that has become known in late years for its spending and tolerance of graft.

Actually, we believe the farm program, the administrative item that most closely affects our own locality, will be with us from now on, regardless of party in power; so we are not alarmed about any changes in this field.

Through the cooperation of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, we are listing below a consise comparison of the two national platforms as relating to national defense and foreign program spending - and even these are so general in their phrasing that votes hardly could be cast on them alone. That's why we're advocating attention to the man and to a change of administration rather than strict study of the written

Language of the two platforms on these subjects, in essence, as follows:

National Defense:

Democratic platform: Promises continued support of "the expansion and maintenance of military an civil defense forces required for our national safety;" rejects "The defeatest view of those who say we cannot afford the expense and effort necesary to defend ourselves."


Republican platform: Promises adequate support for national defense and for meeting treaty obligations; seeks "quickest possible development" of adequate air power; promises to "strip ur entire preparedness program clean of waste," and to eliminate conflict inertia and lack of cooperation among the armed forces.

Foreign program spending:

Democratic platform: Promises to encourage the "economic and political security of Europe," to "carry forward and expand the Voice of American programs, to contine to aid Israel and the Middle East, to aid growth of the United Nations, to continue South American programs, and to help India and Pakistan create a better life for their people." Support is pledged for expansion of the Point Four program to help undeveloped lands raise living standards. Continuation of present aid to Nationalist China is

Republican platform: Promises to "encourage and aid" collective security force in western Europe and elewhere and to "end neglect of the Far East;" pledges aid to Israel and the Arab states. Support f the United Nations and strengthening of ties with South America are pledged. Measuring of foreign commitments "so that they can be borne without endangering the economic health of the United States" is also promised. This plank declares for continuance of the program of exchange of students with foreign countries and efforts for improvement of underdeveloped countries. It promises "to sever from the public payroll all the hordes of loafers, incompetents and unnecessary employees who clutter up the aministration of our foreign affairs. The party will rid the State Department and other agencies of "those responsible for the needless perils in which we find ourselves," the plank

## "Small Business"

The furore stirred up by the release of the hitherto secret rereport of the Federal Trade Commission on an international oil monopoly to the Senate Small Business Committee, is creating the No. 1 problem in Washington right now.

\* \* \* \*
The report. ly released barrage of posed a problem which will

Washington C. W. Harder feels it must be solved on the basis of the facts brought out.

Here are some of the facts contained in almost 400 printed pages. Five U. S. companies, Standard of New Jersey, Standard of California, Socony-Va-cuum, Gulf and Texaco, plus two British firms, Anglo-Iranian and Royal Dutch Shell, control the world's known petroleum reserves and production

\* \* \* \*
The FTC claims these seven control 33.6% of U. S. reserves, 81.2% of foreign reserves, or of all reserves. They also control 86.5% of Western hemisphere production; 96.1% of Eastern hemisphere production.

\* \* \*
FTC also shows in the report that these seven companies, through ownership of subsidiar-ies all over the world, have pegged prices, curtailed production to hold up those prices.

\* \* \* \*
With the start of the Marshall
Plan, which with its successor,
has cost U. S. taxpayers almost a billion and a half dollars to date for oil to Europe, the price of Mediterranean basin oil jumped from \$1.05 to \$2.22 per

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94% of this oil was sold by six of the Big Seven largely to their own subsidiaries in the nations

receiving aid.

A subsequent price adjustment resulted in this oil being sold in Europe for \$1.75 but when shipped halfway around the world to the U.S. the price was \$1.43. This resulted in the shut down of independent U. S. producers, drowned out by the flood of oil imported by the Big

The report also gives Aram-co's net profit for three years when the majority of sales was to nations receiving U. S. aid.

In 1948 it was 98.9 cents per barrel, in 1949 95.4 cents, in 1950 84.5 cents.

These and many other facts are reasons why something will have to be done, Washington feels, especially as this report has aroused more foreign interest than any Congressional report in the past. If nothing else, it is felt, world opinion will force

As to be expected, there are many solutions advanced. One, of course, is the Socialistic plan to nationalize the oil industry. The Big Seven seek to justify their revealed tactics on the basis of national welfare.

\* \* \*
But the most hopeful sigh seen
of an American settlement of the problem is the suit filed by Justice Department for \$67 million to recover alleged oil company overcharges to the Marshall Plan.

\* \* \*
This could be the first of a series of Justice Department actions under the anti-trust laws to put the U. S. oil industry on a free, independent and competitive basis. With the issue now dragged out into the open, anything can happen.







However, the result ha always been the same. The money collected from these additional so-called "substitute" taxes has never been sufficient to effect a reduction in other taxes. Actually, the existence of the funds thereby collected has always resulted in increased governmental expenditures providing additional services by the government to the people, many of which were not solicited and are unwanted. The job that Congress will have in the next few years is to see that cuts in federal spending result in direct benefit to the individual taxpayer in the form of a reduced tax bill. It makes little difference who may be President or which party may have contral of Congress, this job is going to be just as big, for the simple reason that most politicians, regardless of party, regardless of platform, and regardless of promises, seem to recognize as a cardinal rule that expenditures by the government providing all kinds of services to the citizens will sustain them in power. It is my belief that such a rule is false, especially in the Panhandle of Texas, that our people would much prefer that government services be confined to necessary services, and that the individual retain possession and control of as many of his dollars as possible. However, the fact remains that it is no less difficult today than in yesterday to repeal or deuce a tax levy. e are gaining much strength in our efforts to bring tax relief to the individual taxpayer, and I sinercely hope that this gain will continue.






