Trees Available At Minimum Cost For Windbreaks

Trees for windbreak purposes now are available to Parmer County farmers at the very minimum cost. County Agent Joe W. Jones has announced. The trees can be secured through the Texas Forestry Service for \$1.00 per hundred, and each order must be for at least 100 trees. Order blanks may be secured at the county agent's office or at the Farm Bureau and Chamber of Commerce offices in Friona.

Jones said that at present it is planned for the trees to be delivered on March 14th, 3:00 p. m., and those ordering will be expected to pick them up at that time.

Species available include red cedar, Chinese elm, cottonwood, sycamore, thornless honey locust, Russian mulberry, Osage orange, and Parnifolia elm.

Whitefield Showed Grand Champion At San Antonio

Championship honors in the Columbian sheep division of the San Antonio Livestock Exposition were topped last week by Otho Whitefield of Friona. His picture and others of his animals were run in both San Antonio papers last Friday, day after the judging.

The Whitefields took ten head of their fine sheep to the show and brought back the awards for grand champion ram, 1st place ribbon in the get-of-sire, and reserve champion ram, netting 3 first place awards, 2 second places, 1 third, 2 fourth placings, and 2 fifth classifications.

They brought back all animals except the reserve champion which sold for \$350.00 to L. A. Nordan, San Antonio oilman-sheepman and competitor in the show.

This is the third year the Whitefields have shown at San Antonio, last year taking grand champion ewe among other awards. They went down this year on Valentineday and returned this Monday night. Otho reported conditions had been bad downstate, with drought reported on to the coast. However a good rain fell while the show was in progress that will help alleviate the situation. He said the Friona area was actually in better condition regarding crops and pastures than any other he had seen in Texas.

Holsteins, Shorthorns In Top Bracket For January D.H.I.A. Production Tests

Holstein and Shorthorn herds took high herd honors in the January testing reports just released by the Parmer County Dairy Herd Improvement Association with Humphrey & Ellis Holstein herd taking first place with an average milk production of 919 lbs and 34 lbs butterfat.

The Humphrey Dairy Holstein herd took second, and the Leo Witkowski Shorthorn herd took third.

High milk producing cows for the month was Bud, a Humphrey & Ellis Holstein, producing 2300 lbs milk. She was followed by Witowski's Hornet, Shorthorn producing 2030 lbs.

Butterfat production honors went to Daisy, another Witkowski Shorthorn, producing 85 lbs butterfat.

Among the ten high cows in milk and butterfat production were animals from the above herds and that of Joe Harbin's Guernsey group. The 40 to 50 lbs class included animals from the D. C. Burnett Brown Swiss herd, the Witkowski herd of shorthorns, Robert Huseman's Jerseys, Harbin's Guernseys, Roy V. Miller's Jerseys, Humphrey's Hosteins, Virgil Teague's Shorthorns, Preston Martin's Holsteins, and Levi Johnson's Shorthorns. The 50-60 lbs group included animals from the Bobby Warren Shorthorn herd, and some animals from the above herds. Above 60 lbs were recorded in herds of Witkowski, Miller Humphrey, and Harbin.

Winning team for the drive was Joe Menefee, Friona director, and Hadley Reeve, Secretary-Treasurer. Together, they turned in 65 memberships. They were each awarded new hats for their work.

Second place winners were Henry Haseloff and Charles Christian of Farwell, who turned in 48 the first day, and wound up with 57. Hand carved bill folds were presented to them.

T. E. Lovett and O. B. Moyer claimed 3rd place with 30 memberships. They each received 6 quarts of permanent anti-freeze Running Lovett and Moyer a

close second and possibly tying them, were Earl Stevenson and Aubrey Ellison, Directors of Bovina. If final tabulations reveal a tie, these men will be awarded duplicate prizes.

A dinner served in Farwell for membership workers a week ago gave impetus to the drive and activity began and continued through last week. Several farmers took memberships at the close of the Lazbuddie meeting.

F. W. Reeve, Long-Time Civic Worker Notes Observations of Half Century

Editor's Note: Quite a bit of comment was received this year on the articles written about local pioneers and present-day civic workers. This week, we are doing the job a bit differently - we asked our friend, Mr. Floyd Reeve, to write his own article! We asked him to choose any subject of his choice - history of the area, observations, or an editorial theme. Mr. Reeve's article follows:

BY F. W. REEVE

Nye on to half century past, Farmer John, his young wife and baby girl landed at Friona. They were transplanted from some 1000 miles away. Their hope was to build for themselves a home in this great big beautiful land.

To try to give a vivid picture of their new country and surroundings would lead to telling stories and so slinging the lingo that people might think they were copies of the standard literary work, "Texas Bragg." Therefore this great big beautiful land will have to suffice for a description.

This wonderful expanse of raw rich prairie has since been transformed into farm after farm and home after home. A network of good roads connects these homes with on another and the beautiful little city of Friona is the natural destiny of all. But to the modern looker and prospective settler the big sight is still the great beautiful land.

This pioneer farmer and wife anticipated little of what they were up against on the home question. They soon learned the housing question could be solved; adobe could be had for the making, hazards of short crops could be overcome with calves and lambs on the great expanses of wild grass. They were ignorant of the need of water closer than the windmill. The U. S. W. P. A. out house was not yet thought of. Civilization was not yet developed to the point where they could honorably and with pioneer pride expect government aid or subsidy. In fact it has not been long since to call a good hardheaded democrat farmer, a socialist, would be equal for a show of physical skill in combat.

Life was not always smooth sailing but there was no thought of fudging on self reliance. Individual initiative coupled with a fair exchange of neighborly help

fullness was the power that started on the Union church idea.

The pioneer preacher being ed the neighborhood upward climb. There were problems of making a home other than housing, clothing and feeding the family.

The background of these early settlers was such that they were sure the children needed church influence. The occasional Sunday gathering with some distant neighboring settlers strengthened that conviction. An occasional gathering of neighbors at some lake-side for Sunday school and open air singing and games cultivated the church desire. The family of one little Hoosier girl was soon added to with five little Texans. Other farm and ranch families were growing also.

The Friona Union church supplied the need of these early families. It was of spontaneous origin. One of the co-owners of the big Hassel land and cattle company was a staunch church man and his enthusiasm was perhaps a twoedged reward. He believed the fast settling people should have church advantages and likely he believed churches would help the value of his holdings. The result was his money building four churches within a radius of some 2 miles. The Friona church was one of them. This donor believed church effort should be concentrated. To begin with the Friona church was truly a union church. It was a mix of nearly all the popular denominations. These were Methodist, Baptist, Christian, Pentacostal Presbyterian, Quaker, Lutheran and Episcopalian and one Congregationalist.

It has been said that there were at one time fifteen different shades of theological thinking represented in the pioneer church. People of the numerous churches can get along together

without making faces at one another. Farmer John saw it tried out. He soon became thoroughly aware of conflicting theological background in his congregation was very careful to stay away from scriptural interpretation that might lead to argument. He seemed to be of the opinion there was plenty of God within plain view of all, that needed cultivation and glorifying.

As for statements of faith each person was encouraged to look to and listen to his own intelligence and conscience. The whole group was assured liberty in their personal views and that the dignity of all sincere opinions were respected.

It was plain to see that this group of pioneers were honestly trying to build a community life of friendship. The good neighbor policy was practiced. The state from which one had moved, whether poor or poorer, or the church to which one had belonged was of little interest.

Each Sunday brought a fresh challenge, to better know ones neighbor. There was always a chance of a new settler being at the meeting. They might be from Rhea, Star Ranch, near Laabuddie, Finley, near Bootleg, Black or anywhere with in driving distance of the little community church.

They tried to practice the essence of true religion, and the idea of humbleness, generosity, honesty and considerate manners was never lost sight of. The virtues of thrift and love were held where all could see and gain inspiration. The attributes required to grow choice personalities came to be recognized as coming direct from natures foundation, God.

This little Friona church for a number of years was truly the bright spot for religious influence, and looked at one time as if its light might become as far reaching as the great big beautiful land it was trying to serve.

It did have an occasional criticism, that of over stressing the value of higher education. But friendship bridged all chasms.

For financial reasons this community church became a Congregational member. The Congregational home missionary association furnished capitol in time of need. The local church did

retain part of its original identity in that its official name was made Union Congregational.

The Congregational church was and is one of the old established churches of the nation. The perfectly natural course under congregational preaching was for the local church to signify the color of its own individual brand of theology. That in time, was a signal to other denominations who had their ear to the ground for a call. The big beautiful land looked like good fishing.

As a result Friona now has six nice church buildings and others threatening. The old business proverb, completion is the life of trade, is true of the church line of human endeavor. Spice adds to the joy of home surroundings.

The school has grown to as good as any in the land. The PTA, athletic association, the scouts, lodge and dance clubs are all making generous and efficient contribution towards lifting the country from the coyote and cowboy days.

But it is impractical to depend on organizations to do all the lifting. One of Friona's pastors uses the expression, "There is a bit of God in each of us." Christ's way of putting the idea is, "The kingdom of God is within ourselves." This bit of God - life is the most important phenomenon in the universe.

Men cooperating, man with his intellect can triumph and bring forth the noble instincts within him. More ideal conditions could be the natural growth if cultivated by improved men in this great big beautiful land.

Timeworn Landmark Moved; Oldtimers Recall Intergrating History of Weir Building and Half-Century Progress

One of the oldest, if not actually the oldest, Friona landmarks has been removed from Main Street — the old Weir building adjacent to Jack Anderson's barber shop.

Tracing the history of the old structure was somewhat difficult, however, as its early days preceded the residence of most "old timers" now living here. For instance the Reeve boys hitched their truck to move the frame building for new owner, Jim Wilson, but these boys and father, Floyd Reeve were relative newcomers, being here only since 1908, and they just didn't recall its early history!

However bits of information gathered from Reeve, Tom Crawford, John White, and Jack Anderson, revealed that the store was built probably in 1907 by McMillian and Fergus, landowners who had properties at that time north and west of

Friona. First occupants were a real estate firm and a barber shop. And then were probably the two most important businesses in this or any other early-day settlement. For instance, real estate promotion was practically synonymous with settlement of West Texas. A pamphlet advertising Friona in earlier days extolled its value in these opening words:

"Like a lustrous pearl, set amid a cluster of emeralds, lies the little city of Friona, in Parmer County, in the Texas Panhandle. . . . Friona is the natural and logical commercial center of that part of the Panhandle in which it is located, and also of a large portion of Curry County, New Mexico, the surface of the ground is practically level, and the soil is deep, fertile, and rich as the Valley of the Nile."

The concluding paragraph of the pamphlet read, "Come and

Later the Friona Star, which had been located in a corner of the Wilkerson Implement Company just across the street, moved into the building.

Glen Weir purchased the property in the mid-20's and set up a grocery stock. He also bought the adjoining lot for taxes, the old-timers report, and enlarged his business.

In recent times a number of occupants have passed through the landmark. In its final days the building stood vacant for some time, and narrowly missed being victim of the fire which last month destroyed the building to the north of it, with flames scoring some of its own ancient timber.

After lunch the group met in the sanctuary for an interlude of organ music by Mrs. H. K. Kendrick.

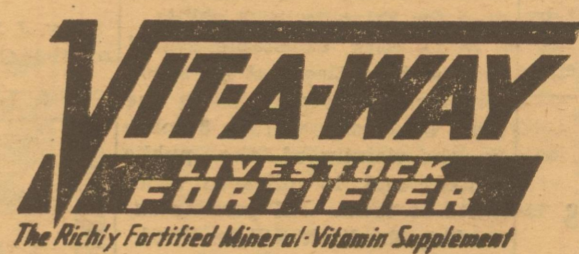

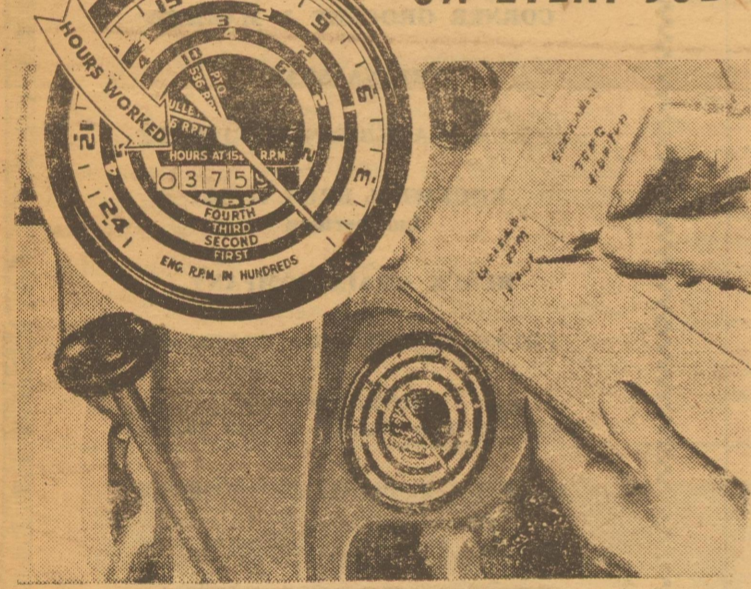
