The following information has been relayed us regarding the Southwestern Associated Telephone Company:

President Roy Autry of Southwestern Associated Telephone Company announced in Dallas today (July 16) the signing of a new one-year contract with the Communications Workers of America—CIO calling for an upward adjustment of wages for employees in the bargaining unit—increase subject to wage stabilization approval. The wage increase will cost the company nearly \$335,000 on an annual basis, which will make it necessary for the company to seek further increases in telephone rates.

Best Fly Control Begins at Breeding Place, State Health Officer Emphasizes

The control of the fly menace comes at the top of the list of public health measures which should be applied by every city, community, and individual in the state, declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

The most effective measure for fly control is to prevent their breeding. Flies breed in filth and about eight days are required to complete a life cycle. During her life time of several months, one fly lays from 600 to 1,000 eggs.

To eliminate flies, the breeding places must be destroyed. Manure piles, garbage, and other organic filth furnish the requirements of warmth, moisture, and food necessary for the propagation of the fly. Flies should be kept from contact with food or drink or utensils in which such food and drink are prepared and served. Likewise, they should be kept from access to privy vaults where they pick up the infections, which they later spread to humans by contact with the food and drinks, and by unwashed hands and utensils.

See that your windows, doors, and porches are screened so that the stray fly from some careless neighbor will not molest your family. See that your grocer keeps meat, vegetables, and fruit screened from flies.

The use of DDT and other sprays for the control of all varieties of adult flies and fly larvae have come into wide usage. However, their use should be, after

Monday Morning Musings...

Check County Politics First

The writer is no exception—we, like most every citizen of this county are centering our political observations these weeks on the shows being staged in Chicago and Washington. And sometimes we go along in agreeing on the charges of "corruption, mis-management, subversive dealings, mink coat scandals, etc."

But actually this accelerated interest in national affairs at this particular date is ill-timed. Now this is hard to understand, isn't it? But here are the reasons we make this accusation:

In no manner minimizing the interest we should direct toward our national government, isn't it logical that we should first be aware of local situations, doing something about local ills, before raising our voices in indignation against big time mis-management? To be effective in our nationwide appeals, certainly we should have a background of consistent square dealing at home.

For instance:

How many of us actually know what transpires even at the regular meetings of the commissioners court of Parmer County?

Chances are that even much of the routine action of our county administration would be foreign to our knowledge.

Did you know, for example:

The July 14th meeting of the commissioners court approved reduction in valuation of a large number of lots in the City of Farwell, all owned by one man. Lots owned by a prominent Farwell citizen and county political figure and located in 18 separate blocks were reduced to the valuation of \$10 per lot in the instances where they had previously been evaluated at more than that amount (\$20 in most instances).

We are making no comment, other than asking if you knew about the action; the same holds true for the following incidents recorded in the minutes of the commissioners court and placed on record:

On February 25th, the valuation of cattle was raised from \$35 to \$50 per head.

On June 9th the rendition of the Santa Fe railway property was accepted in the amount of exactly \$40,000.00 less than in the previous year. A decrease from \$554,580 to \$14,580!

How can we look anyone in the eye and call for consistency in our national administration when here in our own county we penalize the local livestock owner, favor a few lot holders, and succumb to the smooth talking of a corporation representative who convinces our commission that we are doing the railroad an injustice—\$40,000 worth!

We citizens must class ourselves in one of two categories: (1) as ignorant of dealings within the inner sanctum in Parmer County, or (2) disinterested. Maybe both factors enter in. Certainly interest could not be proven by our attendance at many of our commission meetings or by a new slate of office holders being proposed for all the involved offices.

We'd better take inventory—here at home, specifically in Parmer county.

Confused Balloting

From The Fort Worth Star Telegram

Folks who want to vote for General Eisenhower for president, but would also like to have a voice in the election of their district attorney and county commissioners, have a date with a polling booth July 26.

That's the day of the first Democratic primary, and in order to vote in the primary—an election set up and financed by the Democratic Party of Texas—each voter must take this pledge:

"I am a Democrat and pledge myself to support the nominees of this primary."

The pledge says nothing about supporting all of the nominees of the Democratic party, and there will be no presidential nominees listed on the primary ballot.

Thus there is no legal or moral barrier, as far as the party pledge is concerned, to prevent a person from voting in the Democratic primaries in July and August and voting for the Republican candidate for president in the November general election.

However, there is a legal issue to be considered by persons planning to vote in the July 26 Democratic primary and attend a Republican precinct convention that same afternoon.

A new state law provides a penalty of from \$100 to \$500 for anyone convicted of participating in the primary or convention of more than one party in the same day.

At the same time, Texas Democrats who feel no Democratic presidential candidate likely to be nominated will be satisfactory to them and thus are desirous of switching allegiance to the GOP and attending Republican precinct conventions, face the opposition of disenfranchising themselves on the state and county level if they choose to attend a convention July 26.

In Texas, the men chosen as party nominees in the Democratic primaries are as good as elected. At any rate, they have been up to now. Failure to vote in a Democratic primary, therefore, means the voter loses the right to have his say on who will represent him in the Legislature, be the governor or United States senator, sheriff or district clerk.

WASHINGTON AND— "Small Business"

As this column enters its third year in the weekly newspapers of America, recent Congressional actions reveal the influence wielded by weekly newspapers and their readers.

Events also prove if Americans are given facts, they will act to correct existent evils. So far the independent weekly newspapers of America have stood alone in bringing forth and its close C. W. Harder facts, letting chips fall where they may.



Significantly Congress did far more than stop government power to control consumer credit, and to cut down the powers of the OPS or Office Plenty Screw. Unnoticed, Congress took an even more important step.

Congress at the same time passed a measure to aid and encourage American newsprint production. An attempt will now be made to combat the foreign monopoly squeezing the life-blood out of independent newspapers.

Action was taken despite previous protests by State Secretary Dean Acheson that nothing should be done to antagonize Canadian newsprint producers despite constant price increases totalling more than 150%.

In Washington leaders of independent business have long urged Congressmen to protect the free American press from monopoly exploitation. This need has been pointed out time and time as the first bulwark in the defense of American liberty. The Senate Small Business Committee, headed by Sen. John Sparkman, Ala., launched still another probe of the situation.

But in recent months, facts not covered by the big dailies have been brought to small cities and towns of America.

These facts, without adornment, caused readers of weekly newspapers across the nation to protest to their Congressmen. After all, in the big cities, there are people who can be persuaded that whatever sounds silly is really not silly.

But high flown theories do not ring true in the smaller cities and towns of the nation.

In these regions, where the vote is controlled, nonsense is still looked upon as nonsense.

Sincere Congressmen of both parties voice pleasure over receiving so many expressions of opinions from the solid people who read weekly newspapers.

Typical comment: "We had a feeling that many things, if they were known, would not set too well with these people, but until we had something concrete to go on, it's hard to disprove the theory boys."

Many Congressmen give the weekly newspapers full credit for recent acts curtailing the power of the government to meddle in private business and lives.

Many Congressmen feel this situation is healthy, are prepared to act to aid weekly newspapers buy newsprint on a competitive market.

Naturally, bureaucrats who have lost power, or position because of this reaction, will oppose such action.

So organized independent business is preparing to battle on this issue. The results of the past two weeks show that such a battle can be won.

25 Years Ago

Roy Bailey had been busy with a crew of helpers putting up poles for his system of rural telephone lines which he has been building into the city. When these lines were finished he planned to install the rural phones so patrons would have the use of them locally until the system was completed and the central office was installed in town and the entire system connected.

DO YOU KNOW what the seventh and eighth amendments To The constitution of The United States, being a part of the Bill of Rights are?

Amendment Number Seven, states "In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States than according to the rules of the common law."

Amendment Number Eight states "Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted."

This does not of course interfere with the individuals right of appeal in any case, but that after the appeal has been taken, and the judgment found against him, that the individual may not thereafter re-open the case, and that all parties may know what their rights are upon the final judgment in the case.

The Eighth Amendment guarantees that concentration camps, the like of which are found in other parts of the world, can never develop in this country, and impose cruel and unusual punishments upon the individual. It guards against harsh and cruel practices, and who will have individuals charged with crime and held for trial, and those who may have been convicted and are being held in confinement as punishment.

Star Recipes

Chicken Tetrazini

- 1 stewing chicken
- Salt
- 1-4 pound mushrooms
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1-2 pound Italian Spaghetti
- Cream Sauce—
- 3 tablespoons butter or chicken fat.
- Pepper
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1 cup heavy cream.
- Cut chicken into 4 or more pieces. Place in stewing kettle and add approximately one qt. hot water. Add salt (1-2 teaspoon per pound of fowl) and simmer until tender. Remove chicken from bone and cut into 1-2 in. pieces. Slice mushrooms and saute in butter over moderate heat until brown. Break 1-2 pound Italian spaghetti into small pieces and cook in large amount of salted water until tender. Make cream sauce using fat and flour, gradually adding hot strained chicken broth, stirring until smooth and boiling point is reached. Stir in 1 cup of heavy

cream. Divide sauce, add chicken to one half and cooked spaghetti and mushrooms to other half.

Put spaghetti half into a baking dish making a hole in the center for chicken mixture. Cover with grated Parmesan cheese and bake in moderate oven until lightly browned, about 10 minutes.

Communist Party Membership

Here are some facts and figures concerning Communist Party membership in several countries. It must be remembered that all communists and communist sympathizers do not enroll themselves in the party records. Therefore these figures probably represent a minimum of the 'pinks' in those countries.

Belgium: Before 1939 known communists in Belgium were estimated to number about 9,000. Increases during World War II lifted the estimated total to 95,000 in early 1947. In the first postwar general elections in February 1946, the communists received 300,000 votes, which

probably represent the combined strength of the communists and their sympathizers. Since 1947 there seems to have been a decline in Belgian communist strength.

France: In 1936 communist party membership in France showed only 100,000 enrolled, but in the elections, held in April of that year, communist candidates received about 1,500,000 votes, which is indicative of the fact that many voters are sympathizers and supporters of the movement even though they refuse to be identified as communists. Early in 1937 party membership increased to some 300,000 but in 1939 the government outlawed the party. It went underground, and probably lost initially in membership as well as in sympathizers. In the first postwar elections, held in November 1946, communist candidates received 5,004,121 votes of a total 19,661,515 cast (or better than 25 per cent), and the party elected 173 members to the National Assembly, the largest single group among the 619 deputies. In the 1951 elections, however, communists lost considerably in the National Assembly (they secured 97 seats out of 627) and they also lost in the popular vote, receiving about 4,800,000. Present party membership figures are not known, but

the total is probably somewhat (or perhaps considerably) less than the 1,300,000 figure given for the year 1947.

Italy: In the early 1930's the illegal communist party in Italy was literally smothered by the government and its leader, Palmiro Togliatti, fled to Moscow. Subsequently, several attempts were made by other underground communist leaders to form a united front with the socialists against Fascism. Such a front was established and was very active during the war. After the fall of Mussolini (late in 1943) committees for national liberation were set up in many parts of the country; communists formed the spearheads of these committees. After the war the membership in the communist party multiplied rapidly until today there are more than 2,000,000 Italian citizens enrolled.

Turkey: Communists have never obtained a foothold in Turkey, whose government has exercised the strictest measures of control over them. Before the war they were suppressed even though Turkey was on friendly terms with the Soviet Union. In 1946 there was some relaxation of control and th

Turkish Proletarian and Peasant party was formed. It is estimated that the party's membership then totalled about 5,000. But late in that year this party, as well as other newly organized opposition and labor groups were again suppressed.

Today there is no communist movement in Turkey; at least none that is allowed to function openly.

Yugoslavia: In Yugoslavia, communists govern the country with absolute and unquestioned power. During the last quarter century they have not been numerous, and even today their number is estimated at only about 150,000, or somewhat less than one percent of Yugoslavia's population. Before the war the communist party was banned by the government, but communists had an underground organization. This organization was active during the war years, and before war's end, communists were in

practical control of the country. In the first postwar elections the People's Front party (a combination of communists, several socialist, peasant, and other left-wing parties received 6,725,047 votes, or 88.6 percent of the total votes cast. This is the group which, under communist leadership, has obtained absolute political power in the country. In the last general elections, held in March 1950, the government claimed 9,059,193 votes or more than 93 percent of the total votes cast. But these figures do not give any indication of the number of persons enrolled in the communist party. As stated previously the total may not be much in excess of the estimated 150,000.

Shivers Agin Auto Inspection Law; Shall Change It or Repeal it he Says

By BEN KAPLAN, Press Staff Writer

Governor Allan Shivers today said that the new auto inspection law should either be modified or repealed.

The Governor told the Press before he left Austin for Houston to make a campaign appearance that he had some ideas for changing the controversial law.

His idea is to take the red tape and confusion out of the law.

"The law was intended to bring about real safety and not in convenience," said Governor Shivers.

"We need to stop killings on the highways. Texas has become the number one State in the United States for murder on the highways."

"The Legislature passed this inspection law by a vote of 117 to 12 in the House of Representatives and 19 to 9 in the State Senate, with the thought that it would save more than 200 Texas lives each year. If the law fails to do this an instead causes confusion and inconvenience, it ought to be changed or repealed."

The Governor said that he would recommend to the next session of the Legislature that it re-study and examine this law in view of the experience and either modify or repeal it.

(Several months ago, when it became apparent that the new law was causing inconvenience and confusion, Governor Shivers ordered it suspended until it can be reviewed by the Legislature).

Confusion in Seed Labels
Coming from inquiries and complaints which have reached the Texas Department of Agriculture in Austin, many farmers are confused as to the purpose of the Tested Seed label which is required on each bag of seed sold in the state.

There are three tags which can be found on seed bags, all issued by the department—the tested seed label, the Certified seed tag and the Registered seed tag. Unless the purchaser is familiar with each of them, he can easily become confused and believe he is buying seed guaranteed by the department.

The cream-colored Tested Seed label does not guarantee that the seed is of high quality. The Department of Agriculture issues the tags and requires the dealer to supply information on the tag as to bag contents.

Purpose of this tag is to let the purchaser know exactly what he is buying. The law states that the dealer should include on the tag the commonly accepted name of the seed, its germination qualities, the purity, amount of inert matter, weed seeds, date tested, weight of bag and origin of contents. This is the responsibility of the dealer, and if he falsifies this information, he violates the Texas Seed Law.

Many farmers are mistaking this tag for the Certified Seed Label and the Registered Seed tag. Both of these do guarantee, to a certain extent, a high quality of contents. The Certified tag is pale blue in color, and the Registered tag, which is backed by even higher test standards, is light purple. They are plainly marked Certified and Registered. They also carry the name of the seed grower, variety of crop, weight per container, year of production, and a serial number. Field inspectors have determined qualities of the seed before either tag is issued.

Some unscrupulous operators have been known to attach these two quality tags in inferior seeds, since it would be impossible for the Texas Department of Agriculture to employ enough men to personally tag each bag. Any such practice is a direct and serious violation of the law and should be reported to the department at once.

It is a good practice for each farmer to save a generous sample of seed from each bag he purchases, and keep the tag with the sample. If the seed fails to meet his expectations, the sample can be sent along with the tag

575,000 4-H'ers Get Training to Cut Farm Accident Toll



Farm safety surveys made by 4-H'ers show that matches within reach of small children and stairways littered with toys, jars and other articles were much in evidence as fire and accident hazards in rural homes.

Chicago—(Special)—More than 575,000 4-H Club boys and girls throughout the nation are receiving training in farm accident and fire prevention this year. The outstanding feature of this training in the National 4-H Farm and Home Safety program is to check and remove from farms and homes any conditions likely to cause fire, accidents or injuries. These 4-H surveys are acclaimed a valuable contribution to the nation-wide campaign to reduce the annual toll of 15,000 farm people dying and 1,300,000 being injured as a result of rural accidents each year.

Here is a report, made by a 4-H girl on behalf of her local club, after making a safety survey of every home in the community:

"In all homes having stairways that we visited, the stairs were full of toys, jars, tools and other articles," she stated. "In many homes people used kerosene to build fires. They also had oily cloths and papers stored close to the stove and flue. Matches and unlabeled bottles of poisonous

liquids were within reach of small children.

"On several farms visited, boards with rusty nails pointing upward were much in evidence. In our local schoolhouse, the ceiling plaster in the classroom was loose. If it fell it would cause severe injuries to the pupils.

"After we had made our survey, we called a community meeting. Attention was called to the hazards we had found. Immediately following the meeting everyone present began work necessary to make our community a safe one. Every hazard we had found was corrected."

Medals of honor are presented to five county winners having the best 4-H records in safety work, and a trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago is awarded to the State champion. Eight of the latter will be selected as national winners, who will each receive a \$300 college scholarship. Awards are provided by General Motors for the eighth consecutive year. The program is conducted under the direction of the Co-operative Extension Service.

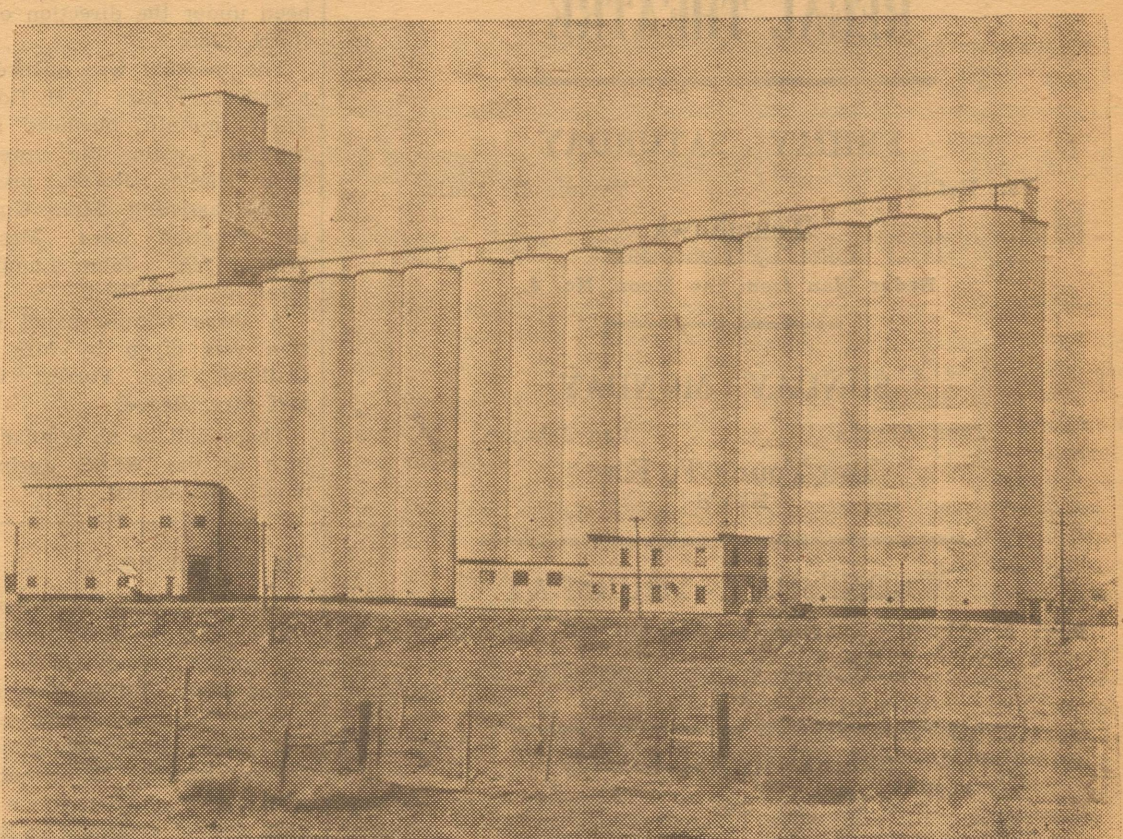
