Lubbock Takes Water Option Near Muleshoe

Water conservation and regulation codes are much in the limelight this week throughout the irrigation belt, with most action being sparkplugged from Muleshoe and Bailey County where recent options for water rights under over 50,000 acres of land have been secured by the city of Lubbock. Public meetings have been called at Muleshoe, with a majority demanding drastic action to halt this practice until further study is made of effects on the overall water level of the plains.

The situation has been discussed in meetings of the water conservation district directors, although that body has so far declined to go on record regarding municipal use of the waters.

However chamber of commerce meetings in both Muleshoe and Friona, together with other towns of the area have aired the situation, and accelerated action is anticipated immediately.

What was it?

Harold Lillard was plowing in his field some 7 miles northwest of Friona last week when he discovered what at first appeared to be a gopher hole. On closer examination, however, Lillard found that actually no hole had been dug, but rather some object had hit the ground with terrific force, digging a hole and disturbing the ground in a wide area. In the above picture Lillard and Stanley Phillip of the Friona Star are measuring one of the fissures extending to a radius of 18 ft.

The soil in the area was covered with an alumi-

num colored ash. Would lightening cause this? Would an object falling from a plane generate this much heat? Was a projectile buried underneath? Or had a small meteor fallen? These were the questions Lillard was asking himself, and in the meantime he was taking no chances, as noted in the picture by the plow having given the area a wide girth!

Editorially Speaking . . .

Is Our Water Being Threatened?

Ever take time to view a situation from the viewpoint of the precedent which it sets rather than the immediate consequences?

Then, quite probably now is the time to start!

Is WATER vital to your well-being? Is the underground water supply necessary to your farming operation, to your success as a retail merchant, to your future in Parmer County. If so, we beg you to read further and weigh the consequences of impending acts right here in our midst.

Did you know: the City of Lubbock has acquired water rights under more than 50,000 acres of land only a few miles distant, specifically immediately south of Muleshoe on the Baptist Foundation tract (about 13,000 acres) and on some 40,000 acres of the VVN Ranch?

The residents of Bailey County are up in arms. And definitely the situation merits our own scrutiny.

If there is the ghost of a chance that exploitation of underground water could result, then every move should be taken to stop this trend, right now, firmly and immediately.

We have had no personal bones to pick with the City of Lubbock. Likely the present city administration there would develop the water judiciously, but that is absolutely no guarantee that other municipalities, or that one at a later date, or any other firm or group might follow in the precedent set by Lubbock and completely drain the area. It could happen.

For example only, what would keep Amarillo, or Denver, or some government controlled utility from following suit? Nothing, dear friend, nothing.

We are not hydrologists, knowing nothing of underground water engineering, so we cannot say definitely that the water could by any means be depleted. But we stand on our right to urge every investigation of the consequences before we concede one acre foot of water to the municipalities.

Agriculture and industry are intra-dependent. Obviously the cities would be 'cutting off their nose to spite their face' if they acted to harm the agricultural welfare of the area.

BUT SHORT-SIGHTED GRASPING TENDENCIES PERMIT EXACTLY SUCH TOM-FOOLERY!

The Southwestern Public Service Company reportedly has option on some 10,000 acres in the same sand hill area of Bailey County. We are not scoring this firm or our Lubbock friends, except that we demand a HALT to this practice until a further study can be made.

Reports are that Lubbock plans to develop only some twenty wells, some 14 inches. Alright, for supposition only and to awaken us to the consequences, we have noted the following calculations: 20 wells, pumping 1,000 gallons per minute, 12 hours per day, every day of the year, would equal over 5-billion gallons annually! And if the pumping continued 24-hours per day, you can just double that figure!

The actual option for these water rights was, according to newspaper reports, obtained from L. A. Purtell, Lubbock contractor and business man. The contract signed by Mayor Murrel Tripp called for the city paying Purtell \$1 for the option.

If drilling tests scheduled to commence immedi-

quantity underlies the sandhills area, the contract binds the city to pay Purtell not to exceed \$10 an acre for perpetual water rights. The city is committed to pay for rights only upon lands where water may be found, according to information furnished the Star.

R. L. Oldham city director of public works for Lubbock, has predicted that exploration alone in the area would cost from \$10,000 to \$20,000 and that complete development might not be expected for several years. This complete development might cost 14 million dollars including half of that amount for the 70-mile pipeline feeder to Lubbock.

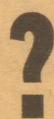
Every landowner, of course, has the right to sell his mineral and water rights under present codes. But that does not lessen the possibility of catastrophic results if the movement should develop on a large scale, as permitted by this "wedge" being driven by Lubbock.

Citizens of Muleshoe are talking about little else along the sidewalks and at public meetings this week. They have expressed concern, not only for their county, but for Lamb, Parmer, Castro, and others of the irrigation belt. And they should not be alone in their concern.

To you and me water is more precious to our welfare than the more discussed oil and gold. Then let's do something, talk it over at every opportunity, make it a point to send delegations to every meeting local or area, where this problem might be aired, and press for a HALT to further exploitation moves until a satisfactory and definite solution is reached.

To date, the Hi-Plains Water Conservation Board has not taken active participation in the controversy. Maybe they need more information; we don't know their entire set-up, but when we supported this organization at the time of its founding and early development we most certainly understood that it was to represent the desires of the farmer. If so, then the board should stop all other activity until it accomplishes an equitable solution here, assuring you and me that no municipality or firm would endanger our lifeblood. The board cannot straddle the fence, for such would indicate that there is doubt as to the endangering the water supply . . . and if there is anything short of absolute proof, stand should be taken to protect the water of our plains -- our most valuable resource.

It's not a pretty situation. If you think so, consider a time 100 years from now when by some vacillating policies of you and me and the water conservation board in 1952, our reservoir might be drained. Tibet or barren Siberia would have nothing on Parmer County!



The Law and You

DO YOU KNOW what the first Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, being a part of the Bill of Rights, is?

Amendment No. One states, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people to peaceably assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances"

The first portion of this amendment is to maintain a separation of the state and church, and make it impossible for a state church to ever be established, or for the government in any way to impair the right of the individual to worship as he may desire. This makes it possible for every person to freely choose his own manner of worship.

The second portion of this amendment with regard to freedom of speech, and freedom of press, means that all types of issues, social, political and economic, may be discussed freely, resulting in a more enlightened people, and that with a full and complete knowledge of all the factors involved, that the people may wisely choose for themselves ideas and theories that they will accept, and that thus being armed with facts, that it will not be possible for a small minority to gain control of the press, and of course in our time, the radio and television, and poison the people's minds by telling them only half-truths, and untruths, and thus causing them to believe in subversive philosophies,

which could ultimately undermine our country.

The latter part of this amendment guaranteeing to all persons the right to assemble and have a say in their government, means that the people, so long as they do not become indifferent to what is happening in their government, shall have a say in their government, and that the government will thus be "of the people, by the people, and for the people."

GRASS ROOTS

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

The hue and cry over the Presidential seizure of the strike-bound steel industry caused the major issue involved to be overlooked.

Demands for a presidential impeachment, of course, are expected in an election year on any pretext.

However, election year hysteria is a poor excuse for ignoring the basic cause of the steel situation. It is also dangerous for presidential seizure of anything, even a peanut stand, to be tolerated.

Yet, on clear analysis, all the furor and fuss has so far failed to outline a solution to a problem that will occur again and again to plague the nation until adequate enforcement of anti-trust laws solves the problem.

Steel numbers among its members, U. S. Steel, which while disclaiming a monopoly, does control an estimated 40% of the nation's production. There are less than 700,000 stockholders in all the nation's steel companies, and the largest number are in U. S. Steel, created a half century ago by J. P. Morgan. The entire steel industry takes its cue from U. S. Steel because it is not considered politic to run contrary to the decisions reached in its august heights.

And on the other side are about 650,000 steel workers, organized in one huge labor monopoly.

Then there are on a third side some 4,000,000 independent businesses, largely dependent on steel in some form, plus about 150 million American consumers.

It seems fantastic that any nation can stand by idly while a steel monopoly and a labor monopoly go into a prolonged stalemate.

So the question that anyone should ask themselves is briefly "If I were President of the United States, just how would I handle a similar situation?"

And thereby is posed the strange paradox of modern American life that can lead to Socialism or Communism by constant government intervention into the disputes between monopoly industry and monopoly labor.

No president seems to have been able to cope with the problems of enforcing the anti-trust laws which would prevent these situations.

Franklin D. Roosevelt attacked the problem of monopoly business by encouraging the organization of monopoly labor organization; comparable to 'burning down the house to get rid of the mice.'

Yet, Herbert Hoover was also ineffectual in solving the problem, and his ineffectiveness is made all the more contrasting by his post-depression statement "Our real depression troubles began with the building up of a kind of economic autocracy."

The entire situation again emphasizes a long neglected fact. The only solution to the greatest of all national problems since the founding of the Republic is adequate anti-trust law enforcement.

This in turn, emphasizes the need for Congressmen who understand and appreciate what vigorous enforcement of these measures means to national freedom and security.

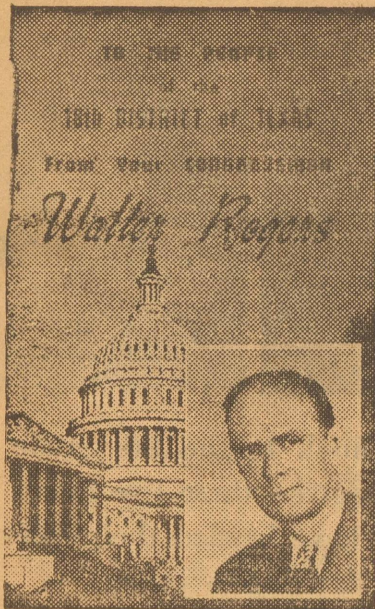


HOWARD'S LAMENT

THE EFFECT OF THE TIDE-LANDS ISSUE ON DECENTRALIZING GOVERNMENT:

On May 7th the Senate-House conference committee agreed on a tidelands bill. Both the House and Senate conferees made concessions in reaching the agreement. The result was a bill designed primarily to quitclaim to the respective states the off-shore lands. This quitclaim will involve three miles in most instances, 10 1-2 miles in Texas and parts of Florida. It is neither the Senate bill nor the House bill, but a combination of the two. The important thing is that the agreed bill gives back to the states that which has always belonged to the state

and settles definitely the question of ownership. The tidelands fight in the Congress has meant much more than the return of the lands to the various states. It was this fight that actually brought out into the open the dangers and pitfalls incident to over-centralization of government. It was this fight that opened the eyes of people all over this nation, in both coastal and inland states. It spotlighted the Jeffersonian principles of states' rights that are indispensable to the strength and unity that this nation must maintain if our form of government is to survive. Few times in our history have the Congress and the people been so fully conscious of the rights and the authorities of the several states. This trend is evidenced daily by the remarks and speeches of congressmen from all sections of this country, and is one of the healthiest signs that we could hope for. I sincerely hope that the President will sign this bill so that this issue can be settled, and settled right, once and for all. Should he fail to sign the bill, I firmly believe that the Congress will override the veto. There is little, if any, doubt, that the House of Representatives will override the veto by a sizable majority. The vote in the Senate on the Senat bill was much closer than the House veto, but it is the consensus of opinion in legislative circles here that the Senate will also override the veto. The enact-

ment of this bill into law will mean that the people in all sections of this country, under the great leadership of Texas, Louisiana and California, have won a resounding victory against the forces bent on centralizing this government.

MORE ABOUT FOREIGN AID

The proposed 7.9 billion-dollar foreign aid bill is still one of the major topics of conversation in the Capitol. The committees in both the House and Senate are recommending a cut of approximately one billion dollars. In my opinion this bill will be cut substantially more than 1 billion dollars before its final passage. Many of those who support and advocate the full 7.9 billion-dollar appropriation are military men. Their arguments are most convincing when they tell you that these countries need every dime of the proposed appropriation. However, there are two sides to the question, the other being, "How much can the American taxpayers afford?" There is no doubt but that every dime that is appropriated will be spent; I have never heard of any of this money being returned to the public treasury. Most military men seem to forget that this country is making great contributions to the economies of the foreign countries involved by various methods. For instance, the testimony before the Merchant Marine Committee would indicate that many of these countries by virtue of ECA funds have been able to build up their merchant marine and have become strong competitors of the shipping companies of this country. In addition to this, the United States has followed a policy of shipping a substantial amount of our products in foreign bottoms, that is, foreign bottoms made possible by ECA funds. This means that the taxpayers of this country are called upon to subsidize American shipping interests. It all adds up to this. The American taxpayer has made possible to many of these foreign countries the construction of merchant fleets; the American taxpayer has then paid a freight bill for the use of the merchant fleets that they made possible in the first place. Then because the American taxpayer made possible the foreign merchant fleets and then made use of the foreign

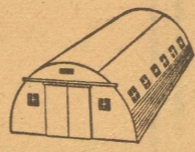

SEED TESTING & CERTIFICATION

Farming today is getting complicated -- sometimes it makes a person long for the "40 acres and a mule" of a hundred years ago. But 100 years ago 85% of the U. S. population was engaged in agriculture. Today only 15% of the people are left on the land, and they have to produce enough for all Americans and some for export.

To get bigger yields, we are planting better seeds. But seed testing and certification, while helping us improve the quality of our seed stock, is one more

complication in 20th Century farming. Seed samples submitted to the State laboratories, indicate there is some confusion as to procedures. The following notes should help clear things up.

"Certified seed, bearing a Certified Seed Tag, is seed which meets high quality standards. Certification is not required by law.

A grower wanting his seed certified files an application with the State Department of Agriculture and pays a \$10 annual fee, plus a 5c to 50c fee per acre for most seeds.

"Registered" seed is like certified seed except that it meets higher quality standards.

More than 1,000,000 bags of high quality registered and certified seed passed into the Texas channels of trade last year.

"Tested" seed is seed tested for purity and germination. It is required by law for field seeds offered for sale.

The State Seed Laboratories in Austin and Lubbock provide free testing for field seeds; Tested Seed labels cost 1c each.

Samples should be identified with kind and variety, name and address of sender, lot No. or other stock identification, year grown, test desired (whether purity or germination or both).

Samples should be 2 oz. for small seed like white or alsike clover; 5 oz. for seed the size of red or crimson clover, alfalfa, ryegrass, bromegrass, millet, flax, and rape; 1 lb. for seed like sudan grass, sorghum, proso and hemp, and 2 lbs. for large seed like corn, cotton, cereals and vetches.

The state laboratories tested 14,818 samples last year and sent out 3, 614, 081 Tested Seed Labels

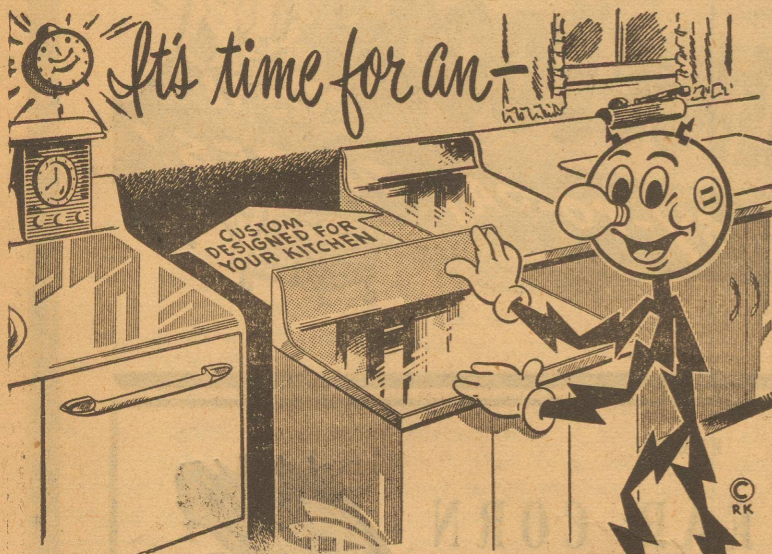

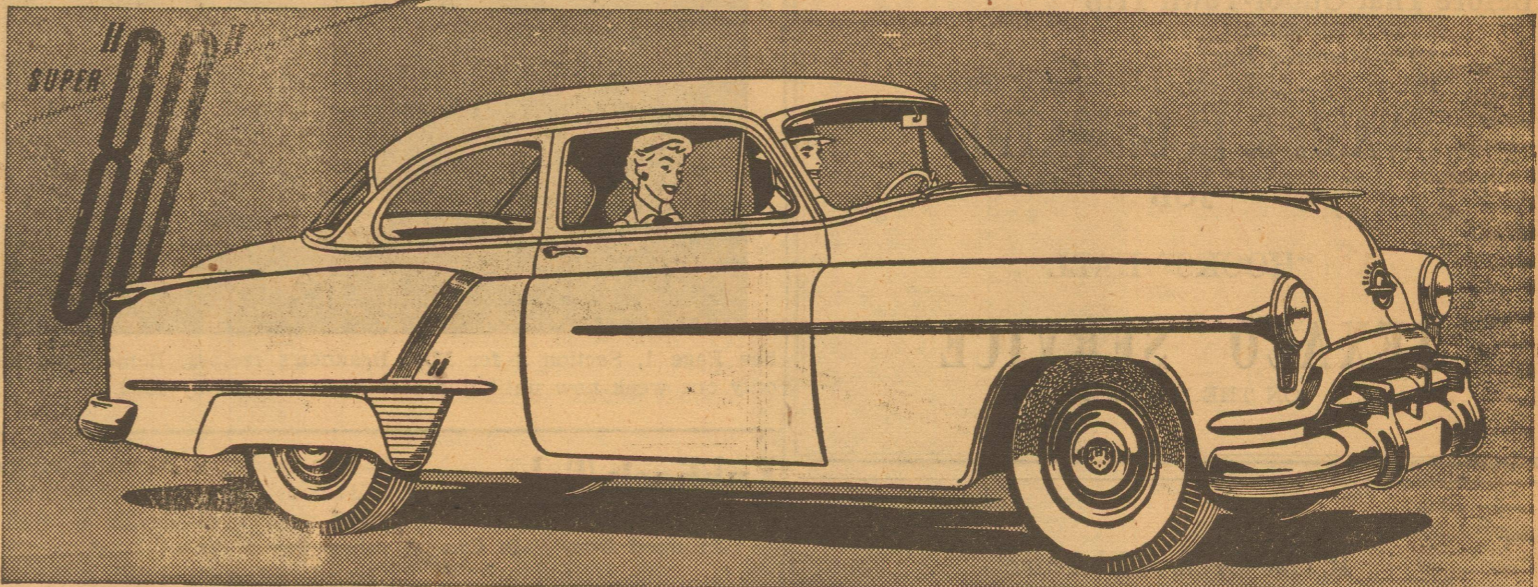

was a 3c tax, not 3%.

Under this plan, no donations or money drives would be involved, with all support for the district coming from this tax money.

Well-spacing, re-charging, and stopping of waste were discussed at length, with the majority of directors demanding quick action of each county.

Both state and nationally proposed water legislation were discussed, and the board voiced need of all controls being definitely local in nature, with Bruce Parr summing it up this way, "We just want to be left alone, with any regulations for our good being drawn up on as local a level as possible."

Though the Bailey county-Lub-

bock controversy was noted and discussed, the board made no commitment, possibly because within its area are nineteen incorporated towns, all or many of which could be having the same problems as Lubbock; and no official stand by the directors was wished until thorough study of actual harm to the water level was determined.

Will any legislation be needed by Lubbock to secure this water and condemn right of way for its transportation?

What assurance is there that Lubbock will not sell the water to other towns, resulting in excessive drainage of the local belt? Is it not the function of the Hi-Plains Water District to regulate and control the water?

Inasmuch as every businessman and farmer should be taken into consideration in this matter, should not steps be taken for a hearing to be held before any city can be granted permission to use this outlying water supplies?

Few of the answers are apparent at this time, but committees of the area are making investigations which should reveal most of the answers in a few days.

The board of directors of the Hi Plains Water Conservation District met Tuesday night in Muleshoe for a dinner meeting that lasted till well after midnight.

Eighteen directors and visitors were present including Raymond Euler and Bruce Parr for Parmer County.

Topics discussed there included the 3c per \$100 valuation tax that is being put into effect over the 13-county area for support of the district. Contracts must be entered into between the district and each county before the county can levy this tax and collect it through regular channels. Most of the counties already have signed, and the proposition will be placed before the Parmer County Commissioners Court on May 26th. Tom McFarland, district manager, emphasized that this

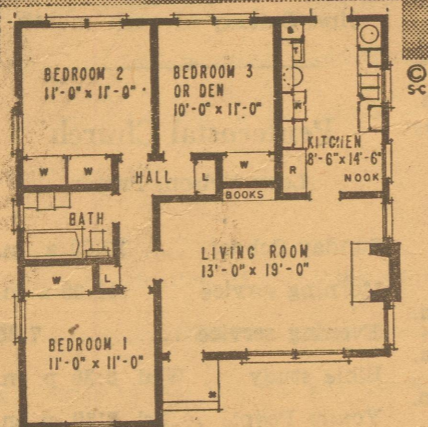
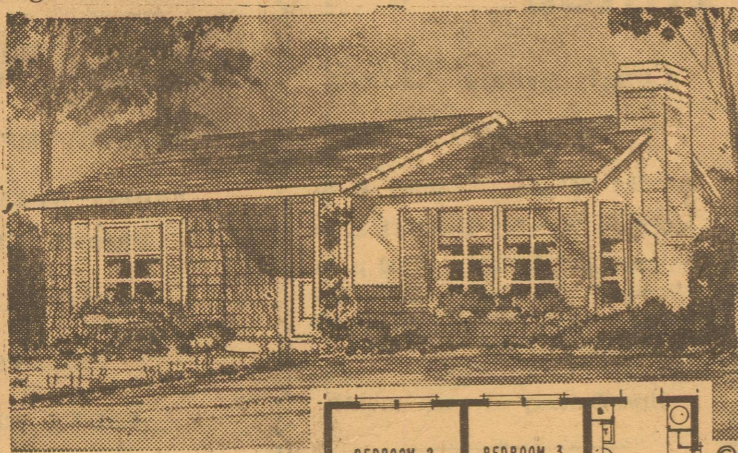

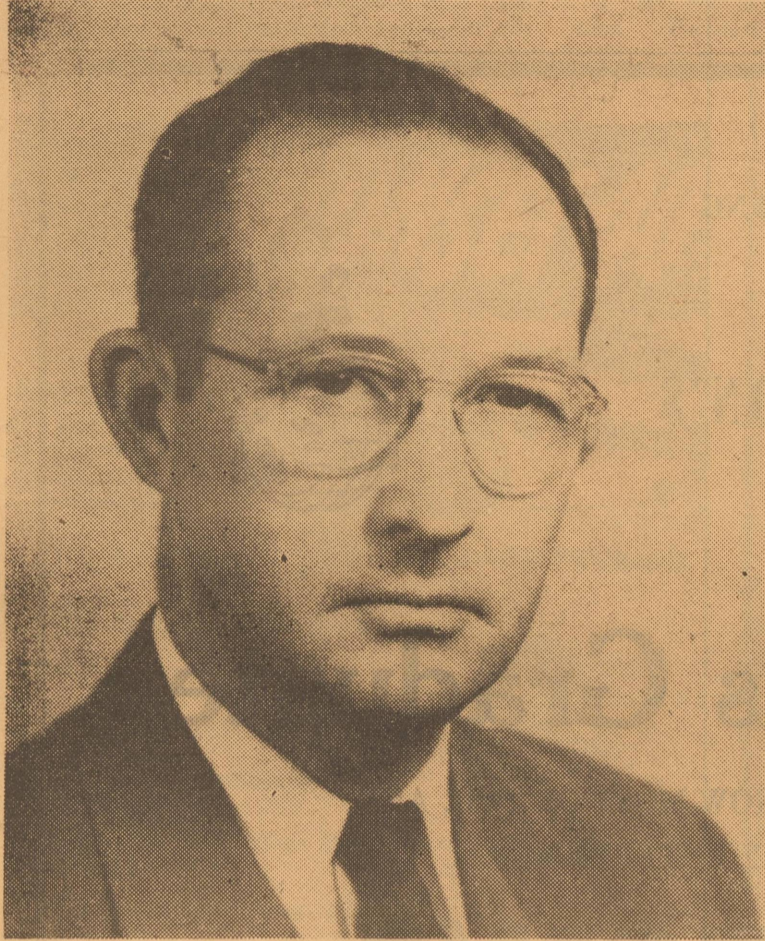

Housewarming Was Held For Milburn Bennetts

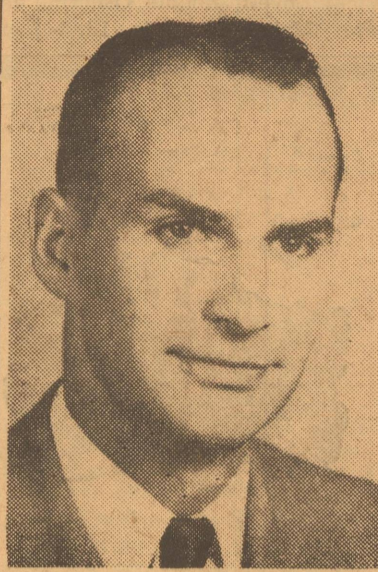

Fern Brannon Gives More Cooking Hints as Local School Approaches

Statistics show that seventy percent of all cooking is done on top of the range. Applied to an electric range, this guarantees lots of top-notch eating. With a flip of the switch or a push of the buttons, the surface units provide fast, clean measured electric heat economically.

Included on most electric ranges is a deep well cooker. The cooker is just an ordinary large sauce pan. The magic is in the thickly insulated well which holds the cooker, and holds the heat. An entire meal can be cooked in the deep-well cooker at one time, including meat, potatoes, vegetables and a dessert, or just a few dinner rolls can be quickly and easily warmed before serving. The cooker is an ideal place to cook the less tender cuts of meat. There may be no such thing as inexpensive meats, but there are "less expensive meats". These less expensive meats are as nutritious as the most expensive cuts. The thrifter cuts like all others, are rich in complete, high quality proteins. All certain essential B vitamins and certain minerals such as iron, copper and phosphorus.

Thrifty cuts of meat are often less popular with the homemaker because of the longer cooking time necessary since they usually require long, slow cooking with moist heat. This process takes very little of the homemaker's time, however, when done in the deep well cooker of her electric range, for all she needs to do is to turn the unit switch to the lowest heat after the meat is steam-

ing and let the electric range do the rest.

Other uses for the deep well cooker are to:

Steam vegetables, cereals, puddings, and Boston brown bread. Stew chicken and stewing meats. Braise less tender cuts of meat. Bake cup custards, apples potatoes. Sterilize tableware, canning equipment, nursing bottles, sick-room dishes. Deep fat fry doughnuts, chicken, potatoes, croquettes. Cook soups, large quantities of vegetables and beverages. Blanch vegetables for freezing.

A suggested well cooker menu:

Tomato Cocktail
Savory Steak
Mushroom Vegetable Sauce
Braised Carrots and Potatoes
Avacado Salad

Rolls
Butter
Steamed Upside Down Pudding
Savory Steak with Vegetables

1 1-2 pounds round steak, 1" thick
1 clove garlic
3-4 teaspoon salt
1-4 teaspoon pepper
1-2 cup enriched flour
3 tablespoons shortening
1-4 cup water
1 can mushroom sauce
3 carrots, cut in half
1 green pepper, cut in strips
4 stalks celery, cut in strips
3 onions, sliced
3 potatoes, cut in half

Wipe meat with a damp cloth and rub with a piece of garlic. Cut meat into serving pieces; add salt and pepper to flour and

pour well into meat on both sides. Brown steak in frying pan in melted shortening. Transfer to deep well cooker kettle and add water and mushroom sauce. Cover, turn switch to high and when steaming freely turn to fourth heat and simmer for one hour. Add vegetables to meat and place pudding on trivet. Turn switch to HIGH and when steaming, again turn to fourth heat for 45 minutes or until puddings and vegetables are done. Yield: 5 servings.

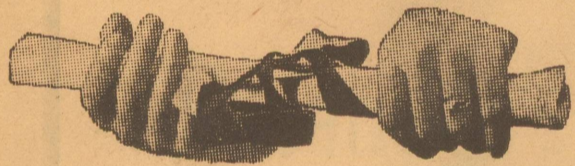
To Be Cooked in Deep-Well Cooker.

Steamed Upside Down Pudding

10 tablespoons butter or margarine
5 tablespoons brown sugar
5 apricot or peach halves
Melt butter; place 2 tablespoons butter and 1 tablespoon sugar in bottom of each custard cup. Place in the cup an apricot or peach half and pour over the fruit the following batter:
1 cup enriched flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1-2 teaspoons salt
1-2 cup sugar
1 egg beaten
1-3 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
3 tablespoons melted shortening

Sift together the dry ingredients. Combine remaining ingredients and pour into the center of the dry ingredients. Beat until thoroughly blended. Pour over fruit in custard cups and steam for 45 minutes. Serve with whipped cream. Yield: 5 servings.

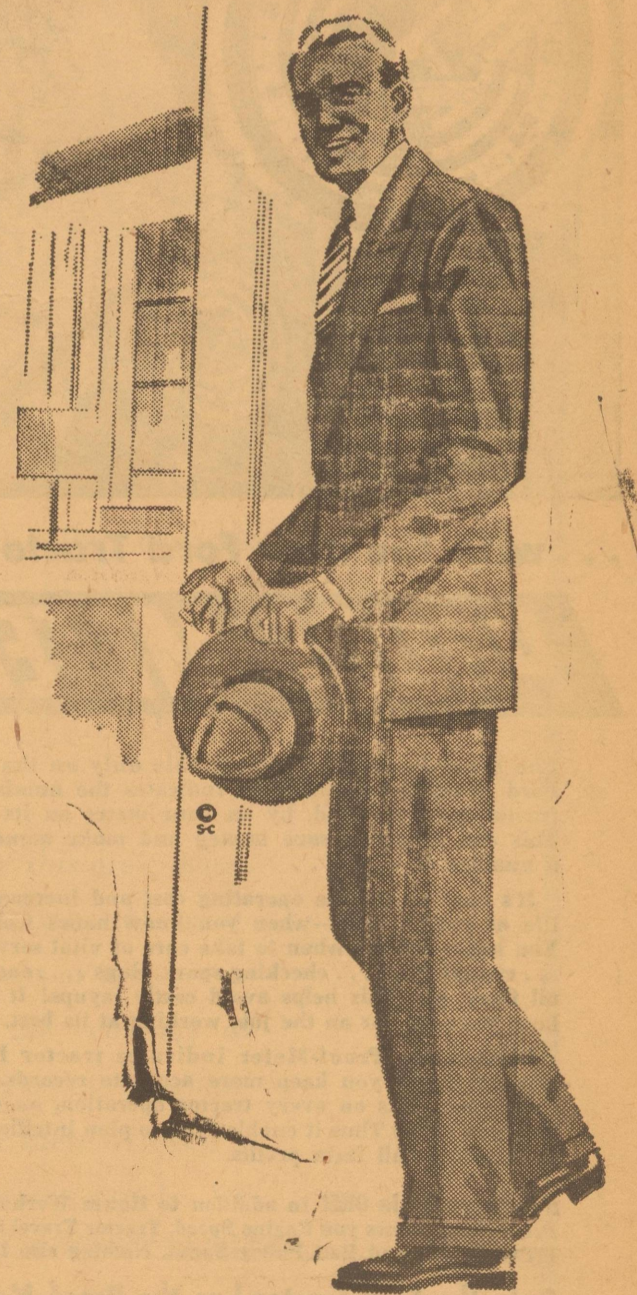

Three-In-One Cookies

One batch of refrigerator cookie dough produces three different flavors—vanilla, chocolate and orange—for an attractive cookie assortment.

Desserts are never a problem when you keep the cookie jar well stocked. That's easy to do when you depend on your baker for a tempting variety of cookies, or make your own at home.

Home baker's choice are cookie doughs which make up into two or three or even four different kinds by the simple addition of flavorings, nuts or coconut. In this class is today's featured refrigerator cookie. Flavor one-third of the batter with melted chocolate, another third with orange juice and rind and leave remaining third plain vanilla.

Chill the dough thoroughly for several hours or overnight. It keeps well when wrapped in waxed paper or pressed into a cookie mold, so that you can make up just the number of cookies needed at one time.

With a full cookie jar, you can dress up servings of fruit sauce or ice cream at a moment's notice, and have a ready accompaniment to hot chocolate or tea. Cost of these cookies is only about one-half cent apiece.

Sweets can be good for you as desserts made with enriched flour prove, for they provide protein, essential B-vitamins and food iron.

- Cream together shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Add egg, milk and vanilla extract. Beat well. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add to creamed mixture and mix well. Divide dough into thirds. To one-third add melted chocolate, mixing it in thoroughly. To another third add orange juice and rind, mixing well. Leave remaining third plain. Shape each third into a roll. Wrap in waxed paper. Chill until very firm. Slice thin and bake on greased baking sheets in moderately hot oven (400°F.) 10 minutes. Makes about 6 dozen small cookies.

Answer to Question No. 1

A Health Council is a group of individuals in a community organized to plan and improve local health conditions. It is usually composed of representatives of the local Medical Society, various health and welfare organizations and other interested citizens. For the last five years Health Councils have been growing in number at the rate of 20 per cent a year. Thirty-two states and more than 1,200 communities have health councils.

Answer to Question No. 2:

Present estimates indicate that eight per cent of our population today is over 65 years of age and the percentage is growing

yearly. Chronic diseases such as heart ailments, cancer, brain disturbances and kidney conditions are common among this aging population. Accidents are a particular hazard.

Answer to Question No. 3:

"Wonder drug" is the popular name given to newly discovered drugs which at once help in the treatment and cure of a disease and eventually reduce medical costs. These drugs take years of experimentation and expensive research in laboratories to develop, but fortunately such efforts in the interest of health are actively pursued in America.
