City council expected to adopt budget, set tax rate on Tuesday

Big Spring City Council is expected to adopt an annual budget for 1999-2000 and set a tax rate when it convenes at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday

An increase in rates for cemetery lots, a boost in the employee compensation plan and approval of the Moore Development for Big Spring, Inc. budget are among other items on the agenda.

City council members are expected to set a tax rate of approximately 62 cents per \$100

51.183 cents assessed for maintenance and operation of the city and 10.817 cents for the payment of various bonds. The total 1998-99 tax rate was 61 cents per \$100 valuation.

increase in residential sanitation rates from \$8.50 to \$10.50 per month, which the city estimates will generate an additional \$197,640 in revenue annually. Landfill gate fees will also increase \$3 per ton, a move which will bring in an additional \$36,129, according to city figures.

Wilderness housing close to being ready

Prisoners should be ready to move in to the new, \$200,000 home for Wilderness Camp inmates in Building 64 at the McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark by Oct. 1, Director of Public Works Todd Darden said Friday.

The original building, shared with Avantech, is 95 per cent completed, Darden said. But the 150-man housing addition, about 65 percent completed, is running more than two weeks behind because the prefab building was delayed nearly that long.

Darden, noting that Oct. 1 is less than three weeks away was not worried. "We had three days to do the framing, three days to do the slab ... if I can't get the skin done by Oct. 1, something's wrong.'

The building is "basically just a shell with electricity, heating and evaporative coolers, but no plumbing," he said.

The addition of about 7.000 square feet, with the space in the original Webb Air Force Base building, will give the city

about 18,000 square feet of floor space in the new facility.

City officials have noted that this will cost the city about \$200,000, compared to the million dollars it is said would be the replacement cost of an all new building.

That's because most of the labor for the camp is being done by Wilderness Camp inmates, as well as city employees. Darden said the project supervisors are "impressed with the quality of work the inmates have done."

The original building, shared with Avantech, will house offices, restrooms and support services, while the addition will house 150 prisoners.

The city is under contract with the Texas Department of Criminal Justice to provide housing for the inmates. In exchange, the inmates perform various labor around the community on such projects as the pavilion and restrooms at Kids' Zone, the Comanche Trail Festival of Lights at Christmas, and the Vietnam Memorial Gold Star Chapel.

House fire claims life of local woman **HERALD Staff Report**


A 72-year-old Big Spring woman died Friday night when a fire broke out in her home at 640 Manor St. shortly after 10 p.m.



In return, the United States is considering measures to ease sanctions against North Korea, National Security Adviser Sandy Berger said in Auckland, New Zealand, where he was accompanying President Clinton at an Asian summit.

"It is now our understanding and expectation that North Korea will refrain from testing any long-range missiles for the duration our our negotiations to improve relations," Berger said. "This is an important initial step for addressing our concerns about North Korea's missile program."

• The tentative agreement was struck in negotiations held by U.S. and North Korean experts in Berlin.

Berger said the United States was pleased that progress was being made in the missile talks, which are to continue.

Berger said North Korea had agreed that "nothing would be done in the meantime that would interfere with the positive atmosphere that existed in the talks.'

The administration takes that to mean that North Korea will not proceed with a missile test, another U.S. official said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

In Seoul, a South Korean Foreign Ministry spokesman expressed relief at the "successful settlement.'

"I don't know whether that much specific agreement was made," Chang Chul-ju said. "but I can say that the first button has been fittingly fastened." North Korea's potential to strike at least some targets in the United States is often cited by the Clinton administration in promoting a U.S. missile defense system.

The United States has been grappling with North Korea for years in an attempt to sidetrack nuclear weapons programs that, if nothing else, raise ter sions on the Korean Peninsula.





The Everson case, decided 5-4 in 1947, was easy. It involved a New Jersey law that authorized local school boards to reimburse parents for the cost of bus transportation for their children to and from school. Everson complained that by including children attending Catholic parochial schools, the law violated the Constitution. Justice Hugo Black at first appeared to agree. In a famous passage he wrote:

"The First Amendment has erected a wall of separation between church and state. The wall must be kept high and impregnable. We could not approve the slightest breach."

But Black saw no fatal breach in the New Jersey law. It was not a law directly respecting an establishment of religion. It was a law of gener-

In the ensuing five decades, the high court has traveled a long way from Everson. The court has found nothing amiss in tax laws that treat contributions to churches as charitable gifts. Church property may be exempted from local taxes on real estate. Church publications get the same postal benefit extended to other nonprofit publications. Handicapped children in parochial schools are entitled to the same benefits accorded children in public schools. School lunch programs make no religious distinctions. States must provide the same nonsectarian textbooks to students in public and parochial schools alike.

But in this field, the boundaries separating the permissible from the impermissible are marked by serpentine walls. State aid for textbooks appears to lie on the sunny side of the wall; state aid for other assistance is often shaded. In the coming term the high court will consider a major case involving the loan of instructional equipment to religious schools under a federal program known simply as Title VI. You will be hearing a great deal about it as time goes by.

The program creates nine kinds of "innovative assistance" for both public and private schools. Title VI funds may be expended for all kinds of instructional equipment, including computer software and hardware and "other curricular materials which are tied to high academic standards." who objected to the program sued to stop benefits for children in Catholic schools. The suit followed an off-and-on course for 12 years. Finally U.S. District Judge Marcel Livaudais ruled that Title VI did no violence to the Establishment Clause: The program had a secular purpose, its aim was not to advance religion, and it did not require excessive entanglement with the state.

The 5th Circuit reversed his decision. Circuit Judge John M. Duhe Jr. commented on the difficulties that face federal judges "in the vast, perplexing desert of Establishment Clause jurisprudence." During the pendency of the suit, he said, 'the sand dunes have shifted,' but some old landmarks of separation remained. It will be up to the Supreme Court to promulgate new maps and new boundaries.

The high court also will have to deal with the increasingly complex problems of tuition grants or vouchers. This simmering controversy recently boiled over in Cleveland when U.S. District Judge Solomon Oliver Jr. abruptly suspended the city's program. Created by the Ohio legislature in 1995, the plan authorizes grants of up to \$2,250 for children from low-income families. The grants may be applied toward tuition costs in either public or private schools. The immediate effect of Oliver's ruling was temporarily to disrupt the edudeserved more considerate treatment at the hands of a federal judge.

Ohio's program is not significantly different from a voucher program in Milwaukee. The Wisconsin plan contains a provision assuring participating children that they cannot be required to attend religious services. Milwaukee schools must strive for a religiously diversified student body. The Wisconsin Supreme Court upheld the Milwaukee plan last year, and the Supreme Court denied a petition for review.

Eventually the high court will have to stop dodging and face the issues directly. An opportunity is at hand in a case from Arizona. Here the facts are different - the Arizona plan lacks the fenders and bumpers of the Wisconsin plan — but the underlying principle is the same. Arizona allows a state tax credit of up to \$500 for those who donate to STOs (School Tuition Organizations). Parents then apply to an STO for a scholarship for their child. The American Civil Liberties Union, which never sleeps in its effort to top the wall of separation with rolls of razor wire, sued to have the program declared unconstitutional. Arizona's Supreme Court upheld it nonetheless, and the ACLU's petition for review is

now pending. In my own view, none of the challenged programs authorizes or promotes an "establishment of religion." Their purpose is wholly secular - to assist in the education of children. What in the world - or in the Constitution — is wrong with that?

Dallas matched its biggest comeback ever Sunday, rallying from a 21-point deficit in the fourth quarter to beat Washington 41-35 on Rocket Ismail's 76yard touchdown catch in overtime.

"Nobody thought it was going to be easy, but nobody thought it was going to be like this," Cowboys tight end David LaFleur, who caught two touchdown passes, said as he smiled and shook his head in amazement.

Ismail, signed as a free agent to add speed to the receiving corps, split the safeties and was wide open for Troy Aikman's fifth touchdown pass 4:09 into the extra period.

"I think this is probably the wildest game I've ever been a part of," said Aikman, who was 28-for-49 for 362 yards

Dallas has rallied from 21 points down to win once before, 30-27 in overtime against New Orleans in 1984. It was also the third time the Cowboys have made up a big deficit to beat the Redskins, coming back from 20 points down in 1983 and 17 points in 1979.

"It gives you more to build on than if you win 28-14," Dallas coach Chan Gailey said. "(Ismail) caught it, and then I think I breathed.

Now it gets serious ... really serious. Big Spring's Lady Steers open District 5-4A volleyball play at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, traveling to Fort Stockton for a match they hope will be the first step to a berth in the Class 4A playoffs later this fall.

And Lady Steers head coach Traci Pierce couldn't think of a much tougher way for her team to open district action than facing the Prowlers on their home court.

"It's certainly going to be a challenge for us, because Fort Stockton is traditionally a good team," Pierce said after watching the Lady Steers finish their pre-district schedule with wins over Monahans' Lady Loboes and Water Valley's Lady Eagles in a three-way match Saturday.

"We haven't played that well in Fort Stockton in the past, either," Pierce added. "To be honest, Fort Stockton always has a little bit of an edge when they're playing at home, because everyone in the district has to travel so far to get there. You have to tough it up, though, and be ready to play your best volleyball."

The Lady Steers enter Tuesday's district opener with an 11-6 record, the best mark they've fashioned in recent memory.

And while Pierce says San Angele Lake View has to be considered the favorite in this year's 5-4A chase, she believes the Lady Steers are entirely capable of battling for the district championship and have every reason to expect one of three playoff berths "You have to make Lake View the favorite, because they've got a great tradition and a lot of girls back from the team that was the district's co-champion last year," she explained. "At the same time, we feel like we're certainly capable of being a contender. "The important thing about this team is that we've continued to get better," Pierce added. "We've been able to do lots of things that in the past really weren't feasible for us to do ... like changing our defense last weekend at the Plainview tournament. It wound up giving us some problems and probably kept us from making the championship game, but we knew we had to make a change if we were going to compete against people like Lake View later in the season. The importance of that change showed during Saturday's matches with Monahans and Water Valley. After dispatching Monahans 15-13, 15-4, the Lady Steers found themselves struggling early in their match against Water Valley — a team that beat them in pool play at the San Angelo tournament earlier in the season. With senior Monica Rubio out of the lineup as a result of illness, the Lady Steers quickly found themselves on the short end of a 9-2 score in the opening game of the match. You and your husband must stand firm on this. Enough is enough. Your in-laws may need some counseling in prudent financial management. If that is not an option, volumes have been written on the subject.







In 1996, rapper Tupac Shakur died at a Las Vegas hospital six days after he was wounded in a drive-by shooting. He was 25. In 1997, funeral services were held in Calcutta, India, for Nobel peace laureate Mother Teresa.
