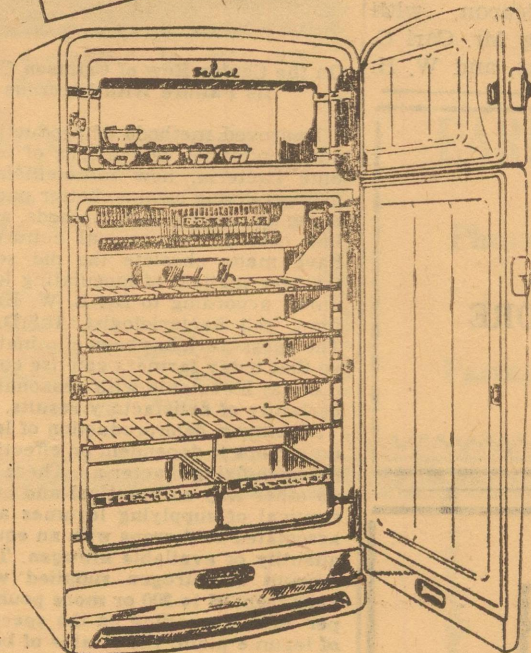

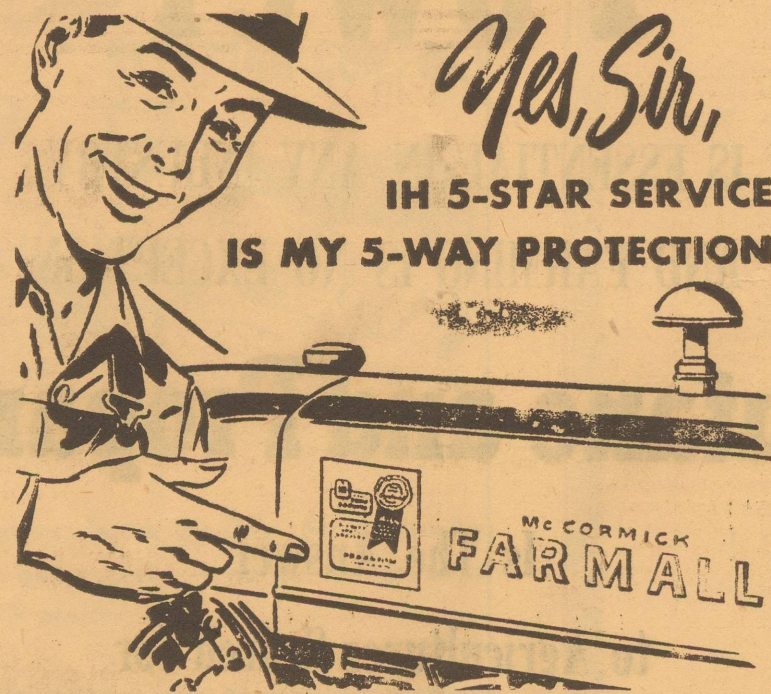

For Top Legume Yields Seed Must Be Inoculated



On the Center Row of Crimson Clover No Inoculant Was Used. Compare Its Failure With Vigorous Inoculated Rows on Either Side.

Improved methods of production and application of cultures of legume bacteria, new more-efficient nitrogen-fixing strains, better packaging and distribution methods, and low cost of commercial cultures, have made obsolete the old soil-transfer method of inoculating legumes, according to Dr. L. W. Erdman, soil bacteriologist, U.S.D.A. The guess-work has been eliminated so that today farmers can use commercial inoculants with reasonable certainty of satisfactory results.

Maximum field production of legume crops is dependent on effective nitrogen-fixing bacteria. There is no other way so practical and economical of supplying legumes and associated field crops with an equal quantity of available nitrogen. The amount of nitrogen supplied will vary from 25 to 200 or more pounds per acre, depending on the species of legume plant, the strains of bacteria, and soil conditions.

Certain groups of leguminous plants use the same general strains of bacteria, e.g., the alfalfas and sweet clovers are in the same group, and true peas and vetches are together in another group. It is important, however, to use strains known to have high nitrogen-fixing efficiency with the variety or species planted.

Soil conditions, climate, moisture, fertilizers, acidity, and other factors affect the activity and efficiency of legume bacteria. Those conditions essential to the satisfactory growth of legumes must be supplied if maximum results from inoculation are to be obtained.

Acid soils tend to eliminate legume bacteria in accordance with

the degree of acidity of the soil, and the ability of the bacteria to tolerate this condition. Organic matter is essential for proper development and functioning of legume bacteria.

Certain strains of legume bacteria are much less effective than others in their nitrogen fixation even though they form numerous nodules, and some are actually parasitic. Unless it is known that the soil contains the right kind of bacteria of a highly effective strain, artificial inoculation should always be used when sowing legume seed. "When in doubt, inoculate."

Legume bacteria are living organisms, so inoculants should be stored in a cool place until used, and not be exposed to high temperatures. After legume seeds are inoculated they should be kept out of sun and be sown or planted as quickly as possible.

If inoculated legume seeds are not sown under favorable conditions for quick germination and plant development, the legume bacteria may be destroyed, in which case a supplemental inoculation may be necessary to obtain satisfactory results.

Most chemical seed disinfectants are injurious to legume bacteria, so care should be exercised where both kinds of treatments are used.

Tests made by Erdman and others have shown that a large percentage of the commercial legume cultures on the market today, put out by well-known concerns, and handled and applied according to instructions given, can be depended upon to produce satisfactory results.

Mrs. O. F. Lange was named as Member-at-large of the Church Cabinet and Mrs. J. H. O'Rear as member-at-large of The World Service Committee.

The officers of the organizations of the church reported growth in every instance which was particularly noticeable in the report for the Sunday School made by the superintendent, Otho Whitefield.

The splendid Church orchestra under the direction of Mrs. G. L. Cranfill and Mrs. C. C. Maurer was cited as the finest single development of the program of the church during the year, and the orchestras' participation in the several phases of the church program.

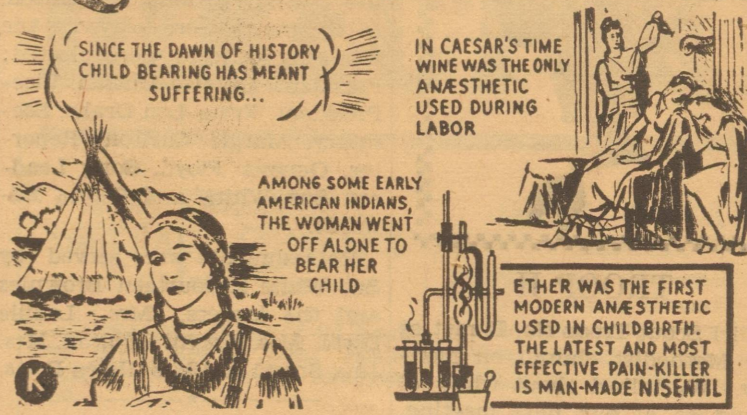

Notable advance was made in 1902 with the introduction of morphine and scopolamine. In succeeding years there were many other drugs, but none of them were ideal.

Now, Dr. Henry G. La Forge of the University of Buffalo Medical

School reports that a new laboratory-made drug, Nisentil, is the most successful pain-killer yet found and "an improvement over any analgesic drug heretofore available."

Dr. La Forge reported that 1,000 women were given hypodermic injections of Nisentil. Results showed that "the drug definitely relieves pain and anxiety of labor," shortens its duration, acts rapidly and has little or no undesirable effects on either mother or child.

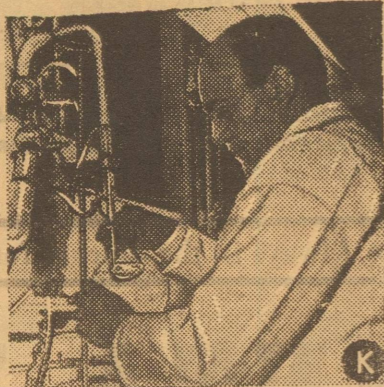

Farmers gave a lot of different answers this week when asked how many inches of snow it takes to make an inch of water.

Thomas A. Blair is probably the nearest to right when he says that "In the absence of definite information, the ratio of 10 inches of snow to 1 inch of water is frequently used as an average." He goes on to say that the amount of water in a given volume of snow varies greatly because in very moist snow 6 inches may make an inch of water, while in fluffy, dry snow it may take 30 inches to make one inch of water. Blair is author of the book "Weather Elements" and in 1942, was senior meteorologist in the U. S. Weather Bureau.

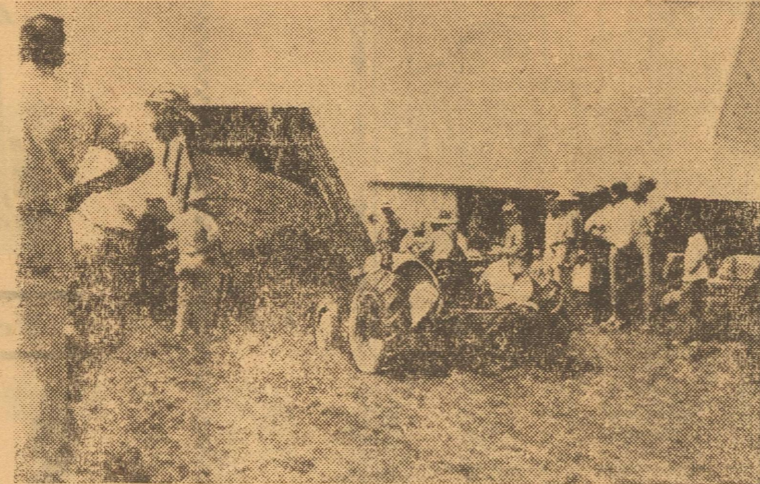

More Economical Method of Storing Grass Silage



Chopped Forage Is Blown Into Trucks Directly From Harvesting Machines, Dumped on Pile and Packed Down by Tractor.

The story of a demonstration on an Illinois farm of how grass silage can be made more economically by the "silage pile" method is told by Charlie Enlow, formerly agronomist of the Soil Conservation Service.

Grass silage is nothing new, particularly to thousands of eastern dairy farmers, but stacking it on top of the ground without the expense of digging a pit or erecting a silo is a radical departure from established methods. It is the most practical method of storing the first cutting of legume-grass mixtures and avoids the heavy losses generally encountered in attempting to make a hay crop during the uncertain weather of early June.

The "silage pile" idea is to construct a highway grade from 14 to 20 feet wide over the crest of a convenient spot near where cattle or other livestock are fed. This gives drainage not only to ditches 10 to 12 inches deep under either edge of the pile, but towards both ends of the pile from the center. The real secret in addition to good drainage is in packing the silage very compactly with no air pockets. During the demonstration, three small rubber-tired tractors were used continuously to pack the silage, in addition to the trucks driving over the pile while dumping their loads.

When completed, the pile of silage contained about 400 to 450 tons, and was approximately 14 feet high in the center, sloping toward each end at ground level. It can best be visualized when it is realized that the trucks continued to drive over the pile from one end to the other until it was completed.

The pile was covered with 2 or 3 inches of soil and planted to rye. This makes it quite easy to peel off the soil as necessary in feeding the silage. However, many farmers prefer to leave the pile without cov-

er, as the spoilage seldom goes deeper than 6 to 8 inches. If well compacted and sealed the total loss should not be over 5 to 8 per cent, which is very low as compared to the average loss in attempting to make hay of the first crop.

Following are some of the reasons why farmers are so interested in this new method:

(1) The initial cost of preparing for storage is negligible. Preparing the ground for storing 520 tons of silage cost one farmer only \$15.00.

(2) The site for storage can be chosen annually for convenience in feeding operations.

(3) There is no spoilage from water seeping in as may happen with a trench silo.

(4) It is a rapid operation. Field chopped forage is blown into trucks directly from harvesting machines, hauled quickly to the pile and dumped, and the trucks are back ready for more loads.

(5) Spoilage is less because of the ease with which thorough packing can be done, by driving the trucks back and forth over the pile.

(6) Less labor is required than by other methods.

(7) Feeding operations are more convenient and less expensive.

The importance of this new technique is that it eliminates one of the most troublesome bottlenecks to the increased acreage of grass-legume crops—that of harvesting.

We must have grasses and legumes in the crop rotation to increase yields per acre and total production appreciably. It is basic to erosion control and to improving soil structure and fertility. It also means not less but more livestock, lowered costs of meat production, and substantial increases in the total production of all food crops through the only sensible route—increased yields per acre.

Here is a slick way to make two crops in one year and at the same time improve your soil.

(1) In fall seed wheat by regular methods.

(2) In early spring overseed wheat, across the drill furrows, to Hubam Clover. Inoculate seed.

(3) In spring or early summer harvest wheat. The clover at this time will be too small to interfere with the harvest.

(4) In late summer or fall harvest clover. Then turn under residue by deep plowing 8 to 10 inches.

The deep plowing is important to insure aeration.

prevent dust storms in the long run by boosting growing wheat and legume cover crops. However, we can look for more dust immediately after the ground dries up.

A thin layer of surface soil cracks and becomes fluffy after snow has melted and the ground dries. The original stability of the soil is broken down, leaving a powdery substance lying loosely over the surface of the land. This loose, dry, powdery soil is easily swept up by wind.

A report to the Soil Conservation Service in October 1949 showed that in the Southern High Plains, the decline in soil productivity due to erosion was five times greater than that due to crop removals.

Dr. R. T. Hunt, professor of Agricultural Economic at Texas A and M College explains that soil destruction is somewhat like a man caught in his house without fuel, but he keeps warm

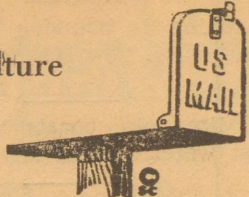

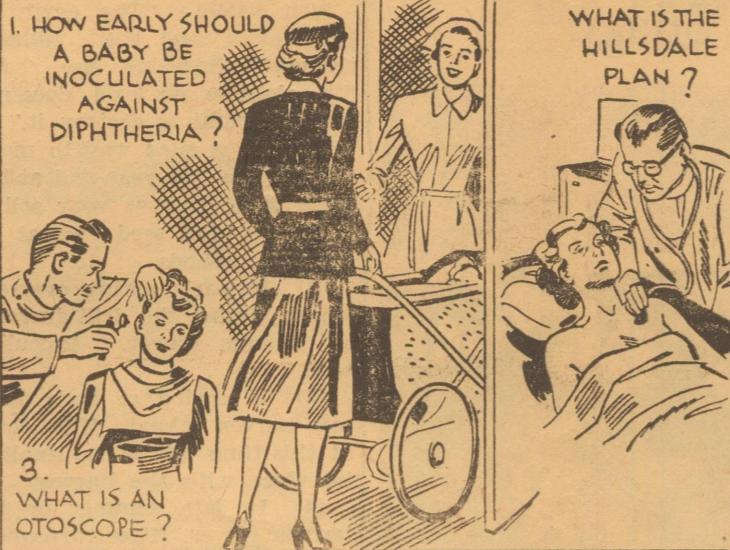

FAMILY NIGHT HELD

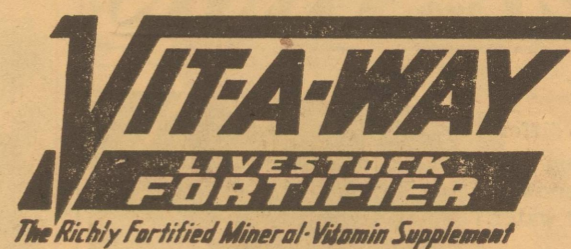
The January Church Family Night of the Congregational Church was held January 6th., with a fine attendance. The "Feed" was particularly good.
