Time To Pay

People in the Clyde area will be able to pay their poll tax either by mail or directly to Mr. Lovell at the City Hall in Clyde on January 26 from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

For persons over 60 years, to be tax exempt in the 1966 elections, they must have had their 60th birthday before January 31, 1965. They will not need an exemption certificate as this requirement applies to cities of 10,000 or more population.






