

USE YOUR FREEDOM TO VOTE

Only 35.4 per cent of the eligible voters in Parmer County took time to vote in the 1948 presidential election.

This fact is appalling in a democracy that is supposedly governed by the governed.

One must go back to 1896 to find a creditable voting percentage in the United States; in that year 84 per cent of the eligible voters expressed their preferences at the polls.

But down in 1948 the percentage had dropped to a miserable 50 per cent.

Let's compare this showing with figures in the last general elections in some other lands:

- England - 84 per cent voted.
- Italy - 89 per cent response.
- Belgium - 92 per cent!

But in Parmer County - in the good old U.S.A. the figure stands out in near shame - 35.4.

Are not all our blessings worth the consideration of a vote? Haven't we equal and more reason to cast our vote than the European semi-democracies and totalitarian states?

How about keeping Nov. 4th open for voting? Let's do everything possible to vote and see

Ike Holds 4-1 Lead in High Plains Straw Vote; Local Count Is 76-20

Editor's Note: Though fully being aware of the fact that a Poll of this type is inaccurate at best, we have had a lot of fun conducting it in Parmer

County, and we hope you enjoyed the good-natured arguments that sometimes have resulted.

We cannot believe that Mr.

Eisenhower will carry the actual local vote by a 4-1 majority but we do believe the poll is indicative of a majority vote here.

In the latest tabulation of the straw vote of the entire panhandle, Ike had 1 660 votes as against 432 for Adlai.

However, Stevenson was making a stronger showing than was reported in the first round of returns. He now is leading in two communities, Shamrock and Claude. He led only a Shamrock at the first report two weeks ago. He has held to that lead with The Shamrock Texan reporting a total of 70 for Stevenson and 59 for Eisenhower.

The poll in this area was a joint enterprise of 24 weekly newspapers in the high plains cooperating with the Amarillo Daily News.

Some of the papers made a detailed analysis of the voting-for instance The Dalhart Texan came up with the revelation that certain occupations - including housewives, business men and business employees have voted heavier in the straw vote than other classifications including the big farm and rail road blocks there.

Confused about the 'Tideland' References? Geologists - Engineers Attempt Clarification

With so much mention in the news during recent weeks of the 'Tidelands' of Texas, the following report of their definition and real importance has been prepared by a group of qualified scientists for the enlightenment of the great majority of us who have been at times confused regarding these lands.

A confusion has been established in the minds of people not only by the erroneous use of the term "tidelands" but also by an attempt to establish these offshore submerged lands to be of no economic importance to the State of Texas.

The offshore submerged lands of Texas and Louisiana are but a continuation of the Gulf Coastal Embayment—a part of which is located on land, and part of which is covered by water. This structural province covers the entire Gulf of Mexico, including the shore areas immediately surrounding it.

This geological province is a very large basin into which rivers, during millions of years, have deposited sediments many thousands of feet thick. Folding, faulting, and uplifting through earth structural changes and piercement by salt masses have resulted in the formation of reservoirs favorable for the accumulation of gas, oil, and sulphur.

The oil fields located along Gulf Coast of Old Mexico, Texas, and Louisiana are on the landward parts of this basin. The early discovery of these fields was due to the fact that

these areas were above sea level where it was cheaper and easier to drill and not because the structures, traps, and salt domes do not occur where the land is below sea level. Sea level has nothing to do with the occurrence of these traps and structures.

With the increase in the demand for oil, gas, and sulphur

and improved methods for exploration and drilling, development of the submerged lands became economically feasible and resulted in the discovery of numerous structures and fields off shore. These operations were successfully conducted on the submerged lands of Louisiana and Texas until the title to this offshore submerged land

was questioned by the Federal Government in Washington, after which, all drilling was terminated on the submerged lands of Texas.

These undeveloped lands of Texas occur along the same structural trend and at similar depths to the large number of oil and gas fields and sulphur domes that are presently being

produced in southern Louisiana on submerged areas raised above sea level by the great delta of the Mississippi River and its tributaries. If by Geological happenstance the Mississippi River had been diverted westward into Texas, at an earlier time, the reverse of the existing status would undoubtedly exist. The Texas structures and

traps would have already been discovered and developed.

The vastness of the oil, gas, condensate, and sulphur potentialities in this submerged land area is indicated by the discoveries made on the landward portion of this basin. As of Jan 1st, 1952, there were 1,085 oil and gas fields producing in Railroad Commission Districts 2, 3, and 4, within a 100 mile belt along the Gulf Coast line of Texas alone. From these fields, as of the same date 11.9 trillion cubic feet of gas, 5,046 billion barrels of oil and condensate, and 70.9 million long tons of sulphur had already been produced. As of the same date, there still remains a future estimated reserve, already discovered, to be produced, of 50 trillion cubic feet of gas, 5,965 billion barrels of oil and condensate and 50 million long tons of sulphur.

The total gas, oil, condensate, and sulphur discovered in the coastal belt of Texas as of January 1, 1952, was therefore, 61,940 trillion cubic feet of gas, 11,011 billion barrels of oil and condensate and 120.9 billion long tons of sulphur. These total ultimate future recovery estimates are very conservative in that they do not include the fields discovered since the first of the year nor those yet to be discovered in the same land area. Seventy new fields already have been discovered this year.

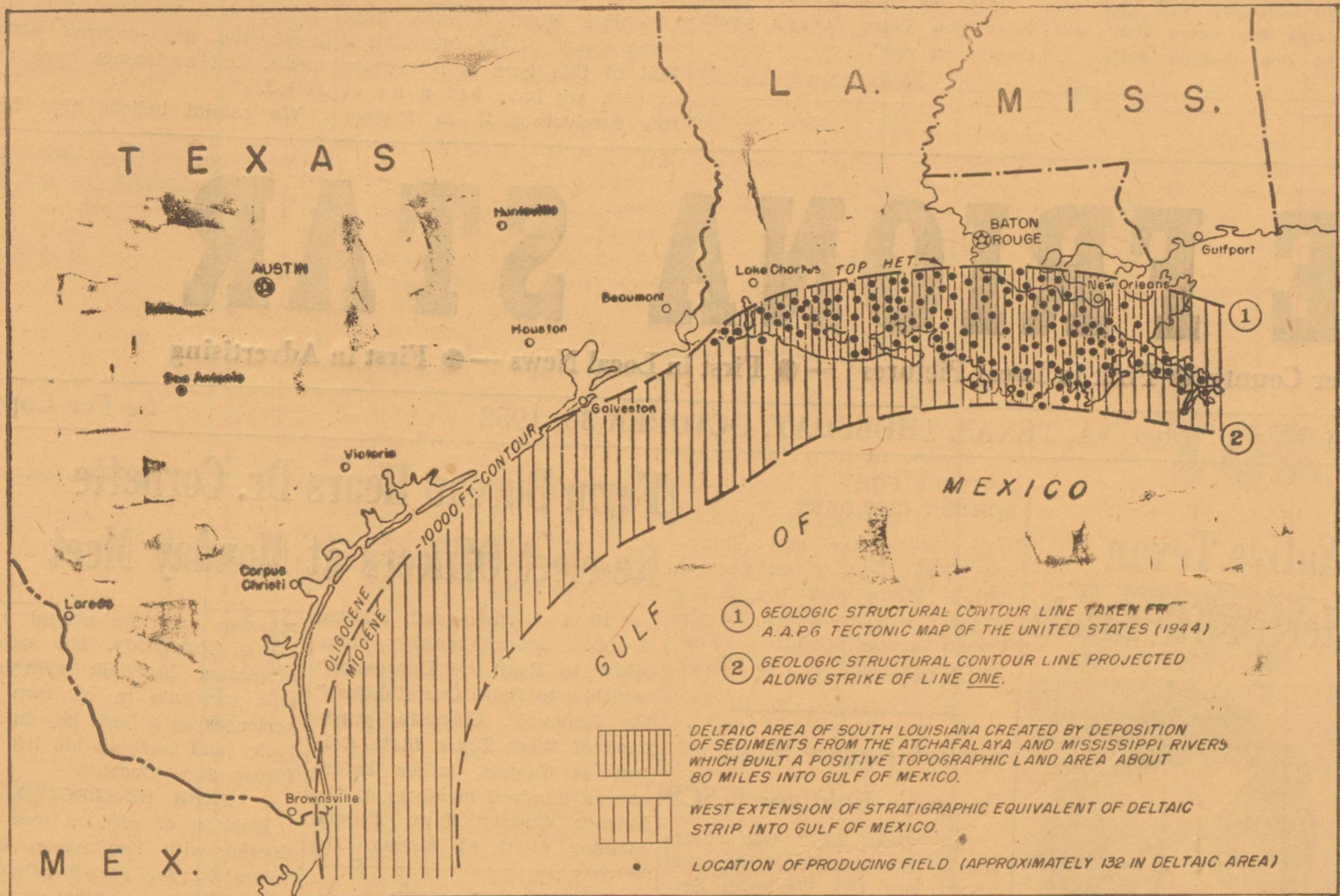
The Texas submerged land areas, immediately adjacent to the Gulf Coastal belt of Railroad Commission Districts 2, 3, and 4 extending for over 400 miles along the coast line having the same geological and structural features have a potentiality for the production of oil, gas, condensate, and sulphur greatly in excess of these totals because of its greater area, better reservoir conditions, and the full use of modern methods of recovery.

However, if the potentialities be assumed to be limited to the equivalent of the ultimate recoveries as set forth above, than the gross ultimate income from the gas at 15 cents per 1,000 cubic feet would amount to \$9,291,000,000. The oil and condensate at an average of \$2.65 per barrel \$291,791,500,000 and the sulphur at a value of \$25.00 per long ton \$302,250,000 or a total of \$414,926,500,000. A more realistic forecast of the possible gross ultimate income would probably be twice the above figure or say \$80 billion.

A royalty of 1-8 accruing to the public school fund would amount to say \$5 billion on the minimum estimate or \$10 billion on that of the more realistic figure not including the amounts that would accrue as a bonus for leasing the lands or the rentals received therefrom. It also would not include any ad valorem taxes or 5-per cent gross production and pipeline tax the latter alone would amount to \$2 billion or \$4 billion respectively.

If the ownership to these potential oil - gas - and sulphur reserves are seized and nationalized by the government in Washington it not only means the loss of this future income to the State School Fund that will have to be replaced by taxes but will also remove these taxable values as source of future ad valorem income required to offset the declining oil and gas values of the existing fields located on the adjacent onshore unsubmerged land areas.

This brief review of what the Submerged Lands of Texas or the so-called "Tidelands Case" means to Texas and Texans has been evaluated as a public service to the People of Texas by Texas Geologists and Registered Engineers functioning solely as Texas citizens.

Do you know the difference between a General Warranty Deed and a Quit Claim Deed?

A General Warranty Deed is an instrument in writing duly executed and delivered which conveys title to real estate. This type of deed guarantees that the seller is conveying a good title to the purchaser subject to such limitations as may be mentioned in the Deed, and it the owner of the property being conveyed and that he holds all of the rights in said property. Under such a Deed even if the seller did not have title of any sort to the property at the time of giving the Deed, but should thereafter acquire title to the property, then under his guarantee that he had

title at that time, the title to the property would pass to the purchaser, to whom he has given a Deed.

A Quit Claim Deed carries with it no guarantee of anything. A Quit Claim Deed merely gives to the recipient of the same any title which the owner might have at that time. If the Seller had no title or did not have good title then the Purchaser received nothing more than what the Seller had at the time. There are no guarantees or warranties in connection with Quit Claim Deed.

Thus a purchaser should always insist upon a General Warranty Deed duly executed by all necessary parties who own or claim any interest in the property duly acknowledged and delivered.

Wm. H. Guyer owner of the Good Luck Produce had announced that he had closed out his cream station here and was employed at the Friona Gin.

Miss Rose Evelyn Adams and Mrs. Aubrey Armstrong had presented a musical recital at the high school auditorium. The recital included piano and cornet and also readings and vocal numbers.

W. L. Venable was candidate for sheriff and tax collector of Parmer County.

Officers and directors of the Friona State Bank were M. M.

Henschel as president; H. J. Farwell as vice-president; and Jesse M. Osborn as cashier. Raymond Wright was assistant cashier and J.G. Weir and Mrs. Geo. Maurer were directors.

The Star was reminding all voters to take time on the ballots and mark them correctly. Al Smith and Herbert Hoover were presidential candidates.

A called meeting of the Friona Chamber of Commerce was held in the office of M. A. Crum to discuss the campaign for the removal of the county seat from Farwell to Friona.

The herd law ordinance went into full force and effect. This ordinance stated that owners of domestic animals should not allow their animals to run at large within the city limits.

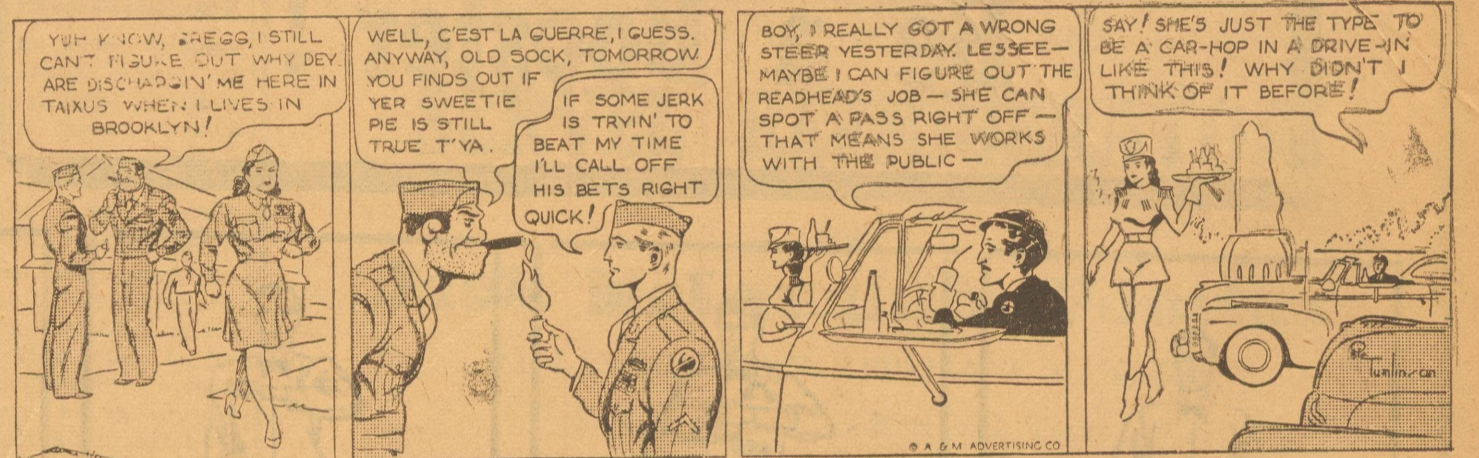

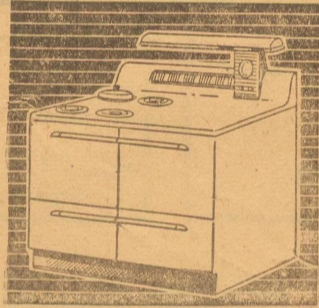

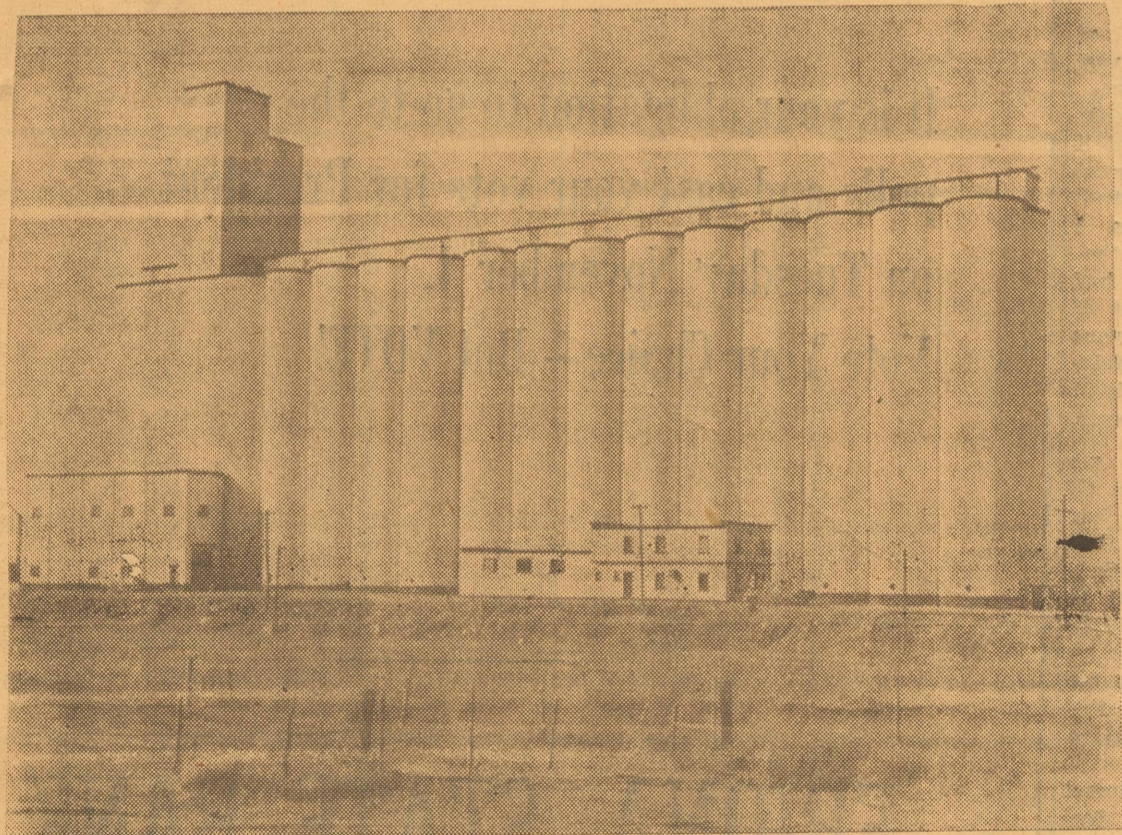

Rogers 'Sees' Trend To Adlai; Enumerates Criticisms of GOP

What the people are saying along U. S. Highway 66 and U. S. 40:

Mrs. Rogers and I made it back to Washington on schedule although it was a close shave. We came back by way of Hiway 60 to Tulsa -then 66 to St. Louis and 40 to the Pennsylvania Turnpike and on to Washington via 240. This is a long trip and covers about 1700 miles. We consumed more time than would otherwise be necessary because I stopped at every opportunity to visit with people in all walks of life concerning their feelings about the coming election. As you no doubt suspect there is a great diversity of thought on this subject. However the recent

trends towards Stevenson as reported in the national polls was indicated more clearly among the great middle class. Many of the small business men fear that Republican control would result in a repetition of the depression years of the early 30's. They base this thought on the great interest that New York financial interests are showing in supporting the Republican ticket and the tremendous amount of money that is being spent by the Republican National Committee. Most all of them were highly complimentary of both Governor Stevenson and General Eisen-

would be exempt from the same tuition. It would also have created red tape on top of red tape and subjected the taxpayer to administrative expense that would have run into the millions each year. It would also have opened the door for a repetition of the immoral if not fraudulent practices that were engaged in by many schools under the original GI bill. These practices amounted to raids on the public treasury and were uncovered by the able work of the committee headed by Congressman Olin Teague of Bryan.

Another thing that many people can't understand is why the big money interests refuse to buy government insured GI mortgages while at the same time they purchase public housing bonds. These same

people condemn public housing as socialism (incidentally I have voted against public housing at every opportunity) while at the same time they are willing to furnish the money to finance public housing projects. The reason is simple. The public housing bonds bear two per cent interests and are tax exempt. The GI mortgage paper bears four per cent interest and is not tax exempt. Because the big money interest are in the high tax brackets they can realize a bigger return from the two per cent tax exempt bonds than they can from four per cent GI paper. I do not criticize them for trying to get the greatest return from their investments. But I cannot under-

stand why these people cry out against socialism and then are willing to help finance it. One of the greatest guards against socialism and communism is individual home ownership. The GI home mortgage bill does not give the GI anything. It merely affords him the opportunity to buy and pay for a home for himself and family at a reasonable interest rate. It occurs to me that these big money interests could make a great contribution in the fight against socialism and communism if they would stop buying these public housing bonds and start helping these boys who have protected their interests on the battlefield.

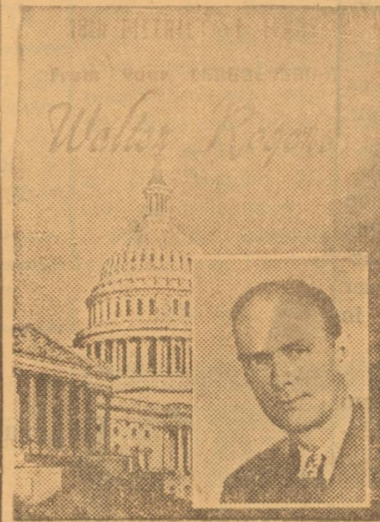

hower but in many instances they were highly critical of both vice-presidential nominees. One criticism against Senator Nixon that I heard repeated many times was the fact that he had called upon Governor Stevenson and Senator Sparkman to make public their income tax returns and then refused to subject his own to the public gaze. This failure on his part has undoubtedly caused much suspicion as to whether or not he told all in his television-radio appearance.

In lower Illinois and Indiana and Ohio much of which is considered strong Taft territory there is pronounced feeling against the treatment Taft received at the Republican Convention. The wounds have not yet healed. What effect this might have on the election is a toss-up. One man told me that many undecided voters were leaning toward Stevenson because Stevenson had not engaged in the cat fight going on between Truman and Eisenhower and Nixon but that he had continued to discuss the issues clearly and concisely speaking in factual terms rather than in generalities and refusing to be dragged into name calling contest of wild accusations and innuendoes.

The interesting feature of this experience was the vast amount of information possessed by the various people along the way. I have heard it said many times that a great majority of voters are controlled by temporary emotions. I have always contested this theory because I have always had great faith in the judgment of the American people. Anyone who does not have that faith should make the same trip I made and talk to the people.

One person explained to me in detail the recent Korean GI bill. He did not know that I had worked on that bill and had helped fight it through Congress. I can assure you that he was well acquainted with the entire subject including the attempted amendment of the bill in the Senate and what that amendment would have done. The amendment that I refer to was the Nixon Amendment which was introduced by Senator Nixon and supported by Senator Ives of New York. The amendment was adopted in the Senate. It was knocked out in the Conference Committee after a clean but hard fight. The primary purpose of the amendment was to permit California and New York schools to collect from the Federal Government tuition and fees that they could not collect from the individual students under their state laws. It would have meant that the American taxpayer would have had to pay tuition for yet while civilian students

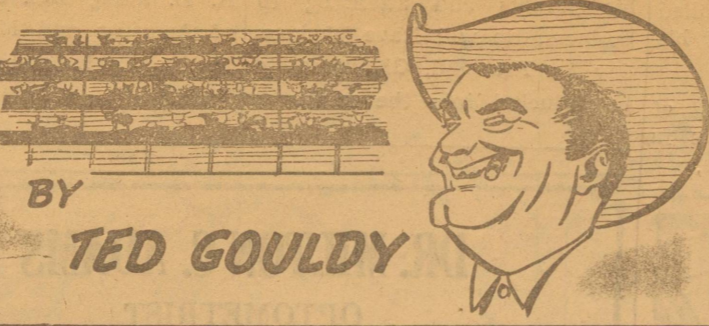

Heavy movement of cattle and calves continued this week. However a stronger stocker and feeder market and broader demand for replacement cattle and calves helped prices away to a better start at Ft. Worth Monday. Fat calves shared the stronger market. Many sales of stockers and fat calves were \$1 or more above a week ago at Fort Worth. First interest in many weeks in lightweight stocker calves this week resulted in some calf sales sharply higher for their kind. Typical was a lot of 42 calves at 216 pounds at \$24.50. Hugh Rogers, Knox County, had 32 stocker steer yearlings at 521 lbs. at \$22.50, with 31 heifers at 493 lbs. at \$18. G. R. White, Brady, had cows at \$14.50 and \$15.50.

Lambs were strong to 50 cents higher at Fort Worth Monday, and ewes were mostly 50 cents up. Feeders and yearlings ruled steady.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings drew \$23 to \$31, and plain and medium sorts sold from \$14 to \$21 with cutter grades from \$10 to \$13. Fat cows cashed at \$13 to \$16, a few heiferettes to \$18. Canners and cutters cleared at \$7 to \$13. Bulls sold from \$10 to \$18.50.

Good and choice slaughter calves sold for \$18 to \$23 with fancy heavyweights of 500 to 600 pounds at \$23 to \$26. Plain and medium butcher sorts cashed at \$14 to \$17, with cull sorts from \$10 to \$13.

Hogs topped at \$18, lowest since April, 1952. Sows drew \$14 to \$16.50.

Good and choice stocker calves ranged from \$17 to \$24.50, some mixed steer and heifer calves averaging 216 pounds at \$24.50 and some plain and med-

ium kinds sold from \$13 to \$17. Stocker steer yearlings cashed at \$14 to \$22.50. Stocker cows drew \$11 to \$18. Several sizable shipments of feeder steers and heifers sold in the \$16 to \$19 bracket.

Medium, good and choice slaughter lambs sold from \$13 to \$23, and stocker and feeder lambs sold from \$8 to \$15. Cull lambs and yearlings, as well as some cull two's, sold from \$6 to \$8. Aged wethers sold from \$4 to \$8, and slaughter ewes drew \$3.50 to \$5. Old bucks sold from \$3 to \$4. Slaughter yearlings drew \$8 to \$15.
