Howard County residents paying their property taxes paying better get busy to avoid paying a stiff penalty.
According to Sondra Bloom, According to Sondra Bloom,
deputy clerk for the Howard
County Tax County Tax Collectors Office,
93 percent of Howard County taxpayers have paid their prop-
erty tax. For those erty tax. For those who
haven't, the interest and penal havent, the interest and penal-
ty keeps getting stiffer the longer they wait. Tixfer bills were due the end of January.
"If we receive your property "If we receive your property
tax with a postmark of tax with a postmark of
February, we will only charge
a 7 percent late fee; however
anything postmarked after that will be charged a late fee of " percent," said Bloom. "It
steadily goes up each month that it goes unpaid." Bloom said the rate will
increase to 11 percent in April increase to 11 percent in April 13 percent in May, and 15 per-
cent late fee if not paid until cent lat
June.

There is also an additional 17 percent tacked on for attorney
fees on tax bills not collected fy June 30 . "A person can by June 30 . "A person can
avoid all the penalties and
interest that is assessed if interest that is assessed if they
