Boy Scouting will be revived on a full scale in Friona next week when the first troop meeting of Pack 56 will be held at the Methodist Church annex at 7:00 o'clock Tuesday evening, Nov. 25th.

All boys interested in scouting and interested adults alike are urged to attend this meeting.

The Friona Lions Club is sponsoring the troop, and representatives of that club met with area scout worker W. M. Teague in Friona Wednesday and set up the council and completed the

necessary preliminary arrangements for organization.

Four-Day Revival Begins Sunday

A Stewardship Revival will be conducted at the Friona Methodist Church, beginning on Sunday, Nov. 23, and continuing through Wednesday evening.

The pastor, Rev. U. S. Sherrill, will preach at the morning service Sunday, and Rev. Lester Hill of the Methodist Church in Canyon will preach that evening at 7:30 o'clock. Rev. Hill's subject will be "The Stewardship of Talent". He incidentally was at one time pastor of the local church. The public is cordially invited to hear him Sunday night.

Other speakers during the revival include Rev. T. Edgar Neal of Hereford, Monday night; Rev. H. B. Coggins of the Buchanan Street Methodist Church, Amarillo, Tuesday evening; and E. H. Quattlebaum, layman of Amarillo on Wednesday night.

Boys eleven years of age and older are eligible for scouting; those younger are serviced by the Cub program underway here already.

Items of interest to be discussed at the Tuesday night meeting include organization of a temporary patrol, the troop budget (all boys wishing to join are asked to bring 50 cents to the meeting), the setting of a regular meeting night, and plans for area and national Scout activities including the national jamboree, the explorer encampment at the Amarillo Army Air Force Base, etc. Also arrangements are being negotiated for the use of the indoor swimming pool at WTSC in Canyon.

Over 10,000 Bales Cotton Ginned In Area as Peak of Harvest Near

Cotton gins of the area are centers of activity this week as the cotton now is being brought to the gins, faster than they can handle it, despite the three additional gins in Parmer County this year. However the gins are operating day and night and each report only a few hundred bales waiting in yards.

Wright Williams of the North Plains Gin at Friona estimates that the harvest is about 60 per cent complete. He said that harvesting in general had been earlier than most observers had expected, due largely to the early freeze.

G. W. Fleming of the Mills-Fleming Gin at Hub states that the quality of cotton being brought to the gins is as good as expected for this locality. Much of the staple length is running 7-8ths to 29-32nds inch length. Price has been hovering around 28-29 cents average.

A 1952 Texas cotton crop of 3,660,000 bales with an average yield of 174 pounds per acre was forecast by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, USDA, on Nov. 10th. This is 60,000 bales above the October forecast.

It is expected that 10,114,000 acres of cotton will be harvested this year, according to information received by Joe Camp of the Parmer County PMA.

The forecast for the nation is for a crop of 14,905,000 bales or 492,000 bales above the October forecast.

The 1952 crop is expected to be about 1,000,000 bales short of the goal set for the nation and will not materially increase the amount of carryover cotton at the end of the marketing season above the carryover at the end of the 1951 marketing season, according to the Department of Agriculture.

Of particular interest was a resolution recommending a depletion clause for farmers, similar to that allowed for petroleum, mining and lumber industries.

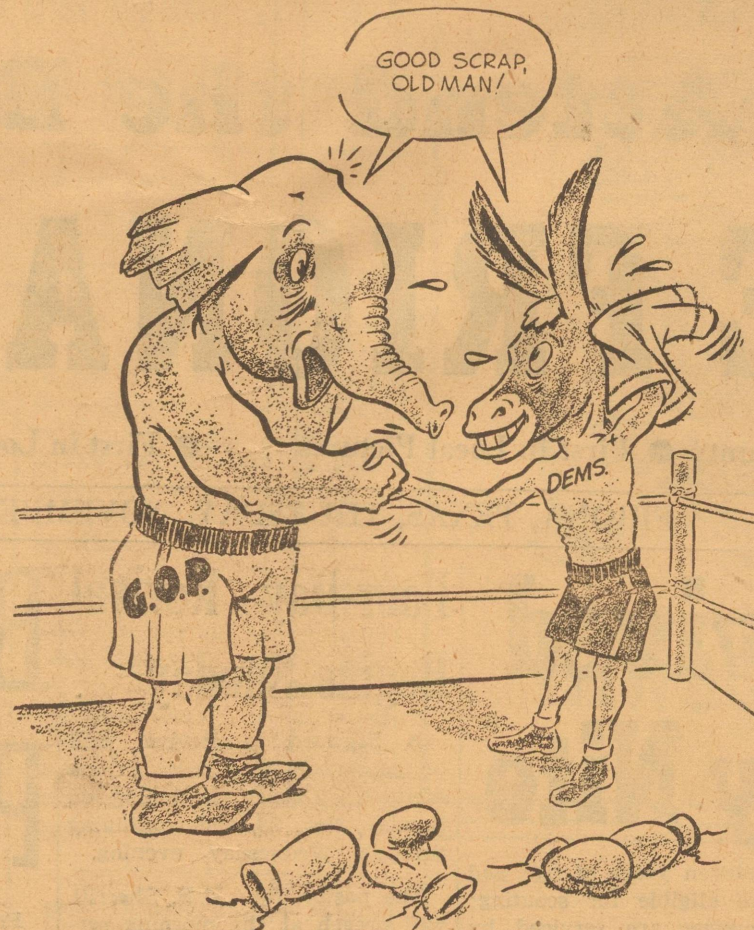

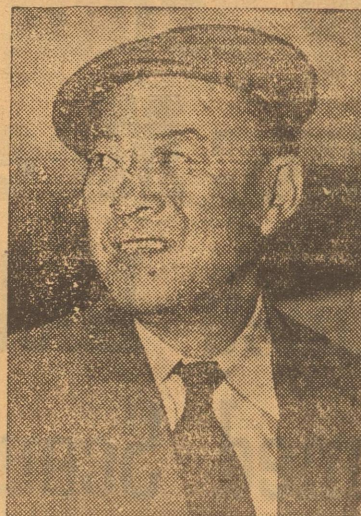

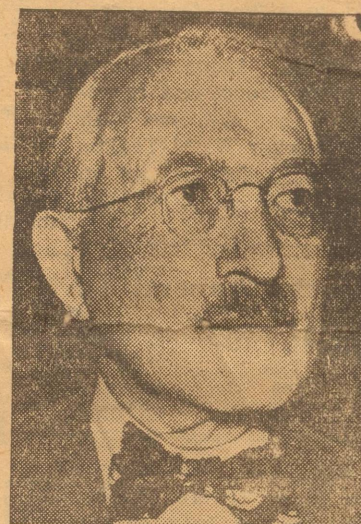
would take the same position.

If these prisoners were returned to the country of their origin under the second proposal above referred to, it would be administratively impossible to keep up with them because of rigid censorship behind the Iron Curtain and the further fact that most of the information we could obtain on them would be highly questionable. I do not believe that Russia would agree to this second proposal. If she agreed to the first proposal, I would entertain great fears that she would attempt to infiltrate UN countries with Red spies by this medium.

One of Russia's prime objectives is to bring about a major breach in the NATO organization. She obviously thinks that her best chance lies in causing friction between France and the other NATO countries. It presently appears that should a truce be concluded in Korea, the Red Chinese will promptly move men and supplies to the Indo-China front for stepped up action against the French. This will require France to call for immediate all-out aid from the UN or permit Indo-China to fall into the hands of the Reds. Russia figures that such action on the part of Red China will force the UN to move into Indo-China, a they did in Korea, or refuse to France the all-out aid that would be necessary. She figures that in the latter event, France would be forced to commit practically all of her forces to the salvation of Indo-China, and that even though she was able to prevent the Red menace from taking over. She would break with the NATO countries and at the same time measurably weaken herself at home. On the other hand, if the UN does move into Indo-China and stops the Red menace there, Russia can always return to Korea to keep the fire smoldering, truce or no truce. She is in the position similar to a checker player in the double corner. The problem of the United Nations is to get her out of that double corner without permitting a third

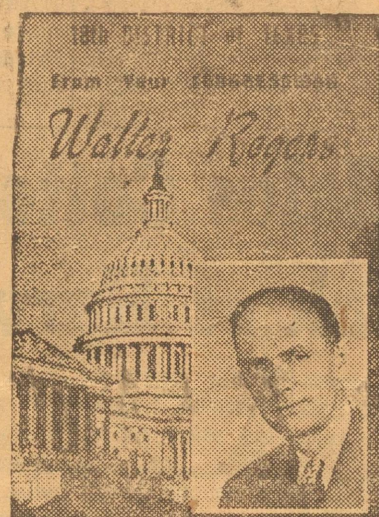

Prisoner Repatriation Big Problem - Rogers



THE POW SITUATION IN THE KOREAN TRUCE TALKS

The major obstacle in reaching a truce in the Korean conflict appears to hinge on the question of forced or voluntary repatriation of prisoners of war. From the lack of progress that has been made in the solution of this issue, it would seem that an irresistible force has met an immovable object. Russia and her satellites have taken the position that all prisoners of war on both sides shall be returned to the sources from which they were captured, irrespective of the desires of the prisoner. The position of the United Nations is that these prisoners should be thoroughly screened and that those sincerely and honestly desiring to remain under the jurisdiction of their captors should be dealt with by the captors and not the opposition forces. It will be remembered that subsequent to World War II many tragic stories came out of Europe and Russia concerning the great efforts and in many cases suicidal attempts of prisoners of war resisting their return to Russia. This would leave little doubt as to the type of harsh punishment employed by Russia in dealing with returned POW's, and it can be safely assumed that the same procedure would be employed by North Korea and Red China, who follow so closely the Russian scheme. What actually happened to these returned POW's is still somewhat of a mystery because of the rigid censorship behind the Iron Curtain.

Several plans have been advanced to solve this tough problem. One of these before the United Nations calls for the formation of a neutral screening commission to separate the sheep from the goats. Another plan receiving some consideration calls for a return of all POW's upon commitments from the country receiving them that they will not be mistreated. Such agreement would call for periodic review on the status of each returned prisoner. Should the Reds yield from their present arbitrary position and accept the first of

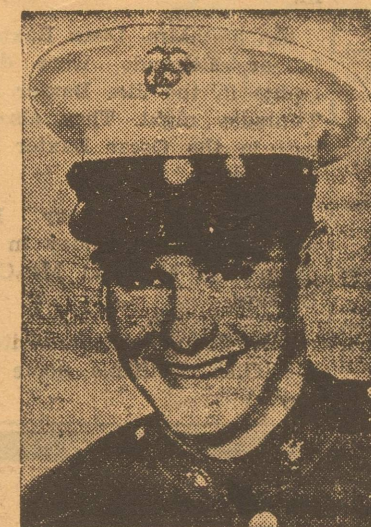
