President Johnson, in his 1965 Christmas greetings to the members of the Job Corps said, "the Corps is for those who want to 'get somewhere' and be 'somebody,' but it can only be a helping hand and not a handout -- or we, and you, will fail.'







Upon completion of training, Job Corps personnel assist with placing the graduates in full-time employment.

President Johnson, in his 1965 Christmas greetings to the members of the Job Corps said, "the Corps is for those who want to 'get somewhere' and be 'somebody,' but it can only be a helping hand and not a handout -- or we, and you, will fail.

If you are a young man beween 16 and 21 who is out of school and cut of work, the Job Corps may offer you an excellent opportunity to upgrade your skills and education. 




