## There's Reasonable Explanation

Voting in the local school election was light. Tho we had hoped to see more people at the polls. we analyze this particular instance as not a display of dis-interest, but rather as indicative of a situation wherin seven good men were offering their services, with no big issues being involved to create large polling. We further believe the vote indicates that the public considers ours as a smooth running and sound educational set-up - at least more so than has been noted in some other years and in some

But this truth still is with us: If we become disgruntled with the administration, we have no one to blame except ourselves who failed to vote. Apathy is a fertile breeding ground for abuses and ill-management. And there is no one but ourselves to blame. Example: National politics in immediate years past.

## What Percentage?

We wouldn't have gone to lengthy research to find why (although we do regret every mis-spelled word, etc., just as much as anyone could). We thought that the fault merely lay in our own stupidity, but a fellow editor comes up with these explanatory facts that make us feel ever so much better!

In an ordinary newspeper column there are 10,000 letters, and there are seven wrong positions for each letter, making 70,000 chances to make errors and several million chances for transpositions. There are at least 56 columns in this newspeper, so you can readily see the chance for mistakes. Did you know that in the sentence, "To be or not to be", by transposition alone, 2,759,022 errors can be made? Now aren't you sorry you got hot and bothered about that little mistake last week!

Another item about your newspaper you probably hadn't thought of:

Your local paper stands ever ready to promote and publicize local civic and charity projects in its editorial columns. That is one of our more enjoyable and beneficial functions.

But did you know that ten inches of space on page one (which is not for sale) is worth at least \$15?

## Fathers and Teachers

We've had our mind on the problems and duties of a school board in the recent weeks preceding the board election.

And this week we came across a highly interesting discourse on a related subject. In the Texas Outlook magazine there appears an article that we hope you will read in its entirity - the views of a father as he appraises the classroom TEACHER and points out the place of a FATHER in the school operation. We quote some excerpts from the author, Mr. Andy Holt, educator of note and no doubt a

"You (teachers) don't impose on us as much as you just ignore us, and that is worse! You never pay any attention to us, except maybe once a year you send a mimeographed note saying, "Dear Father, will you please do what is checked below ... "

"You have heard the old saying, 'Never underestimate the power of a woman'. Well, don't you underestimate the powers of us fathers, because not only do we provide the lunch money, but we build the buildings in which you teach, and pay your salaries; we even decide how much we are going to pay you -- I hate to admit it, but we do!

"Not only that, but I can go to Rotary Club any Tuesday, turn to the fellow on the right of me, "Say, did you hear that fifth grade teacher was drunk last night?" It spreads around, and in a week they are ready to run you out of town! Or I could turn to

the fellow on my left, "Say, they tell me that fifth grade teacher is the best we've ever had." First thing you know they are ready to raise your salary. Don't underestimate the fathers!"

And the writer then goes into a more serious vein, proposing a 9-point program for "Winning the fathers over". What do you think of it ,teachers?

1. If you want me to respect you, resect your-

3. Let me know that you are trying to improve yourselves .....

7. If you want me to like you, you will give me a chance to know you better ....

8. If you want me to work for you, give me some-

9. Just do a good job of teaching our children.."



Some observers feel further comparison between FBI and FTC would be libellous to the

But on disclosures pending in Washington, comparison between FBI and FTC, bearing in mind both have investigative functions,

can be carried even further.

For example, no one accuses
FBI of spending all effort investigating who puts slugs in penny gum machines, while saboteurs go unnoticed.

Yet the FTC spends millions of dollars on cases such as the following: The Stewart-Allen Company of New York makes smoking pipes. Recently, the majesty of the FTC was brought to bear in a public hearing, resulting in a decision the firm must disclose its pipes are manufactured in the U.S. even though the briar is imported.

Neither would FBI hire people not believing in the laws.

But FTC neglect to investigate pending major problems raises many doubts about motives. © National Federation of Independent Business Retiring Commissioner John Carson reveals a case in point. Several months ago, in the Tire Case, FTC invoked for the first time in history the maximum given it by Congress. Other FTC actions are just as puzzling. For example, years of research, the FTC prepared a long, several hundred page report on the actions of a few major American oil com-panies allied with British oil interests, in establishing an alleged world petroleum cartel. This report was then buried by the FTC and required action by U. S. Sen-

ators to make it public. The FTC has great powers. But many Congressmen are becoming curious as to just how, and for whom, is FTC using this


strip that has been in controversy, the states can immediately proceed with full development. The fight on this issue has been long and tough, and it is a source of great satisfaction to know that we have passed the measure through the House and that it will not be vetoed.
