

Baird Low Rent Housing Authority Receives \$2,400 Loan; 12 To Be Built

The Department of Housing and Urban Development announced last week that a \$2,400 loan has been made to the Housing Authority of the City of Baird.

The funds, requested by the Housing Authority of the City of Baird, will enable it to begin preliminary planning on its program for 12 new low-rent homes at Baird. Ten will be designed for the elderly. These dwellings, to be available to low-income families at rents they can afford, will have an important role in the community's efforts to eliminate conditions associated with poverty.

Following completion of preliminary planning, the Local Housing Authority will prepare and submit to HUD a program which will include a description of the proposed housing site, sketch plans, and an estimate of the total cost of the proposed housing development.

The program will serve as a basis for an annual contributions contract. This contract will permit the Housing Authority to proceed toward construction of the proposed housing units, which will add substantially to the local economy, and to set rentals within the means of low income families.

National Library Week April 17 - 24

As National Library Week approaches, April 17-24, Callahan County Library will have on display a number of new books especially adapted to show advances in science, history and the space explorations.

For the Memorial Shelf, two books have been given in memory of Tom Barton of Baird. These are Science, The Never Ending Guest, by W. Vergara, and Science In The Age of Space, by Dan Posin.

In memory of M. D. (Pete) Chatham, a very comprehensive A Short History of the United States, by Nevins and Commager, will be available for reference.

Two pioneer Callahan County women have been honored by memorial books also. The Story of The Texas Rangers, by Walter Prescott Webb, is inscribed in memory of Mrs. W. O. Maltby, who was the daughter-in-law of a famous Texas Ranger, Capt. Jeff Maltby. Another epic of frontier days, The Chisholm Trail, by Wayne Gard, has been given in honor of the memory of Mrs. Pearl Fountain Berry of Clyde, who was especially interested in frontier history.

Other useful titles soon to be available are An Intellectual and Cultural History of the Western World, by H. E. Barnes;

the 1966 Supplement to the World Book Encyclopedia; the Baseball Guide for 1966, and several other books on history and science.

A collection of titles for young people by the well-known author, Laura Ingalls Wilder, will provide eight books on the true stories of Mrs. Wilder's life, a collection known as the Little House series, popular even with adults.

The appearance of the Library and Pioneer Museum has been improved by the recent addition of 812 square feet of floor space. This provides space for a re-arrangement of shelves and of museum cases to better advantage.

Members of the Wednesday Club, which sponsors purchase of books for the Library, are planning to arrange a reading center for small children. This is made possible by a gift from the Woodman Lodge of Baird.

Another recent gift was a check from various clubs and individuals of Baird for the establishment of a Peruvian Shelf of Literature for children.

National Library Week will be an appropriate time to visit the Callahan County Library and Pioneer Museum in the basement of the courthouse.

Bo Strickland paced the Cross Plains Buffaloes to the District 10-A track and field championship at Ranger Thursday, winning both dashes and anchoring the winning 440-yard relay team.

The Buffs scored 112 points to edge Baird which finished with 100 1/2.

Strickland took the century in 9.8 and the 220 in 21.8. He was the day's only double winner.

One of the top duels of the meet came in the hurdles where Ranger's Jerry Watson and Jim Brown of Cross Plains locked horns. Brown took the high in 15.1 and Watson the lows in 19.5, both races near photo-finishes.

Albany won the freshman division with a 65-64 edge over Ranger, while Baird captured the junior high bracket over Albany, 53-44.

Walter was one of the first of the Turtle members. The Turtles were the first organized rodeo group. When Walter was the ripe old age of 13 he won the calf roping at the SKI-HI STAMPEDE in Monte Vista Colorado.

After Walter was married he found that contesting alone was not a steady enough income to support a family, so he started working for different stock contractors as pick-up man and then he became a stock foreman for a Kansas producer and later became a partner. A few years later he had a chance to buy another stock contractor in Colorado and be on his own. Since that time he has been

trying to build his stock and the quality of rodeo he puts on. He keeps looking for things that will make his rodeo more colorful and more interesting to the spectators as well as improving his stock.

Walter loves animals and takes personal care of his animals. When the rodeo starts and until it is over you will find Walter at the chutes, as he likes to handle his own stock.

Walter has contested in all the events except saddle bronc riding and he still enters the roping events.

Walter has taken his son in as a partner now and the son picks up. The son, Art also, enters the roping and steer wrestling events. Walter and Art team rope together where ever there is a roping, when they are not putting on a rodeo.
