Notary Appointments

To be Made in May-June

Secretary of State Howard Carney has armounced that he will reappoint all persons who now hold Notary Public Commissions and that all such persons must qualify by filing an oath and bond with the County Clerk of their residence beeen June 1, 1953, and June 10, 1953. The law specifically required County Clerks to approve Notary bonds and individuals should not send money or requests for commissions direct to the Secretary of State. All Notary matters can only be received by the Secretary of State after the County Clerk acts

Any person who has not heretofore been a Notary Public siould apply to his County Clerk between May 1, 1953, and May 23, 1953, if he desires to have this application given prompt attention in the State Department, as the rush of re appointing all old notaries may slow up the ordinary process of making new appointments and issuing commissions.

MINED ORIGIN DESTROYED MUCH OF THE ROCKWELL BROS. & COMPANY LUMBER FIRM IN FRIONA THIS AFTER-NOON, WITH FLAMES SWEPT BY HIGH WEST WINDS EN-GULFING THE ENTIRE WEST SHEDS OF THE FIRM IN THE MATTER OF ONLY A FEW MIN-

.Totally destroyed were three of the buildings and their contents. The bins forming the west wall of the firm were burned to the ground and only the charred remains of their contents were left by nightfall. Part of this section was erected in 1907 when the Rockwell firm established its Friona branch. This shed was 24 ft. by 150 ft. Part of it had been built later in 1925. A new bin directly behind the offices was completed only a few days ago; it and its contents also were destroyed

The fire broke out in the extreme northwest corner of the buildings O. F. Lange, local manager, reported. He stated that no wiring was in that section and only insulation was stored on the upper deck at that point, with nothing stored on the ground floor there. However, most of the bins were virtually full; probably two-thirds of the lumber stock of the firm was destroyed.

The spectacular fire was discovered by employees taking inventory in the yard. Howard Love. Billy Nazworth and W. J. Nazworth noted the flames coming through the roof at about 3:30 or shortly thereafter, Lange said, and firemen were on the scene only a few minutes later, but the high winds already had swept the billow ing flames the 150 ft. length of the

The Friona firemen and other volunteer workers fought desperately for well over an hour to keep the fire from spreading throughout the yard covering a quarter of the city block in downtown Friona, and their persistant and often dangerous work in close proximity to the wind-swept flames saved the office building and sheds to the east, Wet cloths were continually used by one company of fighters to protect their faces from the extreme heat as they played a steady stream of water onto the rear of the of fice building, preventing ignition of that section. Suffocating smcke hindered fighting at close quar-

Late today, manager Lange had made no estimate of the financial loss to the yard or of the board feet of lumber stock dstroyed. The firm was insured.

A bit of human intrest was supplied with two uniformed Salvation Army workers coming to the scene, both the man and the woing they carried cases of Cokes to the hot and weary workers still in the smoke, water and rubble.

The Hereford Fire Department greatly assisting in finally quenchng the fire. However, the Friona shtrs seemed to have the flames well under control by the time the visitors could get here.

Mr. Lange asked the Star late today to express his deepest gratitude to all who assisted in any way, especially to the local firemen and to the Hereford fire department and to the Salva ion Army.

And because of the ever nearness of the situation and the present acuteness of it, we offer no apologies for its discussion in the columns of this paper. We would not be worth our salt and the very ink on this sheet would be tainted if any other course were

In the one and one-half hours devoted to this particular session, a "multitude of sins" were aired with the moderator finding it somewhat difficult to focus attention to the one case at hand. In fact, discussions ranged from the commendation by some parents of the local pool hall as a beneficial entertainment and moral force in the community to other subjects including alleged double parking of ye editor, the merits and demerits of particular school representatives, and the past offenses of "the other boys more guilty than mine".

We personally are convinced that much more could have been accomplished had each parent directed more concern toward "my own boy" than in trying the ridiculous number of cases not on the

The truism has been brought home to many of us in recent weeks: It is so much easier and much more equitable for all concerned to remedy a wrong at its very beginning. Otherwise there are inevitable injustices and complications. AND we don't imply that the boys this week were unjustly punished - we mean that offenders in the past were unjustly ignored or coddled.

Suggestions for a POSITIVE approach to youth problems or programs are ever in order; bringing to mind some questions:

What are YOU AND I doing in the very real day to day incidents in Friona? What are the churches doing? Are any ministers present at the court trials or at the open forum discussions? What of the school board? What is the extent of the guidance and counseling work of the ministers, the scout leaders, even the city officials who definitely have social obligations in this field?



A program for real peace was presented to the world by President Eisenhower in his recent address before American newspaper editors. The Presidnt spoke as the leader of the nation -- not as the leader of a poltical party. He looked for ways of getting out of our difficulties - not for pointless arguments about how we got into them. He stressed the basic rinciples that unite Americans - not the partisan differences that divide them.

As your Senator - as an American - I support that kind of program. I am ready at any time to do whatever I can to help the President carry it out.





School Scheduled For Deaf Children

A ten day session for the parents of pre-school deaf children has been planned for and applications are now being taken. This session is to be held at the Texas School for the Deaf in Austin.

Any parents and pre-school deaf children who are residents of Texas will be potentially eligible to attend. Formerly, only mothers and the deaf child was eligible, but last year the school enrolled two fathers, so fathers are being included in the planning of the session of this school. Preference will be given to children who become six years of age by September of this year

This summer school is not an attempt to train parents as teachers, but to help clarify the problems and development of a deaf youngster prior to his entering school. Certain educational leaders have recognized the fact that there is no place available for the counselling of parents confronted with deafness of their child and their need for medical, psychological, and educational counselling. This summer school is planned to present people of authority who are professional in each of these areas.

More information concerning the summer school may be obtained by calling the State Department of Public Welfar in the Deaf Smith County Courthouse, or by writing to the Texas School for the Deaf at 1102 South Congress, Austin 4, Texas.

Anyone in the community kno_{xa}ing of a deaf child and his parents
should make this information
available to them. Incidentally, the
only cost to these parents and
their deaf child is the transportation to and from Austin.

to the price they could have received from the Commodity Credit Corporation had they elected to come under the price support program. Therefore, this bill was introduced for the puurpose of requiring the Commodity Credit Corp to take this crop nto the loan program, even though the farmers in scuthern Maryland had by an almost 3 to 1 majority elected to take their chances on the open market and had afree hand to plant as much tobacco as they desired. It reminded me of the case of the negro boy who was hailed efore a court to answer a charge. The judge asked him if he wanted to plead guilty or not guilty. The negro boy told the judge that he would like to hear the evidence frst. That is exactly the situation that the Maryland tobacco farmers were in. They want to wait until the crop is in and find out what the market is before they decide on the support praogram. If this policy should be followed on basic commodities as a general farm price support program, it would bankrupt this country in no time at all. And if the Maryland tobacco ram, it would be hard to argue that farmers are entitled to such a prog the farmers raising other basic com modities would not be entitled to the same treatment. This type of legislation would add more fuel to the fires of those who would dest roy the basic farm price support pro gram than any other thing I can think of. The strange thing was that most of the members of the Congress realized it, but it appear ed that certain factions had deter mined to force this bill through the House simply because Secretary of Argriculture Ezra T. Benson had put his stamp of approval on it. The bill was debated for two hours, or that is the proponent of the bill argued for itfor 98 minutes and the opponents got to argue about 22 minutes. Then the bill was read for amendment and a motion was adopted by voice vote which limit ed futher discussion of the bill for amendment to approximately 25 mi nutes. The few proprosed amend-ment, to the bill which were inten ded to do away with its bad featur es were shouted down on voice vote and soundly defeated on a teller vote, neither of which votes are recorded. Then on final passage of the bill a record vote was called for and enough members were in favor of the record vot to insure it. On the vote on final pas age of the bill it was defeated by the resounding margin of 213 to110.

During the debate it was brought out by one of the Mississippi Conrressmen who was on the Agricult ure Committee that during the hearings on the bill, not one of the 71 per cent of the farmers who vot ed against coming under the support program appeared on behalf of the il. He explaned this by saying that this 71 per cent was probably a bunch of Washingtonians who are farming on the side. In other word city larmers who operate some o these farms merely for th epurpose of saving some money on income taxes. They thought that they would make a killing in the tothis, they wanted the taxpayer to bail them out. Passage of this legislation could have easily endanger ed the entre basic farm program for which so many of us have fought. I was somewhat amused at some who supported this bill and who have been screaming about creeping socalism. I thought they were aganst creeping socialism, but from the looks of this bill it appears that what they wanted to do was

I wrote the Postmaster General to ask (1) if postmasterships are to be denied because of political affiliations to persons who have passed Civil Service examinations recently but whoe appointments have yet to be confirmed, and (2) if postal appointments are to be removed from Civil Service.

The Deputy Postmaster General replied that "No one is being dened opportunity to compete for a postmastership because of political affiliations," He said standards had been raised because "The position of postmaster is much more important than has been generally recognized." It is iteresting that the Republicans didn't recognize the importance of postmasters until they started making the appointments. He also wrote: "There is no intention of removing from office any of the postmasters appointed during the previous administration if they are now performing and contnue to perform satisfactory




