

#### Howard College trustees renew contracts, create posts Those receiving renewals were Terry Hansen, executive vice president; Linda

Conway, vice president for instruction; Ron Brasel, SouthWest Collegiate Institue for the Deaf provost; Amy Burchett, administrativedean for institutional advancement; and John Jasper, provost for the San Angelo campus. Trustees approved two

new positions – athletic director for the Big Spring campus and coordinator of workforce training for the San Angelo campus. These positions will be advertised and posted immediately. Terry Hansen has been

filling the position of athletic director for about a year. "We have made the decision to post the athletic director as a separate position," said Hansen. "In the past, the position has been handled by one of the coaches with an additional stipend included for the additional duties. We have determined however, it is in the best interest of the college to go ahead and post

that as a separate position

and then on top of athletic director duties work in a secondary role that would fit with the individual's background, skills and education.

Also approved by the board was a bid by Places & Pleasures Travel Agency to handle all travel services for the college. One other bid was received from Big Spring Skipper Travel. Both agencies provided the same services; however, Places & Pleasures offered to provide a 30-day net billing cycle

Travel did not.

Architect Phil Furgueron gave an update on construction projects currently underway. He said that the auditorium renovation project should be ready to go out for bids by the end of the week. He also said the SWCID dorm project was progressing well. He noted that the asbestos abatement project had been completed for around \$2,000, some \$3,000 less than at first anticipated.

## **BSISD** trustees mull superintendent

Redistricting, various bids on tap for council tonight; FM 700 hearing will follow

Redistricting and bids are the top items on the agenda for Big Spring City Council members, who meet at an earlier time tonight than usual.

The council will convene in chambers at 5 p.m. instead of the normal 5:30 time in order to be completed before a Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) public hearing on the FM

700 project at 6. That public hearing will also be held in council chambers, 307 East Fourth St

Council members are expected to adopt criteria to be used in the redistricting process and to execute an the agreement with University of Texas of the Permian Basin to provide redistricting services. The criteria simply calls for easily identifiable boundaries, the use of alleyways instead of the middle of streets as dividing lines, and that the districts should be relatively equal in size. The council will consider bids for a fire truck as well as the sludge removal project at the water treatment plant. Also on the agenda is a recommendation to advertise for bids for seal coating materials.

The school board took no action following the special meeting, but has scheduled another meeting for 5:30 p.m. Monday to continue the process of replacing Superintendent William McQueary, who "Bill" announced his decision to retire during the board's Feb. 8 meeting.

McQueary, whose career in education spans 34 years, the past 14 as Big Spring superintendent, has indicat-

ed he will retire on July 1.

Following Monday's session, board president Irene Bustamante explained that the district's attorney, Paul Hunt, has advised trustees that they must post the superintendent's position for a minimum of 21 days before hiring McQueary's successor.

That means BSISD trustees could name a new superintendent during their

Howard County Commissioners Court on Monday unanimously approved the hiring of a new library administrator

Hollis McCright, a reference librarian at Mahon Public Library in Lubbock, has been selected to replace Loraine Redman, who left

last month to accept an assistant administrator's position at the Nicholson Memorial Library in Garland.

McCright will begin her duties in about a month, and will receive a salary of approximately \$40,000 per vear

"She wants to give her employer a two-week notice and she also had some vacation time coming," said

County Judge Ben Lockhart. "She has an outstanding resume and we are looking forward to her coming.'

McCright received her master of library science degree last year from Texas Woman's University. She received her bachelor's degree in history from Tarleton State University in 1975. She has previously served as a

bookkeeper/clerk in Midland and Lubbock and taught history and geography for two years at Christ The King Cathedral School in Lubbock.

Odle was out of the office today, and unavailable for comment.


According to De La Garza, a career move and family considerations were the deciding factors for Odle's decision to resign from his current position.

the time listed on the ticket, the judge will issue them a courtesy letter telling them they need to come in and pay the fine. If they do not pay the fine, the judge enters the information into a computer system that is sent to Austin with a company the state has a contract with called Omni Base. That company then will send the violator a letter. If they have not heard from them in 30 days another letter is sent. If after that 30 days has passed without a response, the company will send notification to DPS headquarters in Austin that they have not paid their fine and they will be denied renewing their driver's license until the fine has been paid.'

Hester said that after DPS has been notified, if the individual is stopped, he will receive a citation for driving with an invalid license. The license will continue to be flagged until the fine is paid. Hester also said that it may be possible to go back to the year 1998 in order to recoup old traffic fines that are still unpaid. The program is in effect in Mitchell, Martin and Dawson counties and is 'going very well," according to Hester.

back toward the major shopping center without incurring any traffic lights. In addition, the west-bound exit ramp just before U.S. 87 will be moved east about 1,000 yards.

Finally, traffic signals will be placed at the west Wal-Mart entrance to (between Furr's and Pizza Hut parking lots) and at Virginia, east of Goliad.

Another part of the project will be to have a true fourway intersection at Goliad. Currently, motorists find themselves stopping at lights some 30 feet or more from FM 700 because of traffic from the frontage roads. Traffic moving along the south frontage road going east will now hit a stop sign at Goliad, and will turn left to go north to the traffic light.

Barrow said bids on the project will be let in December and construction is expected to begin in January 2002. It should be completed in September.



## Survivors dig out after Mississippi tornado

PONTOTOC, Miss. (AP) -Johnny Seale broke into tears as he stood in the debris around his home. He had survived a deadly twister, but his 36-year-old son, a sister and his nephew were not so lucky.

"It is bad. So bad," said Seale, his head bowed.

Residents of northern Mississippi recalled the tornado that cut a 23-mile path across Pontotoc County on Saturday night, killing five, injuring hundreds and damaging more than 360 homes. Crews using chain saws

cut through toppled trees to reach homes and downed said it could be days before services are restored to the hardest-hit areas.

Seale remembers helping the wounded.

"We had about 20 to 25 in the living room and we covered them up with quilts and got them dry," he said. "That's all I knew to do. I couldn't get them to the hospital.

"There were trees across the street and the phones were all out. I done all that I could do.'



Nor does NMD do dog to protect us from drugresistant strains of TB that are spreading concomitantly with AIDS, or from the consequences of massive poverty in the Third World and what are called "failed states" — the new politically correct way to say "regimes corrupt to the

point of disaster.' On the TB front, John LeCarre's new novel. "The Constant Gardener," is both a great read and an excellent primer on the role of multinational pharmaceutical companies in the Third World – a splendid tale of corporate evil-doing, but with the exquisite sadness of the heart-broken idealist that distinguishes LeCarre's work.

On the global warming front, the fresh evidence is almost too depressing to contemplate in conjunction with the Bushies' blindness. All the news is bad. The journal Science reports that an analysis of ice cores drilled in the Himalayan mountains shows that the past decade has been the warmest for 1,000 years. The fate of Pacific coral reefs suggests

an even longer period. The New York Times

reports that the snows of Kilimanjaro, which have floated for thousands of years like a cool beacon over Tanzania, are retreating so fast that they will be gone in 15 years. The same is true of icecaps from Peru to Tibet.

The most chilling report is by the IPCC - the **United Nations** International Panel on Climate Change. (I'm afraid that's an acronym with which you will become extremely familiar.) The panel consists of more than 400 of the world's leading climatologists. They predict that global warming may raise the average temperature of Earth as much as 10 degrees over the average temperature of 1990. That is a dramatic escalation from 1995, when they predicted a maximum hemispheric rise of 6 degrees. We're in big trouble.

If we were being invaded by aliens from space, we would react more intelligently than this. At least we'd recognize it as a national-security threat.

I know that many of you who are well-informed about global warming sometimes despair of breaking through the denial, partially paid for by the energy companies — not to mention the depressing sight of Texas oilmen running the country's energy policy. Despair is not only

a grave sin but, I think, unwarranted. If you can remember when President Nixon went to China, this country essentially turned on a dime. From decades of denouncing Beijing (which we then spelled "Peking") as the heart of absolute darkness, we suddenly noticed that it also happened to be the largest market in the world. That took about 10 minutes. As for the terrible epidemic, I would like to salute Time magazine for the challenge on its recent cover story: "This is about AIDS in Africa. Look at the pictures. Read the words. And then try not to care.' If compassion is beyond you, despite its newly Bushian status in politics, try this: There's not a chance that victims of "failed states" and climate change are going to stay where they are. The most massive migrations in history will follow if nothing is done. In your children's



At one time in the South when someone started acting in a pompous manner, you would say, "Climb down off that big white horse." To be angry was to "have the reds." To go on a bender was to "get red-eyed and rowdy."

An ex-convict of my acquaintance once said, after describing a humiliation, "But I ain't a dog. I'm a man among men."

Much of language is born in the military, and, as new phrases or words arise, others become obsolete. We know that "to buy the farm" means to die, but few people would know that "Adam and Eve on a raft" means eggs on toast. "GI" means Government Issue. The Purple Heart, a decoration awarded to someone who is wounded, was called "the slow badge" in Vietnam.

In frontier days, a man who had been shot or stabbed might elicit the comment, "You couldn't store shucks in that guy's body." A bowlegged man "couldn't trap a pig in a one-foot ditch." A shiftyeyed person might be described as having "skimmilk eyes.

Another old saying was, 'He was born lazy and reared tired." "Hookworm hustle" also described a lethargic person, but since few, if any, people in paved-over America have been infected with hookworms, it has become meaningless. From firearms comes the

phrase "lock, stock and barrel." These are three components of a rifle. To "shoot your wad" is to have no effect. It refers to people who, in the excitement of battle, loaded their muskets with powder and wad but forgot to put in the lead ball. "Hitting the nail on the head" refers to frontier shooting matches when the target was often a nail dri-

ven into a board. My father liked to use Coca-Cola bottle caps for a target. He could hit them, too, with his pistol from about 40 feet out. "Broadside" refers to a volley of cannons on a sailing ship. "Scalping" tickets comes from the earlier meaning of the word, which was literally to take a person's scalp as a trophy. It's sure a pleasure to see

Just like any team, Howard College's Hawks are suspect when they play as individuals. But as a whole, playing as a team, they are almost impossible to beat.

Howard's collective effort Monday night, combined a sub-par first half with an awe-inspiring second half to take the 94-71 win over Clarendon College's Bulldogs

It could have been Zacherie Moss' inside play or Derrick Tarver's perimeter performance, but whatever the Hawks did, they managed to put themselves in a position to contend for fourth place in the Western Junior College Athletic Conference (WJCAC).

The Hawks' win, coupled with New Mexico Junior College's loss to Odessa, leaves Howard and NMJC tied for the WJCAC's fourth and final berth in the Region V Tournament with one game remaining in the regular season.

The Hawks will close out the reg ular season Thursday night when they travel to Levelland to take on South Plains' Texans, the thirdplace team in the WJCAC standings NMJC, on the other hand, closes out the conference schedule at home Thursday. But the Thunderbirds may be facing an even tougher task than the Hawks, because the final WJCAC game has Midland College's second-place Chaparrals coming to call. The Hawks' win Monday night started in the usual fashion, with Howard battling the Bulldogs back and forth, leading one moment and tied the next before taking a 39-36 advantage into halftime. Whatever was said during the break had had the desired effect, as the Hawks - led by Tarver and Moss - came out to boost their minuscule 3-point edge to a commanding 15-point lead. The Hawks were almost perfect from the free throw line on the night, hitting 13-of-15 from the stripe, and were nothing short of devastating from long distance, knocking down 11 3-pointers. Tarver, who struggled offensively in the first half, came out on fire in the second half, providing five of those 3-point shots. **Teammates Christopher Acker** and Ander Pinedo also had a hot hand, but it was Tarver that led all scorers with 28 points behind his




